On June 22, the election reform law (the "VOTES act") was signed into law by Governor Baker. The VOTES act makes many of the changes from the pandemic permanent (i.e., Vote by Mail and Early In-Person Voting). In addition, the assignment of police officers at polling places now requires a vote of the Selectboard. In coordination with Chief Hurley, I ask that one officer be assigned to each election and furthermore, I recommend the Board of Selectman designate the Police Chief the authority to assign specific police officers according to scheduling and availability.

COMMUNITY PRESERVATION ACT GRANT AGREEMENT FOR

Wellfleet Historical Society and Museum, Inc.

This GRANT AGREEMENT ("Agreement") is made on this day of
, 2022 (the "Commencement Date"), by and between the Town of
Wellfleet, a municipal corporation duly organized under the laws of Massachusetts and
having its usual place of business at Wellfleet Town Hall, 300 Main Street, Wellfleet,
MA 02667, acting by and through its Selectboard (the "Town"), and the Wellfleet
Historical Society and Museum, Inc., having an address of 266 Main Street, Wellfleet,
MA 02667 (the "Grantee").

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the Wellfleet Community Preservation Committee (the "CPC") invited submission of proposals for grants of funds for purposes consistent with the Community Preservation Act, G.L. c. 44B (the "Act"); and

WHEREAS, the Grantee submitted a proposal in response thereto (the "Proposal"), and the CPC reviewed and approved the Proposal and recommended that Town Meeting vote to appropriate from the Community Preservation Fund the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars and No Cents (\$20,000.00) to be used for the purpose of the restoration of the mid-section of 262 Main Street (the "Property") for use by the Grantee and the public as a historical society and museum (the "Project"); and

WHEREAS, the Wellfleet Town Meeting thereafter appropriated the funds recommended by the CPC for the Project and authorized the Town to enter into a grant agreement with the Grantee for the purposes set forth in the Proposal.

NOW THEREFORE, the Town and the Grantee agree as follows:

1. <u>Funding</u>. As recommended by the CPC under Article 33 of the June 11, 2022 Town Meeting, and as appropriated by said Town Meeting, the Town shall grant to the Grantee the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars and No Cents (\$20,000.00) (the "Funds") for the purpose of providing a new entrance to the museum, an elevator, reception area and bathrooms to ensure accessibility for all (the "Work") on the condition that the Grantee shall use the Funds only for the purposes of the Project, as set forth more particularly in the Proposal and the documents attached thereto and in accordance with the terms of this Grant Agreement.

- 2. <u>Conditions</u>. The Funds provided pursuant to Section 1 above are subject to the following terms and conditions:
- a) Work on the Project must commence within ninety (90) days from the Commencement Date. All work must be done within three (3) years from the Commencement Date (the "Completion Date"), unless the Town, acting through its Selectboard, grants an extension for good cause shown.
- b) Excess or unused Funds will be returned to the Community Preservation Fund if the Project has not begun or the Project has not been completed as provided for in Section 2(a). The Selectboard may grant extensions to these terms for good cause shown, upon review at a public meeting.
- c) Terms of the Preservation Restriction Agreement between the Grantee and the Town, dated April 18, 2018, recorded with the Barnstable Registry of Deeds in Book 31238 Page 311, shall apply to the Project.
- d) The Grantee shall seek the approval of, and work closely with, the Town in the implementation of the Project.
- e) Grantee shall perform the work in accordance with "The Secretary of the Interior's Standards for the Treatment of Historic Properties" (36 CFR 67 and 68), as these may be amended from time to time.
- 3. <u>Contact.</u> The Grantee shall identify in writing a contact person responsible for administration of the Project and a second person, authorized to act if the contact person is unavailable. Name, address, telephone number(s) and e-mail address, if any shall be provided for both contact persons. As of the date of this Agreement, the Grantee contacts shall be <u>John ConnorsBrad Williams</u> and <u>John KetchumSam</u> Bradford of the Wellfleet Historical Society and Museum, Inc.
- 4. Budget/Other Sources of Funding. Prior to the commencement of any work, the Grantee must submit a complete budget for the Project, including all final bids that account for: (a) the expenditure of all Funds awarded under this Agreement, and (b) all other sources of funding, if necessary, to complete the Project as described herein. Reimbursement for monies spent will not commence unless sufficient sources of funding have been secured to complete the Project, and the Project budget has been approved by the Town. The Town's approval shall not be unreasonably withheld. If the Town determines that Funds have been spent on goods and/or services not included in the Project budget or otherwise not authorized under the Act, reimbursement may not be authorized, or if the Funds have already been provided pursuant to this Agreement, the Grantee shall reimburse the Town for any such unauthorized expenditure, said funds to be returned to the Community Preservation Fund.
- 5. <u>Liability of the Town.</u> The Town's liability hereunder shall be to make the payment specified in Section 1 of this Agreement, provided that the conditions set

forth in Section 2 are followed, and the Town shall be under no further obligation and shall have no further liability. Nothing in this Agreement shall be construed to render the Town or any elected or appointed official or employee of the Town, or their successors in office, personally liable for any obligation under this Agreement.

- 6. <u>Indemnification</u>. Grantee shall indemnify, defend, and hold the Town and its departments, officers, employees, representatives and agents harmless from and against any and all claims, demands, liabilities, actions, causes of actions, costs and expenses, including attorneys' fees, of any nature whatsoever arising as a result of (a) any injury to person or property resulting from the Work, (b) the quality of the Work, (c) Grantee's performance of the Work or the negligence or misconduct of Grantee or Grantee's agents, employees, contractors and invitees, (d) the failure of any contractor hired by Grantee to perform the Work or any other act or omission of any such contractor, and (e) any and all claims for the payment by the Town of any amount in excess of the Grant Amount.
- 7. <u>Inspections and Reports</u>. The Grantee shall submit the Town with progress reports at three (3) month intervals beginning ninety (90) days from the date this Agreement is signed, for so long as the Funds remain unexpended, and with a final report, including digital photographs and other documents, within thirty (30) days of the Completion Date. All documents, including, but not limited to, photographs and videos, submitted to the Town shall become the property of the Town and shall be available for use by the Town and available to the public under the Massachusetts Public Records Law.
- 8. Record Keeping. The Grantee agrees to keep, for a period of six (6) years after the Project is completed, such records with respect to the utilization of the Funds as are kept in the normal course of business and such additional records as may be required by the Town or the CPC. The Grantee further agrees to make these records available to the Town upon request.
- 9. Payments. The Town shall disburse the Funds during the construction of the Project, which disbursements shall be apportioned based on the work done and made no more than once a month and paid only upon the presentment of detailed invoices from the Grantee or the Grantee's contractor listing in detail the work performed and the cost thereof. The Town shall have the right to ask for supplementary information, including documentation from the restoration contractor confirming the extent of the work performed. Prior to any payment, the Town shall have the right to enter the Property to inspect the work. No payment shall be made until the Town reasonably determines that the work has been done in a good and workmanlike manner and substantially in compliance with the Proposal and this Agreement. The Grantee shall use the Funds only for the purpose of constructing the Project. The entire cost of constructing the Project in excess of the Funds shall be paid by Grantee. Notwithstanding anything herein to the contrary, if the actual total cost of the Project is less than the Funds (the difference

- between the two amounts referred to hereinafter as the "Excess"), the Town shall have no obligation to pay the Excess.
- 10. <u>Successors and Assigns</u>. This Agreement is binding upon the parties hereto, their successors, assigns and legal representatives. The Grantee shall not assign, subcontract or otherwise transfer this Agreement, in whole or in part, without the prior written consent of the Town.
- 11. Termination. In the event the Grantee fails to fulfill all obligations under the terms of this Agreement, as determined by the Town, and such failure is not cured within forty-five (45) days after the Town has given written notice to the Grantee specifying such failure, the Town shall have the right, in its sole discretion, to terminate this Agreement upon written notice to the Grantee. Upon receipt of said termination notice, the Grantee shall cease to incur additional expenses in connection with this Agreement. Upon termination, the Town shall be free to pursue any rights or remedies provided within this Agreement, including without limitation, recapture of Funds as set forth in Section 12 below. Upon the expiration or earlier termination of this Grant Agreement, all rights and obligations of the parties hereunder shall expire and be of no further force and effect, except that the provisions of Sections 5, 6, 9, 12, 13, and 17 shall survive said expiration or earlier termination.
- 12. Return of Funds. In the event the Grantee fails to fulfill all obligations under the terms of this Agreement and this Agreement is terminated pursuant to Section 11, any Funds granted to the Grantee under this Agreement and not yet expended shall be returned forthwith to the Town without further expenditure thereof. If the Grantee fails to fulfill its obligations under the terms of this Agreement as a result of negligent or intentional acts or omissions of the Grantee, its agents, employees, contractors or invitees, the Grantee shall be liable to repay to the Town the entire amount of the Funds provided under this Agreement, and the Town may take such steps as are necessary, including legal action, to recover such Funds. Any Funds so returned or recovered shall be placed in the Town's Community Preservation Fund. In the event that the Town takes legal action under this Agreement, the Grantee shall pay any and all costs, including reasonable attorneys' fees, expended by the Town for the enforcement of this Agreement.
- 13. Compliance with Laws. The Grantee shall comply with all Federal, State and local laws, rules, regulations and orders applicable to the Project, such provisions being incorporated herein by reference, and shall be responsible for obtaining all necessary licenses, permits, and approvals required in connection with the Project. No local permit or license is waived by the award of this Grant or by this Agreement.
- 14. <u>Notice</u>. Any and all notices, or other communications required or permitted under this Agreement shall be in writing and delivered by hand or mailed postage prepaid, return receipt requested, by registered or certified mail or by other reputable delivery service, to the parties at the addresses set forth on Page 1 or

furnished from time to time in writing hereafter by one party to the other party. Any such notice or correspondence shall be deemed given when so delivered by hand, if mailed, when deposited with the U.S. Postal Service or, if sent by private overnight or other delivery service, when deposited with such delivery service.

- 15. Community Preservation Act Awareness. Upon completion of the Project, the Grantee agrees to post, at a location mutually acceptable to the parties, a permanent sign stating that the Project was funded through the Community Preservation Fund program. The Grantee shall also identify that the Project was funded through the Town of Wellfleet in its written materials about the Project, including press releases, brochures, and similar materials.
- 16. Severability. If any term or condition of this Agreement or any application thereof shall to any extent be held invalid, illegal or unenforceable by a court of competent jurisdiction, the validity, legality, and enforceability of the remaining terms and conditions of this Agreement shall not be deemed affected thereby unless one or both parties would be substantially or materially prejudiced.
- 17. Governing Law. This Agreement shall be governed by, construed and enforced in accordance with the laws of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts and the Grantee submits to the jurisdiction of any of its appropriate courts for the adjudication of disputes arising out of this Agreement.

The Lily House Inc.

This GRANT AGREEMENT ("Agreement") is made on this 25 day of 2022 (the "Commencement Date"), by and between the **Town of Wellfleet**, a municipal corporation duly organized under the laws of Massachusetts and having its usual place of business at Wellfleet Town Hall, 300 Main Street, Wellfleet, MA 02667, acting by and through the Selectboard (the "Town"), and **The Lily House Inc.**, having an address of 40 Pocahontus Road, Wellfleet, MA 02667 (the "Grantee").

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the Wellfleet Community Preservation Committee (the "CPC") invited submission of proposals for grants of funds for purposes consistent with the Community Preservation Act, G.L. c. 44B (the "Act"); and

WHEREAS, the Grantee submitted a proposal in response thereto (the "Proposal") for the purpose of contributing to renovations and upgrades of the Lily House to provide a home for the terminally ill (the "Project") and the CPC reviewed and approved the Proposal and recommended that Town Meeting vote to appropriate from the Community Preservation Fund the sum of Twenty Thousand and No/100 Dollars (\$20,000.00) to be used for the purpose of contributing to the capital improvements of community housing at 40 Pocahontus Road, Wellfleet, MA 02667 (the "Property"); and

WHEREAS, the Wellfleet Town Meeting thereafter appropriated the funds recommended by the CPC for the Project and authorized the Town to enter into a grant agreement with the Grantee for the purposes set forth in the Proposal.

NOW THEREFORE, the Town and the Grantee agree as follows:

1. Funding. As recommended by the CPC under Article 30 of the June 11, 2022 Town Meeting, and as appropriated by said Town Meeting, the Town shall grant to the Grantee the sum of Twenty Thousand and No/100 Dollars (\$20,000.00) (the "Funds") on the condition that the Grantee shall use the Funds only for the purposes of rehabilitation of the Lily House (the "Work"), as set forth more particularly in the Proposal and the documents attached thereto and in accordance with the terms of this Agreement.

- 2. <u>Conditions</u>. The Funds provided pursuant to Section 1 above are subject to the following terms and conditions:
 - a) Work on the Project must commence within ninety (90) days from the Commencement Date. All work must be done within three (3) years from the Commencement Date (the "Completion Date"), unless the Town, acting through its Selectboard, grants an extension for good cause shown.
 - b) Excess or unused Funds will be returned to the Community Preservation Fund if the Project has not begun or the Project has not been completed as provided for in Section 2(a).
 - c) The Grantee shall seek the approval of, and work closely with, the Town in the implementation of the Project.
- 3. Contact. The Grantee shall identify in writing a contact person responsible for administration of the Project and a second person, authorized to act if the contact person is unavailable. Prior to the commencement of any work, the Grantee must submit a complete budget for the Project, including all final bids that account for: (a) the expenditure of all Funds awarded under this Agreement, and (b) all other sources of funding necessary to complete the Project as described herein. The Town's approval shall not be unreasonably withheld. If the Grantee fails to fulfill its obligations under the terms of this Agreement as a result of negligent or intentional acts or omissions of the Grantee, its agents, employees, contractors or invitees, the Grantee shall be liable to repay to the Town the entire amount of the Funds provided under this Agreement, and the Town may take such steps as are necessary, including legal action, to recover such Funds. Any Funds so returned or recovered shall be placed in the Town's Community Preservation Fund. In the event that the Town takes legal action under this Agreement, the Grantee shall pay any and all costs, including reasonable attorneys' fees, expended by the Town for the enforcement of this Agreement.
- 13. <u>Compliance with Laws.</u> The Grantee shall comply with all Federal, State and local laws, rules, regulations and orders applicable to the Project, such provisions being incorporated herein by reference, and shall be responsible for obtaining all necessary licenses, permits, and approvals required in connection with the Project. No local permit or license is waived by the award of this Grant or by this Agreement.
- 14. Notice. Any and all notices, or other communications required or permitted under this Agreement shall be in writing and delivered by hand or mailed postage prepaid, return receipt requested, by registered or certified mail or by other reputable delivery service, to the parties at the addresses set forth on Page 1 or furnished from time to time in writing hereafter by one party to the other party. Any such notice or correspondence shall be deemed given when so delivered by hand, if mailed, when deposited with the U.S. Postal Service or, if sent by private overnight or other delivery service, when deposited with such delivery service.
- 15. Community Preservation Act Awareness. The Grantee agrees to post, at a location mutually acceptable to the parties, a permanent sign stating that the restoration/preservation of the Property was funded through the Community Preservation Fund program. The Grantee shall also identify that the Project was funded in part through the Town of Wellfleet in its written materials, including press releases, brochures, and similar materials.
- 16. <u>Severability</u>. If any term or condition of this Agreement or any application thereof shall to any extent be held invalid, illegal or unenforceable by a court of competent jurisdiction, the validity, legality, and enforceability of the remaining terms and

- conditions of this Agreement shall not be deemed affected thereby unless one or both parties would be substantially or materially prejudiced.
- 17. Governing Law. This Agreement shall be governed by, construed and enforced in accordance with the laws of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts and the Grantee submits to the jurisdiction of any of its appropriate courts for the adjudication of disputes arising out of this Agreement.

The Town shall, at no cost and expense to the Grantor, complete the following work: (i) elevate a portion of Way #672 and the driveway on the Premises to match the elevation of Way #672 as shown on that certain plan entitled "Herring River Restoration Project, Permit Level Design Plans for Low-Lying Property Impact Prevention, Way #672, Hirsch-Meek Property (25 Way #672), & Ellis Property (27 Way#672), Wellfleet, Massachusetts, Notice of Intent Plans Not For Construction, November 17, 2021, Prepared for Friends of Herring River by WSP (11 sheets), scale 1" = 20" or as noted, stamped by Clayton Carlisle (#45839) (the "Plan"), a copy of which plan is attached hereto as Exhibit A; (ii) replace any an all trees damaged or removed to due construction with 7 native shrubs of the largest size available planted at the recommended spacing following best planting practices. Species and replacement location will be determined in consultation with the property owner, and (iii) install underground utilities from approximately Hopkins Drive along High Toss Road and Way 672 to replace overhead utilities that now service the Premises; disconnect and remove poles and wires on Way 672 after installation of the underground utilities is complete; (iv) relocate the private water supply well located on the Premises to an area approximately forty (40) feet southwest of the existing residence on the Premises and at least one hundred (100) feet from the existing onsite septic

system serving the adjacent property as shown on the Proposed Conditions plan for the Ellis property (Sheet 8 of the above-referenced plan set); and (v) disconnect and abandon in place the existing water supply well on the Premises (collectively, the "Work").

Dear Selectboard Members:

After inspecting the spat collecting devices in Chipman's Cove, the Shellfish Department checked and realized that Todd Mindrebo and Jeremy Storer did not have the Town of Wellfleet Commercial Shellfishing Permit as required by our regulations.

7.15.3. Use of Spat Collecting Devices

The use of spat collecting devices such as Chinese hats to catch oyster larvae in areas not licensed for aquaculture, may only be done by commercial permit holders who also hold a seed permit (Section 1, Definitions). During this period, catching oyster larva with such devices is legally considered to be fishing, not farming and the devices are classified as fishing equipment, not growing devices. All devices used in the collection of spat must be tagged with the name of the grant holder and phone number. From time to time, upon receiving a recommendation from the Constable, the Selectboard may vote to limit the areas in which such fishing is allowed or the numbers of Chinese hats or such other devices that may be set out by individuals in these same areas.

When we contacted them, they were both unaware that this was needed and immediately requested to be able to purchase one to make this right. The Shellfish Department believes that compliance is the ultimate goal, and we were pleased that both of these shellfishermen immediately wanted to rectify the situation in the fastest way possible.

Therefore, we asked them to submit a quick note requesting a hardship exemption (see attached). Here are the specifications outlined in our Wellfleet Shellfishing Policy and Regulations:

REGULATION 6.1.4. Hardship Exemption

The Board of Selectmen may at its discretion grant permits after January 31st if the applicant demonstrates all three of the following conditions:

- 1) that unusual circumstances existed which would reasonably excuse a failure to file an application prior to February 1st, and
- 2) that a substantial hardship would be caused by the refusal of a permit, and
- 3) that the granting of the late permit would not affect the opportunity of applicants, who have applied in a timely manner, to harvest a reasonable quantity of shellfish.

We believe they meet all three of the above conditions.

- 1) They were unaware of the regulation and in fact, this is the first time that the Shellfish Department is able to enforce it since we added tagging as a requirement in March of this year.
- 2) They both rely on natural, wild set providing significant oyster seed for their businesses. They could not make it without this seed.
- 3) The wild fishery resource is abundant this year. We see no adverse effect on other shellfishermen should they also decide to use their permit to shellfish commercially in the wild.

The Shellfish Department is pleased to find an efficient and reasonable way to achieve compliance with our spat collecting regulations for these two shellfish farmers. We ask that you grant these exemptions and allow us to issue them commercial shellfishing permits.





1. Summary:

Based on an evaluation of the data that characterize the material proposed to be dredged, this memorandum addresses the suitability of that material for disposal as proposed at the Cape Cod Bay Disposal Site (CCBDS) in accordance with applicable regulations. The Marine Analysis Section (MAS) finds that the data provide sufficient information to satisfy the evaluation and testing requirements of the appropriate regulations. The determination found that some of the sediments were unsuitable for open water disposal. However, MAS talked to the lab and had them re-examine the method detection limits reported previously. The lab reported back on 23 February that their previous report was in error and submitted a new corrected data report. Examining these new values showed that ALL these sediments are suitable for unconfined open water disposal at CCBDS as proposed.

2. Project Description:

The applicant is proposing to dredge two areas in Wellfleet Harbor. The first area (Area 1) is comprised of the North and South channels, the North Anchorage, and the Access Channel adjacent to L-Pier. This area is approximately 674,309 sq. ft. and would be dredged to depths of - 6 ft. MLW. Approximately 118,300 cu. yds. of material will be removed. The second area (Area 2) is the South Anchorage. This area is approximately 945,688 sq. ft. and would be dredged to depths of - 6 MLW, producing approximately 248,000 cu. yds. of material to be removed. The Town of Wellfleet proposes to mechanically dredge and dispose of this material at the Cape Cod Bay Disposal Site (CCBDS). This area was last permitted to be dredged in part ten years ago.

3. Sampling and Testing:

Charles N. Farris prepared a sampling plan for this project on 25 March 2014. The plan called for 14 cores (W-1 through W-14) to be taken from the project area. Bulk sediment chemistry analyses were conducted on four composites comprised of 14 samples (EXAMPLE: Composite A is comprised of cores W-5 and W-6). See the spreadsheets for details.

Comparison to (CCBDS) Reference Values

Metals: The contaminant concentrations in the sediments represented by Composites A through D were below or near the means plus twice the standard deviations of the contaminant concentrations found at the CCBDS reference site. The exception is copper in Composite A, which is two times larger. See the attached spreadsheets for details.

PAHs: In all of the project sediment samples, the PAH concentrations were below or near the means plus twice the standard deviations of the contaminant concentrations found at the CCBDS reference site. See the attached spreadsheets for details.

