Town of Wellfleet Shellfishing Policy and Regulations

Last Amended 04/09/13, 06/04/13, 7/16/13, and 01/28/14, 06/10/14, 8/05/14, 09/16/14, 03/24/15, 05/12/15, 08/11/15, 09/08/15, 12/08/15, 01/26/16, 4/12/16, 9/13/16, 12/6/16

All References to Massachusetts General Law (MGL) and the Code of Massachusetts Regulations (CMR) are valid as of 2014

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Aquaculture - The farming of aquatic marine organism including, but not limited to fish, mollusks, crustaceans, echinoderms and plants. Farming implies some sort of intervention in the rearing process to enhance production including, but not limited to controlled propagation, feeding and protection from predators.

Aquaculture License - An authorization, granted by a vote of the Board of Selectmen, to utilize a specific tract of land, under coastal waters (1) to plant and grow shellfish using in-bottom or off- bottom culture; (2) to place shellfish in or under protective devices affixed directly to the tidal flats or land under Wellfleet's coastal waters, such as boxes, pens, trays, bags or nets; (3) to harvest and take legal shellfish; (4) to plant cultch for the purpose of catching shellfish seed; and (5) to grow shellfish by means of racks, rafts or floats (MGL Chapter 130; Section 57).

Aquaculture Licensed Area (Grant) - See Licensed Area.

Aquaculture Permit (See Permit)

Basket Rake - A hand-held implement used for the harvesting of shellfish, which is similar to but longer than a standard clam hoe, which has a basket and no more than twenty (20) teeth, is no wider than 12 inches at its widest part, does not have a T handle, and is only to be used on foot.

Blood Ark Clam and Ponderous Ark Clam - Bivalves of the species *Anadara* ovalis and *Noetia* ponderosa are some of the few marine mollusks having red blood, due to the presence of hemoglobin. Their shells grow to a length of approximately two or three inches and are fairly thick and sturdy. Each of the two valves has approximately 35 radiating ribs. The complete bivalve, when viewed from the end, is heart-shaped.

Board of Selectmen - The Wellfleet Board of Selectmen (BOS); Wellfleet's elected executive Board, designated by the State (MGL Chapter 30) as the regulatory Board that has jurisdiction over shellfishing in the Town.

Bull Rake - A T-handled hand-held and hauled implement used for the harvesting of shellfish. It shall be 12 inches or wider and have a fixed basket and teeth.

Bushel - U.S. dry measure; 2150.42 cubic inches, or 32 quarts.

By-Catch - The incidental capture of non-target species.

Captain - The master or individual in charge of a vessel.

Channel- The area marked by U.S. Coast Guard navigation buoys indicating a navigable way of passage.

Chinese Hats - Cones or disks of plastic, usually in stacks, coated with mortar with high lime content, used to collect oyster spat.

Clam Rake - A hand tool of typically eight (8) times or less, used to manually bring clams to the surface of the substrate.

CMR - Code of Massachusetts Regulations.

Commercial Harvest - The harvest of shellfish for sale, trade, or other consideration.

Container - Any bag, box, basket, cage, or other receptacle containing loose shellfish which may be separated from other shellfish after harvest, on a lease, or from the entire load or shipment.

Constable (Warden) - The municipal employee, appointed by the Board of Selectmen, who is in charge of administering the management of the fishery; the head of the Shellfish Department of the Town.

(To) Cull - to remove dead, dying, undersized or otherwise unsuitable organisms (also, the organism which is

removed).

- (To) Dig and Take (archaic); See (To) Harvest
- (To) Dive The use of SCUBA, surface supplied air, or snorkel to harvest shellfish.

DMF - Division of Marine Fisheries.

Documented Vessels - Commercial or recreational vessels registered through the federal system which have a certificate of documentation, recognized both nationally and internationally, as well as an Official Number permanently affixed to the hull.

Domiciled Resident - See Resident

Drag / Dredge - A heavy metal frame with an attached bag, which is towed or dragged along the seafloor to catch bottom dwelling shellfish. Some have metal teeth along the base of the frame that act like a rake.

Extension - An extension of a licensed area abutting a pre-existing area licensed by the same individual.

Fyke - A long bag-shaped fishing net held open by hoops that act as a cul-de-sac funnel.

Gems (Vongeles - Quahogs between 7/8 and 1 inch wide (thickness of the hard clam across both valves at the hinge).

Glass Eel - Eel in its transparent, post-larval stage.

Grant - See Aquaculture License/Licensed Area

- (To) Handpick The transfer of shellfish to a container from the substrate by hand or with a hand-held tool of eight (8) tines or less.
- **(To) Harvest -** To gather shellfish or other marine organisms in a container of any sort after sorting and separating them from what has initially been taken from the habitat.

Harvesting Area - An area approved for the taking of shellfish.

Handpicker - An individual who practices handpicking.

