All References to Massachusetts General Law (MGL) and the Code of Massachusetts Regulations (CMR) are valid as of 2014

7.17. Predator Control

7.17.1. No Lethal Predator Control Measures

Unless specifically authorized by the Director, in consultation with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and/or the National Marine Fisheries Service, it shall be unlawful to use lethal means to control or exclude predators or other organisms from any area used for aquaculture. Non-lethal enclosures, including, but not limited to, nets, fences, bubble curtains and noise may be used, if approved for a specific site and purpose. Invertebrate predators, pests and fouling organisms may be removed manually from an aquaculture site and disposed of in a lawful manner (CMR 322, Section 13.7.2).

7.17.2. No Taking of Horseshoe Crabs or Whelks/Conks Without Permit.

Being in possession of horseshoe crabs and whelks (conchs) for any reason requires a State permit. In this regulation, whelk/conch refers to either knobbed whelk (Busycon carica) or channeled (smooth) whelk (Busycotypus canaliculatus). (See CMR 322 <u>6. 34: Horseshoe Crab Management</u> and 322 CMR <u>Section 6.21: Minimum Size for Conch.</u>) As stated in 7.17.1, neither species shall be intentionally killed while practicing predator control.

7.17.3. No Harm to Endangered Species

No person shall maintain a predator control method that will intentionally threaten any endangered species.

7.18. Aquaculture Gear and Equipment

7.18.1. Grants Shall Be Marked

Every licensee shall mark the corners of the area licensed under their license with buoys marked with the license number. From April 1st to November 1st, the corners shall be marked with fluorescent yellow balls, at least twenty (20) inches in circumference. Buoys shall be attached to their anchor by cables, chains or non-floating lines. Numbers shall be marked on said buoys, and shall be at least two (2) inches high and shall be black in color. Temporary buoys shall be required from November 1 through April 1.

7.18.2. Height and Arrangement of Equipment

With the exception of spat collection devices there shall be no equipment or gear made of metal that rises more than eighteen (18") inches above the grade, and equipment or gear made of plastic (or another equally flexible material) higher than twenty-four (24") inches above the grade, within the boundaries of a licensed area.

7.18.3. Marking of Gear

Every licensee shall clearly and permanently mark any and all trays, boxes, holding cars and all other aquaculture gear with the license number of the license area in a manner that is clearly visible.

7.18.4. Removal of Damaged Gear or Equipment

All equipment or gear which is either damaged, or can no longer used as it was originally designed or intended to be used in the opinion of the Constable, must be removed from a licensed area and either disposed of properly or moved to an appropriate site not located within a protected resource area. This includes, but is not limited to, loose nets, twisted and damaged racks, loose envelopes, grow-out bags and fastening devises.

7.18.5. Overwintering of Equipment on Grants

Racks, rebar or u hooks used to secure nets on a licensed area must either be securely fastened to within eight inches (8") of the bottom or removed by January 15, or before ice prevents removal, whichever comes first.

Any licensee who wishes to overwinter racks on their grant must obtain and sign an agreement form available from the Shellfish Department.

APPENDIX D:

FORM OF AGREEMENT

I,
agree to remove all metal racks, rebar or u hooks used to secure nets to the bottom, or anything constructed of metal, by January 15th, or before ice prevents removal, whichever comes first.
If I decide to store racks on my grant(s) over the winter, I agree to the following conditions:
1. All racks shall be tagged with the owner's name and grant number.
2. An accurate number of racks being left on the grant will be provided on this agreement form
3. All such racks must be pumped down to within 8" of the bottom.
4. Any racks that are damaged during the winter must be cleaned up by March 1st or when the departure of ice allows, whichever comes first.
5. I understand that I am solely liable for any damage my equipment may cause to other aquaculturists or the public.
6. Failure to adhere to these conditions can result in suspension or revocation of my grant license, in accordance with Section 11 of the Wellfleet Shellfishing Policy and Regulations.