4. Regulations governing the determination of the suitability of dredged material for open-water disposal:

The disposal of dredged material seaward of the high tide line in Cape Cod Bay is regulated under Section 404 of the Clean Water Act (CWA).

Subpart G of the Section 404(b)(1) guidelines (40 CFR Section 230.60 and 230.61) describes the procedures for determining the suitability of this material for open-water disposal, including any relevant testing that may be required.

40 CFR 230.60 General Evaluation of Dredged or Fill Material

- (a) This subsection states that further testing may not be necessary if it could be determined with the evaluation under paragraph (b) that the sediment is not a carrier of contaminants. Dredged or fill material is most likely to be free from pollutants when it is composed primarily of sand, gravel or other naturally occurring inert material. Based upon our Tier 1 review, the proposed dredge sediment is primarily sand, gravel or other inert material in an area of high current and/or wave energy and evaluation under paragraph (b) below indicates the material is not a carrier of contaminants. Therefore, this subsection does not apply. Based upon our Tier 1 review, evaluation under paragraph (b) below indicates the proposed dredge sediment is a carrier of contaminants so this subsection does not apply.
- (b) This subsection states that the site should be evaluated to determine whether it is sufficiently removed from sources of pollution. These factors include records of spills or potential routes of contamination, like outfall pipes. There is a boat ramp and a fuel dock on the main pier as well as a drainage system to control runoff from impervious surfaces. No history of spills was reported by the contractor after examination of the area.

- (c) This subsection states that further testing may not be necessary if certain conditions and circumstances make it unlikely that the dredged material would degrade the disposal site. For the project to meet this exclusion, the material to be dredged and the material at the disposal site must be adjacent to each other **and** composed of the same materials **and** subject to the same sources of contaminants. As the project site is not adjacent to the disposal site, this exclusion does not apply to this project
- (d) This subsection states that further testing may not be necessary if the material to be dredged is constrained, both to reduce contamination within the disposal site and to prevent transport of contaminants beyond the boundaries of the disposal site. As such constraints in handling are not proposed, this subsection does not apply.
- 40 CFR 230.61 Chemical, Biological and Physical Evaluation and Testing
- (a) This subsection describes the purpose of Part 230.61 and does not give any criteria for the evaluation of sediments.
- (b) This subsection states that dredged material may be excluded from testing for water column effects and benthic bioassays if it is determined, by evaluation under 40 CFR Part 230.60, that the likelihood of contamination levels that could exert ecological impacts (as defined in Part 230.60 is that the right section) is acceptably low. Such testing is not needed, as it was determined, based on evaluation under Part 230.61(c), that the likelihood of contamination is low.
- (c) This subsection states that an inventory of the concentrations of the contaminants of concern would aid in an environmental assessment of the impact of their disposal on the designated disposal site. Such an inventory was performed at the dredge site. See Section 3 above and the attached spreadsheets for details. The dredged materials should have minimal impact at the disposal site.

CENAE and the federal agencies did not think an analysis of biological community structure was needed for this project.

(d) This subsection states the importance of the disposal of dredged materials on the characteristics of the physical substrate. MAS determined that the likelihood of physical effects from the disposal of the dredged material at the disposal site should be minimal. Although some benthic marine organisms will be buried by the disposal of the project materials, the disposal site should be rapidly re-colonized.





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I. INTRODUCTION

The 1996 amendments to the Magnuson-Stevens Fishery Conservation and Management Act require that an Essential Fish Habitat (EFH) consultation be conducted for activities that may adversely affect important habitats of federally managed marine and anadromous fish species. EFH includes "those waters and substrate necessary to fish for spawning, breeding, feeding, or growth to maturity." The proposed dredging location within Wellfleet Harbor falls into this category and thus has the potential to provide habitat for fish species in the area. The following is an assessment of the EFH for the maintenance dredging of Wellfleet Harbor.

II. PROPOSED ACTION: Dredging and Disposal

The Town of Wellfleet is seeking to perform maintenance dredging of all Town managed channels and anchorages within Wellfleet Harbor in an effort to restore safe and reliable navigation. There are two primary dredge Areas composed of 5 dredge sites within Wellfleet Harbor that have been maintained by the Town for more than sixty years. These areas are now severely shoaled and the Town is seeking to address the shoaling which is now causing major impacts on commercial and recreational boating in the Harbor. The scale of these projects presents major funding hurdles for the Town which, in turn, limits the scope and frequency of maintenance dredging of these areas. However, the extent of shoaling is now causing severe impacts on vessels in the harbor and the continued use and viability of the harbor makes it imperative that the shoaling is removed.

A Federal Navigation Project, adjacent to but not a part of this permitting application, maintains access into Wellfleet inner harbor and provides for a 10 foot deep channel, 125 feet wide with a 10 foot deep anchorage basin 800 feet by 500 feet at the head of the channel. The Town of Wellfleet maintains and operates a marina at the Town Pier and two anchorages, one to the north and one to the south of the Federal project.

For the purposes of this narrative, the Town managed portion of Wellfleet Harbor has been split up into two areas:

- Area I includes the North and South Access Channels, North Anchorage and the Access Channel adjacent to the L-Pier.
 - Area II is the South Anchorage

All material removed as part of the dredge will be taken for unconfined open water disposal at the Cape Cod Bay Disposal site.

ANALYSIS OF IMPACTS

Impacts to EFH from any dredging and disposal activity include potential changes in the physical and chemical properties of the water column, possible changes in sediment types both within the channel and at adjacent areas, and changes in water depth. Consequently, changes in the abundance and/or distribution of prey species may also result from both dredging and disposal activities. These impacts may range from both short-term, (i.e. impacts to the water column (increases in turbidity and total suspended solids)), to longer term impacts (i.e. changes in bathymetry as a result of dredging within the channel and deposition at the disposal site(s)).

A. Physical Environment

Physical Description - Wellfleet Harbor is a natural harbor and has played an important role in the history of Wellfleet, having provided dockage and anchorage for fishing and recreational vessels since 1644. The harbor is shallow with areas exposed at low tide both within and outside of the proposed dredge footprint. The substrate is primarily silt with most core samples showing approximately 80% silt / clay with less than 20% fine sand. The area is not considered productive shellfish area (per Andrew Koch, Shellfish Warden). The project area is not mapped by MA GIS for seagrass. The harbor has been actively used as a navigation and mooring field by commercial fishing vessels, charter boats and recreational boats for more than 60 years. Existing channels and anchorages gradually accumulate sediments as part of the natural processes on this shoreline and periodic maintenance dredging is required in order to maintain navigation.

Water Quality — Any impacts on water quality resultant from dredging the proposed channels and mooring basins in Wellfleet Harbor are expected to be temporary and limited to the immediate project area. Water quality impacts would be primarily a result of increased turbidities and suspended sediment (TSS) loads within the water column as a result of both the dredging operations. The sediments are mainly silt / clay with approximately 20% or less per core of fine sand. Turbidity will be limited by the use of an environmental bucket during dredge operations. Dissolved oxygen levels are not anticipated to be impacted by dredging and/or disposal activities of this project. No appreciable changes in the salinity regime, tidal flows or tide height are expected as a result of the proposed dredging or disposal activity.

Bathymetry/Water Depth — Other impacts from the proposed project include changes in the bathymetry of the areas to be dredged and the disposal site(s) due to the removal and placement of sediment. The area within Wellfleet Harbor that is to be dredged will remain a shallow water habitat with proposed dredge depths of -6 MLW (-7 with overdredge). All dredged materials have been approved for disposal at the Cape Cod Bay Disposal Site where they have been determined to have no negative impact.

B. Biological Environment

Prey Species — The abundance and/or distribution of prey species, for which EFH has been designated, may be impacted from dredging and disposal activities conducted for the Wellfleet Harbor dredge project. Many of these fish feed on organisms that live in or on the sediment. At the locations that are to be dredged, these prey species will be disrupted and or destroyed during the dredging process. However, each dredging project is expected to take up to 16 weeks and the actual dredging work will only impact a very small area at any one time. This will allow recolonization of dredged areas to start as soon as the dredge equipment relocates and impacted areas will only be a small portion of the entire footprint at any one time. Following dredging completion, the substrate types at dredging locations are expected to be similar to pre-project conditions thus promoting rapid recolonization by organisms from adjacent

areas. Therefore, any impacts to the habitat in which these fish species use for forage, would be expected to be temporary. Any biota inhabiting these areas would be opportunistic and capable of rapid recolonization.

Prey species that live in the water column are also likely to be impacted during dredging activities. The increased suspended sediments resulting from dredging activities have the potential to destroy/disrupt planktonic species in the vicinity of the TSS plume. However, given the short-lived and transient nature of these water column disturbances, it is expected that any impacts would be of a temporary nature and quickly return to ambient conditions upon cessation of operational activities. Thus any impacts would not be expected to have any long-term effects on prey species within the project area.

Much of the Land under Ocean proposed for dredging in this project is also designated as Shellfish Suitable Habitat for some species as per MA GIS mapping. However, a large majority of the dredge area is a muddy substrate and is not considered productive shellfish area. The Town will continue to work closely with the Wellfleet Shellfish Constable as dredge activities begin but there is minimal impact to shellfish anticipated due to dredge activities.

IV. Life History of EFH Species

A. Selection of EFH Species

The National Marine Fisheries Service Guide to Essential Fish Habitat web site was used to determine which species have designated EFH in Wellfleet Harbor and Surrounding areas. The species and the life stages of those species that have EFH in the study area was determined by using the quick reference $10 \times 10 = 10 \times 10 = 1$

Table 2 presents a list of the species that have designated EFH within Wellfleet Harbor and surrounding areas. A short summary of the EFH for each life stage of each particular species is described in the sections below. Information on the species was taken from the NMFS "Guide to EFH Species Designations", the Essential Fish Habitat Amendment, October 7, 1998, prepared by the New England Fishery Management Council located at http://www.nefmc.org/habitat/index.html and www.fishbase.org.

B. Summary of EFH Species

Atlantic Cod

EFH is designated for all four life stages of Atlantic cod (*Gadus morhua*) within the project area. Larvae typically prefer depths from 30 to 70 meters. Juveniles are found on bottom habitats with a substrate of cobble or gravel in depths from 25 to 75 meters. The adults are found on bottom habitats with a substrate of rocks, pebbles, or gravel. The adults prefer depths between 10 and 150 meters including for spawning. Wellfleet Harbor is much shallower than their preferred habitat depth, and composed primarily of soft silty sediments. Therefore, no more than minimal impacts on Atlantic cod EFH would be expected as a result of this project.

Haddock

EFH is designated within the project area for eggs and larvae of haddock (*Melanogrammus aeglefinus*). Eggs are generally found in water depths from 50 to 90 meters from March through May. Larvae are generally found in water depths from 30 to 90 meters between January and July. Spawning adult haddock are typically found in bottom habitats with a substrate of pebble gravel or gravelly sand in water temperature below 6° C. This project is expected to have minimal effects on EFH for haddock because all life stages tend to be found in waters deeper than those in the area of Wellfleet Harbor. The bottom of Wellfleet Harbor consists of mainly silt and, therefore, the project area would be unsuitable for spawning Haddock. Also, the project is expected to be subject to TOY restrictions preventing dredging during the peak periods for eggs.

Pollock

EFH is designated in the project areas for the larvae, juveniles, and adults of pollock (*Pollachius virens*). Larvae are pelagic, and found at depths significantly deeper than the proposed dredging. The juveniles have been reported over a wide variety of substrates, including sand, mud, or rocky bottom, and vegetation. Juveniles are found at depths of 0 to 250 meters. Adults inhabit a wide range of depths from 15 to 365 meters. Both Juveniles and Adults show little preference for bottom type. This project is expected to have minimal effects on EFH of pollock since the larvae, juveniles, and adults are all commonly found at depths deeper than the depths in Wellfleet Harbor. Additionally, any juvenile and adult pollock in the

dredge impact area would be able to easily avoid any disturbance caused by dredging. Therefore, no more than minimal impacts on pollock EFH would be anticipated as a result of this project.

Whiting / Silver Hake

Whiting or Silver Hake (Merluccius bilinearis) EFH is designated within the area of the proposed project for all life stages. Eggs are found at sea surface temperatures below 20° C and water depths between 50 and 150 meters. Whiting eggs are observed all year, with peaks from June through October. Larvae are generally found at sea surface temperatures below 20°C and water depths between 50 and 130 meters. Whiting larvae are observed all year, with peaks from July through September. Generally, the following conditions exist where most whiting juveniles are found: water temperatures below 21° C, depths between 20 and 270 meters and salinities greater than 20%. Generally, the following conditions exist where most whiting adults are found: water temperatures below 22° C and depths between 30 and 325 meters. The depth that all Whiting EFH life stages are generally found is much deeper than the proposed dredge depth therefore minimal to no impact is anticipated.

Red Hake

EFH is designated in the project area for all life stages of Red Hake. Red Hake eggs are found at sea surface temperatures below 10° C along the inner continental shelf with salinity less than 25‰. Hake eggs are most often observed during the months from May - November, with peaks in June and July. Red hake larvae are found at sea surface temperatures below 19° C, water depths less than 200 meters, and salinity greater than 0.5‰. Red hake larvae are most often observed from May through December, with peaks in September - October. Red Hake juveniles are found in water temperatures below 16° C, depths less than 100 meters and a salinity range from 31 - 33‰. Red Hake adults are generally found in water temperatures below 12° C, depths from 10 - 130 meters, and salinity range from 33 - 34‰. Although Red Hake EFH is located within the project area, sea surface temperatures in this shallow enclosed harbor would be higher than normal range for spawning fish and eggs in the months May to November. As such minimal impact would be expected on eggs. Juveniles and adults are very mobile and would be able to flee from the dredging or disposal areas once activities commence. Consequently, any potential impacts that occur will be localized and short term. Therefore, no more than minimal impacts on all life stages of the Red Hake EFH would be anticipated as a result of this project.

White Hake

EFH is designated within the project area for all life stages of white hake (*Urophycis tenuis*). Eggs are found in surface waters while the larvae are pelagic, both are found from August through September. TOY restrictions will limit impacts on these life stages. Juveniles have a pelagic and demersal stage. In the demersal stage, the juveniles are found on bottom habitats with seagrass beds or a substrate of mud or fine-grained sand, with water temperatures below 19° C, and depths from 5 to 225 meters. The adults are found associated with bottom habitats with a substrate of mud or fine grained sand, water temperatures below 14° C, and depths from 5 to 325 meters. The shallow waters of Wellfleet Harbor have a muddy substrate, no seagrass and are shallower than typical EFH. Therefore, no more than minimal impacts on white hake EFH would be anticipated as a result of this project.

Winter flounder

EFH is designated within the area of the proposed project areas for all life stages of the winter flounder (*Pseudopleuronectes americanus*). The eggs of winter flounder, which are demersal, are typically found at depths of less than 16.4 feet (5 m) in bottom waters in a broad range of salinities (10-30 ‰). Spawning, and therefore the presence of eggs, occurs from February to June. EFH for larvae, juveniles, and adults includes bottom habitats of mud and fine-grained sandy substrate in waters ranging from 0.3 to 328 feet (0.1-100 m) in depth. Spawning adults are typically associated with similar substrates in less than 19.7 feet (6 m) of water. Although winter flounder EFH is located within the

project area, juveniles and adults are very mobile and would be able to flee from the dredging or disposal areas once activities commence. Winter flounder move into the upper portions of the bay during the fall and remain in the area until spawning is completed. The young-of-the-year flounder generally remain in the immediate area where they hatched. The proponent will fully comply with TOY restrictions placed on dredge activities in response to Winter Flounder habitat needs. Consequently, any potential impacts that occur will be localized and short term and no more than minimal impacts on all life stages of the winter flounder EFH would be anticipated as a result of this project.

Yellowtail Flounder

EFH is designated within the area of the proposed project areas for all life stages of the yellowtail flounder. The eggs of winter flounder are typically found at depths between 30 to 90 meters in surface waters. Spawning, and therefore the presence of eggs, occurs from mid-March to July. Larvae occur in surface waters with a depth from 10 to 90 meters. EFH for juveniles, and adults includes bottom habitats of sand or sand and mud in waters ranging from 20 to 50 meters in depth. Spawning adults are typically associated with similar substrates in 10 to 125 meters of water. Depths in Wellfleet Harbor are typically shallower than EFH for yellowtail flounder. TOY restrictions placed on dredge activities would minimize impacts on eggs. Consequently, any potential impacts that occur will be localized and short term and no more than minimal impacts on all life stages of the yellowtail flounder EFH would be anticipated as a result of this project.

Windowpane Flounder

EFH is designated for all four life stages of windowpane flounder (*Scopthalmus aquosus*) in Wellfleet Harbor. Eggs and larvae are generally found in water depths less than 70 meters with sea surface temperatures less than 20° C. Eggs are observed from February to November in surface waters while larvae are pelagic. Peaks in eggs and larvae occur July to August on Georges Bank. Juveniles and Adults are generally found in bottom habitats with substrates of mud or fine grained sand in depths of 1 to 100 meters. Juveniles and Adults are highly mobile and would be able to flee from any potential water quality effects in the area. Any potential impacts that occur will be localized and short term. Therefore, no more than minimal impacts on the juvenile and adult life stage of the windowpane flounder EFH would be anticipated as a result of this project. TOY restrictions would be expected to minimize impacts on eggs and larvae.

American Plaice

EFH is designated for all four life stages of American Plaice. All four stages are found in depths greater than 30 meters with a wide range of salinities. All life stages can be found in areas with substrates of sand and gravel. Eggs and Larvae are generally present in surface waters and as such would not be impacted by dredge activities. Adults and juveniles can be found in bottom habitats in areas with more fine grained substrate, but these individuals would be easily able to avoid dredge activities. No more than minimal impacts on all life stages of American plaice are anticipated as a result of this project.

Ocean Pout

EFH is designated in the project area for all life stages of Ocean Pout. Due to low fecundity, relatively few eggs (< 4200) are laid in gelatinous masses, generally in hard bottom sheltered nests, holes, or crevices where they are guarded by either female or both parents. Generally, the following conditions exist where ocean pout eggs are found: water temperatures below 10° C, depths less than 50 meters, and a salinity range from 32 - 34‰. Larvae are believed to remain in close proximity to hard bottom nesting areas. Juveniles are generally found in conditions where water temperatures are below 14°C, depths less than 80 meters, and salinities greater than 25‰. Generally adults are found in water temperatures below 15°C, depths less than 110 meters, and a salinity range from 32 - 34‰. Due to the silty nature of Wellfleet Harbor, these conditions would be unsuitable for Ocean Pout eggs and larvae as they tend to

exist in hard bottom nesting areas. EFH for the juvenile and adult exist within the project area however impact will be minimal as they are mobile in their juvenile and adult stage, and have the ability to avoid dredging activities

Atlantic Halibut

EFH is designated within the area of Wellfleet Harbor for all life stages of Atlantic halibut (*Hippoglossus*), but the project area is too shallow to have any effect on the EFH of this species. Atlantic halibut eggs are bathypelagic, floating not at the surface, but suspended in the water column at depths ranging from 50 to 200 meters. The eggs are observed between late fall and early spring, with peaks in November and December. The larvae exist in surface waters. Juveniles and adults are found on bottom habitats with a substrate of sand, gravel, or clay. The juveniles are found in depths from 20 to 60 meters, whereas the adults are found at depths of 100 to 700 meters. The EFH for the entire life stage of Atlantic Halibut is much deeper than the depth within the proposed project area, therefore minimal to no impact is anticipated.

Atlantic Sea Scallop

EFH is designated in the project area for all life stages of Atlantic sea scallops. Eggs are heavier than seawater and remain on the seafloor until they develop into the first free-swimming larval stage. Spawning occurs from May through October, with peaks in September and October on Georges Bank and in the Gulf of Maine. Larvae are found in pelagic waters. Juveniles and adults are found in bottom habitats with a substrate of gravelly sand, shell fragments, and pebbles. The project is located within the EFH for Atlantic sea scallop eggs however substrates in the project area are not ideal habitat for larvae to settle. Additionally, impact will be minimal and transient allowing for the rapid resettlement of individuals. As such the project is anticipated to have minimal impact on EFH for sea scallop.

Atlantic Sea Herring

EFH is designated for all four stages for Atlantic sea herring. Generally, the following conditions exist where Larvae are found between 50 and 90 meters; Juveniles are found in water temperatures below 10°C, water depths from 15 - 135 meters, and a salinity range above 28% and Adults are typically found in water depths of 20 -130 meters. Spawning Adults are found in 20 -80 meters with a substrate of gravel, sand, cobble and shell fragments which are not typically found in Wellfleet Harbor. While herring eggs are usually found from July to November, they are found between depths of 20-80 meters. Minimal to no impact on Atlantic sea herring is anticipated as the depths as EFH for Atlantic sea herring is deeper than depths found in Wellfleet Harbor.

Monkfish

EFH is designated in the project area for eggs, larvae and juvenile Monkfish. Eggs are generally found in the following conditions: sea surface temperatures below 18° C and water depths from 15 - 1000 meters. Monkfish egg veils and larvae are most often observed during the months from March to September. Monkfish larvae are generally found in water temperatures 15° C and water depths from 25 - 1000 meters. Juvenile Monkfish prefer a substrate of sand-shell mix, algae covered rocks, hard-sand, pebbly gravel, or mud generally in water temps below 13° C, and depths from 25-200 meters There will be minimal impact to EFH for Monkfish eggs, larvae and juvenile stages as they are typically found in water deeper than 15 meters, which is significantly deeper than Wellfleet Harbor. This project will be subject to TOY restrictions which will minimize impacts on egg and larvae life stages.