Hinge Width - The distance between the convex apex of the right shell and the convex apex of the left shell.

Intertidal - The land or area between the mean high and the mean low watermarks.

Jerk Rake - modified bull rake employing a harness.

(To) Land - To bring harvested shellfish by vessel to the Town Pier and to tie up before proceeding elsewhere; to bring harvested shellfish ashore above the mean high water line.

License - An authorization, granted by a vote of the Board of Selectmen, to utilize a specific tract of land under coastal waters (1) to plant and grow shellfish in bottom or off bottom culture; (2) to place shellfish in or under protective devices affixed directly to the tidal flats or land under Wellfleet's coastal waters, such as boxes, pens, trays, bags or nets; (3) to harvest and take legal shellfish; (4) to plant cultch for the purpose of catching shellfish seed; and (5) to grow shellfish by means of racks, rafts or floats (MGL Chapter 130, Sections 57 - 68).

Licensed Area (Grant) - a designated bottom area, certified by The Department of Marine Fisheries (DMF) and

Spat - An oyster or similar bivalve mollusk in the larval stage, especially when it has settled on and attached itself to a surface on which it can then proceed to grow.

Subtidal - The body of water or area below that of mean low water for spring tides; habitats rarely, if ever, completely uncovered by low tides.

Surf Clam (Sea Clam) - A clam of species Spisula solidissima.

(To) Take - To harvest.

Taxpayer - An individual or corporation who owns land in Wellfleet for which they are taxed by the Town.

Tongs - A hand-held and hauled implement used for the harvesting of oysters. They have a scissor mechanism to close two baskets upon themselves.

Town - The town of Wellfleet.

Transaction Card - See Permits; Shellfish Transaction Card.

(To) Transfer - To grant the right to use a previously established, licensed area, as allowed by MGL Chapter 130: Sections 57 and 58, and approved by a vote of the Board of Selectmen.

Transferee - Individual or entity to whom the right to use a previously established, licensed area for aquaculture has been granted by a vote of the Board of Selectmen.

(To) Transplant - The moving of shellfish from one area to another.

Undersized Oysters, Quahogs and Surf Clams - Oysters whose greatest length is between 2.5 and 3"; quahogs whose hinge width is between 7/8" and 1"; surf clams whose shell diameter is between 1 1/2" and 5".

Warden - See Constable

Waters - Coastal waters, tidal flats, tidal creeks, and all salt or fresh waters within the boundaries of the Town of Wellfleet.

Week - The calendar week commencing at 00:01 A.M. Sunday and ending at 12:00 Midnight Saturday.

Wet Storage - The temporary placement of legally harvested shellfish from an area open to shellfishing onto an area licensed for aquaculture, for the purpose of maintaining their health in an optimal environment or for the purpose of allowing them to purge themselves of sand and other inedible matter, before transporting them to market.

Section 2. Shellfishing Policy for the Town of Wellfleet

Purpose of Regulations

The purpose of these regulations is to foster, protect and preserve Wellfleet's shellfish resources and habitats, to maintain and improve conditions permitting sustainable, productive shellfishing and aquaculture, to ensure equitable use of the resource for all persons legally engaged in these activities, and to provide appropriate protection for the reasonable and legitimate interests of all others affected by shellfishing. To that end, these regulations supplement and are consistent with the requirements of the State of Massachusetts including Massachusetts General Law Chapter 130, Code of Massachusetts Regulations 322, and the current Best Management Practices for the Shellfish Culture Industry in Southeastern Massachusetts, developed by SEMAC

bushels of seed oysters per acre of licensed area or fraction thereof, pro rated at that rate.

7.15.4. No Seed Harvested by Dragging

No person shall harvest shellfish seed by dragging, except by the licensee within the boundaries of his or her licensed area.

7.16. Petite Oysters and Gems

An aquaculture license holder may harvest and sell petite oysters (between 2.5 and 3 inches in height) and/or gems (quahogs between 3/4 and 1 inch in width) if:

- a. they do not have a Town of Wellfleet commercial shellfish permit;
- b. they have documented proof of purchase of seed
- c. they have the required amendment to their propagation permit, granted by the State, allowing them to sell petite oysters and/or gems to a previously designated dealer, approved by the State;
- d. they, or their employees, or otherwise affiliated persons (as defined in Section 7.8.4) Employees of Licensees or their families do not store any oysters or quahogs, harvested from the wild on their licensed area(s):
- e. they are limited to selling petite oysters and/or gems for a term of not less than a year, beginning with the routine issuance of an annual propagation permit from the State;
- -f. they forfeit any claim to a hardship waiver under Section 6.1.4 <u>Hardship Exemption</u> of the Town of Wellfleet Shellfishing Policy and Regulations.