Previously I have prepared three other memoranda on snow and ice removal from private ways. Two dated May 26, 2015 are posted in the Town Administrator's documents section of the Town web site: http://www.wellfleet-ma.gov/town-administrator-documents. The third, dated October 26, 2015, was included with the November 10, 2015 selectmen's meeting materials and was directed at cost issues only.

Snow and ice removal from private ways is an exception to the general rule that towns may not spend public money for private benefit. The exception is in Mass. General Laws, chapter 40, section 6C which provides as follows:

A city or town which accepts this section in the manner provided in section six D may appropriate money for the removal of snow and ice from such private ways within its limits and open to the public use as may be designated by the city council or selectmen; provided, that, for the purposes of section twenty-five of chapter eighty-four, the removal of snow or ice from such a way shall not constitute a repair of a way.

Wellfleet accepted this statute on September 14, 1982.

From 1983 through 2006 the selectmen authorized the plowing of certain private roads. The warrant for the 2006 annual town meeting included a listing of private roads which the selectmen and determined would be plowed, and a further list of private dirt roads that will no longer be plowed. Copies of both are attached. I am not aware of subsequent votes by the Board of Selectmen to authorize the plowing of additional private roads. Since publication of the list in 2006 the DPW has been advising the Planning Board that approval of a subdivision plan does not mean that the roads on the plan will be added to the list of roads to be plowed. On December 11, 2012 the Board of Selectmen adopted the current policy on snow removal from paved private roads. The policy is posted on the Town web site along with a list of roads and their eligibility under the policy as determined by an inspection of their condition. The policy and list are posted at: http://www.wellfleet-

ma.gov/sites/wellfleetma/files/file/file/41 paved private road maintenance policy 201 5-08-11 with road list as of 2015-08-13.pdf. On August 11, 2015 the Board of Selectmen voted to defer enforcement of this policy until after the winter of 2015-16.

At the November 10, 2015 meeting the Board of Selectmen voted "to have a compassionate emergency response snow plowing plan where everyone with medical

condition should write a letter to the Selectmen. Discussion ensued. Ms. Bruinooge clarified that this will be just temporary one year solution until better solutions is found." Motion 2015-370 (minutes in draft form at present.)

In determining how to exercise the Board's discretion under the authority in section 6C I suggest that the following factors might be considered:

- (1) Are there are year round residents living on the road that would be put at risk should the town not plow the road? Examples might include individuals with known, significant medical conditions or individuals who are on some form of public assistance or otherwise unable to afford the cost of plowing.
- (2) Is the road open to public use? It is a requirement of the statute that he road be open for public use.
- (3) Is the condition of the road such that it can be safely plowed? The board may wish to adopt standards and may wish to request comment from the DPW. Standards adopted by other town include such requirements as signage, adequate cleared width, the presence of year round occupants and a road surface that does not contain significant surface irregularities (e. g. no depressions more than 1 inch deep.) The standards in the current paved private road policy could be easily adapted to unpaved roads. In many cases this could be achieved by nothing more than the removal of the word "paved" from the policy sections.
- (4) Does the Town have a sufficient snow and ice removal appropriation to service the additional road(s)?

QUESTION 1. Shall the Town of Wellfleet be allowed to exempt from the provisions of Proposition 2 ½ so-called, the amounts required to pay for bonds or notes issued by the Town in order to pay for a new road grader?

QUESTION 2. Shall the Town of Wellfleet be allowed to exempt from the provisions of Proposition 2 ½ so-called, the amounts required to pay for bonds or notes issued by the Town in order to pay for a new street sweeper?

QUESTION 3. Shall the Town of Wellfleet be allowed to assess an additional \$52,000 in real estate and personal property taxes for the purpose of funding one (1) additional position for the Department of Public Works for the fiscal year 2007 beginning July 1, 2006?

QUESTION 4. Shall the Town of Wellfleet be allowed to assess an additional \$34,000 in real estate and personal property taxes for the purpose of funding contract services and materials for snow removal on private roads for fiscal year 2007 beginning July 1, 2006?