Bluefish

EFH is designated within Wellfleet Harbor for juvenile and adult Bluefish. Juvenile bluefish are found in North Atlantic estuaries June through October, Adult bluefish occur in the open ocean, large embayments, and most estuarine systems within their range. Juvenile and adults prefer warmer

temperatures and travel to the North Atlantic waters June through October. Depending on time of year, adult Bluefish habitat can be found in depths from 1-100m. The project will occur within the EFH however juvenile and adult Bluefish are very mobile pelagic species not associated with bottom habitats often found in schools; therefore, dredging operations should not significantly impact preferred habitat. Since bluefish are sight feeders, increased turbidity in the proposed project area may affect their ability to locate prey however use of an environmental bucket during dredge operations and the ability of the bluefish to easily leave turbid waters should minimize potential impacts. Overall, minimal impact is anticipated to the juvenile and adult bluefish within Wellfleet Harbor.

Squid (Long Fin)

EFH is designated within Wellfleet Harbor for juveniles and adults of longfinned (Loligo pealeii) squid. EFH is the pelagic waters found over the Continental Shelf (from the coast out to the limits of the EEZ), from the Gulf of Maine through Cape Hatteras, North Carolina where the highest catches are found. Juvenile or pre-recruits are found in depths of 6-160 meters and adults or recruits are 6-200 meters with water temperatures between $8.5-14.5^{\circ}$ C. The squid are highly mobile in their juvenile and adult stage, and have the ability to avoid dredging activities. Minimal to no impact to the habitat is anticipated within Wellfleet harbor as the depths are not accommodating to the juveniles and adults.

Squid (Short Fin)

EFH is designated within Wellfleet Harbor for juveniles and adults of shortfinned (*Illex illecebrosus*) squid. Although there is little data available for this species, squid are highly mobile in their juvenile and adult stage, and have the ability to avoid dredging activities. Minimal to no impact to the habitat is anticipated within Wellfleet harbor.

Smooth Dogfish

EFH is designated for all life stages of Smooth Dogfish (*Mustelus canis*) in the area of Wellfleet Harbor. Insufficient information is available to identify EFH for this species but young are liveborn and the adults are extremely mobile. Little to no impact to their EFH is anticipated in the Wellfleet harbor project.

Atlantic Butterfish

EFH is designated within the project area for all stages of the Atlantic butterfish (*Peprilus triacanthus*). All life stages of the butterfish are pelagic, with juviniles and adults forming loose schools, often near the surface. Juvenile are found between depths of 10 and 280 m and adults are found between 11 and 250 m. Therefore, any disruption of EFH as a result of project activity would be temporary and no more than minimal impacts are expected on Atlantic butterfish within the shallow depths of Wellfleet Harbor.

Atlantic Mackerel

EFH is designated within the area of the proposed project for all four life stages of Atlantic mackerel (*Scomber scombrus*). Since all life stages of Atlantic mackerel are generally found offshore, no impacts to Atlantic mackerel EFH are expected within the project area. The eggs are pelagic and occur in water having salinities greater than 34 ‰, in depths deeper than 100 meters or less than average temperatures of 6.5 to 12.5° C. Larvae are primarily distributed at depths between 21 and 100 meters. The juveniles are found between 10 and 110 meters and adults are found in depths less than 170 meters. Any adults and juveniles in the project area should be able to avoid any potential impacts because of their mobility. Therefore, no more than minimal impacts on all life stages of Atlantic mackerel EFH would be anticipated as a result of this project due to the depths within Wellfleet Harbor.

Summer Flounder

EFH is indicated for the adult stage of summer flounder or fluke (*Paralichthys dentatus*). Inshore EFH for summer flounder is the estuaries where summer flounder have been identified as being common, abundant, or highly abundant in the ELMR database. Generally, summer flounder inhabit shallow coastal and estuarine waters during warmer months and move offshore on the outer Continental Shelf at depths of 500 ft in colder months. Due to TOY restrictions dredging is anticipated to occur in the fall when summer flounder may be moving off into deeper waters. Additionally, adults are highly mobile and will be easily able to avoid dredge activities. As such impact to the adult stage of summer flounder in Wellfleet harbor is expected to be minimal.

Little Skate

EFH is designated for the adult stage within Wellfleet harbor for little skate (*Leucoraja erinacea*). Adults are generally found in bottom habitats with a sandy or gravelly substrate or mud, ranging from Georges Bank through the Mid-Atlantic Bight to Cape Hatteras, North Carolina. They are found at depths between shallows and 137 meters. While little skate can be found in shallow depths, highest concentrations are found between 73 and 91 meters. Adult skates are highly mobile and are able to avoid dredge activities, combined with the shallow depths within Wellfleet harbor minimal impacts would be anticipated during dredging.

Scup

EFH is designated within the project area for all juvenile and adult Scup (Stenotomus chrysops). Scup juveniles and adults have the potential to occur in estuarine systems during the spring and summer months. All life stages of scup prefer salinities greater than 15 ‰. Juveniles and adults use structured areas for foraging and refuge, which do not exist in the project area. Scup are highly mobile species and would be expected to have the ability to avoid dredging and disposal activities. Therefore, no more than minimal impacts to Scup EFH would be anticipated as a result of this project.

Black Sea Bass

EFH is designated for adult black sea bass (*Centropristus striata*) within the project area. EFH for the adults of this species is predominantly within estuarine systems with oceanic salinities. Adults are found in estuaries during spring and summer months in water temperatures above 6° C and salinities greater than 18 %. Black sea bass prefer rough, shelly substrates and can be found in natural and manmade structured habitats. These habitats are not found in Wellfleet harbor and dredging is likely to occur in the fall when sea bass are moving off shore. Although sea bass may occur in the project area, adults should be able to avoid any potential impacts because of their mobility. Therefore, no more than minimal impacts to black sea bass EFH are anticipated as a result of this project.

Thorny Skate

EFH is designated for juvenile Thorny Skate. Juveniles are found in depths between 18 and 2000 meters. Depth range in Wellfleet Harbor is less than this range and any juveniles will be mobile to avoid dredging activities. Therefore, no more than minimal impacts to Thorny Skate EFH are anticipated as a result of this project.

Surf Clam

EFH is indicated for juvenile and adult life stages of surf clam (*Spisula solidissima*). They are found throughout the substrate, to a depth of three feet below the water/sediment interface, within federal waters from the eastern edge of Georges Bank and the Gulf of Maine throughout the Atlantic EEZ. Surf clams generally occur from the beach zone to a depth of about 200 feet, but beyond about 125 feet abundance is low. The proposed project area is mapped as suitable habitat for surf clams but actual abundance is low as per the Town of Wellfleet shellfish warden. Impacts due to dredge activities will be

transient allowing for recolonization if individuals are present in the project area. Therefore, impacts to EFH will be minimal and temporary.

Spiny Dogfish

EFH is designated for juveniles and adult spiny dogfish (*Squalus acanthias*) in Wellfleet Harbor. Juveniles can be found in waters ranging from 10 to 390 meters and water temperature anywhere from 2-21 °C. Adults can be found in waters ranging between 11 to 450 meters and water temperatures ranging from about 5-20 °C. EFH is deeper than Wellfleet Harbor and both juvenile and adult Spiny Dogfish are highly mobile and can avoid any disturbances during dredging or disposal activity. Little to no impact to their EFH is anticipated by the project.

Blue Shark

EFH habitat is designated within Wellfleet harbor for adult Blue shark (*Prionace glauca*). Adults can be found in waters ranging from 1-350m deep. Occasionally they can be found close inshore where the continental shelf is narrow. The prefer temperatures ranging from 12-20 °C. Blue Sharks are highly migratory with complex movement patterns. There is little to no impact on adult blue shark habitat as these species are highly mobile and are able to avoid any dredging activity.

Bluefin Tuna

EFH is designated within the Wellfleet Harbor area for bluefin tuna (*Thunnus thynnus*) juveniles and adults. Bluefin tuna is a highly migratory species found in pelagic waters of at least 82 feet (25 m) depth. The few that enter coastal waters are highly mobile and can evade any potential short-term water column disturbances as a result of dredging and disposal activities. Therefore, no impacts to highly migratory species would be anticipated as a result of this project.

White Shark

EFH habitat is designated for all life stages of White shark. Young are liveborn. Adults can be found in all waters. Occasionally they can be found close inshore. There is little to no impact on White Shark habitat as these species are highly mobile and are able to avoid any dredging activity.

Winter Skate

EFH is designated for the adult stage within Wellfleet harbor for winter skate (*Leucoraja ocellata*). Adults are generally found in bottom habitats with a sandy or gravelly substrate or mud, ranging from Georges Bank through the Mid-Atlantic Bight to Cape Hatteras, North Carolina. They are found at depths between shallows and 400 meters. While winter skate can be found in shallow depths, highest concentrations are found at depths shallower than 111 meters. Both adult and juvenile skates are highly mobile and are able to avoid dredge activities, combined with the shallow depths within Wellfleet harbor minimal impacts would be anticipated during dredging.

Atlantic Wolffish

EFH is designated within the area of Wellfleet Harbor for all life stages of Atlantic wolffish (Anarhichas lupus), but the project area is too shallow to have any effect on the EFH of this species. Atlantic wolffish EFH is from 40 to 240 meters in depth. The EFH for the entire life stage of Atlantic Wolffish is much deeper than the depth within the proposed project area, therefore minimal to no impact is anticipated.

V. CUMULATIVE EFFECTS

Cumulative impacts are those resulting from the incremental impact of the proposed action when added to other past, present, and reasonably foreseeable future actions. Dredging has been conducted in

Wellfleet Harbor previously. Reasonably foreseeable future actions include the continuation of proposed dredging and navigation activities. Water quality, air quality, hydrology, and other biological resources are expected to not be significantly affected by these actions based on prior dredging activity. The direct effects of this project are not anticipated to add to impacts from other actions in the area. Maintenance dredging in Wellfleet Harbor will preserve the navigation of this important area and maintain the important commercial and recreational mooring fields. No adverse cumulative impacts are projected as a result of this project.

VI. SUMMARY OF EFFECTS

The dredging activities proposed for maintenance dredging in Wellfleet Harbor could potentially have limited minimal temporary impacts on EFH of designated species found within the proposed project area. In general, eggs and larvae are more susceptible to impacts than juveniles and adults (Sherk et al., 1975) which can avoid dredging related disturbance. Demersal species such as flounders are more susceptible to impacts than pelagic species since most dredging related disturbance occurs near the bottom, but the adults of these species tend to be the most tolerant to suspended solids (Sherk et al., 1975). Consequently, the EFH of species with the greatest potential to be affected by the Wellfleet Harbor dredging project are those with demersal eggs (winter flounder), the eggs can be dredged or buried by disposal. To avoid these impacts the proponent will comply fully with recommended TOY restrictions for those species as listed. Occasionally eggs and larvae may be physically damaged or killed from exposure to elevated concentrations of suspended solids, but the use of an environmental bucket will minimize the sediments that remain suspended in the water column.

A. Conclusions

There is minimal, if any potential for adverse effects, including cumulative effects, of the proposed action on Essential Fish Habitat. The dredging will occur in an area that has long been disturbed by activity. The area will also remain a shallow water habitat after dredge operations are complete. In such an environment, few animals representing the various life stages of the managed species have the potential to be impacted by dredge activities. The dredged material is primarily silt, so the project proponent is proposing to use a mechanical dredge with an environmental bucket to minimize potential impacts. Any impacts to EFH from the dredging and disposal are expected to be short-term and localized. The proposed project would not be expected to affect schooling life stages or spawning and nursery habitats as the area will quickly return to a shallow water habitat.

Additionally, not all areas designated as EFH for the various species will be impacted. The effects of dredging and disposal will be limited in time and area as dredge operations will only impact small sections of the overall project area at any given time. Therefore, the species at these locations will be able to remove themselves from impacted areas or repopulate impacted areas quickly.

I. INTRODUCTION

The 1996 amendments to the Magnuson-Stevens Fishery Conservation and Management Act require that an Essential Fish Habitat (EFH) consultation be conducted for activities that may adversely affect important habitats of federally managed marine and anadromous fish species. EFH includes "those waters and substrate necessary to fish for spawning, breeding, feeding, or growth to maturity." The proposed dredging location within Wellfleet Harbor falls into this category and thus has the potential to provide habitat for fish species in the area. The following is an assessment of the EFH for the maintenance dredging of Wellfleet Harbor.

II. PROPOSED ACTION: Dredging and Disposal

The Town of Wellfleet is seeking to perform maintenance dredging of all Town managed channels and anchorages within Wellfleet Harbor in an effort to restore safe and reliable navigation. There are two primary dredge Areas composed of 5 dredge sites within Wellfleet Harbor that have been maintained by the Town for more than sixty years. These areas are now severely shoaled and the Town is seeking to address the shoaling which is now causing major impacts on commercial and recreational boating in the Harbor. The scale of these projects presents major funding hurdles for the Town which, in turn, limits the scope and frequency of maintenance dredging of these areas. However, the extent of shoaling is now causing severe impacts on vessels in the harbor and the continued use and viability of the harbor makes it imperative that the shoaling is removed.

A Federal Navigation Project, adjacent to but not a part of this permitting application, maintains access into Wellfleet inner harbor and provides for a 10 foot deep channel, 125 feet wide with a 10 foot deep anchorage basin 800 feet by 500 feet at the head of the channel. The Town of Wellfleet maintains and operates a marina at the Town Pier and two anchorages, one to the north and one to the south of the Federal project.

For the purposes of this narrative, the Town managed portion of Wellfleet Harbor has been split up into two areas:

• Area I includes the North and South Access Channels, North Anchorage and the Access Channel adjacent to the L-Pier.

All material removed as part of the dredge will be taken for unconfined open water disposal at the Cape Cod Bay Disposal site.

ANALYSIS OF IMPACTS

Impacts to EFH from any dredging and disposal activity include potential changes in the physical and chemical properties of the water column, possible changes in sediment types both within the channel and at adjacent areas, and changes in water depth. Consequently, changes in the abundance and/or distribution of prey species may also result from both dredging and disposal activities. These impacts may range from both short-term, (i.e. impacts to the water column (increases in turbidity and total suspended solids)), to longer term impacts (i.e. changes in bathymetry as a result of dredging within the channel and deposition at the disposal site(s)).

A. Physical Environment

Physical Description - Wellfleet Harbor is a natural harbor and has played an important role in the history of Wellfleet, having provided dockage and anchorage for fishing and recreational vessels since 1644. The harbor is shallow with areas exposed at low tide both within and outside of the proposed dredge footprint. The substrate is primarily silt with most core samples showing approximately 80% silt / clay with less than 20% fine sand. The area is not considered productive shellfish area (per Andrew Koch, Shellfish Warden). The project area is not mapped by MA GIS for seagrass. The harbor has been actively used as a navigation and mooring field by commercial fishing vessels, charter boats and recreational boats for more than 60 years. Existing channels and anchorages gradually accumulate sediments as part of the natural processes on this shoreline and periodic maintenance dredging is required in order to maintain navigation.

Water Quality — Any impacts on water quality resultant from dredging the proposed channels and mooring basins in Wellfleet Harbor are expected to be temporary and limited to the immediate project area. Water quality impacts would be primarily a result of increased turbidities and suspended sediment (TSS) loads within the water column as a result of both the dredging operations. The sediments are mainly silt / clay with approximately 20% or less per core of fine sand. Turbidity will be limited by the use of an environmental bucket during dredge operations. Dissolved oxygen levels are not anticipated to be impacted by dredging and/or disposal activities of this project. No appreciable changes in the salinity regime, tidal flows or tide height are expected as a result of the proposed dredging or disposal activity.

Bathymetry/Water Depth — Other impacts from the proposed project include changes in the bathymetry of the areas to be dredged and the disposal site(s) due to the removal and placement of sediment. The area within Wellfleet Harbor that is to be dredged will remain a shallow water habitat with proposed dredge depths of -6 MLW (-7 with overdredge). All dredged materials have been approved for disposal at the Cape Cod Bay Disposal Site where they have been determined to have no negative impact.

B. Biological Environment

Prey Species — The abundance and/or distribution of prey species, for which EFH has been designated, may be impacted from dredging and disposal activities conducted for the Wellfleet Harbor dredge project. Many of these fish feed on organisms that live in or on the sediment. At the locations that are to be dredged, these prey species will be disrupted and or destroyed during the dredging process. However, each dredging project is expected to take up to 16 weeks and the actual dredging work will only impact a very small area at any one time. This will allow recolonization of dredged areas to start as soon as the dredge equipment relocates and impacted areas will only be a small portion of the entire footprint at any one time. Following dredging completion, the substrate types at dredging locations are expected to be similar to pre-project conditions thus promoting rapid recolonization by organisms from adjacent

areas. Therefore, any impacts to the habitat in which these fish species use for forage, would be expected to be temporary. Any biota inhabiting these areas would be opportunistic and capable of rapid recolonization.

Prey species that live in the water column are also likely to be impacted during dredging activities. The increased suspended sediments resulting from dredging activities have the potential to destroy/disrupt planktonic species in the vicinity of the TSS plume. However, given the short-lived and transient nature of these water column disturbances, it is expected that any impacts would be of a temporary nature and quickly return to ambient conditions upon cessation of operational activities. Thus any impacts would not be expected to have any long-term effects on prey species within the project area.

Much of the Land under Ocean proposed for dredging in this project is also designated as Shellfish Suitable Habitat for some species as per MA GIS mapping. However, a large majority of the dredge area is a muddy substrate and is not considered productive shellfish area. The Town will continue to work closely with the Wellfleet Shellfish Constable as dredge activities begin but there is minimal impact to shellfish anticipated due to dredge activities.

IV. Life History of EFH Species

A. Selection of EFH Species

The National Marine Fisheries Service Guide to Essential Fish Habitat web site was used to determine which species have designated EFH in Wellfleet Harbor and Surrounding areas. The species and the life stages of those species that have EFH in the study area was determined by using the quick reference 10 x 10 minute squares of latitude and longitude. The coordinates of the 10 x 10 minute square that is representative of the geographic area of the proposed dredging and disposal activities are provided in Table 1 below.

Table 2 presents a list of the species that have designated EFH within Wellfleet Harbor and surrounding areas. A short summary of the EFH for each life stage of each particular species is described in the sections below. Information on the species was taken from the NMFS "Guide to EFH Species Designations", the Essential Fish Habitat Amendment, October 7, 1998, prepared by the New England Fishery Management Council located at http://www.nefmc.org/habitat/index.html and www.fishbase.org.

B. Summary of EFH Species

Atlantic Cod

EFH is designated for all four life stages of Atlantic cod (*Gadus morhua*) within the project area. Larvae typically prefer depths from 30 to 70 meters. Juveniles are found on bottom habitats with a substrate of cobble or gravel in depths from 25 to 75 meters. The adults are found on bottom habitats with a substrate of rocks, pebbles, or gravel. The adults prefer depths between 10 and 150 meters including for spawning. Wellfleet Harbor is much shallower than their preferred habitat depth, and composed primarily of soft silty sediments. Therefore, no more than minimal impacts on Atlantic cod EFH would be expected as a result of this project.

Haddock

EFH is designated within the project area for eggs and larvae of haddock (*Melanogrammus aeglefinus*). Eggs are generally found in water depths from 50 to 90 meters from March through May. Larvae are generally found in water depths from 30 to 90 meters between January and July. Spawning adult haddock are typically found in bottom habitats with a substrate of pebble gravel or gravelly sand in water temperature below 6° C. This project is expected to have minimal effects on EFH for haddock because all life stages tend to be found in waters deeper than those in the area of Wellfleet Harbor. The bottom of Wellfleet Harbor consists of mainly silt and, therefore, the project area would be unsuitable for spawning Haddock. Also, the project is expected to be subject to TOY restrictions preventing dredging during the peak periods for eggs.

Pollock

EFH is designated in the project areas for the larvae, juveniles, and adults of pollock (*Pollachius virens*). Larvae are pelagic, and found at depths significantly deeper than the proposed dredging. The juveniles have been reported over a wide variety of substrates, including sand, mud, or rocky bottom, and vegetation. Juveniles are found at depths of 0 to 250 meters. Adults inhabit a wide range of depths from 15 to 365 meters. Both Juveniles and Adults show little preference for bottom type. This project is expected to have minimal effects on EFH of pollock since the larvae, juveniles, and adults are all commonly found at depths deeper than the depths in Wellfleet Harbor. Additionally, any juvenile and adult pollock in the

dredge impact area would be able to easily avoid any disturbance caused by dredging. Therefore, no more than minimal impacts on pollock EFH would be anticipated as a result of this project.

Whiting / Silver Hake

Whiting or Silver Hake (Merluccius bilinearis) EFH is designated within the area of the proposed project for all life stages. Eggs are found at sea surface temperatures below 20° C and water depths between 50 and 150 meters. Whiting eggs are observed all year, with peaks from June through October. Larvae are generally found at sea surface temperatures below 20°C and water depths between 50 and 130 meters. Whiting larvae are observed all year, with peaks from July through September. Generally, the following conditions exist where most whiting juveniles are found: water temperatures below 21° C, depths between 20 and 270 meters and salinities greater than 20%. Generally, the following conditions exist where most whiting adults are found: water temperatures below 22° C and depths between 30 and 325 meters. The depth that all Whiting EFH life stages are generally found is much deeper than the proposed dredge depth therefore minimal to no impact is anticipated.