7.16.1 Transfer of Oysters to Wholesale Dealers Trucks During Vibrio Control Season: See Section 4.3.2 7.16. Undersized Oysters, Quahogs and Surf Clams

7.16. 1 Containers Holding Undersized Shellfish Must Be Tagged

All containers that hold market-bound, aquaculture-raised shellfish whose size is less than that allowed by the State when that species is harvested from the wild (petite oysters whose greatest length is between 2 1/2 and 3", quahogs whose hinge width is between 7/8" and 1", or surf clams whose shell diameter is between 1 1/2" and 5") must be tagged with the words "AQUACULTURE-RAISED" or "FARM RAISED".

7.16.2 Sale Only from Grower to Primary Buyer

The primary sale of undersized, aquaculture-raised (oysters whose greatest length is between 2 1/2 and 3", quahogs whose hinge width is between 7/8 and 1", and surf clams whose shell diameter is between 1 1/2 and 5") must only be between the aquaculturists or their licensed employee, and a licensed wholesale dealer that is also a "primary buyer of shellfish". If the aquaculturists is also licensed as a primary buyer, they may be considered as the primary buyer of their own product.

7.16.3 State Endorsement Required

Aquaculturists who grow and then harvest undersized shellfish for sale must have the required endorsement on their propagation permit granted by the State, allowing them to sell undersized shellfish for consumption.

7.16.4 Petite Oysters

An aquaculture license holder may harvest and sell farm-raised petite oysters whose greatest length is between 2.5 and 3 inches both in and out of State if:

- a. they do not have a Town of Wellfleet commercial shellfish permit;
- b. they have documented proof of purchase of seed;
- c. they are limited to selling petite oysters for a term of not less than a year beginning with the routine issuance of an annual propagation permit from the State.

7.16.5 Undersized Quahogs aka "Gems "or "Vongeles"

An aquaculture license holder may harvest and sell farm-raised quahogs whose hinge width is between 7/8" and 1" if:

a. they are sold only to primary buyers on the inter-state shippers list that distribute them out-of-

state. The in-state distribution of aquaculture farm raised quahogs whose hinge width is under 1" is prohibited;

- b. they have documented proof of purchase of seed;
- c. they do not have a Town of Wellfleet commercial shellfish permit;
- d. they are limited to selling such farm-raised quahogs whose hinge width is more than 7/8 and less than 1" for a term of not less than a year beginning with the routine issuance of an annual propagation permit from the State;

7.16.6 Undersized Sea/Surf Clams aka "Butter" Clams

An aquaculture license holder may harvest and sell farm-raised surf clams whose shell diameter is between 1 1/2 and 5" both in and out of state if:

- a. They have documented proof of purchase of seed.
- 7.17. Transfer of Oysters to Wholesale Dealers Trucks During Vibrio Control Season: See Section 4.3.2

7.18. Predator Control

7.18.1. No Lethal Predator Control Measures

Unless specifically authorized by the Director, in consultation with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and/or the National Marine Fisheries Service, it shall be unlawful to use lethal means to control or exclude predators or other organisms from any area used for aquaculture. Non-lethal enclosures, including, but not limited to, nets, fences, bubble curtains and noise may be used, if approved for a specific site and purpose. Invertebrate predators, pests and fouling organisms may be removed manually from an aquaculture site and disposed of in a lawful manner (CMR 322, Section 13.7.2).

7.18.2. No Taking of Horseshoe Crabs or Whelks/Conks Without Permit.

Being in possession of horseshoe crabs and whelks (conchs) for any reason requires a State permit. In this regulation, whelk/conch refers to either knobbed whelk (Busycon carica) or channeled (smooth) whelk (Busycotypus canaliculatus). (See CMR 322 6. 34: Horseshoe Crab Management and 322 CMR Section 6.21: Minimum Size for Conch.) As stated in 7.17.1, neither species shall be intentionally killed while practicing predator control.

7.18.3. No Harm to Endangered Species

No person shall maintain a predator control method that will intentionally threaten any endangered species.

7.19. Aquaculture Gear and Equipment

7.19.1. Grants Shall Be Marked

Every licensee shall mark the corners of the area licensed under their license with buoys marked with the license number. From April 1st to November 1st, the corners shall be marked with fluorescent yellow balls, at least twenty (20) inches in circumference. Buoys shall be attached to their anchor by cables, chains or non-floating lines. Numbers shall be marked on said buoys, and shall be at least two (2) inches high and shall be black in color. Temporary buoys shall be required from November 1 through April 1.

7.19.2. Height and Arrangement of Equipment

With the exception of spat collection devices there shall be no equipment or gear made of metal that rises more than eighteen (18") inches above the grade, and equipment or gear made of plastic (or another equally flexible material) higher than twenty-four (24") inches above the grade, within the boundaries of a licensed area.

7.19.3. Marking of Gear

Every licensee shall clearly and permanently mark any and all trays, boxes, holding cars and all other aquaculture gear with the license number of the license area in a manner that is clearly visible.





