

### **The Human Condition 2001 Project**

#### LIMITATIONS OF THESE DATA

The findings contained in the next four pages result from a survey of Welffleet residents conducted in Spring/Summer 2001 ("Household Survey"). One in every 15 Welffleet households was surveyed. While researchers made every attempt to survey a random sample of residents, there is no guarantee that these findings are representative of all Welffleet residents. Thus, the reader should consider these data to be indicators of the human condition in Welffleet.


#### **RESIDENT SURVEY RESPONSES:**

Of the Wellfleet households randomly selected for participation in The Human Condition 2001 Household Survey, 90 completed and returned the survey questionnaire. This number represents 4% of the total number of surveys collected across Barnstable County. A detailed Socio-Demographic Profile of the 90 Wellfleet households sampled is provided in Appendix 2.C. The following two sections summarize the perspectives of these Wellfleet households concerning important social issues, potential problem areas, and barriers to access to needed human services.

#### **RESIDENT PERSPECTIVES:**

#### Household-Level Issues:

Wellfleet respondents included in their list of problems ("household issues") eleven of twelve of the issues from the County's Top Twelve Household Issues list, but in a somewhat different rank order. Issues of inadequate time for recreation and to spend with spouse/partner, and affordability appear to be of a higher priority in Wellfleet than across the County as a whole.



#### Barriers To Access to Human Services:

Wellfleet respondents included on their list of difficulties encountered in attempting to access needed human services ("service barriers") eleven of twelve barriers from the County's Top Twelve Service Barriers list, but in a considerably different rank order. Barriers concerning travel distance to services, not liking the services, inconvenient hours of service, and the inability to take time off from work to go to services appear to be of a higher priority in Wellfleet than across the County as a whole.



"Did not like the services" made Wellfleet's Top Service Barriers list but is not on the comparable County list.