Red Hake

EFH is designated in the project area for all life stages of Red Hake. Red Hake eggs are found at sea surface temperatures below 10° C along the inner continental shelf with salinity less than 25‰. Hake eggs are most often observed during the months from May - November, with peaks in June and July. Red hake larvae are found at sea surface temperatures below 19° C, water depths less than 200 meters, and salinity greater than 0.5‰. Red hake larvae are most often observed from May through December, with peaks in September - October. Red Hake juveniles are found in water temperatures below 16° C, depths less than 100 meters and a salinity range from 31 - 33‰. Red Hake adults are generally found in water temperatures below 12° C, depths from 10 - 130 meters, and salinity range from 33 - 34‰. Although Red Hake EFH is located within the project area, sea surface temperatures in this shallow enclosed harbor would be higher than normal range for spawning fish and eggs in the months May to November. As such minimal impact would be expected on eggs. Juveniles and adults are very mobile and would be able to flee from the dredging or disposal areas once activities commence. Consequently, any potential impacts that occur will be localized and short term. Therefore, no more than minimal impacts on all life stages of the Red Hake EFH would be anticipated as a result of this project.

White Hake

EFH is designated within the project area for all life stages of white hake (*Urophycis tenuis*). Eggs are found in surface waters while the larvae are pelagic, both are found from August through September. TOY restrictions will limit impacts on these life stages. Juveniles have a pelagic and demersal stage. In the demersal stage, the juveniles are found on bottom habitats with seagrass beds or a substrate of mud or fine-grained sand, with water temperatures below 19° C, and depths from 5 to 225 meters. The adults are found associated with bottom habitats with a substrate of mud or fine grained sand, water temperatures below 14° C, and depths from 5 to 325 meters. The shallow waters of Wellfleet Harbor have a muddy substrate, no seagrass and are shallower than typical EFH. Therefore, no more than minimal impacts on white hake EFH would be anticipated as a result of this project.

Winter flounder

EFH is designated within the area of the proposed project areas for all life stages of the winter flounder (*Pseudopleuronectes americanus*). The eggs of winter flounder, which are demersal, are typically found at depths of less than 16.4 feet (5 m) in bottom waters in a broad range of salinities (10-30 ‰). Spawning, and therefore the presence of eggs, occurs from February to June. EFH for larvae, juveniles, and adults includes bottom habitats of mud and fine-grained sandy substrate in waters ranging from 0.3 to 328 feet (0.1-100 m) in depth. Spawning adults are typically associated with similar substrates in less than 19.7 feet (6 m) of water. Although winter flounder EFH is located within the

project area, juveniles and adults are very mobile and would be able to flee from the dredging or disposal areas once activities commence. Winter flounder move into the upper portions of the bay during the fall and remain in the area until spawning is completed. The young-of-the-year flounder generally remain in the immediate area where they hatched. The proponent will fully comply with TOY restrictions placed on dredge activities in response to Winter Flounder habitat needs. Consequently, any potential impacts that occur will be localized and short term and no more than minimal impacts on all life stages of the winter flounder EFH would be anticipated as a result of this project.

Yellowtail Flounder

EFH is designated within the area of the proposed project areas for all life stages of the yellowtail flounder. The eggs of winter flounder are typically found at depths between 30 to 90 meters in surface waters. Spawning, and therefore the presence of eggs, occurs from mid-March to July. Larvae occur in surface waters with a depth from 10 to 90 meters. EFH for juveniles, and adults includes bottom habitats of sand or sand and mud in waters ranging from 20 to 50 meters in depth. Spawning adults are typically associated with similar substrates in 10 to 125 meters of water. Depths in Wellfleet Harbor are typically shallower than EFH for yellowtail flounder. TOY restrictions placed on dredge activities would minimize impacts on eggs. Consequently, any potential impacts that occur will be localized and short term and no more than minimal impacts on all life stages of the yellowtail flounder EFH would be anticipated as a result of this project.

Windowpane Flounder

EFH is designated for all four life stages of windowpane flounder (*Scopthalmus aquosus*) in Wellfleet Harbor. Eggs and larvae are generally found in water depths less than 70 meters with sea surface temperatures less than 20° C. Eggs are observed from February to November in surface waters while larvae are pelagic. Peaks in eggs and larvae occur July to August on Georges Bank. Juveniles and Adults are generally found in bottom habitats with substrates of mud or fine grained sand in depths of 1 to 100 meters. Juveniles and Adults are highly mobile and would be able to flee from any potential water quality effects in the area. Any potential impacts that occur will be localized and short term. Therefore, no more than minimal impacts on the juvenile and adult life stage of the windowpane flounder EFH would be anticipated as a result of this project. TOY restrictions would be expected to minimize impacts on eggs and larvae.

American Plaice

EFH is designated for all four life stages of American Plaice. All four stages are found in depths greater than 30 meters with a wide range of salinities. All life stages can be found in areas with substrates of sand and gravel. Eggs and Larvae are generally present in surface waters and as such would not be impacted by dredge activities. Adults and juveniles can be found in bottom habitats in areas with more fine grained substrate, but these individuals would be easily able to avoid dredge activities. No more than minimal impacts on all life stages of American plaice are anticipated as a result of this project.

Ocean Pout

EFH is designated in the project area for all life stages of Ocean Pout. Due to low fecundity, relatively few eggs (< 4200) are laid in gelatinous masses, generally in hard bottom sheltered nests, holes, or crevices where they are guarded by either female or both parents. Generally, the following conditions exist where ocean pout eggs are found: water temperatures below 10° C, depths less than 50 meters, and a salinity range from 32 - 34‰. Larvae are believed to remain in close proximity to hard bottom nesting areas. Juveniles are generally found in conditions where water temperatures are below 14°C, depths less than 80 meters, and salinities greater than 25‰. Generally adults are found in water temperatures below 15°C, depths less than 110 meters, and a salinity range from 32 - 34‰. Due to the silty nature of Wellfleet Harbor, these conditions would be unsuitable for Ocean Pout eggs and larvae as they tend to

exist in hard bottom nesting areas. EFH for the juvenile and adult exist within the project area however impact will be minimal as they are mobile in their juvenile and adult stage, and have the ability to avoid dredging activities

Atlantic Halibut

EFH is designated within the area of Wellfleet Harbor for all life stages of Atlantic halibut (Hippoglossus hippoglossus), but the project area is too shallow to have any effect on the EFH of this species. Atlantic halibut eggs are bathypelagic, floating not at the surface, but suspended in the water column at depths ranging from 50 to 200 meters. The eggs are observed between late fall and early spring, with peaks in November and December. The larvae exist in surface waters. Juveniles and adults are found on bottom habitats with a substrate of sand, gravel, or clay. The juveniles are found in depths from 20 to 60 meters, whereas the adults are found at depths of 100 to 700 meters. The EFH for the entire life stage of Atlantic Halibut is much deeper than the depth within the proposed project area, therefore minimal to no impact is anticipated.

Atlantic Sea Scallop

EFH is designated in the project area for all life stages of Atlantic sea scallops. Eggs are heavier than seawater and remain on the seafloor until they develop into the first free-swimming larval stage. Spawning occurs from May through October, with peaks in September and October on Georges Bank and in the Gulf of Maine. Larvae are found in pelagic waters. Juveniles and adults are found in bottom habitats with a substrate of gravelly sand, shell fragments, and pebbles. The project is located within the EFH for Atlantic sea scallop eggs however substrates in the project area are not ideal habitat for larvae to settle. Additionally, impact will be minimal and transient allowing for the rapid resettlement of individuals. As such the project is anticipated to have minimal impact on EFH for sea scallop.

Atlantic Sea Herring

EFH is designated for all four stages for Atlantic sea herring. Generally, the following conditions exist where Larvae are found between 50 and 90 meters; Juveniles are found in water temperatures below 10°C, water depths from 15 - 135 meters, and a salinity range above 28% and Adults are typically found in water depths of 20 -130 meters. Spawning Adults are found in 20 -80 meters with a substrate of gravel, sand, cobble and shell fragments which are not typically found in Wellfleet Harbor. While herring eggs are usually found from July to November, they are found between depths of 20-80 meters. Minimal to no impact on Atlantic sea herring is anticipated as the depths as EFH for Atlantic sea herring is deeper than depths found in Wellfleet Harbor.

Monkfish

EFH is designated in the project area for eggs, larvae and juvenile Monkfish. Eggs are generally found in the following conditions: sea surface temperatures below 18° C and water depths from 15 - 1000 meters. Monkfish egg veils and larvae are most often observed during the months from March to September. Monkfish larvae are generally found in water temperatures 15° C and water depths from 25 - 1000 meters. Juvenile Monkfish prefer a substrate of sand-shell mix, algae covered rocks, hard-sand, pebbly gravel, or mud generally in water temps below 13° C, and depths from 25-200 meters There will be minimal impact to EFH for Monkfish eggs, larvae and juvenile stages as they are typically found in water deeper than 15 meters, which is significantly deeper than Wellfleet Harbor. This project will be subject to TOY restrictions which will minimize impacts on egg and larvae life stages.

Bluefish

EFH is designated within Wellfleet Harbor for juvenile and adult Bluefish. Juvenile bluefish are found in North Atlantic estuaries June through October, Adult bluefish occur in the open ocean, large embayments, and most estuarine systems within their range. Juvenile and adults prefer warmer

temperatures and travel to the North Atlantic waters June through October. Depending on time of year, adult Bluefish habitat can be found in depths from 1-100m. The project will occur within the EFH however juvenile and adult Bluefish are very mobile pelagic species not associated with bottom habitats often found in schools; therefore, dredging operations should not significantly impact preferred habitat. Since bluefish are sight feeders, increased turbidity in the proposed project area may affect their ability to locate prey however use of an environmental bucket during dredge operations and the ability of the bluefish to easily leave turbid waters should minimize potential impacts. Overall, minimal impact is anticipated to the juvenile and adult bluefish within Wellfleet Harbor.

Squid (Long Fin)

EFH is designated within Wellfleet Harbor for juveniles and adults of longfinned (*Loligo pealeii*) squid. EFH is the pelagic waters found over the Continental Shelf (from the coast out to the limits of the EEZ), from the Gulf of Maine through Cape Hatteras, North Carolina where the highest catches are found. Juvenile or pre-recruits are found in depths of 6-160 meters and adults or recruits are 6-200 meters with water temperatures between $8.5-14.5^{\circ}$ C. The squid are highly mobile in their juvenile and adult stage, and have the ability to avoid dredging activities. Minimal to no impact to the habitat is anticipated within Wellfleet harbor as the depths are not accommodating to the juveniles and adults.

Squid (Short Fin)

EFH is designated within Wellfleet Harbor for juveniles and adults of shortfinned (*Illex illecebrosus*) squid. Although there is little data available for this species, squid are highly mobile in their juvenile and adult stage, and have the ability to avoid dredging activities. Minimal to no impact to the habitat is anticipated within Wellfleet harbor.

Smooth Dogfish

EFH is designated for all life stages of Smooth Dogfish (*Mustelus canis*) in the area of Wellfleet Harbor. Insufficient information is available to identify EFH for this species but young are liveborn and the adults are extremely mobile. Little to no impact to their EFH is anticipated in the Wellfleet harbor project.

Atlantic Butterfish

EFH is designated within the project area for all stages of the Atlantic butterfish (*Peprilus triacanthus*). All life stages of the butterfish are pelagic, with juviniles and adults forming loose schools, often near the surface. Juvenile are found between depths of 10 and 280 m and adults are found between 11 and 250 m. Therefore, any disruption of EFH as a result of project activity would be temporary and no more than minimal impacts are expected on Atlantic butterfish within the shallow depths of Wellfleet Harbor.

Atlantic Mackerel

EFH is designated within the area of the proposed project for all four life stages of Atlantic mackerel (Scomber scombrus). Since all life stages of Atlantic mackerel are generally found offshore, no impacts to Atlantic mackerel EFH are expected within the project area. The eggs are pelagic and occur in water having salinities greater than 34 ‰, in depths deeper than 100 meters or less than average temperatures of 6.5 to 12.5° C. Larvae are primarily distributed at depths between 21 and 100 meters. The juveniles are found between 10 and 110 meters and adults are found in depths less than 170 meters. Any adults and juveniles in the project area should be able to avoid any potential impacts because of their mobility. Therefore, no more than minimal impacts on all life stages of Atlantic mackerel EFH would be anticipated as a result of this project due to the depths within Wellfleet Harbor.

Summer Flounder

EFH is indicated for the adult stage of summer flounder or fluke (*Paralichthys dentatus*). Inshore EFH for summer flounder is the estuaries where summer flounder have been identified as being common, abundant, or highly abundant in the ELMR database. Generally, summer flounder inhabit shallow coastal and estuarine waters during warmer months and move offshore on the outer Continental Shelf at depths of 500 ft in colder months. Due to TOY restrictions dredging is anticipated to occur in the fall when summer flounder may be moving off into deeper waters. Additionally, adults are highly mobile and will be easily able to avoid dredge activities. As such impact to the adult stage of summer flounder in Wellfleet harbor is expected to be minimal.

Little Skate

EFH is designated for the adult stage within Wellfleet harbor for little skate (*Leucoraja erinacea*). Adults are generally found in bottom habitats with a sandy or gravelly substrate or mud, ranging from Georges Bank through the Mid-Atlantic Bight to Cape Hatteras, North Carolina. They are found at depths between shallows and 137 meters. While little skate can be found in shallow depths, highest concentrations are found between 73 and 91 meters. Adult skates are highly mobile and are able to avoid dredge activities, combined with the shallow depths within Wellfleet harbor minimal impacts would be anticipated during dredging.

Scup

EFH is designated within the project area for all juvenile and adult Scup (Stenotomus chrysops). Scup juveniles and adults have the potential to occur in estuarine systems during the spring and summer months. All life stages of scup prefer salinities greater than 15 %. Juveniles and adults use structured areas for foraging and refuge, which do not exist in the project area. Scup are highly mobile species and would be expected to have the ability to avoid dredging and disposal activities. Therefore, no more than minimal impacts to Scup EFH would be anticipated as a result of this project.

Black Sea Bass

EFH is designated for adult black sea bass (*Centropristus striata*) within the project area. EFH for the adults of this species is predominantly within estuarine systems with oceanic salinities. Adults are found in estuaries during spring and summer months in water temperatures above 6° C and salinities greater than 18 %. Black sea bass prefer rough, shelly substrates and can be found in natural and manmade structured habitats. These habitats are not found in Wellfleet harbor and dredging is likely to occur in the fall when sea bass are moving off shore. Although sea bass may occur in the project area, adults should be able to avoid any potential impacts because of their mobility. Therefore, no more than minimal impacts to black sea bass EFH are anticipated as a result of this project.

Thorny Skate

EFH is designated for juvenile Thorny Skate. Juveniles are found in depths between 18 and 2000 meters. Depth range in Wellfleet Harbor is less than this range and any juveniles will be mobile to avoid dredging activities. Therefore, no more than minimal impacts to Thorny Skate EFH are anticipated as a result of this project.

Surf Clam

EFH is indicated for juvenile and adult life stages of surf clam (Spisula solidissima). They are found throughout the substrate, to a depth of three feet below the water/sediment interface, within federal waters from the eastern edge of Georges Bank and the Gulf of Maine throughout the Atlantic EEZ. Surf clams generally occur from the beach zone to a depth of about 200 feet, but beyond about 125 feet abundance is low. The proposed project area is mapped as suitable habitat for surf clams but actual abundance is low as per the Town of Wellfleet shellfish warden. Impacts due to dredge activities will be

transient allowing for recolonization if individuals are present in the project area. Therefore, impacts to EFH will be minimal and temporary.

Spiny Dogfish

EFH is designated for juveniles and adult spiny dogfish (*Squalus acanthias*) in Wellfleet Harbor. Juveniles can be found in waters ranging from 10 to 390 meters and water temperature anywhere from 2-21 °C. Adults can be found in waters ranging between 11 to 450 meters and water temperatures ranging from about 5-20 °C. EFH is deeper than Wellfleet Harbor and both juvenile and adult Spiny Dogfish are highly mobile and can avoid any disturbances during dredging or disposal activity. Little to no impact to their EFH is anticipated by the project.

Blue Shark

EFH habitat is designated within Wellfleet harbor for adult Blue shark (*Prionace glauca*). Adults can be found in waters ranging from 1-350m deep. Occasionally they can be found close inshore where the continental shelf is narrow. The prefer temperatures ranging from 12-20 °C. Blue Sharks are highly migratory with complex movement patterns. There is little to no impact on adult blue shark habitat as these species are highly mobile and are able to avoid any dredging activity.

Bluefin Tuna

EFH is designated within the Wellfleet Harbor area for bluefin tuna (*Thunnus thynnus*) juveniles and adults. Bluefin tuna is a highly migratory species found in pelagic waters of at least 82 feet (25 m) depth. The few that enter coastal waters are highly mobile and can evade any potential short-term water column disturbances as a result of dredging and disposal activities. Therefore, no impacts to highly migratory species would be anticipated as a result of this project.

White Shark

EFH habitat is designated for all life stages of White shark. Young are liveborn. Adults can be found in all waters. Occasionally they can be found close inshore. There is little to no impact on White Shark habitat as these species are highly mobile and are able to avoid any dredging activity.

Winter Skate

EFH is designated for the adult stage within Wellfleet harbor for winter skate (Leucoraja ocellata). Adults are generally found in bottom habitats with a sandy or gravelly substrate or mud, ranging from Georges Bank through the Mid-Atlantic Bight to Cape Hatteras, North Carolina. They are found at depths between shallows and 400 meters. While winter skate can be found in shallow depths, highest concentrations are found at depths shallower than 111 meters. Both adult and juvenile skates are highly mobile and are able to avoid dredge activities, combined with the shallow depths within Wellfleet harbor minimal impacts would be anticipated during dredging.

Atlantic Wolffish

EFH is designated within the area of Wellfleet Harbor for all life stages of Atlantic wolffish (*Anarhichas lupus*), but the project area is too shallow to have any effect on the EFH of this species. Atlantic wolffish EFH is from 40 to 240 meters in depth. The EFH for the entire life stage of Atlantic Wolffish is much deeper than the depth within the proposed project area, therefore minimal to no impact is anticipated.

V. CUMULATIVE EFFECTS

Cumulative impacts are those resulting from the incremental impact of the proposed action when added to other past, present, and reasonably foreseeable future actions. Dredging has been conducted in

Wellfleet Harbor previously. Reasonably foreseeable future actions include the continuation of proposed dredging and navigation activities. Water quality, air quality, hydrology, and other biological resources are expected to not be significantly affected by these actions based on prior dredging activity. The direct effects of this project are not anticipated to add to impacts from other actions in the area. Maintenance dredging in Wellfleet Harbor will preserve the navigation of this important area and maintain the important commercial and recreational mooring fields. No adverse cumulative impacts are projected as a result of this project.

VI. SUMMARY OF EFFECTS

The dredging activities proposed for maintenance dredging in Wellfleet Harbor could potentially have limited minimal temporary impacts on EFH of designated species found within the proposed project area. In general, eggs and larvae are more susceptible to impacts than juveniles and adults (Sherk et al., 1975) which can avoid dredging related disturbance. Demersal species such as flounders are more susceptible to impacts than pelagic species since most dredging related disturbance occurs near the bottom, but the adults of these species tend to be the most tolerant to suspended solids (Sherk et al., 1975). Consequently, the EFH of species with the greatest potential to be affected by the Wellfleet Harbor dredging project are those with demersal eggs (winter flounder), the eggs can be dredged or buried by disposal. To avoid these impacts the proponent will comply fully with recommended TOY restrictions for those species as listed. Occasionally eggs and larvae may be physically damaged or killed from exposure to elevated concentrations of suspended solids, but the use of an environmental bucket will minimize the sediments that remain suspended in the water column.

A. Conclusions

There is minimal, if any potential for adverse effects, including cumulative effects, of the proposed action on Essential Fish Habitat. The dredging will occur in an area that has long been disturbed by activity. The area will also remain a shallow water habitat after dredge operations are complete. In such an environment, few animals representing the various life stages of the managed species have the potential to be impacted by dredge activities. The dredged material is primarily silt, so the project proponent is proposing to use a mechanical dredge with an environmental bucket to minimize potential impacts. Any impacts to EFH from the dredging and disposal are expected to be short-term and localized. The proposed project would not be expected to affect schooling life stages or spawning and nursery habitats as the area will quickly return to a shallow water habitat.

Additionally, not all areas designated as EFH for the various species will be impacted. The effects of dredging and disposal will be limited in time and area as dredge operations will only impact small sections of the overall project area at any given time. Therefore, the species at these locations will be able to remove themselves from impacted areas or repopulate impacted areas quickly.

PROJECT NARRATIVE

Wellfleet Harbor Dredging Wellfleet, MA

I. INTRODUCTION

A. Summary

The Town of Wellfleet is seeking to perform maintenance dredging of all Town managed channels and anchorages within Wellfleet Harbor in an effort to restore safe and reliable navigation. There are two primary dredge Areas composed of 5 dredge sites within Wellfleet Harbor that have been maintained by the Town for more than sixty years. These areas are now severely shoaled and the Town is seeking to address the shoaling which is now causing major impacts on commercial and recreational boating in the Harbor. The scale of these projects presents major funding hurdles for the Town which, in turn, limits the scope and frequency of maintenance dredging of these areas. However, the extent of shoaling is now causing severe impacts on vessels in the harbor and the continued use and viability of the harbor makes it imperative that the shoaling is removed.

A Federal Navigation Project, adjacent to but not a part of this permitting application, maintains access into Wellfleet inner harbor and provides for a 10 foot deep channel, 125 feet wide with a 10 foot deep anchorage basin 800 feet by 500 feet at the head of the channel. The Town of Wellfleet maintains and operates a marina at the Town Pier and two anchorages, one to the north and one to the south of the Federal project.