Greetings,

As the substance abuse crisis (defined as the abuse of prescription opioids, heroin, methamphetamine, and alcohol) continues to impact our communities with increasing force, we recognize with no small amount of appreciation, that there have been real positive steps that have been taken within the Town of Wellfleet to work collaboratively in addressing this issue. We also recognize that there is more work that can and should be done on a local, grass roots level. The complexity of the health care system is frankly overwhelming for citizens suffering from mental health disorders and the disease of substance abuse. It is widely known that these two disorders are co-occurring.

In light of this, we respectfully ask the Selectmen to direct the Town Administrator to immediately investigate the possibility of establishing a position for a Mental Health and Substance Abuse Navigator that would assist citizens in need of service. The town of Provincetown has already implemented such an approach through an article on the Town Meeting warrant that was first proposed by one of their Selectmen. The town of Yarmouth also has recently committed significant resources to their local Substance Abuse Committee. At some point in the future, we would suggest a regional approach to these problems, as the epidemic knows no town lines or borders. We suggest that a collaboration of lower Cape towns may be an effective approach.

For our present needs, we request that the Board of Selectmen vote this evening to direct the Town Administrator to investigate the possibility of establishing the position and funding for a Mental Health and Substance Abuse Navigator. It is our hope that the process will proceed quickly to allow for an article to be included on the April 2017 Town Meeting Warrant. Recovery 349 would be happy to assist the Town Administrator with this endeavor.

Community Resource Navigator (CRN)

Summary

- Need: Improving outcomes for residents in need of social, behavioral health, and substance abuse services while reducing the burden and cost Provincetown, MA agencies.
- Intervention: The Community Resource Navigator Program works with local social services and town agencies, churches, and law enforcement to identify and connect clients to needed services.
- Results: Clients are gaining access to the care they were once lacking while the program has helped local service agencies work together at a greater level to better serve local residents.

Description



Funded by the Town of Provincetown in collaboration with Outer Carle Health Services.

Provincetown is the outermost town on the Cape Cod peninsula of Massachusetts. An attractive location for tourists and artists, the town has also become a center for drug and alcohol abuse. There are also 10 times higher incidence of people living with HIV in Provincetown than in Boston. Because the cost of living is high, homelessness has become more common. These are just some of the factors that have contributed to the social, behavioral, and substance abuse issues of the area's most vulnerable residents.

Through a grant from the town of Provincetown, the Community Resource Navigator (CRN) Program was started by <u>Outer Cape Health Services</u> (http://www.outercape.org/). Launched in April 2016, this pilot project was designed to serve those in need who have been unable to connect with local social, behavioral, and substance abuse agencies. Their reported reasons include difficulty navigating the system, suspicion, lack of knowledge, or cost.

The CRN Program functions through a Bachelor's level Navigator who seeks out referrals of potential clients through local service agencies. The Navigator then meets with clients in the community and initiates a conversation in order to connect them to the appropriate services and treatments. A Master's level social worker located in the health center assists clients and coordinates treatment plans alongside the Navigator.

Regular roundtable discussions with areas service providers are held with the purpose of connecting services to one another through the common goal of helping those who have fallen through the cracks. The Navigator works with the following local service agencies:

 drug treatment agencies, mental health providers, domestic violence agencies, and other communitybased organizations providing information and referrals on a wide variety of supportive services. Ancillary
 service referrals may include: literacy training, temporary housing, and referrals to food banks, health
 care clinics, mental health, and other needed services. Provide community advocacy as necessary.
- Work in conjunction with DCFS workers to receive referrals and provide written reports and updates about client progress.
- Arrive to weekly individual/group supervision prepared with cases to discuss and ready to receive feedback and direction from supervisor.



"If you look at the cause of death, we just don't normally see increases like this," said Robert Anderson, the chief of the mortality statistics branch at the National Center for Health Care Statistics at the CDC.

TOP CAUSE OF ACCIDENTAL DEATHS

Drugs now kill more people than cars, guns

Drugs are the leading cause of accidental death in this country. Fatal overdoses surpassed shooting deaths and fatal traffic accidents years ago.

For perspective on how fast drug deaths have risen, Anderson said, consider the sharp rise in heart disease in the early half of the 20th century. It took about 50 years for the rate of heart disease to double. It took drug deaths a fraction of that time.

The only thing comparable might be the HIV epidemic when it first reached the United States in the late 1980s, when there were no drugs to treat it. But unlike with HIV, where demonstrators took to the streets to demand help, the drug epidemic often happened out of the spotlight.


That might be because drug deaths have disproportionately hit small towns and rural America, mainly in Appalachia and in the Southwest, far away from the eye of the national media. It became a particularly dangerous problem for middle-age white men and women.


Heroin-related deaths increased 439% from 1999 to 2014. As of 2014, heroin-related deaths had more than tripled in five years and quintupled in 10 years.