QUESTION 5. Shall the Town of Wellfleet be allowed to assess an additional \$25,000 in real estate and personal property taxes for the purpose of funding Wellfleet's share of the Flex Route bus system?

ARTICLE 32. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, transfer from available funds or borrow the sum of \$180,000, or any other sum, for the purpose of purchasing and outfitting a new street sweeper, or do or act anything thereon.

FINANCE COMMITTEE RESERVES RECOMMENDATION TO TOWN MEETING BOARD OF SELECTMEN RECOMMENDS 4-0-1

The three preceding Articles will fund the additional equipment and personnel required to remove snow and sweep sand on all private paved roads. The Board of Selectmen recommends that the Town remove snow and sand on all 147 private paved roads beginning in fiscal year 2007. Private contractors will be used to plow approximately 30-40 private paved roads. The following is the breakdown of needed funds:

Contract Services - \$27,000 Materials - \$7,000 Sweeper - \$180,000 Personnel - \$52,000

Last year the town plowed the first half of Howard Court but ended at the beginning of the extension. We have been told that the town will not plow any "new" private roads but cannot find any confirmation of that policy in the documents we have read on the town website — all we can glean from the information is that the existing Howard Court is non - compliant due to the fact there is no turn around which the extension does provide.

We do not understand how the town can provide a service to the majority of the residents and deny that same service to others. We would like to know the procedure that is needed in order to become eligible for plowing for the winter of 2015 -2016.


Based on the above we request that Beach St. be plowed by the town at least as far as number 30.

To Whom It May Concern:

- 1. I am a year-round Wellfleet resident of 220 Aaron Rich Road. My house is located at the end of Aaron Rich Road. The original 1799 captain's house built by Captain Aaron Rich is next door to my house. It was bought by my grandparents, Paul and Nina Chavchavadze in 1939, and now belongs to my sister Alexandra Chavchavadze. Aaron Rich Road is currently the only access road to both houses, and to several other houses in the area (approximately 20 year round residents and 4 summer residents). My family has been paying Wellfleet taxes since 1939. I have been a year round resident since 1994. I am 62 years old.
- 2. In 2002, my sister and I sold 8 acres of land to the Wellfleet Conservation Trust at well below market rate, enabling the Town of Wellfleet to increase the footprint of the Fox Island Conservation area that now surrounds our property. The Conservation Trust now owns approximately 1/2 of Aaron Rich Road and provides maps for public access to the Fox Island Conservation trails. Aaron Rich Road is marked on these maps as a route for visitors to access the public trails.

Since the sale of our land to the Conservation Trust in 2002, I have personally paid for the maintenance/plowing of the entire Conservation Trust-owned section of Aaron Rich Road. I have been told by the Conservation Commission that they cannot share the cost of road maintenance. This has been a considerable hardship for me over the years and has become increasingly burdensome during recent snow storms, and as I approach retirement age.

3. In 2002, our neighbor granted us a legal easement across Moses Hinckley Road in order to facilitate the sale of our land for conservation. At that time, in the interests of conservation, we signed an agreement with the town saying that we would use Aaron Rich Road exclusively for our daily usage. I agreed to this because, at the time, Aaron Rich Road was being maintained by the town, and was listed by the town as one of the roads regularly maintained.

In 2006, the town voted to remove Aaron Rich Road (and other private, unpaved roads) from the list of maintained roads. I would never have signed the agreement with the town to use Aaron Rich Road exclusively if I had known the town would discontinue maintaining the road. This has created a further hardship for me. There are frequent times during the winter months when there is significant snow build-up on the road, rendering it impassable. As I reach retirement age and go onto a fixed income, this situation will become even more difficult for me. I hope you will consider approving the maintenance and plowing of Aaron Rich Road for the reasons listed above.