For the purposes of this narrative, the Town managed portion of Wellfleet Harbor has been split up into two areas:

- Area I includes the North and South Access Channels, North Anchorage and the Access Channel adjacent to the L-Pier.
- Area II is the South Anchorage (see Exhibit 1).

II. SITE DESCRIPTION

Wellfleet Harbor is a natural harbor and has played an important role in the history of Wellfleet, having provided dockage and anchorage for fishing and recreational vessels since 1644. The harbor is currently used by commercial fishing vessels, charter boats and recreational boats. Exhibit 1 shows the existing harbor layout with previously authorized channels and mooring basins. The existing channels and anchorages gradually accumulate sediments as part of the natural processes on this shoreline and periodic maintenance dredging is required in order to maintain navigation.

The Town currently operates approximately 250 moorings and 150 boat slips within the Harbor used by vessels with drafts up to 6 feet. The marina is extremely popular and demand for slips is high with over 300 people on the current waiting list. The Town Marina provides a major economic benefit for the Town by directly raising revenue from user fees, providing berthing for commercial fishing and charter boats and attracting many private boaters to the Harbor. The Town raises additional revenue from the marine fueling station which services the many boats in the Harbor. The Town Marina is located on the north side of the Town Pier and access is maintained from the Federal project via the South Access Channel and North Access Channel. These channels have been previously authorized for dredging to a depth of 6 feet with widths of 100 feet for the South Channel and 150 feet for the North Channel. Both Access Channels were last dredged in 2001 and have a combined area of approximately 10 acres. The North Anchorage (within Area I) is approximately 4 acres in size with a previously authorized depth of 6 feet. It is used to provide seasonal moorings to approximately 35 boats with drafts up to 6 feet. The North Anchorage was last dredged in 2001. Area II, the South Anchorage, is approximately 22 acres in size with a previously authorized depth

of 6 feet. It is contiguous with the Federal Anchorage and both anchorages combined provide approximately 200 seasonal moorings for boats with lengths up to 39 feet and drafts up to 6 feet. The last known dredging project for the South Anchorage was in 1957.

III. EXISTING CONDITIONS

On January 5, 6 and March 17, 18 2010, *BCE* performed a hydrographic survey of Wellfleet Harbor including all Town anchorages and channels. The survey was performed using a Trimble GeoXH GPS and an Odom Hydrotrack single beam echo sounder with an 8° transducer. Data was collected through an on-board laptop computer using Hypack Hydrographic Survey Software. The survey extended approximately 200 feet outside the proposed dredge footprints for both Area I and Area II. Existing water depths are shown on the Project Plans attached in Appendix C with the previously authorized channel and anchorage boundaries superimposed.

Area I

The North and South Channels provide access from the Federal Navigation Project to the Town Marina on the north side of the Town Pier. The Town Marina provides over 150 slips for vessels

with drafts up to 6 feet. The Marina consists of 1200 linear feet of pile moored permanent concrete floats along the north shoreline of the Town Pier and 6500 square feet of seasonal timber floats at the inner west end of the North Channel. All areas of the marina use a Mediterranean style mooring system to increase the number of slips available and there is currently a long waiting list for slips. The North and South Channels both have significant shoaling. The water depths at Mean Low Water (MLW) in the North Channel are, typically, 3 feet or less which is severely impeding navigation and available draft in the marina slips. The North Anchorage is north of the Federal Channel Project and close to the south side of the Town Pier. This anchorage provides seasonal moorings for up to 35 boats with drafts up to 6 feet. The entire anchorage is severely shoaled with depths, typically, 3 feet or less. Some of the marina is now dry at low tide and approximately 15% of the historic footprint is now intertidal.

Area II

The South Anchorage directly abuts the south edge of the Federal Navigation Project. Navigational access is directly from the Federal Project. The total area of the 1957 dredging project (Contract #1769) was approximately 22 acres. This entire area and approximately 11 acres additional area at the southern end provide seasonal moorings for approximately 200 boats. The entire anchorage is now severely shoaled to the extent that many of the moorings are dry at low tide. Approximately 64% of the historic footprint has now shoaled to become intertidal mudflat with elevations ranging between 0 and +1 feet MLW. The deepest portion of the anchorage abuts the Federal Anchorage with depths ranging between -1 and -2 feet.

IV. DESCRIPTION OF PROPOSED PROJECT

The Town is seeking to dredge all historically permitted areas to a depth of -6 feet below MLW (-1 overdredge). Dredging would be performed using a mechanical dredge on a barge. An environmental bucket would be used to remove sediment from the dredge sites, it would be placed on a barge for transport to the Cape Cod Bay Disposal Site (CCDS) for offshore disposal. Due to the fine nature of the dredge sediments, this project does not lend itself to beneficial reuse or beach renourishment.

Table 2 below provides a summary of dredge areas and volumes for the project. The total proposed project is relatively large and will take a significant period to complete. The available draft (even after dredging) will limit the size of dredge equipment that can be used for the project and also the available working hours within the tide cycle. A typical dump scow has a laden draft of 10 to 12 feet which limits the working period to mid tide or higher. With these depth limitations, it is anticipated that each dredging "day" will start at around mid tide and the scow will be filled as the tide rises. The scow would then leave for the disposal site during the higher part of the tide cycle.

Assuming a production rate of 2,000 cubic yards per day and 24/7 dredging, the Area I dredging (116,500 cubic yards) is expected to require a minimum of 10 weeks to complete but a more realistic estimate is closer to 14 weeks allowing for equipment setup, breakdown, etc. Similarly, the Area II dredging (211,000 cubic yards) is expected to take a minimum of 18 weeks to complete but should allow up to 25 weeks. Due to the scale, duration and funding requirements for these projects, it is likely that the contract dredge work will be broken into a minimum of two projects and, more likely, three projects.

The priority area for the Town is the Town Marina and Area I and this is assumed to occur first. The Town is anticipating that Time of Year (TOY) restrictions will apply to this work and the actual working window may be limited to a period of 3 months from September to late December. The sequencing and phasing of the Town dredging work will depend very heavily on available funding and, given anticipated TOY restrictions, the anticipated dredging schedule would extend over three dredging seasons.

The Town dredging project would also need coordination with the proposed Federal dredging project. Survey from April 2015 shows the harbor channel depths remain close to 10 feet but the

Federal Anchorage has shoaled to depths of less than 2 feet in some areas. With these limited depths, dredging has to proceed from the outer harbor to the inner harbor allowing the dredge plant to work its way into the inner areas. It is assumed that the Federal dredging project will take a complete dredging season to complete in advance of any Town dredging.

The overall harbor dredging schedule is likely to spread over a total of four seasons. It may be possible to condense this schedule but dredging multiple areas concurrently is likely to be problematic. All dredging needs to start at the Federal Anchorage and progress into the shallower areas. If multiple areas are being dredged, conflicts between scows traveling to and from the disposal site and dredging operations would be likely, leading to delays and additional costs. In addition to the logistical difficulties, funding of multiple areas simultaneously would also be expected to be difficult.

Sediment Analysis

Based on review of historical data, the Town requested a new sampling and testing plan from the US Army Corps of Engineers with the goal of disposing of dredge spoils at the Cape Cod Bay Disposal Site (CCDS). The sampling and testing program was completed and the material has been found suitable for open water disposal at the CCDS. A copy of the suitability determination is attached at Appendix D.

V. ASSESSMENT OF PROJECT IMPACTS AND MITIGATION

A. Resource Areas

MA GIS Mapping for the following resource areas can be found in Appendix B.

Land Under Ocean – All proposed areas of dredging and disposal are Land under Ocean.

Tidal Flats (see Coastal Beach Wetlands Protection Regulations) – Some of the proposed dredge footprints have now shoaled to the extent that they form low lying tidal flats with an elevation just above Mean Low Water. These areas are regularly fully inundated by tides and are often not exposed for positive low tides. As such they form shallow water habitat for almost all of the tide cycle.

Proposed dredging is maintenance dredging which will result a shallow water habitat with fine muddy substrate as exists today. The area is an active mooring field and as such is regularly disturbed by boats, boating activities and mooring buoys. The area has been in constant seasonal use for nearly sixty years and is not considered a productive shellfishing area, as per Andrew Koch, the Town of Wellfleet Shellfish Warden. Impacts of this project will be temporary and minimal.

Coastal Beaches – The Town's preferred method for dredge material disposal is offshore at the Cape Cod Bay Disposal Site, as such there will be no impact to Coastal Beach as a result of this project.

Land Containing Shellfish – Much of the Land Under Ocean proposed for dredging in this project is also considered Land Containing Shellfish as per MA GIS mapping. The Town of Wellfleet Shellfish Constable, Andrew Koch, has determined that these areas are not productive shellfish resource areas or areas that are open to shell fishing due to the fine nature of the sediments. As such there will be no long term negative impacts to shellfish due to the proposed dredging activities.

Submerged Aquatic Vegetation – The areas of dredging proposed does not contain any SAV and DEP Mapping back to 1995 does not show any eelgrass beds in the proposed project area. As such there will be no impact to eelgrass or other SAV caused by maintenance dredging as currently proposed.

Area of Critical Environmental Concern (ACEC)

Wellfleet Harbor with the exception of the existing federal and town channels and anchorages has been designated as an Area of Critical Environmental Concern. As the project does not propose expansion of the existing maintenance dredge areas the project lies fully outside the boundaries of the Wellfleet ACEC. Additionally, the waters surrounding the ACEC are considered Outstanding Resource Waters, but again due to the exception of the town channels from the ACEC boundaries there will be minimal and transient impact on any ORW located near the project site. ACEC Boundaries as described in Appendix F (Coastal ACEC Boundary Clarification Project, November 2002) are shown on Appendix C Sheet 2 & 4. The ACEC boundary description is consistent with the described limits of the maintenance dredge areas although there is some inconsistency with current MA GIS mapping. By using the historic dredge contracts and the ACEC boundary description the proponent has assured that all dredging is maintenance dredging and lies outside the ACEC boundary.

Essential Fish Habitat

An Essential Fish Habitat assessment has been included as Appendix E of this report.

Natural Heritage

The proposed project area is within priority habitat (PH 15) for Northern diamondback terrapin (Malaclemys terrapin terrapin). From spring to fall the terrapin would not be impacted by project activities as they are motile and easily able to avoid any dredge activities. However during their period of brumation they would be susceptible to potential impacts of dredging. A study was conducted in 2011 and 2012 that showed that the majority of individuals brumate in the salt marshes adjacent to the project area, but there are a very small number of individuals that may utilize the channel and basin areas as overwintering spots. As such the Town has actively sought consultation with MESA and will continue to work with state agencies to minimize take and establish a mitigation plan for this species.

Wellfleet Bay Wildlife Sanctuary – this is a 700 acre area maintained by the Massachusetts Audubon Society.

B. Performance Standards

Land Under Ocean

The project will impact 38.5 acres of Land under Ocean.

Performance Standards 10.25 (3) and (4) relate to dredging projects.

- (3) Improvement dredging for navigational purposes affecting land under the ocean shall be designed and carried out using the best available measures so as to minimize adverse effects on such interests caused by changes in:
- (a) bottom topography which will result in increased flooding or erosion caused by an increase in the height or velocity of waves impacting the shore;
- (b) sediment transport processes which will increase flood or erosion hazards by affecting the natural replenishment of beaches;
- (c) water circulation which will result in an adverse change in flushing rate, temperature, or turbidity levels; or
- (d) marine productivity which will result from the suspension or transport of pollutants, the smothering of bottom organisms, the accumulation of pollutants by organisms, or the destruction of marine fisheries habitat or wildlife habitat.
 - There is no improvement dredging proposed for this project so there will be no impacts as relate to Performance Standard 10.25 (3).
- (4) Maintenance dredging for navigational purposes affecting land under the ocean shall be

designed and carried out using the best available measures so as to minimize adverse effects on such interests caused by changes in marine productivity which will result from the suspension or transport of pollutants, increases in turbidity, the smothering of bottom organisms, the accumulation of pollutants by organisms, or the destruction of marine fisheries habitat or wildlife habitat.

- The proposed dredging footprint is entirely within the maintenance dredge footprint and within an enclosed harbor, as such there will be minimal impacts on sediment transport and/or water circulation.
- Any dredging will be performed outside any Time of Year (TOY) restriction. BMP's, including
 the use of mechanical dredging via an environmental bucket will be employed to minimize
 impacts due to suspension of sediment.
- There is no submerged aquatic vegetation within the dredging limits and the substrate has been described by Town Shellfish Warden as "not good shellfish habitat". Any direct impacts from dredging on the bottom substrate are anticipated to be temporary in nature.
- Performance Standard 10.25 (5) requires no alteration of bottom topography causing increased storm damage or erosion. No such alterations are proposed.
- Performance Standard 10.25 (6) requires the project be designed to minimize adverse impacts.
 The project has been designed to fit within the existing historic dredging footprint and will not alter water circulation, cause eelgrass destruction, alter sediment size distribution or change water quality.

Tidal Flats

The shallow water intertidal flats have no function for storm protection in the sheltered environment of Wellfleet Harbor. The only reason that the fine sediment settles within the harbor is due to its sheltered nature. As such 10.27(3) and (4) do not apply.

- (6) In addition to complying with the requirements of 310 CMR 10.27(3) and (4), a project on a tidal flat shall if water-dependent be designed and constructed, using best available measures, so as to minimize adverse effects, and if non-water-dependent, have no adverse effects, on marine fisheries and wildlife habitat caused by:
- (a) alterations in water circulation;
- (b) alterations in the distribution of sediment grain size; and
- (c) changes in water quality, including, but not limited to, other than natural fluctuations in the levels of dissolved oxygen, temperature or turbidity, or the addition of pollutants.

This project is water-dependent but also will have no impacts on water circulation, sediment size or water quality.

Coastal Beach

There is no impact anticipated to Coastal Beach as a result of this project. All dredged materials are proposed to be disposed of offshore at the Cape Cod Bay Disposal Site.

Salt Marsh

The project will not directly impact Salt Marsh and will not be conducted within 100 feet of a saltmarsh.

Land Containing Shellfish

The project will impact a total of 38.5 Acres of Land Containing Shellfish.

These areas are considered shellfish suitability areas based on GIS mapping, but based on information from the Town Shellfish Warden, the harbor bottom consists mainly of "black muck" and is not a productive shellfish area. While some minimal portions of the total dredge footprint are occasionally open to shellfishing the majority of the dredge footprint remains closed and unproductive. The proposed dredge depths of -6 MLW with a -1' overdredge will not permanently impact the ability of the native shellfish species to recolonize the project area. Impacts are expected to minimal and temporary.

Performance Standard 10.34 (4) requires no adverse effect on productivity of land containing shellfish. Given the limited productivity of the dredge area, any impacts are expected to be temporary and minimal.

C. Mitigation

Time of Year Restrictions

Time of year restrictions are expected as part of permitting and will be fully observed by the Town. These are likely to include restrictions due to winter flounder presence from Jan – June, shellfish restrictions from June – Sept and restrictions on the use of the disposal site from Jan – May 15 due to the presence of right whales.

The Town is also working closely with NHESP and MA Audubon Society to minimize and mitigate for potential take of diamondback terrapin.

VI. ALTERNATIVES ANALYSIS

A. Dredge Area Alternatives

The No Action Alternative

The no action alternative for the Town of Wellfleet, Wellfleet Harbor dredge project would allow siltation to continue unabated and the navigation channels which are already severely depth limited will become unusable. This would impact the viability of the two Town anchorages that are vital to the Town's fishing and recreation fleet. The Town Marina and moorings are a significant economic resource for the Town and provide much needed berthing facilities for boaters in this part of Cape Cod Bay. The demand for slips or moorings significantly exceeds availability and provides a service for both commercial and recreational boats. The shoaling in all areas of the Harbor is already severe and is impeding the mooring and safe navigation of the vessels. The shoaling becomes progressively more severe further into the harbor and is particularly severe in the North Channel where the marina is located. If no dredging is performed, this will limit or prevent future use of the Town Marina. The loss (or reduction in number) of berthing and mooring facilities will result in negative impacts on the local economy and boating amenities.

Maintain the existing channels and anchorages to historic depths - Preferred Alternative

This option would reestablish the previously authorized channel and anchorage depths throughout Area I and II. The proposed dredge footprint of Area I matches the last dredging project to restore safe navigation and mooring in the Town Marina. The total access channel length is approximately 2,750 feet with the South Channel 100 feet wide increasing to 150 feet wide in the North Channel. The L-Pier Access Channel is approximately 300 feet in length and 0.85 acres. The North Anchorage is approximately 600 feet long and 4.3 acres. In Area II this option seeks to reestablish the historic dredge depths and footprint as per MA DPW Contract #1769. It should be noted that there appears to be a slight discrepancy on the eastern boundary between the MA GIS ACEC data and the boundary as plotted based on Contract 1769 drawing. However, the Coastal ACEC Boundary Clarification Project, November 2002 document (Attachment F) confirms that the southern mooring basin is excluded from the ACEC. The area will be dredged to a depth of -6 feet MLW with a 1' overdredge to a maximum depth of -7 feet MLW. With no change in mooring configuration, the historic footprint is not large enough to incorporate all the vessels that are currently being moored in the South Anchorage. This could ultimately result in the loss of 50 moorings if the basin is limited to the historic footprint. If the mooring regulations were updated the reduction in the mooring spacing would allow all 200 vessels currently moored in the South Anchorage Basin to fit within the historic South Anchorage Area.

This is the preferred dredge alternative as it maintains existing channels and anchorages in order to maintain Town usage, while limiting impact to areas already affected by Town use and minimizing any additional impacts to the surrounding habitat.

Reduce Marina Access Channel Depths (North & South Channels) and Maintain all other areas to 6 feet below MLW

This option seeks to reduce the impacts of dredging by reducing the volume of material to be removed and the area of dredging required. This option would dredge the North and South Channels to a depth of 4 feet below MLW and all other areas to a depth of 6 feet below MLW.

Typical existing depths in both North and South Channels are now 3 feet or less below MLW and the entire channel footprint needs to be dredged regardless of using the slightly shallower depth. There would be a small reduction in impact area due to the smaller side slopes needed for the shallower depth but this would only amount to a reduction of less than 5% of the channel dredge footprint.

The reduction in depth would bring significant negative impacts to the Town Marina which is located within the North Channel. Boats currently using the marina have drafts up to 5 feet and would have to find alternative berths. Navigation is also severely impeded under negative low tide conditions. Tides of -1.0 feet MLW or lower occur on average more than 70 times per year and recommended drafts should be at least 2 feet below the deepest draft vessel. The majority of boats have drafts of up to 3 feet and the recommended channel depth for these boats would be 5 feet at a water elevation of -1 feet MLW, giving a recommended design channel depth of -6 feet MLW.

Negatively impacting the navigation into a marina of over 150 slips is not considered a reasonable approach for the very small reduction in dredge footprint and this is not considered a realistic alternative.

Maintenance of the Dredge Channels and Expansion of the Anchorages

This option would extend the historic dredged basin (Area II) south to include the entire area currently being utilized for vessel moorings. The proposed dredge footprint would have two depths in an effort to minimize impacts to the surrounding environment. The historic dredge footprint would be dredged to an elevation of -6 feet MLW with a 1' overdredge. The expanded area at the southern anchorage would be the same 750 feet width as the historic footprint with a length of approximately 540 feet and a dredge depth of -4 feet MLW with an over dredge depth to -5 feet MLW. This expanded footprint would accommodate all of the vessels currently listed as being moored in the basin with adequate draft at low water without any change in mooring equipment and layout.

While this option would be an aid to the Town in accommodating additional vessels in the harbor, this option is not ideal as it increases impacts to natural resources and cost to the Town. Any application for dredging within the ACEC is likely to be problematic and dredging in the ACEC is categorically prohibited unless the dredging can be shown to be maintenance dredging.

B. Dredged Material Disposal Options

The Town has performed sampling and testing of the proposed dredge material in accordance with the approved sampling and testing plan. Dredge material was found to be 65% to 95% silts with very high moisture content. Following chemical testing, the material was found to be suitable for open water disposal at the Cape Cod Bay Disposal Site. Given the gradation of the material, it is not suitable for use as beach nourishment and there are two considered alternatives for disposal of the dredge material:

Upland disposal with limited or no beneficial reuse

Upland Disposal is significantly more costly than offshore disposal and only becomes a realistic option if a small portion of the area to be dredged is treated as a separate project for some reason. It is an alternative to offshore disposal but is unlikely to be realistic for the entire harbor due to the large volumes and much higher cost. Upland disposal requires transfer of dredge material from a scow to an upland dewatering site. The material has to be stored and dewatered at an upland site before being trucked to its final destination at a disposal site or landfill. Upland disposal is generally considered to be a viable method of dredge material disposal only if there are contaminants present in the dredge materials. Upland disposal will not be an economic option for this project.

Offshore Disposal

The dredge material has been found suitable for offshore disposal at the Cape Cod Bay Disposal Site (CCDS). Offshore disposal involves placement of dredge material into a bottom dump scow, towing it out approximately 7 nautical miles to the CCDS, where it is dumped into the ocean. This has historically proven to be the most cost effective and most used disposal option if the material meets

all the extensive testing requirements. This is the preferred method of dredge materials disposal for the proposed Wellfleet Harbor dredging project.

C. Dredge Method Alternatives

The Town is proposing to use a mechanical dredge with environmental bucket on a barge system to perform maintenance dredging in the proposed project areas. The material to be dredged is mostly fine sediment and other dredge methods would be inefficient and create unnecessary impacts in the proposed project area.