In 2014, opioids were involved in 28,647 deaths - 61% of all US drug overdose deaths - and 10,574 were related to heroin, in particular. Data from 2014 reflects "two distinct but interrelated trends," the CDC notes, a longterm increase in overdose deaths due to prescription opioids and a surge in illicit opioid overdose deaths, mostly related to heroin.

In 2010, West Virginia moved into the top spot on the list of states with the highest number of drug deaths. From 2014 to 2015 alone, the number of deaths in that state increased by 12%. New Hampshire saw a 24% increase in deaths in that same time period.

The state that has struggled the longest is New Mexico. Its Rio Arriba County has the highest number of drug deaths for a single county in the United States, according to data analysis of more than 15 years of records from the CDC and state departments of health. Looking at drug death data from 1999 to 2014, New Mexico most often holds the No. 1 spot for the highest number of deaths.

The sharp uptick in deaths seems to coincide with Americans' increasing use of drugs like illicit fentanyl.

Substance use is a concern nationwide and on Cape Cod. Our region has a high rate of alcohol use, a troubling opioid problem and correlating issues that wear on the fabric of our community.

However, we are a community that chooses not to shy from these issues, but to address them head on because we matter, our children matter, and our neighbors matter.

When it comes to substance use, choice matters — our choices as individuals and our choices as a society. Whether it be a young person standing at a party being offered alcohol for the first time, or a person in active addiction deciding now is the time to take steps toward recovery, their choices will impact their lives and the lives of those around them.

Many teenagers on Cape Cod do not drink alcohol or use drugs – a fact that may be surprising. A young person who knows that they are not alone in their decision to say 'no' to substances can have the strength to stand up to the perceived pressure to use them. Coming together to guide our children, promote self-empowerment and support our neighbors in their journey from addiction to recovery is the path we have chosen. Our legislators, law enforcement, business leaders, local government, and the community as a whole are united in our efforts to empower each citizen to believe that "My Choice Matters".

FACT SHEET: Regional Substance Use Council (RSAC)

October 2016

PURPOSE

The purpose of the Barnstable County Regional Substance Use Council (RSAC) is to establish a coordinated and comprehensive regional approach to substance use across the continuum of prevention, treatment, intervention, and recovery. By establishing a communication infrastructure across towns, providers, organizations, and individuals on Cape Cod, we are able to identify and address gaps and disparities in the service system, maximize inter-agency collaboration and funding opportunities.

DESCRIPTION

The Regional Substance Abuse Council (RSAC) was organized by the Barnstable County Department of Human Services in 2014 and is comprised of town coalitions, elected officials from the local, state, and federal levels, the Sheriff and District Attorney's offices, police, first responders, probation, drug court, school nurses, school superintendents, and drug treatment, recovery, and healthcare providers. The RSAC has work groups focusing on Prevention, Intervention, Treatment and Recovery.

Beth Albert, Director of Barnstable County Human Services, Cheryl Bartlett, Former Commissioner of the Massachusetts Department of Public Health, and Raymond Tamasi, President of Gosnold on Cape Cod serve as co-chairs of RSAC.

BASELINE ASSESSMENT

The RSAC issued its Baseline Assessment in 2015. The purpose of the *Baseline Assessment* is to provide a snapshot of substance dependency and the related costs for Barnstable County to inform policy and programming recommendations. The *Assessment* utilizes a public health approach in our work – focusing on policy and community strategies rather than on individual behavior. The *Assessment* includes a scan of existing resources, epidemiological data, and estimates of the costs of substance use in Barnstable County (including local, state, and federal direct costs).

The Solicitation for Quotes states that the objective of the project is to add 400-600 new parking spaces and to design a new sewage disposal system for a new restroom facility. 

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














In consideration of the approval by the Town of the Organization's request to use Town property, the Organization agrees as follows:

- That the Organization shall use the facilities in strict compliance with all applicable laws, rules, ordinances, regulations, and by-laws pertaining to said facilities, including but not limited to the Massachusetts General Laws, By Laws, rules and regulations and policies of the Town of Wellfleet as they now exist or may hereafter be altered, amended, or promulgated.
- 2. The Organization shall use the facilities in a safe and proper manner and only for the purposes for which they are intended and for which permission has been granted. No unauthorized use of the premises shall be made by the Organization or any of its representatives, participants, servants, agents, or employees. The Organization shall use the facilities in accordance with any conditions or restrictions placed on the use by the Organization by the Town and set forth in Exhibit A.
- 3. The person designated by the Town as the Event Supervisor is: _ Steven માનુમાર્
- 4. The Organization and its members, servants, agents, or employees shall not cause, permit, or suffer any damage or waste (except normal wear and tear) to the subject facilities and/or surrounding premises, structures, outbulldings, or Town signage or equipment. In the event of any breach of the terms of this paragraph, the Organization shall be responsible to do the following:
 - a. Immediately report said damage or waste to the Town's Event Supervisor.
 - b. Repair such damage or remove waste under the supervision of the Department of Public Works (DPW) in a good and workmanlike manner within such time limits and upon such terms and conditions as may be required. In the event that the Organization shall fail to repair such damage or waste as aforesaid the Town shall at its election either repair the damage or contract with outside agents for the repair of same and the reasonable charges for such repair work shall become the responsibility of the Organization which shall pay the same forthwith upon presentation of the bill/ invoice from the Town.
- 5. The Organization shall not allow any other group, individual, or entity not a member of, or affiliated with the Organization to utilize the facility during the time it is reserved for use by such Organization. It is expressly agreed and understood that any rights to the facility(ies) conferred by this agreement are not assignable by the Organization without the express written permission of the Town and only upon such terms and conditions acceptable to the Town, including but not limited to, the payment of fees and charges.