4. Aaron Rich Road is crossed by Moses Hinckley Road, a historic public way listed on an 1827 Wellfleet town meeting document. Moses Hinckley Road runs in a Northerly direction to Pilgrim Spring Road. This road, the original access to our property, now abuts our neighbor's property. Moses Hinckley Road continues to be the closest route to our house for emergency responders during storms, or when our electric line goes down, as it does usually once per winter (we have private electric lines so must call Farrells Electric in an emergency). Approximately two years ago, our neighbor blocked the entrance to Moses Hinckley Road with boulders and has planted trees in its path, so today emergency responders are not able to reach my house or electric lines this way. As far as I know, the north end of Moses Hinckley Road has never been closed by the town.

I am attaching a map of Aaron Rich Road showing my property (colored in—1.16 acres, Parcel ID 29-283-3) and other properties.


Dear Wellfleet Board of Selectmen:

SENATE No. 478

By Mr. Wolf, a petition (accompanied by bill, Senate, No. 478) of Daniel A. Wolf, Timothy R. Madden, Sarah K. Peake, Chris Walsh and other members of the General Court for legislation relative to vegetation management. Environment, Natural Resources and Agriculture.

The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the One Hundred and Eighty-Ninth General Court (2015-2016)

An Act relative to vegetation management.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

- Any public utility, state agency or authority that maintains a right-of-way through a
- 2 municipality or through property under the control of a water district shall offer a no-spray
- 3 agreement, with reasonable provisions, for the municipality or water district to consider if it
- 4 desires. Any such agreement negotiated may include but is not limited to the responsibilities of
- 5 the parties, the allocation of costs and the rights and remedies of the parties in the event of
- 6 default and may apply to all or any part of the right-of-way within the municipality or over
- 7 which a water district has authority. Any agreement reached under this section must be
- 8 negotiated in good faith, written, and signed by all parties. As part of the no-spray agreement the
- 9 municipality or water district may either perform the vegetation control work to standards as
- 10 provided in the agreement or contract with the public utility or others to conduct the work.
- If the municipality or water district and the entity seeking to control the vegetation are
- 12 unable to come to an agreement regarding a no-spray approach to vegetation management within

13 60 days of beginning discussions, the disputed issues shall be decided by arbitration using an
14 arbitrator mutually agreed to by the parties. If the parties are unable to agree to an arbitrator
15 within 15 days, each party shall choose one arbitrator each and those selected arbitrators shall,
16 within 15 days of being selected, agree upon a third arbitrator. The panel of three arbitrators shall
17 then determine the disputed issues within 15 days from the date the third arbitrator agrees to
18 participate. Nothing in this section shall prevent the parties form using an organization such as
19 the American Arbitration Association or a similar entity.

If a reasonable no-spray agreement is offered to a municipality and an agreement is not reached within 90 days after the date of the offer, the public utility, at its own option may apply pesticides, approved by the Massachusetts Department of Agriculture, in its right-of-way or use other methods to control the vegetation. If the municipality or water district agrees to perform vegetation control work but does not perform it by the agreed upon date or another date reasonably negotiated as the result of weather or other unforeseen events causing delay, the public utility, after 90 days written notice to the municipality or water district, at its own option may apply approved herbicides in its right of way or use other methods to control the vegetation.

It is the intent of this section that an alternative right-of-way maintenance procedure
without the use of pesticides is made available to municipalities and water districts. This section
does not affect a municipality's right to enact by-laws or ordinances not the public utilities to
maintain its right-of-way clear of unwanted vegetation in the absence of a no-spray agreement.

Dear ENRA Committee Chairs Senator Gobi and Representative Schmid:

The Wellfleet Board of Selectmen writes to respectfully ask that the ENRA committee move forward and favorably report out Senator Dan Wolf's bill S.478, a bill regarding vegetation management in rights-of-ways.

The intent of this bill is to give individual towns such as Wellfleet the right to negotiate a no pesticide spraying agreement with Eversource Energy Corp. The bill will provide the citizens of Wellfleet an alternative method of maintaining rights-of-way without the use of toxic pesticides.

Wellfleet, located on the outer arm of Cape Cod, is located in a single source aquifer. The Town's municipal water system and many of our residents rely on locally driven wells for potable water. Many of these wells, including the Town's municipal wellfield are located in close proximity to the Eversource transmission right of way and are therefore place at risk by use of chemical means to control right of way vegetation.