Mechanical Dredging - Preferred alternative

A mechanical dredge removes sediments from the bottom with a bucket apparatus attached to a crane, either land based or barge based. Material is then placed into a scow and transported to the disposal site (open water disposal). A mechanical dredge is the preferred dredge method for fine material with open water disposal and would be the appropriate method for the proposed project.










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NHESP Priority Habitats of Rare Species


NHESP Estimated Habitats of Rare Wildlife



The District Engineer has received a permit application to conduct work in waters of the United States from Town of Wellfleet, 300 Main Street, Wellfleet, Massachusetts, 02667. This work is proposed in Wellfleet Harbor at Kendrick Avenue, Wellfleet, Massachusetts. The site coordinates are: Latitude 41.928902 N; Longitude -70.027303 W.

The work involves maintenance dredging all town-managed channels and anchorage areas in Wellfleet Harbor to -6' MLW, with 1' overdredge. A total area of approximately 38.5 acres will be mechanically dredged and produce approximately 378,300 cubic yards of sandy sediment for disposal at the Cape Cod Bay Disposal Site (CCBDS). Area 1, which is comprised of the North and South Access Channels, the North Anchorage, and the L-Pier Access Channel, is 14.6 acres, will produce 118,300 cy, and was last dredged in 2001. Approximately 2.4 acres, or 16%, of Area 1 is intertidal flats. Area 2, which is the south anchorage, is 23.8 acres, will produce 248,000 cy, and was last dredged in 1957. Approximately 13.9 acres, or 58%, of Area 2 is intertidal flats.

The work is shown on the attached plans entitled "APPLICATION BY: TOWN OF WELLFLEET," on 7 sheets, and dated "07/06/16."

Through the development of this project, the applicant has attempted to avoid and minimize direct impacts to waters of the United States. The Corps continues to work with the applicant to minimize temporary construction impacts (noise and turbidity impacts) to Waters of the United States.

AUTHORITY

Permits are required pursuant to:

- X Section 10 of the Rivers and Harbors Act of 1899
- X Section 404 of the Clean Water Act
- X Section 103 of the Marine Protection, Research and Sanctuaries Act.

The decision whether to issue a permit will be based on an evaluation of the probable impact of the proposed activity on the public interest. That decision will reflect the national concern for both protection and utilization of important resources. The benefit which may reasonably accrue from the proposal must be balanced against its reasonably foreseeable detriments. All factors which may be relevant to the proposal will be considered, including the cumulative effects thereof; among those are: conservation, economics, aesthetics, general environmental concerns, wetlands, cultural value, fish and wildlife values, flood hazards, flood plain value, land use, navigation, shoreline erosion and accretion, recreation, water supply and conservation, water quality, energy needs, safety, food production and, in general, the needs and welfare of the people.

ESSENTIAL FISH HABITAT

The Magnuson-Stevens Fishery Conservation and Management Act, as amended by the Sustainable Fisheries Act of 1996 (Public Law 104-267), requires all federal agencies to consult with the National Marine Fisheries Service on all actions, or proposed actions, permitted, funded, or undertaken by the agency, that may adversely affect Essential Fish Habitat (EFH).

The dredging portion of this project will impact approximately 14.6 acres of Essential Fish Habitat (EFH) in Area 1 for those species listed on the attached table labelled "AREA 1". Habitat at this site can be described as sandy subtidal marine bay and intertidal mud flats habitat. Loss of this habitat may adversely affect the species listed on the attached table by removing the surface layer of sandy marine sediment. However the District Engineer has made a preliminary determination that the site-specific adverse effect will not be substantial. Further consultation with the National Marine Fisheries Service regarding EFH conservation recommendations is being conducted and will be concluded prior to the final decision.

This project will have an adverse effect on 23.8 acres of Essential Fish Habitat (EFH) in Area 2 for those species listed on the attached table labelled "AREA 2". This habitat consists of sandy subtidal marine habitat and intertidal mud flats habitat. Loss of this habitat may adversely affect the species listed on the attached table by removing the surface layer of silty marine sediment. The District Engineer has made a preliminary determination that site-specific impacts may be substantial. Accordingly, the Corps of Engineers will submit an expanded EFH assessment to National Marine Fisheries Service, who in turn will provide conservation recommendations to the Corps. The Corps will coordinate with the applicant regarding implementation of these recommendations. The EFH consultation will be concluded prior to the final decision.

The dredged material disposal is proposed for CCBDS. This is an open water site, which provides Essential Fish Habitat for those species listed on the attached table. Habitat at this site can be described as sandy marine subtidal. Loss of this habitat may adversely affect the species on the attached table by creating a short-lived localized sediment plume, and by burying habitat. However, the District Engineer has made a preliminary determination that the site-specific adverse effect will not be substantial. Further consultation with the National Marine Fisheries Service regarding EFH conservation recommendations is being conducted and will be concluded prior to the final decision.

NATIONAL HISTORIC PRESERVATION ACT

Based on his initial review, the District Engineer has determined that little likelihood exists for the proposed work to impinge upon properties with cultural or Native American significance, or listed in, or eligible for listing in, the National Register of Historic Places. Therefore, no further consideration of the requirements of Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966, as amended, is necessary. This determination is based upon one or more of the following:

- a. The permit area has been extensively modified by previous work.
- b. The permit area has been recently created.
- c. The proposed activity is of limited nature and scope.
- d. Review of the latest published version of the National Register shows that no presence of registered properties listed as being eligible for inclusion therein are in the permit area or general vicinity.
- e. Coordination with the State Historic Preservation Officer and/or Tribal Historic Preservation Officer(s)

ENDANGERED SPECIES CONSULTATION

The New England District, Army Corps of Engineers has reviewed the list of species protected under the Endangered Species Act of 1973, as amended, which might occur at the project site. It is our preliminary determination that the proposed activity for which authorization is being sought is designed, situated or will be operated/used in such a manner that it is not likely to adversely affect any Federally listed endangered or threatened species or their designated critical habitat. By this Public Notice, we are requesting that the appropriate Federal Agency concur with our determination.

COASTAL ZONE MANAGEMENT

The States of Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire and Rhode Island have approved **Coastal Zone Management Programs**. Where applicable, the applicant states that any proposed activity will comply with and will be conducted in a manner that is consistent with the approved Coastal Zone Management Program. By this Public Notice, we are requesting the State concurrence or objection to the applicant's consistency statement.

The following authorizations have been applied for, or have been, or will be obtained:

- (x) Permit, License or Assent from State.
- (x) Permit from Local Wetland Agency or Conservation Commission.
- (x) Water Quality Certification in accordance with Section 401 of the Clean Water Act.

In order to properly evaluate the proposal, we are seeking public comment. Anyone wishing to comment is encouraged to do so. Comments should be submitted in writing by the above date. Any person may request, in writing, within the comment period specified in this notice, that a public hearing be held to consider the application. The initial determinations made herein will be reviewed in light of facts submitted in response to this notice. All comments will be considered a matter of public record. Copies of letters of objection will be forwarded to the applicant who will normally be requested to contact objectors directly in an effort to reach an understanding.

The Corps of Engineers is soliciting comments from the public; Federal, state, and local agencies and officials; Indian Tribes; and other interested parties in order to consider and evaluate the impacts of this proposed activity. Any comments received will be considered by the Corps of Engineers to determine whether to issue, modify, condition or deny a permit for this proposal. To make this decision, comments are used to assess impacts on endangered species, historic properties, water quality, general environmental effects, and the other public interest factors listed above. Comments are used in the preparation of an Environmental Assessment and/or an Environmental Impact Statement pursuant to the National Environmental Policy Act. Comments are also used to determine the need for a public hearing and to determine the overall public interest of the proposed activity.

Where the activity involves the discharge of dredged or fill material into waters of the United States or the transportation of dredged material for the purpose of disposing it in ocean waters, the evaluation of the impact of the activity in the public interest will also include application of the guidelines promulgated by the Administrator, US Environmental Protection Agency, under authority of Section 404(b) of the Clean Water Act, and/or Section 103 of the Marine Protection Research and Sanctuaries Act of 1972, as amended.

The alternatives considered in the dredged material disposal analysis fall into four general categories: beneficial use, upland disposal, confined disposal, and open-water disposal. The feasibility of disposal alternatives was analyzed relative to the physical and chemical quality of the dredged material, the volume of material to be dredged, the availability of suitable disposal and beneficial use sites, and the cost of disposal. When applicable, the biological quality of the disposal of the material at the disposal site was also used to evaluate the feasibility of the open-water disposal alternative.

Based on the characteristics of the dredged material, the lack of suitable alternate disposal or beneficial use sites and costs, the most feasible, practical, cost-effective and environmentally acceptable alternative for the disposal of dredged materials from the proposed dredging is disposal at the requested disposal site.


The dredged material has undergone physical, chemical, and/or biological analysis. It is our preliminary determination that the material is acceptable for disposal at this disposal site.


Any permit issued for this project will include special conditions requiring scows to come to a complete stop while disposing of the material at the disposal site. There will also be a time of year restriction included as a special condition which prohibits dredging during ecologically sensitive times of years.


The Cape Cod Bay Disposal Site was first used in 1971 for the disposal of sediments dredged from Wellfleet Harbor. It has been infrequently used since then for disposal of dredged material from the coasts of Cape Cod Bay. This disposal site is monitored and managed by the Massachusetts Department of Environmental Management. Studies show that the site is a low energy environment such that sediment deposited at this location will remain within the site's boundaries. Levels of metals in the sediments within the disposal site are slightly above background levels, indicative of the influence of the earlier dredge disposal at the site. Previous research has shown that areas outside the disposal site have not been found to be affected by sediment deposited within the site.

The disposal site is located within the identified limits of the Right Whale Critical Habitat Area.












CAPE COD BAY DISPOSAL SITE





These are unproductive hours because the boat cannot leave or return to the pier as the area is not navigable do to the lack of dredging.

In 2019, based on preliminary state reports, the Town of Wellfleet was first in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts for the value of its shellfish landings with more than \$7.7M earned by hard-working local shellfishermen. With about 180 wild commercial harvesters, 134 grant lease holders (shellfish farmers) cultivating approximately 260 acres of bottom and many more employees, shellfishing is a primary year-round economic driver for the Town. Approximately 15 percent of the population – and more importantly, 25 percent of working age people in Wellfleet – rely on shellfishing for their livelihoods.

Even given the success of the industry, the deterioration of the harbor due to lack of dredging is inhibiting its production potential, both for wild shellfishermen and shellfish farmers. Our harbor needs to be dredged for both economic and environmental reasons.

The shellfishing areas adjacent to both Areas I and II, which are scheduled for dredging, are some of the most productive shellfish beds in Wellfleet Harbor, providing important winter wild shellfish harvesting for the Town's commercial and recreational permit holders. The area immediately to the east of Area II is especially critical to oyster farmers who collect wild oyster spat in the summer to grow out as seed for their farms. The western edge of Area II borders a group of highly productive shellfish farms.

Area II has been used consistently as a mooring basin for decades. Even though it is located within a designated shellfish growing area in the open status, there are no naturally occurring shellfish resources in Area II itself. This area is not and has not been hospitable to shellfish, and there is no and has not been any shellfish harvesting in this area, which functions as an active mooring basin.

The substrate to be removed during dredging is inhospitable to shellfish due to the fact that oysters simply disappear into the morass and quahogs and soft-shell clams cannot achieve an anchorage in order to orient themselves siphon up, which is necessary for both respiration and feeding. In fact, this substrate is colloquially referred to as "black mayonnaise," and through years of observation, the only organisms that seem to thrive

there are mud snails. Only when the above-mentioned area is covered with at least one foot of water are Atlantic mummichogs and silversides sporadically observed.

I write this letter to assure you that dredging this area would not remotely constitute improvement dredging and would not disrupt any important environmental resources.

Further to Ed O'Donnell's point, ports and harbors are placed into three categories based on cargo tonnage:

1. Low Use / Emerging Harbors: < 1 million tons

- 2. Moderate Use: 1 million tons 10 million tons
- 3. High use: > 10 million tons.

Unfortunately, fish landings don't count toward cargo tonnage.

Generally speaking, the 100 or so high use ports receive the funding they need. This is generally true for moderate use ports at the high end of the spectrum. Moderate use ports at the low end of the spectrum generally receive funding, but often not in sufficient amounts.

While low use / emerging harbors are guaranteed 10% of the HMT revenue (this goes back to a provision I worked to get in the WRDA 2014 bill), there are a fair number of low use / emerging harbors with some amount of cargo that eat up a lot of that money. Low use / emerging harbors with a federal presence (NOAA, military, etc) also generally receive funding. I have never seen a small port get money without Congressional support.

Dan, that classification is based mainly on how we sort the projects for funding purposes. You need to have over 1 million tons of reported commerce to be considered above a low use harbor and Wellfleet has zero tons reported. We do report all the various info you have provided in our budget request, but there are many competing harbors nationally. I would continue to work with your delegation to help them understand your needs.

Dear Grant Review Committee,

I am writing to offer IFAW's support of the Wellfleet Harbor Dredging Task Force's application to the Massachusetts Dredging Grant Program which would dredge from the channel in Wellfleet Harbor to the boat ramp in coordination with dredging work already planned by USACE in the main channel. Currently, boat access is limited to small windows of time each day around high tide, hindering both human rescue and marine mammal rescue efforts in Wellfleet Harbor.

IFAW's Marine Mammal Rescue and Research team has been responding to stranded marine mammals for over 20 years on Cape Cod and has rescued over 600 live stranded dolphins, porpoises and whales. Cape Cod is known for a high number of mass stranded dolphin events, and up to 80% of these events occur in Wellfleet within Cape Cod Bay, particularly in Wellfleet Harbor. Stranding events on Cape Cod are continuing to increase, with 2019 being the busiest stranding year on record with 477 cases, almost double the annual average. Having access to launch boats is essential to our efforts to prevent mass strandings by attempting to herd animals out of Wellfleet Harbor using a coordinated effort of vessels and to rescue these animals when stranded, as many of locations in Wellfleet harbor are difficult to access by land.

More importantly, access to launch boats in Wellfleet harbor is critical for human safety and rescue efforts, particularly in a very busy harbor including commercial work, recreational activities and animal rescue work. Emergency response from the Harbor Master's office is another resource our rescue team relies on while responding in Wellfleet, which is important to ensure the safety of our team.

We are in support of this project with the understanding that it is compliant with all necessary environmental protections and good stewardship efforts are made to prevent injury or harassment to marine species and damage to this environment.

The Division of Marine Fisheries (MA DMF) has reviewed the Notice of Intent by the Town of Wellfleet for the proposed maintenance dredging of Wellfleet Harbor. Proposed work consists of maintenance dredging 368,800 cubic yards to -6 feet below MLW in two areas within Wellfleet Harbor. Area I consist of the North and South Access Channels, North Anchorage and the Access Channel adjacent to the L-Pier. Area II consists of the South Anchorage area. Dredging would be performed using a barge-mounted mechanical dredge with an environmental bucket. All dredge material would be transferred to the Cape Cod Bay Disposal Site for offshore disposal. Existing marine fisheries resources and potential project impacts to these resources are outlined in the following paragraphs.

MA DMF has identified Wellfleet Harbor as winter flounder (*Pseudopleuronectes americanus*) spawning habitat. Winter flounder enter the area and spawn from February through June, laying clumps of eggs directly on the substrate. These demersal eggs hatch approximately fifteen to twenty days later. The Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission has designated winter flounder spawning habitat as "Habitat Areas of Particular Concern" (HAPC). The most recent stock assessment has determined that Southern New England/Mid Atlantic winter flounder populations are at 18 % of the recommended recovery level, and even though it is not currently experiencing overfishing, the stock is overfished [1]. Because of the winter flounder stock status, every effort should be made to protect winter flounder and their spawning habitat.

The proposed maintenance dredge footprint includes mapped habitat for several shellfish species. The dredge areas contain mapped habitat for American oyster (*Crassostrea virginica*) and quahog (*Mercenaria mercenaria*). The dredge region also closely borders mapped habitat for soft shell clam (*Mya arenaria*) as well as nine existing aquaculture sites. Waters within and/or bordering the project site have habitat characteristics suitable for these shellfish species. Land containing shellfish is deemed significant to the interest of the Wetlands Protection Act (310 CMR 10.34) and the protection of marine fisheries.

Several beaches to the south and west of the dredge area are mapped horseshoe crab (*Limulus polyphemus*) spawning habitat. Horseshoe crabs deposit their eggs in the upper intertidal regions of sandy beaches from late spring to early summer during spring high tides [2]. Adult crabs congregate in deep waters such as channel areas during the day while waiting to move on to the beaches at night to spawn. The eggs hatch approximately two to four weeks later.

Wellfleet Harbor provides habitat for a variety of finfish species. Diadromous fish species in this system include alewife (*Alosa pseudoharengus*), blueback herring (*Alosa aestivalis*), American eel (*Anguilla rostrata*), white perch (*Morone americana*), and Atlantic tomcod (*Microgadus tomcod*) [3]. The proposed dredge footprint also closely borders salt marsh vegetation. Salt marsh provides a variety of ecosystem services, including habitat and energy sources for many fish and invertebrate species [4,5,6].

Cape Cod Bay is designated as a critical habitat area for right whales (*Eubalaena glacialis*). Right whales use Cape Cod Bay as seasonal foraging habitat with peak abundance typically between February and April [3].

MA DMF offers the following comments for your consideration:

- Dredging activity could negatively impact winter flounder, horseshoe crabs, and shellfish
 during their respective spawning and larval development periods. To minimize such
 impacts, MA DMF recommends a time of year (TOY) restriction on all in-water, silt
 producing work from February 1 to September 30 [3].
- To protect right whale feeding aggregations in Cape Cod Bay, MA DMF recommends a TOY restriction on dredge disposal from **January 1 to May 15** [3].
- Bordering aquaculture operations could be negatively impacted by siltation associated with dredging activity. MA DMF recommends that the Town coordinate with local grant owners prior to dredging to minimize potential impacts to these operations.
- A shellfish survey should be performed across the proposed dredge footprint prior to dredging. Relocation of shellfish resources outside of the dredge footprint may be warranted if any high-density resource areas are identified in the survey. The proponent should consult with the shellfish constable about potential mitigation for resource loss in the form of shellfish relocation and/or seeding.
- MA DMF recommends a buffer of at least 25 feet between salt marsh and the dredge slope plus overdredge to prevent erosive impacts to this important fisheries habitat resource.

We have reviewed your application to dredge 116,500 cubic yards of material from 14.6 acres of bottom in Wellfleet Harbor. The area would be dredged to a depth of -6.0 MLW and disposed of at the Cape Cod Bay Disposal Site (CCBDS. Only the area labeled Area 1 and designated in the attached plans would be dredged. This area includes the North and South Access Channels, North Anchorage and the Access Channel adjacent to the L-Pier. This project is located in Wellfleet Harbor at Kendrick Avenue in Wellfleet, Massachusetts. The work is shown on the enclosed plans titled "Dredging, Town of Wellfleet", on seven sheets, and dated "July 6, 2016".

Based on the information that you have provided, we verify that the activity is authorized under General Permit #5 of the enclosed April 16, 2018 Federal permit known as the Massachusetts General Permits (GPs). Also, it has been determined that the activities authorized do not impair the usefulness of the USACE Navigation project and is not injurious to the public interest.]

Please review the enclosed GPs carefully, including the general conditions beginning on page 19, to be sure that you and whoever does the work understand its requirements. A copy of the GPs and this verification letter shall be available at the project site throughout the time the work is underway. Performing work within our jurisdiction that is not specifically authorized by this determination or failing to comply with any special condition(s) provided below or all of the terms and conditions of the GPs may subject you to the enforcement provisions of our regulations. You must perform this work in compliance with the terms and conditions of the GPs and also in compliance with the following special condition(s):].

- 1. The U.S. Coast Guard, Sector Southeastern New England, Waterways Management Division, (401) 435-2351, shall be notified at least ten working days in advance of the intended start date of the location and estimated duration of the dredging and disposal operations. An alternate contact is the Coast Guard Sector Southeastern New England Command Center, Woods Hole, (508) 457-3211.
 - 2. There shall be no dredging or disposal from February 1 to September 30, inclusive, in

order to minimize adverse impacts to winter flounder and shellfish. This is to protect Essential Fish Habitat designated under the Magnuson-Stevens Fishery Conservation and Management Act.

- 3. Except when directed otherwise by the Corps for site management purposes, disposal of dredged material is not permitted unless the following requirements can be met:
- a. Dredged material shall be released at a specified set of coordinates within the disposal site provided in the Dredge and Disposal Approval Letter with the scow moving at a speed of 3 knots or less.
- b. Disposal shall occur with the scow within 300 feet of the disposal coordinates provided in the Dredge and Disposal Approval Letter.
- c. If following the requirements in (a) and (b) above is unsafe, e.g., due to weather or sea conditions, disposal with the scow moving only fast enough to maintain safe control is permitted. In that regard, special attention needs to be given to predicted conditions prior to departing for the disposal site. If disposal occurs without complying with (a) or (b) above, you, your representative, or the captain of the disposal vessel, must notify the Corps DQM contact immediately (see contact information below). Leave a voice message with the relevant information if no one answers. Information provided shall include disposal coordinates, permit number, volume disposed, date and time of disposal, circumstances of incident, disposal vessel name, name of caller, and phone number of caller. In addition, a detailed written report with supporting documentation shall be provided to the Corps within 48 hours following any noncompliant event.
 - 4 National Dredging Quality Management (DQM) Program Requirements:
- a. Discharges of dredged material involving open-water disposal and confined aquatic disposal cells require monitoring by the contractor, which must be performed using the DQM system software and hardware system developed by the Corps. Please address questions regarding certification to the Corps New England District DQM contact (see contact information below).
- b. You are required to follow the DQM specifications, including the DQM information transfer protocol, located at http://dqm.usace.army.mil. The Corps must have certified each disposal vessel used for this project within a year of the disposal activity and you must send the DQM Certification and the Annual System Quality Assurance Verification to the Corps with the Dredge and Disposal Request Form. You are responsible for ensuring that the DQM system is operational throughout the project and that project data are submitted to the National DQM Support Center in accordance with the specifications provided at the aforementioned website. Disposal may not take place if any component of the DQM system is inoperable unless otherwise authorized by the Corps New England District DQM contact (see contact information below). An alternative recording of the absent data stream must be maintained if any of the DQM-certified telemetry ceases operation during a disposal trip. The breakdown of any DQM-certified telemetry must be reported to the DQM contact and repaired within 48 hours to keep the scow fully compliant with permit conditions. Unless weather, safety or sea state conditions prevent it, the hull doors must be fully closed on split hull scows before the vessel leaves the disposal site.