- No Organization shall do or cause to be done any maintenance or repairs on the fields, structures, or accessories thereto without the express permission of the DPW Director.
- 7. The Town of Wellfleet assumes no liability for any injuries to persons or damage to property resulting from the use of Town facilities by an individual, group, association, entity, or Organization, resulting from the use of Town property, facilities, or equipment.
- 8. All rubbish, trash, or litter created by users of Town facilities must not be left on Town property and shall be removed and properly disposed of by the Organization.

 Disposal in Town trash receptacles is not acceptable.
- 9. Except as provided herein the Town shall not be responsible for providing any user of Town facilities with any equipment. If any such equipment is provided to the user, it shall be in safe condition, proper working order, and shall be used in a manner consistent with manufacturers suggested use/recommendations and shall be property stored by the user after use is completed.
- 10. No person shall possess or consume any alcoholic beverages within the limits of any park, playground, public land, public building or facility except as expressly approved by the Board of Selectmen in accordance with Town bylaws.
- 11. No person shall use tobacco products within any Town building.
- 12. In emergency circumstances, field or facility usage may be suspended, including but not limited to emergency maintenance by the Town, its servants, agents, or employees. The Town has discretionary authority to postpone or cancel any and all events under such circumstances to insure the safety of the general public, including participants.
- 13. The Town may request a reasonable security deposit to be determined on a case by case basis by the Board of Selectmen to insure compliance with the terms hereof. In determining whether or not a security deposit should be charged, the Board of Selectmen shall consider the following:
 - a. The level of responsibility demonstrated by the Organization in the past with respect to rental or use of municipal facilities;
 - b. Whether the particular program is sponsored by the Town;
 - c. The facility being reserved with due consideration being given to its condition;
 - d. The length of time that the Organization has been in existence and its composition of residents from the Town; and
 - e. The nature of the activity to be conducted on Town facilities.
- 14. In the event that a security deposit is required, and the user of the field or facilities causes damage to the same, all or part of the security deposit shall be forfeited to the Town. If the cost of repair exceeds the amount of the security deposit, the Organization shall be responsible for the balance and forthwith pay the same upon presentation of a bill for such damage by the Town. Damage to Town facilities or unlawful or improper use of same by an Organization may eliminate or limit the applicant's ability to obtain field usage permits in the future and/or may result in increased security deposits for future facility reservations.
- 15. In the event that the facilities are not damaged by the Organization and are left in good condition, the security deposit shall be returned following an inspection by the

- Event Supervisor. Refunds of security deposits will be processed as soon as practical during the Town's normal biweekly accounts payable processing cycle.
- 16. All vehicles shall be parked in designated parking spaces only. All vehicles shall comply with Town parking regulations including fee and/or sticker requirements at Town beaches and ponds.
- 17. Animals on Town property. Animals on Town property must comply with existing regulations (e. g. Beach and Pond regulations, dog leash bylaw) and with any additional conditions set forth in Exhibit A.
- 18. The person signing on behalf of the Organization represents and warrants that he/she has the authority to enter into this agreement on behalf of said Organization.

Dear Governor Baker,

As elected officials representing the interests of our citizens, we, the members of the Well-fleet Board of Selectmen write to express our concerns about the Pilgrim Nuclear Power Plant in Plymouth. We ask that you, in your role as chief safety officer of the Commonwealth, communicate with the Nuclear Regulatory Commission (NRC) regarding the importance of closing Pilgrim as soon as possible to protect the health and safety of the citizens of Cape Cod.

In 2015, the NRC downgraded Pilgrim's performance to one of the three worst nuclear power plants in the country. We are aware that Entergy will be decommissioning Pilgrim in 2019, but despite a lengthy list of violations and unplanned shut downs it continues to operate. Over the past several months our concern about a potential radiological disaster at the plant has risen as there have been numerous malfunctions reported.