Wellfleet strongly supports a mechanism to provide for alternatives to the application of chemicals in close proximity to our community's only sources of drinking water; we call upon you to move promptly report this bill favorably.

As directed on October 27, 2015 below are the positions of the Board of Water Commissioners and the Conservation Commission in regards to EverSource spraying of the rights-of-way in Wellfleet:

BOARD OF WATER COMMISSIONERS (Discussed during the meeting of November 3, 2015): The Board discussed differing views on the topic of the value and safety of herbicide spraying done by EverSource on Cape Cod, and specifically within Wellfleet.

Vanderschmidt made the motion for the to BWC stand opposed to EverSource spraying; Chair Carlson seconded; the motion passed 3-1 (Nass).

Nass made a motion that the BWC recommend testing be done on the effects on the groundwater after the recent spraying, and that the testing be done by an independent party; Chair Carlson seconded; the motion passed 4-0.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION (Discussed during the meeting of November 18, 2015): The Conservation Commission remains concerned about public and private drinking water and wetland resources along the power line Right of Way.

Out of concern for public health and the environment our preference is for an herbicide free Right-of-Way and we would strongly encourage the use of mechanical removal of targeted species in lieu of herbicide application.

Even with my planned leave during December I will be unable to reduce my unused vacation leave to the five days I am permitted by contract to carry over annually while continuing to meet my responsibilities as Town Administrator. I am requesting the Board's approval to carry over my unused vacation days, which I estimate will be somewhere between eight and eleven days depending on how much time I am able to take off between Christmas and New Year's Day.

Article 29 of the 2014 Annual Town Meeting approved the appropriation of \$540,000 for design, bidding and project management costs for renovation of the Police Station. A request for qualifications for owner's project management services was issued with responses due on September 30, 2015. On September 9, 2015 an optional site visit was held which eight potential vendors attended. Eight timely responses were received. One untimely response was received and returned unopened. On October 19, 2015 the Designer Selection Committee met to select three applications for further review. On October 28, 2015 the Designer Selection Committee interviewed the three firms selected. On November 9, 2015 the Designer Selection Committee met to review reference checks and to rank the firms which had been interviewed. Pomroy Associates was ranked highest. I met with Richard Pomroy on November 23, 2015 and have reviewed his firm's fee proposal and scope of services. The fee estimate is consistent with owner's project manager services fees for other recent public safety building projects including Plymouth, Dartmouth, Chatham and Brewster. The scope of services is consistent with the request for qualifications.

I recommend the Board of Selectmen award the contract for owner's project manager services for the police station project to Pomroy Associates.

Chairman Paul Pilcher called the meeting to order at 7:00 pm.

Announcements, Open Session and Public Comment

- Wilson announced that the comment period for the proposed Cape Cod National Seashore (CCNS) Shorebird Management Plan has been extended to January 11, 2016 and said that public comments are accepted online.
- Terkanian announced that the joint Board of Selectmen meeting with FinCom to review the the FY 2017 budget requests of the Police, Fire, DPW, School and Water Enterprise Fund budgets will be on December 15, 2015.
- Suzanne Grout Thomas announced "Wellfleet Tales" an author reading and book signing at the COA on December 3 at the COA.

Licenses

MOTION 215-376: Bruinooge moved and Houk seconded to approve the renewal of annual liquor licenses for Bookstore & Restaurant, Finely J.P.'s, JB's Pizza Bar & Grill, Marconi Beach Restaurant, PB Boulangerie Bistro, Wellfleet Harbor Actor's Theater – Route 6, Wellfleet Preservation Hall, Inc., The Wicked Oyster, Seaside Liquors, Wellfleet Spirits Shoppe, Wellfleet Marketplace, Wellfleet Mobil and Blackfish Variety. The motion passed 5-0.

Chairman Pilcher opened the public hearings 7:05 pm.

Community Preservation Committee (CPC) annual needs hearing in accordance with the Community Preservation Act, G.L. c.44B.