- c. The DQM system used by the permittee must be capable of providing the information necessary for the Scow Monitoring Profile Specification. The permittee must provide the Corps with a: i) "Weekly Summary Report Form" at the end of each week that dredging and disposal activities are conducted for the duration of the project; and ii) "Seasonal/Final Completion of Dredging with Open-Water Disposal Report Form" upon completion of dredging and disposal for the season and project. These will be provided to you with the Dredge and Disposal Approval Letter that authorizes the initiation or continuation of disposal operations. You must make the data collected by the DQM system available to the Corps upon request.
- d. Prior to the initial dredge/disposal action, or any time dredging/disposal resumes after ceasing for 30 days or more, you or your representative must submit the enclosed Dredge and Disposal Request Form at least 10 working days before dredging or disposal is expected to begin or resume. Dredging/disposal must not begin or resume until the Corps issues a Dredge and Disposal Approval Letter. The letter will include the approved start and end dates. These disposal point coordinates that may differ from those specified for other projects using the same disposal site or even from those specified earlier for this project. You must contact us (see contact information below) as early as possible to request an extension if you anticipate not completing dredge or disposal operations before the approved end date.
- 5. Unless otherwise stated, all submittals related to these special conditions for dredging and disposal shall be emailed to the DQM contact at charles.n.farris@usace.army.mil and cenae-r-pats@usace.army.mil. If it is necessary to provide a paper copy of any submittal, please also provide a digital copy or communicate with our staff if this is not possible. Please send paper copies to: a) MAIL: PATS Branch Regulatory Division, Corps of Engineers, New England District, 696 Virginia Road, Concord, MA 01742-2751; or b) FAX: (978) 318-8303. Direct dredge related questions to (978) 318-8336 OR (978) 318-8831] or (978) 318-8338. Documents which are not addressed in this manner may not reach their intended destination and do not comply with the requirements of this authorization.
- 6. You must complete and return the enclosed Work Start Notification Form to this office at least two weeks before the anticipated starting date.

Disposal operations must not begin or resume until you submit the enclosed Disposal Request Form and the Corps issues an Open-Water Disposal Approval Letter that provides a specified set of coordinates for dredged material release within the disposal site. See the special conditions above.

This authorization expires on April 5, 2023. You must commence or be under contract to commence the work authorized herein by April 5, 2023, and complete the work by April 5, 2024. If not, you must contact this office to determine the need for further authorization before beginning or continuing the activity. We recommend that you contact us *before* this authorization expires to discuss reissuance. Please contact us immediately if you change the plans or construction methods for work within our jurisdiction. We must approve any changes before you undertake them.

This authorization does not obviate the need to obtain other Federal, State, or local authorizations required by law.

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







CAPE COD BAY DISPOSAL SITE





I hope this finds you well.

I am writing to provide an update on the Wellfleet Harbor Dredging Project.

The Army Corps of Engineers successfully completed the dredging of the harbor channel in November, which was federally funded in full. In December, the town of Wellfleet successfully dredged the small area in the inner harbor around the fuel dock and launching ramp area, funded by the town. The project had to finish by December 31st due to the right whale restriction timetable.

The next step in the project is to dredge the remainder of Area 1. This area starts at the launch ramp, continues around the pier and includes all of the boat slip area on the north side of the pier. Subject to funding, the project will commence on October 1, 2021. We have begun the process of applying for a state funding grant which would supplement town funding to complete the Area 1 part of the project. The plan to fully complete the project is to start dredging Area 2, the mooring field, on October 1, 2022.

Wellfleet's dredging project is the largest ongoing dredging project in the state. It is a complex project requiring the submission of documents to many state and federal agencies for approval, as well as frequent conferences. Your counsel and assistance with this project is so helpful and very much appreciated. Thank you!

I will be providing updates to you as we prepare our application for the state grant. I will alert you prior to our submitting the application. Please contact me if you have any questions or thoughts about the project.

The Town of Wellfleet and GEI Consultants, Inc. respectfully request a conference call to discuss the dredging permit application for Wellfleet Harbor Dredging. Below is a brief summary of the work and timeline that has occurred to date related to obtaining the USACE permit for dredging. The goal of this meeting request is to provide a briefing of the work that has occurred since it has been over a period of many years and discuss steps required for permit approval along with anticipated timeline.

An application was submitted to the USACE on July 29, 2016 for permitting of the entire Wellfleet Harbor Dredge project. The Public Notice for the individual permit was published in April of 2017. Comments from federal agencies were received in July of 2017 (see Regulatory Report). At that time NOAA / NMFS and the EPA both expressed concerns about the length of time since the last dredging of Area II. All MA state agencies consider the dredging to be maintenance dredging based on State DCR (formerly DPW) records of dredging from 1956. Both Federal agencies, however, consider Area II to be improvement dredging and would therefore require mitigation for the loss of mud flat habitat. The Town responded to those comments with a brief overview of the importance and constant use of the area as a mooring field. Area II has a surface area of approximately 22 acres (946,123 SF) and was initially dredged to -6 ft MLW, however; over the years it has silted in and the Town has not been able to dredge due to the significant expense.

At the request of NMFS the Town conducted a biological survey of Area II in April of 2018. The survey parameters were established in conjunction with NMFS. The survey did not find an abundance of benthic organisms or a significant amount of resources in "the black mayonnaise silt" of Area II although there were some seed mollusks and other invertebrates present.

Also occurring during this time period, discussion of potential mitigation sites and the productivity of the mud flats was held with the USACE project manager. Eventually, in approximately summer of 2019 discussion centered instead on the possibility of a reduced fee in lieu of mitigation for that area as no viable mitigation sites were identified. The Town continued to try to arrange appropriate fee in lieu of mitigation with the USACE during 2019 -2020.

In May of 2020 the project was passed onto a new USACE project manager and the discussion of in-kind mitigation was reopened. The Town is now being asked to find a suitable in-kind

mitigation project for Area II. The Town requested input from the USACE on what parameters would be considered acceptable in-kind mitigation given that the Town is surrounded by national seashore and no sites of equivalent size were identified.

Due to the critical need for dredging and safety concerns of the Town to provide appropriate maritime response, in October of 2020 the Town asked the USACE to split the project into two sections which would allow a permit for Area I to be acquired in time for dredging in the 2020 season while discussions and processing of the permit application for Area II continued.

Dredging of Area I began in December 2020 removing approximately 36,000 CY of material within the time of year restriction. The Town is planning to continue dredging over the next few dredge seasons and requires discussions with State programs and offices to support funding of the dredge project due to its significant size and associated cost. Having an understanding of the mitigation costs and approved permits for both Areas I and II is imperative to the Town having successful funding discussion with the State.

SUBJECT: Statistical Port Boundary Project

- 1. Purpose: To provide stakeholders with general information about the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers' (USACE) Statistical Port Boundary Project.
- 2. Background: USACE's Navigation and Civil Works Decision Support Center (NDC) is responsible for collecting, processing, distributing and archiving commercial vessel trip and cargo data. As part of that mission, NDC's Waterborne Commerce Statistics Center (WCSC) produces tonnage movement statistics on USACE navigation projects, waterways, and ports. This effort has traditionally been performed at a dock level, without a geographically defined port statistical area (PSA).

Moving forward, USACE is re-designing its statistical database to use a Geographic Information System (GIS). As part of that effort, a project is underway to generate polygons to geospatially define each PSA. USACE regulations require PSAs to be defined by a municipal limit or legislation. The Statistical Port Boundary project will provide stakeholders an opportunity to collaborate with USACE to prepare and review PSAs. PSA boundary information will be organized per Spatial Data Standards for Facilities, Infrastructure, and Environment (SDSFIE) requirements. A new *PortArea* geospatial feature class will be available to users on approximately 31 March 2021. The new layer will support the 2018 Geospatial Data Act and the 2019 OPEN Government Data Act.

b) WHAT:

Per Engineering Regulation 1130-2-520, USACE's NDC and WCSC are responsible for collecting, compiling, printing, and distributing all domestic waterborne commerce statistics for which the USACE has responsibility. Per a

1998 Office of Management and Budget (OMB) memorandum, the WCSC inherited the requirement to include foreign waterborne commerce formally executed by the U.S. Census Bureau. Performance of this work is in accordance with the Rivers and Harbors Appropriation Act of 1922 (33 USC 555).

Engineering Regulation 1130-2-520 defines a port as:

- (1) Port limits defined by legislative enactments of state, county, or city governments.
- (2) The corporate limits of a municipality.

The primary objective of the Statistical Port Boundary project is to utilize a GIS to prepare a USACE enterprise-wide PSA polygon feature class per EP 1130-2-520 and organized in SDSFIE 4.0.2 format.

c) WHEN:

- Updates will be continuous thereafter

d) WHERE:

• All statistical port boundaries within the United States and its territories. The project will result in approximately 500 PSAs.

e) WHY:

USACE has traditionally identified ports as point features. Docks associated with a port have also been identified as a point, and a unique code has been utilized to relate docks to ports. Per ER 1130-2-520, a port area is defined by its legislative description or municipal limit. With the re-design of WCSC's database and new 2019 OPEN Government Data Act requirements, ports in the future will be defined as areas in a GIS which will allow for greater analysis and reporting efficiency. It is important to note that defining ports by area may result in changes to total assigned tonnage, as some docks previously associated with a port may no longer have the same relationship based on legislation or municipal limit.

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

I was on a late phone conversation with GEI Engineering yesterday afternoon, one of the topics that was mentioned was an issue they had believed to be on an inappropriate level. This is regarding the conference call to the ACE about the permitting issues, that I mentioned to the Selectboard last meeting, and forwarded to you. This certainly does not side on the spirit of cooperation and teamwork, and is certainly a bit embarrassing, not only for myself but the Town staff, Selectboard and certainly the rest of the Dredging task force. I have included the minutes from the SB meeting where the DTF was formed, and the emails. I will look forward to any advise you may have on how to proceed in reeling this in and coming up with a better team strategy.

Wellfleet Dredging Task Force Charge Hoort, with Chair Reinhart, drafted the language for the creation of a Dredging Task Force and a charge for the Committee. Wilson suggested overlapping terms for 3 years for five members and only two alternates. There was discussion on the use of the term "manage" in the charge for the Task Force. Chair Reinhart explained that it is to mean that there will be regular oversight, of the harbor dredging. 

WELLFLEET – The town's Dredging Task Force is hoping a lobbyist will help open the doors for the dredging of the mooring field in Wellfleet Harbor next year.

Last month, the Select Board approved a \$25,000, one-year contract with the lobbying firm FBB Federal Relations, which will represent the town in discussions with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and the National Marine Fisheries Service.

The mooring field, also known as Area 2 in the harbor, includes intertidal mud flats that have been designated a "special aquatic site" by the Fisheries Service. As a result, the Fisheries Service wants the town to pay \$13.5 million in mitigation costs to cover any disturbances to the flats that might be caused by the dredging. That amount is based on a formula of \$14.26 per square foot.

GEI, the town's engineering consultant, said the dredging can be done without damaging the intertidal mud flats. The National Marine Fisheries Service disagrees.

The Army Corps of Engineers has refused to sign a dredge permit for the project until the matter is resolved. Meanwhile, the Corps has impeded direct communication between the town and the Fisheries Service, and is refusing to discuss the issue with town officials. Instead, it will communicate only through GEI.

Enter FBB Federal Relations, which town officials hope will work to give the town access to the Army Corps and the Fisheries Service.

The firm said in its proposal to the town that it would work with both agencies "to ensure that the Corps District and the NMFS work directly and constructively with the town."

"We're relying on that, and our congressional delegation, to work on our behalf to open doors," said Joe Aberdale, who co-chairs the Dredging Task Force.

The mooring field has been used as such for 100 years, Aberdale said. It was last dredged in 1957.

Because it's been 64 years since the area was last dredged, the Fisheries Service has classified the work as an improvement dredging project, complete with the \$13.5 million price tag.

Aberdale said he believes the town has a strong case.

"It's been an active mooring field forever," he said. "Our engineers have documented in great detail their opinion that no damage would result to the mooring field with it being dredged."

The project has won the support of federal and state legislators. U.S. Sens. Edward Markey and Elizabeth Warren and U.S. Rec. Bill Keating agree that the town should be allowed to dredge Clinks states to the state by the state of the state

State Sen. Julian Cyr, D-Truro, and state Rep. Sarah Peake, D-Provincetown, have also been very helpful, Aberdale said.

The town has worked with FBB Federal Relations in the past. In fiscal 2020, the firm helped the town obtain \$5 million in federal funding for the recent dredging of the channel and federal anchorage.

Aberdale noted that the ability to dredge the mooring field has great implications for the town.

"One of four people in town are employed in fishing and aquaculture," Aberdale said. "This has a huge economic impact on the town."

- An approximately 2500-yard long extension of the previously licensed 125-foot wide dredged channel from Buoy 12 due south to Buoy 10.

Where ACEC boundaries are defined by the location of natural resource features (e.g. floodplain, wetlands), the boundaries are subject to change based on the most current definitions and data. For a review of site specific projects within the ACEC boundary, determinations need to be made in the field or in consultation with ACEC Program staff.

Thank you for sharing the attached documents. I have been keeping Joe updated on my activities but will communicate with both of you going forward.

I have had numerous discussions with Andrew Nelson on Rep Keating's staff. Andrew has been pushing the Corps District to resolve this issue – while Andrew gave the District two options (no mitigation, or utilize the Herring River project for mitigation) I have communicated to Andrew that the latter is a non-starter, and that the Town is seeking to have the Corp reject the recommendation from NOAA Fisheries and proceed with no mitigation requirement.

I spoke to a contact at USACE HQ here in DC who confirmed that USACE is well within their authority to reject the recommendation from NOAA Fisheries.

I am meeting next week with staff from Senator Warren and Markey's offices as well to update them on Andrew Nelson's outreach to the Corps and to get their perspective on the issue. From a political perspective, Senator Markey is in the best position to influence the Corps given that he is a member of the Environment and Public Works (EPW) Committee with direct jurisdiction over the agency. When I worked with the Town a few years ago to help secure funding for the federal dredging project, Markey's office played the biggest role.

I will keep you updated. Let me know if you have any questions in the meantime.

Dear Assistant Secretary Pinkham:

We are writing to support the Town of Wellfleet's application to the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) for permits to dredge the town-managed mooring field in Wellfleet Harbor. We are also writing to express concern about suggestions of unnecessary and burdensome mitigation requirements that could prevent the Town from moving forward with this important project. Failure to dredge this area will negatively affect public access of the mooring field and likely cause harm to shellfish operations located in Wellfleet harbor, which would significantly affect the regional economy. That is to say nothing of the threat that failure to dredge this area poses on the agency's own assets.

The Town's mooring field comprises 23.8 acres of Wellfleet Harbor and is referred to in the Town's permit application as "Area 2". According to a Public Notice issued by the USACE New England District on May 23, 2017, the decision whether to issue a permit will be based on an evaluation of the probable impact of the proposed activity on the public interest. While the Notice indicated that all factors which may be relevant to the proposal will be considered, including, among other things, economics, general environmental concerns, fish and wildlife values, navigation, recreation, water quality, safety, food production and the general needs and welfare of the people, we don't believe that certain key factors that are unique to this project are being given due consideration as part of the agency's decision-making process. If the agency were to take a wholistic view of the Town's application, it would be evident that the Town's proposed dredging project will improve navigation, support the Town's economy, protect the federal navigation channel from needless and preventable siltation and rid the basin of a substance that threatens shellfish farming operations in the vicinity.

One of the primary reasons the Town is seeking to dredge the mooring field in Wellfleet Harbor is because the area is inaccessible for six to eight hours every day during each low tide. Wellfleet Harbor is the economic engine for the Town of Wellfleet and serves as a regional hub for tourism and commerce – inability to access the harbor impacts the entire Outer Cape economy. Recent economic studies document a direct loss annually of \$5 million to \$8 million in commerce along with hundreds of jobs if Area 2 is not dredged. This includes impacts on the shellfishing industry, which generates over \$15 million annually in direct sales and supports over 200 jobs in Wellfleet. Approximately 15 percent of the population – and more importantly, 25 percent of working age people in Wellfleet – rely on shellfishing for their livelihoods.

The economic benefits associated with dredging in Wellfleet Harbor is one of the many reasons we supported federal funding for dredging the federal navigation channel and federal anchorage.

Commented [CA1]: Why I added federal anchorage: The federal anchorage (which was dredged in 2020 along with the channel), is adjacent to Area 2 and would be most adversely impacted by not dredging Area 1.

We worked very hard to ensure that USACE included \$5 million in the agency's FY2020 work plan for this important project, which is adjacent to the mooring field and wouldeould be affected by the material that has built up in Area 2. It would be unfortunate if USACE granted the permits the Town needs, but included conditions that ultimately make it impossible for the Town to proceed with dredging, as that would severely undermine a multimillion federal investment. Similarly, the part of the mooring field referred to as Area 1 has received permits and is scheduled to be dredged starting on October 1, 2021. The Town's engineers have warned that after Area 1 is dredged it will rapidly fill in with material from Area 2 if that part of the mooring field is not dredged soon thereafter. Failure to dredge Area 2 would result in a massive waste of local investment, which would be on top of an unnecessary and avoidable risk to the investment made here by the federal government.

As described above, the well-being of the regional economy is closelyelosed tied to the health of the shellfish industry. The shellfishing areas adjacent to Area 2 contain some of the most productive shellfish beds in Wellfleet Harbor, providing important winter wild shellfish harvesting for the Town's commercial and recreational permit holders. In a letter that National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS) sent to the New England District of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) on June 16, 2017, NMFS suggested that bordering aquaculture operations could be negatively impacted by siltation associated with dredging activity and recommended the Town coordinate with local shellfish grant owners prior to dredging to minimize potential impacts to these operations. The Town has conducted this outreach to local shellfish grant owners, and what Town leaders were told should be instructive to USACE. Not only do local shellfish grant owners say that Area 2 is inappropriate for shellfish farming, they are but they are also of the belief that dredging Area 2 will not disturb their oyster beds. To the contrary, local shellfish farmers are very concerned that the material that has filled in Area 2 could harm shellfish beds adjacent to the mooring field.

On that last point, it should be noted that the material the Town is seeking to remove from Area 2 is a combination of particulates, sediment and decaying vegetation that locals refer to as "black mayonnaise". While this material is organic in nature, it is inhospitable to shellfish. Oysters simply disappear into the morass and quahogs and soft-shell clams are unable to achieve an anchorage in order to orient themselves and siphon up, which is necessary for both respiration and feeding. It should not be a surprise that the shellfish constable has affirmatively stated there are no shellfish beds within Area 2 – shellfish simply can't survive here, and if the Town is unable to dredge Area 2, the same conditions could migrate to areas of WellIfleet Harbor. This is not speculation – the state of Massachusetts conducted a study in [WHAT YEAR?] concluding that the greatest threat to the Town's shellfish industry is the encroachment of the black mayonnaise from Area 2 onto the shellfish beds in other parts of the harbor.

USACE seems to have assigned a significant environmental value to this area and has concluded that dredging will cause environmental harm. To the contrary, the Town's engineers have completed all of the studies required by USACE and concluded that no harm whatsoever would come to the dredging of Area 2. We believe that closer inspection of this data by USACE would not only bear this out, but also show that failure to dredge poses a bigger threat and that the failure to remove the material that has filled in Area 2 would be very more harmful to the local environment and local shellfish farming operations. All of this information is notwithstanding

the fact that the Town has no good mitigation options. 70% of land in Wellfleet is federal property, and much of the land that Wellfleet does control is conservation land. Even if there was a mitigation project that could be completed in the area, it would take years to complete such a project, during which time the significant harm described in this letter would come to pass. Requiring the Town to simply write a check to the agency is not an alternative.

We value our relationship with USACE and appreciate everything the agency does to improve navigation in the state, enhance flood control and ensure the integrity of our environment. Failure to find a path forward on this issue will have dire consequences for the regional economy, undermine local investments, and negatively effect the agency's own asset, in which the federal government recently made a massive federal investment. We hope the agency will take a wholistic view of the Town's application for permits to dredge Area 2 and work with the £Town to find a path forward that doesn't require unnecessary and burdensome mitigation that the £Town can't complete or otherwise can't afford.

To the contrary, local shellfish farmers are very concerned that the material that has filled in Area 2 could harm shellfish beds adjacent to the mooring field.