There is no evacuation plan in place for Cape Cod other than to shelter in place and await 'relocation'. The citizens of Cape Cod and all tourists visiting at the time of a potential disaster are at risk and vulnerable to a radiological plume. That puts 215,888 residents (2010 census) and potentially hundreds of thousands of visitors at risk. In the event of a disaster the bridges would be closed and hundreds of thousands of residents and visitors would be trapped on Cape Cod.

Federal regulators rated Pilgrim as 'one step above mandatory shutdown' citing Energy's failure to address the factors that led to the plant's high number of unplanned, forced shutdowns and equipment failures. Our residents and visitors are at risk every additional day this plant is allowed to operate.

After closure the plant will still host more than eight hundred tons of irradiated spent fuel in above ground storage pools. We request that the spent fuel rods be safely removed to an area away from the coast line. An extreme weather event or seismic damage would devastate Cape Cod and a good portion of Massachusetts making the area unlivable. The resulting fire, the National Academy of Science has cautioned, could send across Cape Cod and northern New England many times the amount of radioactive cesium-137 re-

leased in the Chernobyl disaster. It's unthinkable that Cape Cod and much of our state could become a nuclear wasteland. Senator Markey has said "Pools like the one at Pilgrim Nuclear Power Station are a disaster waiting to happen".

We request your leadership in working with the NRC so that the Pilgrim nuclear reactor is shut down as soon as possible rather than be allowed to continue to operate in an unsafe manner until 2019.

We thank you, Governor Baker, for **considering** this serious matter and for communicating with us as to your results.



Wellfleet Board of Selectmen Minutes of November 1, 2016 Wellfleet Town Hall Hearing Room

Present: Selectmen Dennis Murphy, Helen Miranda Wilson, Janet Reinhart; Berta Bruinooge, Jerry Houk; Town Administrator Dan Hoort, Assistant Town Administrator Brian Carlson

Chairman Dennis Murphy called the meeting to order at 7:00 pm.

Announcements, Open Session and Public Comment [7:00]

• Town Administrator Dan Hoort announced that the Special Town Meeting will be on Tuesday, November 15 at 7 PM at the Wellfleet Elementary School and the Special Town Election will be on Wednesday, November 16, 2016 from noon to 7 PM at the Council on Aging.

Appointments/Reappointments - Kerry Cox to Recreation Committee

Kerry Cox presented her interest to serve on the Recreation Committee.

<u>MOTION 217-107</u>: Reinhart moved and Bruinooge seconded to appoint Kerry Cox to Recreation Committee with term ending June 30, 2019. The motion passed 5-0.

Business: Capital Improvement Plans for Cape Cod Regional Technical High School

Bob Sanborn, Superintendent of Cape Cod Technical High School (aka Cape Tech) gave a Power Point presentation¹ and cost estimates for an upcoming capital improvement project to re-build or renovate the Cape Tech building. Harry Terkanian and Anthony Tullio, Wellfleet representatives to the Cape Tech School Committee were also present. Sanborn explained that eight out of the 12 participating towns will have to approve the capital project in order for it to go forward. The project cost is estimated to be between \$25M and \$125M depending on the project scope ranging from basic renovations to complete rebuilt. The preferred option will be voted and selected by the Cape Tech School Building Committee before January 7, 2017. The MSBA will reimburse for up to 42% of the project cost. Individual town's share will be based on student enrollment; for Wellfleet based on current enrollment it is estimated to be 1% of the project cost. Sanborn said that once more details are available he will come back in front of the Board and give additional details. The select board took no action, but asked Sanborn to provide a detailed cost estimates for Wellfleet's share based on various project options.

Business: Request for disposition of Town-owned land-Map 35-1, Pleasant Point Bulkhead

ATA Brian Carlson presented an abutters' request for disposition of Town-owned land on Map 35-1, aka Pleasant Point Bulkhead and referred to his memo² on this subject. He asked for the Board's direction for this request. Murphy wanted to find out who will be liable in case of wall collapse. Carlson confirmed that there is a potential for liability. Wilson suggested finding out who constructed the wall. Mr. Perry said that in 1957 the petitioners filed an application with the ConsCom and received an order of conditions and built the wall. He said that this request is in effort to re-build the wall, which is currently at the end of its life. Reinhart wanted to know the position of the Planning Board. Planning Board member Alfred Pickard speaking as individual clarified that the original request of the abutters came for an easement. He said that re-building the wall will result in beach loss, but will provide a wall for 4 units. The Planning Board had discussed the possible value of the property. Murphy wanted to know who will be liable for the protection of these houses and suggested finding the answer of this liability question before taking any position. Hoort will get a legal opinion on the Town's legal exposure before any action is considered by the Board. Wilson said that she prefers to initiate the process, but would like to hear back from all interested stakeholders – Planning Board, Open Space Committee, Shellfish Advisory Board.