Peter Hall, CPC Chair and Mary Rogers, CPC Coordinator introduced the annual Community Preservation Act applications and went over the list¹ individually and explained how these applications fit within the requirements of the Community Preservation Act needs for housing, historical preservation, open space, recreation. No action was taken by the Selectmen.

Terkanian recommended taking no action on this item and postponing it to December 8, 2015 giving the opportunity of the revised proposed language to be re-advertised.

Request for closure of the Wicked Oyster from November 30, 2015 to January 13, 2016 MOTION 215-378: Bruinooge moved and Wilson seconded to approve the request received October 29, 2015 from Ken Kozak on behalf of TEK Restaurant Group, Inc. d/b/a the Wicked Oyster to close from November 30, 2015 through January 13, 2016 to do renovations and general clean up. The motion passed 5-0.

Request for closure of Marconi Beach Restaurant from November 16, 2015 to January 15, 2016 MOTION 215-379: Houk moved and Wilson seconded to approve the request received November 9, 2015 from Russell Swart to close Marconi Beach Restaurant from November 16, 2015 through January 15, 2016. The motion passed 5-0.

Request for closure of the Finely JP's Restaurant from December 6, 2015 to January 15, 2016 MOTION 215-380: Murphy moved and Wilson seconded to approve the request of Request received November 9, 2015 from John Pontius to close Finely JP's Restaurant from December 6, 2015 through January 15, 2016. The motion passed 5-0.

MOTION 215-381: Houk moved and Bruinooge seconded to approve the request of the Chamber of Commerce to hold 2015 Holiday Tree Lighting and sing along on December 12, 2015, from 4 pm to 5:30 pm; event fee waived and no conditions attached. The motion passed 5-0.

MOTION 215-382: Houk moved and Bruinooge seconded to appoint Dawn Rickman to Taxation Aid Committee member at large from December 8, 2015 to June 30, 2017. The motion passed 5-0.

Business

Review and possible approval of proposed amendment to Board of Selectmen policy on investments – additional policy provisions for Other Post Employment Benefits funds²
Terkanian went briefly over his memos³ and explained the reasons for the OPEB investment policy under the Prudent Person Rule and said that this is the second reading. Pilcher asked clarification if this policy is under the purview of the Town Treasurer. Bruinooge suggested that the Treasurer should be consulting with experienced financial advisors.

MOTION 215-383: Bruinooge moved and Murphy seconded to approve the amendment to Board of Selectmen Policy on Investments by including an additional policy provisions for Other Post Employment Benefits funds. Wilson asked about the consequences of the policy amendments. Terkanian explained the authorization to invest is based on the Prudent Person Rule. The motion passed 5-0.

Harbor Dredging Project Update and proposed letter in support of project

Pilcher explained that this proposed letter⁴ is a product of the Dredging Advisor Group (DAG) and their efforts to identify funding and support for the project. He thanked to all involved with this dredging funding efforts for their hard work and asked the Selectmen to authorize sending the letter to

the Army Corps of Engineers before the window of funding opportunity closes in mid January. He stressed the importance of getting Wellfleet Harbor on the list of fundable projects.

MOTION 215-384: Wilson moved to authorize and sign the letter as printed excluding small tweaks if needed. Murphy seconded and the motion passed 5-0.

Cape Cod National Seashore Comprehensive Shorebird Management Plan

Lilli-Ann Green presented the Cape Cod National Seashore (CCNS) Comprehensive Shorebird Management Plan and went briefly over the four alternatives as presented on the summary sheet⁵ for the plan. Green said that the comment period is open until January 11, 2016 and if the Selectmen are interested to provide input they should get in touch with the Cape Cod National Seashore. She presented a hand out on how to submit comments or contact the CCNS Superintendent George Price. Wilson said that she attended the open house. She explained that the predator birds have been poisoned with DRC-1339 and encouraged the people to do their own research on the chemical to understand its possible consequences and potential to get in the food chain. Bruinooge wanted to know what the role of the Selectmen in this process is. Green said that this is an opportunity for public comments and according to Superintendent Price the decision could be swaved based on received comments. Pilcher summarized the issues and asked Wilson if she is primarily objecting to the poison option because of the possibility of getting in the food chain. Wilson answered Bruinooge question by saving that this comment period is legally required and the public should be involved for input. Wilson suggested that the Conservation Commission and Water Commissioners should also comment on this matter. Murphy spoke about the dangers of chemical applications and their half life and suggested getting more information. Pilcher directed Terkanian to invite the CCNS Superintendent to one of the December meetings to specifically address chemical application.