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MOTION 217-108: Wilson moved to charge the TA to notify all interested parties about the possibility of disposing town-owned land Map 35-1 aka Pleasant Point Bulkhead and involve the Shellfish Advisory Board, Planning Board, ConsCom, Open Space, Natural Resources Advisory Board. Murphy said that all this should happen after a legal opinion is received. Houk suggested legal counsel to look at the entire property. Pickard said that when Town land is disposed the use should be identified. The motion did not advance.

MOTION 217-109: Wilson moved to request the TA to notify all interested parties and get back to the Board f Selectmen about the disposition of the land and include the 4 lot numbers. There was no second. And the motion did not advance.

Decision on this Town-owned land disposition request was deferred until a legal opinion is received.

Business: Herring River Restoration Project - Extension Agreement³ - DRI Public Hearing Period Murphy clarified that DRI is Development of Regional Impact and there is a need of additional time for review.

MOTION 217-110: Houk moved to approve and authorize the Chair of the Board of Selectmen to sign Herring River Restoration Project - Extension Agreement - DRI Public Hearing Period. Wilson seconded and the motion passed 5-0.

Business: Local Comprehensive Plan Update – BOS Goals Discussion

ATA Carlson gave a brief background information about the Local Comprehensive Plan Update. The Selectmen discussed a process to update the Board's goals. Carlson said that the provided goals matrix is just for previously approved goals, and if new goals are identified they will be for the future plan. Reinhart said that the goals will most likely be clarified during the Community Workshop on November 12. The Selectmen agreed that all other boards and committees should provide their input before they can identify the priorities. Selectmen will individually prioritize the goals matrix and submit them to Carlson. Houk stepped out at 8:10 pm.

Business: Request received October 26, 2016 from Ken Kozak to close The Wicked Oyster from November 28, 2016 through January 12, 2017.

MOTION 217-111: Bruinooge moved and Wilson seconded to approve the request of Ken Kozak to close The Wicked Oyster from November 28, 2016 through January 12, 2017. The motion passed 4-0 (Houk absent).

Houk returned at 8:13 pm.

Business: Application received October 27, 2016 from John Pontius to close Finely JP's restaurant from December 4, 2016 through January 12, 2017.

MOTION 217-112: Bruinooge moved and Wilson seconded to approve the request of John Pontius to close Finely JP's restaurant from December 4, 2016 through January 12, 2017. The motion passed 5-0.

Business: Request for letter⁴ of support to Governor Baker to close Pilgrim Nuclear Power Plant Lili Green presented her request for letter of support to be sent to Governor Baker to close Pilgrim Nuclear Power Plant. She said that she will be asking the Assembly of Delegates for the same support during the meeting on November 2, 2016. Reinhart felt that the wording is too strong and suggested re-writing it. Wilson supported Reinhart's suggestion and thanked Green for her effort. Wilson expressed an opinion that if a nuclear disaster happens, it would change the entire Cape Cod. She felt that developing an evacuation plan will not be necessary, because it will just waste time. She supported the idea of revising

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and personalizing the letter to stress the urgency of this matter. Houk said that the plant is already scheduled to close in 2019 and any efforts to close it before that time will not escalate the process. Bruinooge found the letter as presented appropriate. Hoort confirmed that he got the Board's direction and input to revise the letter to be more relevant to Wellfleet. Green clarified that if the plant fuel is replenished in the spring of 2017 then the plant will not close before 2019, but there is a possibility for shift before the fuel replenishment. Hoort will revise the letter and bring it to the Board during one of the upcoming meetings.

Business: Mass Cultural Council grant authorization⁵ for local cultural council funds
Carlson explained the need for the grant authorization to the Mass Cultural Council.

MOTION 217-113: Reinhart moved and Bruinooge seconded to authorize the Mass Cultural Council grant application and designate the Town Administrator to sign it. The motion passed 5-0.

Topics for Future Discussions

- Bruinooge Channel 18 running the BOS meeting over and over again and suggested that there is a need for additional content. Wilson suggested looking for grants to expand the Local Government Chanel programming.
- Wilson referred to the letter from Mark Borelli re Harbor Mapping to be on the next agenda
- Wilson Mark Forrest data for the Harbor dredging to be followed-up.
- Wilson an executive session about the update on the ongoing litigations.

Executive Session & Adjournment: To consider approval and whether to release minutes of prior executive sessions (January 24, 2012; June 12, 2012; September 11, 2012; November 13, 2012; November 27, 2012; December 10, 2012; December 11, 2012; November 24, 2015)

MOTION 217-114: Murphy read the purpose of the executive session in open session: To consider approval and whether to release minutes of prior executive sessions (January 24, 2012; June 12, 2012; September 11, 2012; November 27, 2012; December 10, 2012; December 11, 2012; November 24, 2015) and stated that discussing these in open session may have detrimental effect on the Board will enter in executive session and not go back in open session. The motion passed by a roll call vote where each Murphy, Bruinooge, Wilson, Houk and Reinhart said "Aye" moved to adjourn the meeting at 8:40 pm.