Cape Cod Mosquito Control FY 2017 Budget request

Terkanian presented the Mosquito Control Budget request⁶ with 2.5% increase and said that this budget is part of and goes on the Cherry Sheet. According to the proposed document the FY17 share for Wellfleet is \$56,706.50. He explained that the Selectmen have the opportunity to support the request or not. Pilcher wanted to know if the 2.5% increase is a reasonable. Wilson said that this budget also used to cover greenheads control, but was not sure if this is still the case. The Board decided to table this until more information is available.

Christmas Eve Work Schedule; possible early dismissal for non essential employees MOTION 215-385: Wilson moved to allow nonessential employees to be dismissed at noon on December 24, 2015. Murphy seconded and the motion passed 5-0.

Status of the classification and compensation study

Terkanian briefed the Selectmen on the goals of the classification and compensation study and how the WEA Union A and B positions and certain non-union employees were ranked based on educational requirements, experience needed to perform the job, supervisory responsibilities and occupational risks involved. He talked about the process of how the job descriptions were generated and the employees involvement in the process. The draft classification ranking presented was based on a formula used in order to group the jobs into grades. Terkanian also explained that that towns similar to Wellfleet were selected to survey for the comparable employee compensation. This study will be used as a benchmark for evaluating compensation of Wellfleet employees in terms of market equity. No action was required by the Selectmen.

Waiver request from stormwater discharge permit regulation

Assistant Town Administrator Brian Carlson presented a draft letter⁸ for waiver request from stormwater discharge permit regulation and explained why this was needed.

<u>MOTION 215-386</u>: Murphy moved and Wilson seconded to approve the waiver request from stormwater discharge permit regulations letter. The motion passed 5-0.

Possible revocation of Board of Selectmen's policy on Award of Shellfish Grants (Policy 1988-04) MOTION 215-387: Pilcher moved to revoke the Board of Selectmen's policy on Award of Shellfish Grants (Policy 1988-04). Wilson seconded and the motion passed 5-0.

Proposed amendment to Board of Selectmen Equal Opportunity, Discrimination and Sexual Harassment Policy⁹

<u>MOTION 215-388</u>: Wilson moved and Bruinooge seconded to approve the proposed amendment to Board of Selectmen Equal Opportunity, Discrimination and Sexual Harassment Policy. The motion passed 5-0.

Town Administrator's Report

Terkanian presented his report¹⁰ and added that he met with one of the highest ranked Owner's Project Managers finalists for the Police Station Design. He said that an official recommendation should be available for the December 8, 2015 meeting.

Future Concerns

Terkanian: Request for Private Roads plowing criteria have been sent to the DPW director and a recommendation is expected for December 8, 2015. Plicher suggested having all written requests collected by the EA.

Terkanian: There are vacancies on the Library Trustees and Planning Board. In order to fill these vacancies there is a statutory requirement for joint meetings. The Library Trustees will have a brief meeting with the Selectmen on December 8, 2015 to fill in their vacancy.

Pilcher: Invite the Cape Cod National Seashore to December 8, 2015 to address Shorebirds Management Plan concerns.

Pilcher: Invite Alice Boyd of Bailey Boyd for information on additional funds disbursement and possible uses for housing needs in Wellfleet.

Pilcher: Put the Inter-municipal Cooperation Committee on the December 8 agenda for Boar's input. **Terkanian**: Outer Cape Health Services needs for public water supply on December 15, 2015 agenda.