On that last point, it should be noted that the material the Town is seeking to remove from Area 2 is a combination of particulates, sediment and decaying vegetation that locals refer to as "black mayonnaise". While this material is organic in nature, it is inhospitable to shellfish. Oysters simply disappear into the morass and quahogs and soft-shell clams are unable to achieve an anchorage in order to orient themselves and siphon up, which is necessary for both respiration and feeding. It should not be a surprise that the shellfish constable has affirmatively stated there are no shellfish beds within Area 2 – shellfish simply can't survive here, and if the Town is unable to dredge Area 2, the same conditions could migrate to areas of WellIfleet Harbor. This is not speculation – the state of Massachusetts conducted a study in [WHAT YEAR?] concluding that the greatest threat to the Town's shellfish industry is the encroachment of the black mayonnaise from Area 2 onto the shellfish beds in other parts of the harbor.

The Wellfleet Harbor Dredging Project is currently in progress. USACE dredged the channel and the federal anchorage in October and November 2020. At the completion of the USACE work, The Town of Wellfleet performed some dredging work in the vicinity of the L-pier, in December 2020. The Town will be dredging Area 1, October 1, 2021 through December 31, 2021. Area 2 dredging is scheduled to begin October 1, 2022 and run through December 31, 2022.

USACE/NMFS has raised an issue, suggesting that Area 2 dredging would trigger mitigation requirements. Consistent with our previous discussions, the Town of Wellfleet disagrees with NMFS opinion. Nonetheless, the Town has reviewed the potential for new mitigation projects.

The majority of land within Wellfleet is protected land. Approximately 70% of the land is within the Cape Cod National Seashore and an additional 10% is under the protection of other agencies or trusts. This leaves a relatively small amount of land even available for additional/new mitigation projects. Despite the challenge of little remaining available land, the Town of Wellfleet continues to be exceptionally pro-active with respect to conservation measures and expenditures. This pro-active behavior is part of the Town ethos and is done without being forced to do so as a condition for permit approval. The unintended consequence of this pro-active approach is that there are few new opportunities available to satisfy mandated requirements.

Below is a listing of recent and current projects in furtherance of the Town's stewardship and resource management.

Herring River Restoration Project

The Herring River Restoration Project is a long term, complicated project involving many federal agencies, Town departments and committees, citizen advisory groups, and private landowners. The goal of the Herring River Restoration Project is to restore a healthy, functioning tidal marsh within the Herring River flood plain by re-establishing tidal exchange in the river basin and its sub-basins. Tidal exchange will be increased incrementally over time using an adaptive management approach to achieve desired conditions for native estuarine habitats.

The essential feature of the project is to replace the Chequessett Neck Dike with a bridge and control structure to allow managed increases in tidal flow. Other restrictions to tidal flow will be removed or modified and flood protection measures will be taken to protect private property.

Town of Wellfleet, Massachusetts Wellfleet Harbor Dredging Project

The extensive time required to implement such a complex, multi-stakeholder projects is testimony to Wellfleet's commitment and persistence in developing conservation measures.

HDYLTA Trust

In 2019 or 2020???, The Town of Wellfleet, at a cost of \$2 million, acquired 168 acres (at mean low water mark) which includes 56.06 acres for shellfish grants, 4 acres grant expansion area, 47.8 acres Beach/Marsh, 31.45 acres Salt Marsh and 3.44 acres beach lots — an effective land area of 142.75 acres. A significant portion of the site consists of intertidal lands.

Welifleet Conservation Trust

In August 2020, 18.5 acres overlooking the Herring River Estuary, were gifted to the Wellfleet Conservation Trust.

Dear Assistant Secretary Pinkham:

We are writing to support the Town of Wellfleet's application to the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) for permits to dredge the town-managed mooring field in Wellfleet Harbor. We are also writing to express concern about suggestions of unnecessary and burdensome mitigation requirements that could prevent the Town from moving forward with this important project and we encourage the agency uses the discretion available to it. Failure to dredge this area will negatively affect public access of the mooring field and likely cause harm to shellfish operations located in Wellfleet harbor, which would significantly affect the regional economy. That is to say nothing of the threat that failure to dredge this area poses on the agency's own assets.

The Town's mooring field comprises 23.8 acres of Wellfleet Harbor and is referred to in the Town's permit application as "Area 2". According to a Public Notice issued by the USACE New England District on May 23, 2017, the decision whether to issue a permit will be based on an evaluation of the probable impact of the proposed activity on the public interest. While the Notice indicated that all factors which may be relevant to the proposal will be considered, including, among other things, economics, general environmental concerns, fish and wildlife values, navigation, recreation, water quality, safety, food production and the general needs and welfare of the people, we don't believe that certain key factors that are unique to this project are being given due consideration as part of the agency's decision-making process. If the agency were to take a holistic view of the Town's application, it would be evident that the Town's proposed dredging project will improve navigation, enhance public safety, support the Town's economy, protect the federal navigation channel from needless and preventable siltation and rid the basin of a substance that threatens shellfish farming operations in the vicinity.

One of the primary reasons the Town is seeking to dredge the mooring field in Wellfleet Harbor is because the area is inaccessible for six to eight hours every day during each low tide, which affects life and safety and the economy. With respect to life and safety, Wellfleet's Harbormaster is an integral part of the Cape and Islands Maritime Response System (CCIMRS) with responsibility for search and rescue, to prevent loss of life at sea and to protect the maritime environment for Wellfleet Harbor and Cape Cod Bay. Presently the Harbormaster is unable to offer full protection to the thousands of boaters who use Wellfleet and surrounding waters because of the inaccessabilty of the harbor. This inaccessibility also affects Wellfleet's federal designation as a harbor of refuge for other ships in distress.

Inability to access the harbor also impacts the entire Outer Cape economy – Wellfleet Harbor is the economic engine for the Town of Wellfleet and serves as a regional hub for tourism and commerce. Recent economic studies document a direct loss annually of \$5 million to \$8 million in commerce along with hundreds of jobs if Area 2 is not dredged. This includes impacts on the shellfishing industry, which generates over \$15 million annually in direct sales and supports over 200 jobs in Wellfleet. Approximately 15 percent of the population – and more importantly, 25 percent of working age people in Wellfleet – rely on shellfishing for their livelihoods.

The economic benefits associated with dredging in Wellfleet Harbor is one of the many reasons we supported federal funding for dredging the federal navigation channel and federal anchorage. We worked very hard to ensure that USACE included \$5 million in the agency's FY2020 work plan for this important project, which is adjacent to the mooring field and would be affected by the material that has built up in Area 2. It would be unfortunate if USACE granted the permits the Town needs, but included conditions that ultimately make it impossible for the Town to proceed with dredging, as that would severely undermine a multimillion federal investment. Similarly, the part of the mooring field referred to as Area 1 has received permits and is scheduled to be dredged starting on October 1, 2021. The Town's engineers have warned that after Area 1 is dredged it will rapidly fill in with material from Area 2 if that part of the mooring field is not dredged soon thereafter. Failure to dredge Area 2 would result in a massive waste of local investment, which would be on top of an unnecessary and avoidable risk to the investment made here by the federal government.

As described above, the well-being of the regional economy is closely tied to the health of the shellfish industry. The shellfishing areas adjacent to Area 2 contain some of the most productive shellfish beds in Wellfleet Harbor, providing important winter wild shellfish harvesting for the Town's commercial and recreational permit holders. In a letter that National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS) sent to the New England District of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) on June 16, 2017, NMFS suggested that bordering aquaculture operations could be negatively impacted by siltation associated with dredging activity and recommended the Town coordinate with local shellfish grant owners prior to dredging to minimize potential impacts to these operations. The Town has conducted this outreach to local shellfish grant owners, and what Town leaders were told should be instructive to USACE. Not only do local shellfish grant owners say that Area 2 is inappropriate for shellfish farming, but they are also of the belief that dredging Area 2 will not disturb their oyster beds. To the contrary, local shellfish farmers are very concerned that the material that has filled in Area 2 could harm shellfish beds adjacent to the mooring field.

USACE seems to have assigned a significant environmental value to this area and has concluded that dredging will cause environmental harm. To the contrary, the Town's engineers have completed all of the studies required by USACE and concluded that no harm whatsoever would come to the dredging of Area 2. We believe that closer inspection of this data by USACE would not only bear this out, but also show that failure to dredge poses a bigger threat and that the failure to remove the material that has filled in Area 2 would be very harmful to the local environment and local shellfish farming operations. All of this information is notwithstanding the fact that the Town has no good mitigation options. 70% of land in Wellfleet is federal property, and much of the land that Wellfleet does control is conservation land. Even if there was a mitigation project that could be completed in the area, it would take years to complete such a project, during which time the significant harm described in this letter would come to pass. Requiring the Town to simply write a check to the agency is not an alternative.

We value our relationship with USACE and appreciate everything the agency does to improve navigation in the state, enhance flood control and ensure the integrity of our environment. Failure to find a path forward on this issue will have dire consequences for the regional economy, affect public safety, undermine local investments, and negatively effect the agency's own asset, in which the federal government recently made a massive federal investment. We hope the agency will take a holistic view of the Town's application for permits to dredge Area 2 and use it's discretion to work with the Town to find a path forward that doesn't require unnecessary and burdensome mitigation that the Town can't complete or otherwise can't afford.

channel, etc.

However, failure to dredge Area 2 creates its own unsafe local conditions, as boats must avoid either side of each low tide and therefore must all come and go during the water levels either side of each high, forcing all boats into that shortened window and having increased risk of running aground if they cut the timing too close.

Per our discussion today, I will go back to the Markey, et al offices and schedule my meeting with staff next week. Prior to that meeting, I'd like to be aligned with you, Will and Chris as to the points that should be included in the letter (and points that could be made informally).

Proposed talking points for letter – please add anything I missed and correct anything I wrote in error:

- The Town is seeking a permit for maintenance dredging. The Town should not be punished for lacking the resources needed to dredge the area until now.
- The Town has presented data that speak to the fact that the mooring field does not have the same level of environmental value that USACE has assigned to it
 - QUESTION: Are there a few specific datapoints that could be included in the letter to back up this statement?
- There is no difference between Area 1 and Area 2, which begs the question, why is mitigation being required for the permit to dredge Area 2 when USACE granted a permit only months ago to dredge Area 1 without requiring mitigation.
 - Area 1 and Area 2 are adjacent to each other

- Area 1 and Area 2 are part of the same mooring field
- Area 1 and Area 2 are both filled with the same black mayonnaise
- Area 1 and Area 2 are both in the same condition at low tide.
- The shellfish farmers do not believe Area 2
 has value and they do not believe that
 dredging Area 2 will disturb their oyster
 beds. In fact, local oyster farmers are
 concerned about the black mayonnaise
 currently in Area 2 possibly affecting their
 operations in the future
 - QUESTION: Any chance we could get a letter from a local shellfish association or group of companies that would pledge support for the project, explain they would never grow oysters in Area 2, and express concern about any delay in dredging Area 2?
- Even if Area 2 had the level of environmental value that has been suggested, there are no good mitigation options:
 - 70% of land in Wellfleet in federal property, and much of the land that Wellfleet does control is conservation land.
 - Even if there was a project that could be completed at Cape Cod National Seashore, it would take years to complete such a project
 - Herring River is not a good option because [PLEASE FILL IN THE BLANK HERE]

With respect to mitigation, while I would not put this in the letter, I do think we should consider offering the 2 acres of shellfish area that was purchased by the town two years ago as retroactive mitigation. It may present a face-saving option for the Corps.

I would not change the letter with respect to the Harbormaster Emergency Response/search and rescue, but if it comes up in discussion, USACE might argue that Area 2 doesn't enter into Emergency Response - the harbormaster boat can come and go from the L-pier area into the channel, etc.

However, failure to dredge Area 2 creates its own unsafe local conditions, as boats must avoid either side of each low tide and therefore must all come and go during the water levels either side of each high, forcing all boats into that shortened window and having increased risk of running aground if they cut the timing too close.

I recommend consideration of also including the following.

The first item we have always presented to agencies is that of safety. The harbormaster is obligated in an agreement with the Coast Guard to provide search and rescue operations in the harbor and Cape Cod Bay. There have been several serious instances where this obligation could not be met.

The Army Corps has stated to us that they are denying the permit based primarily on the resistance of the National Marine Fisheries Service. While they are not required to deny the permit based on NMFS's objection they are choosing to do so in this case. They have a lot of discretion in making a decision.

Andrew, Any additional feedback from the District?

Eric, I note that EPW held a hearing on the nominee for ASA. Is there an opportunity to highlight this issue in a QFR or during an upcoming meeting between the nominee and the Senator?

Here is an update on my end:

I had a call with the Town's engineer's yesterday. They believe they have provided all pertinent information to the District justifying the agency issuing the permit without requiring mitigation. Their view aligns with what I said below – all of this information was submitted to relatively low-level people who failed to share the information with more senior people in the District.

The engineers are assembling a one or two page document that we can share with the senior level people that summarizes the reams of information the Town has submitted to the agency. The bottom line seems to be that just because something is a "mud flat", it doesn't mean it is high value or requires mitigation. In this case, we are looking at continuously disturbed mud flat that doesn't generally constitute good habitat (and to the extent that any living creatures live in the muck, the project will allow for recolonization fairly quickly).

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It is also worth noting that the federal channel is already being affected by the sediment in the mooring field and the longer we wait to dredge, the more sloughing will occur. This would be a real shame considering how hard the delegation worked to get the Corps to free up that money a few years ago. Not to mention the fact that failure to dredge the mooring field would result in a massive waste of federal funds used to dredge the federal channel.

The Town of Wellfleet's mooring field comprises 23.8 acres of Wellfleet Harbor and is referred to in the town's permit application as "Area 2". According to a Public Notice issued by the USACE New England District on May 23, 2017, the decision whether to issue a permit will be based on an evaluation of the probable impact of the proposed activity on the public interest. This includes, among other things, economics, general environmental concerns, fish and wildlife values, navigation, recreation, water quality, safety, food production, and the general needs and welfare of the people. It is evident that the town's proposed dredging project will improve navigation, enhance public safety, support Wellfleet's economy, protect the federal navigation channel from needless and preventable siltation and rid the basin of a substance that threatens shellfish farming operations in the vicinity. Accordingly, USACE should swiftly move to approve the Town of Wellfleet's permit.

One of the primary reasons the Town of Wellfleet is seeking to dredge the mooring field in Wellfleet Harbor is because the area is inaccessible for six to eight hours every day during each low tide, which affects life and safety and the economy. With respect to life and safety, Wellfleet's Harbormaster is an integral part of the Cape and Islands Maritime Response System (CCIMRS) with responsibility for search and rescue, to prevent loss of life at sea and to protect the maritime environment for Wellfleet Harbor and Cape Cod Bay. The Harbormaster has shared with our offices that he is unable to offer full protection to the thousands of boaters who use Wellfleet and the surrounding waters because of the inaccessabilty of the harbor. This inaccessibility also affects Wellfleet's federal designation as a harbor of refuge for other ships in distress.

Access to the harbor also impacts the entire Outer Cape economy – Wellfleet Harbor is the economic engine for the Town of Wellfleet and serves as a regional hub for tourism and commerce. Recent economic studies document a direct loss annually of \$5 million to \$8 million in commerce along with hundreds of jobs if Area 2 is not dredged. This includes impacts on the shellfishing industry, which generates over \$15 million annually in direct sales and supports over 200 jobs in Wellfleet. Approximately 15 percent of the population – and more importantly, 25 percent of working age people in Wellfleet – rely on shellfishing for their livelihoods.

The economic benefits associated with dredging in Wellfleet Harbor is one of the many reasons we support federal funding for dredging the federal navigation channel and federal anchorage. We advocated to ensure that USACE included \$5 million in the agency's FY 2020 work plan for this important project, which is adjacent to the mooring field and would be negatively affected by the backflow of material that has built up in Area 2. As a result, in addition to granting the permits the town needs, we urge the USACE to avoid including conditions that would ultimately make it financially impossible for the Town to proceed with dredging and severely undermine a multimillion federal investment.

Finally, we understand that the Town of Wellfleet's engineers have completed all of the studies required by USACE and concluded that no environmental harm would be caused by the dredging of Area 2. We believe that closer inspection of this data by USACE would confirm this conclusion. Moreover, the town's studies also indicate that continued failure to dredge Area 2 poses an threat to the local ecosystem and shellfish farming operations.

We appreciate the work that USACE does to improve navigation in the state, enhance flood control and ensure the integrity of our environment. We look forward to working with USACE to find a path forward on this issue and hope the agency will take a holistic view of the Town of Wellfleet's application for permits to dredge Area 2. Furthermore, we respectfully request you use your discretion to work with the Town to find a path forward that does not require unnecessary and burdensome mitigation that the Town cannot complete or otherwise cannot afford.

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The engineers are assembling a one or two page document that we can share with the senior level people that summarizes the reams of information the Town has submitted to the agency. The bottom line seems to be that just because something is a "mud flat", it doesn't mean it is high value or requires mitigation. In this case, we are looking at continuously disturbed mud flat that doesn't generally constitute good habitat (and to the extent that any living creatures live in the muck, the project will allow for recolonization fairly quickly).

In the meantime, if the letter has not yet been sent, it may be useful to point to the fact that the State of Massachusetts has issued all state-level permits needed to complete this project and the State concluded that no mitigation is necessary.

It is also worth noting that the federal channel is already being affected by the sediment in the mooring field and the longer we wait to dredge, the more sloughing will occur. This would be a real shame considering how hard the delegation worked to get the Corps to free up that money a few years ago. Not to mention the fact that failure to dredge the mooring field would result in a massive waste of federal funds used to dredge the federal channel.

This is in response to a recent request dated June 4th, 2021 to modify your Department of the Army permit, number NAE-2015-1414, that authorized maintenance dredging of 116,500 cubic yards of material from 14.6 acres in Wellfleet Harbor. The area was authorized to be dredged to a design depth of -6 feet MLW with 1-foot overdredge (-7 ft MLW) and disposed of at the Cape Cod Bay Disposal Site (CCBDS). This work was located on Kendrick Avenue in Wellfleet, MA.

The permit is hereby modified to add an additional section to the dredging footprint to be dredged and disposed of at CCBDS. This additional area will be approximately 17,835 square feet in size. The volume will be 4,990 cubic yards. This work is also on Kendrick Avenue in Wellfleet, MA. The work is shown on the enclosed plans titled "Harbor Dredging, Town of Wellfleet", on three sheets, and dated "May 2021".

All other terms and conditions of the original permit of November 25th, 2020 and the modification of December 8th, 2021 remain in full force and effect.

I just want to point out that there is a discrepancy between the proposed dredge volume in the plans compared to the proposed dredge volume in the 4345 form. The formers 289,200 cy while the latter says 269,200 cy. Please let me know which volume is the most accurate one. I will pause the release of the public notice until you sort that out as the application isn't complete until I get the correct volume. Re-check the area to make sure.

BTW, I looked at the project narrative from the 2016 application and the proposed volume in the 2016 narrative was significantly smaller. 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The Herring River Restoration Project is a long term, complicated project involving many federal agencies, Town departments and committees, citizen advisory groups, and private landowners. The goal of the Herring River Restoration Project is to restore a healthy, functioning tidal marsh within the Herring River flood plain by re-establishing tidal exchange in the river basin and its sub-basins. Tidal exchange will be increased incrementally over time using an adaptive management approach to achieve desired conditions for native estuarine habitats.

The essential feature of the project is to replace the Chequessett Neck Dike with a bridge and control structure to allow managed increases in tidal flow. Other restrictions to tidal flow will be removed or modified and flood protection measures will be taken to protect private property.

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The extensive time required to implement such a complex, multi-stakeholder projects is testimony to Wellfleet's commitment and persistence in developing conservation measures.

Pre-restoration Assessment of Spat Settlement in the Herring River Estuary

Introduction:

The planned restoration of natural tidal flow into Wellfleet's Herring River is projected to restore habitats for many estuarine animals including economically and recreationally important shellfish. Current hydrodynamic models indicate that water quality will improve and salinity will increase upstream of the current Chequessett Neck Road Dike. The documentation of sets of oysters (*Crassostrea virginica*) and soft-shell clams (*Mya arenaria*) upriver of the dike after a breach in the 1970s is an example of how this area of the estuary will respond to increasing salinity.

Water quality parameters and salinity are important for shellfish reproduction, growth, and survival. The Town of Wellfleet and the Cape Cod Cooperative Extension/Woods Hole Oceanographic Institute conducted studies on oyster and quahog (*Mercenaria mercenaria*) growth and survival in the estuary in 2004. The National Park Service conducted studies on oyster growth, condition and survival in 2013-2014. Both studies point to the conclusion that shellfish growth and survival is much lower upriver (landward) of the Chequessett Neck Road Dike. Currently, Nauset High School is monitoring oyster growth and survival in this area as part of their Advanced Placement Environmental Science Curriculum.

Despite the above-referenced studies of current (pre-restoration) oyster growth and survival, no study has documented the existing settlement of oyster larvae in the estuary. Such settlement of "spat" is important for the reproduction and spread of Wellfleet oysters, and also for the wild commercial fishery. According to Wellfleet Shellfish Constable, Nancy Civetta, "The Herring River area …is open from March 15 through August 31, and it is the most productive intertidal area in the harbor for commercial permit holders during that time period. "The Town of Wellfleet currently sets out surf clam (*Spisula solidissima*) shell (cultch) in three locations


within the estuary. It will be important for the Town to understand how spat settlement might change, and is expected to improve, as a result of the Restoration Project.

Objective:

We propose to monitor spat settlement in four locations within the Herring River Estuary and compare these results to a reference location within Wellfleet Harbor. The reference location will be chosen with the help and advice of the Wellfleet Shellfish Department; it will most likely be in Chipman's Cove where spat settlement is common and often abundant, and where the Town allows aquaculturists to collect spat on Chinese Hats.

Methods:

To account for annual variability, the study will be conducted in three consecutive years: 2020, 2021 and 2022. The five sites for monitoring are indicated on the map below. The sites are: 1) mouth of the River; 2) just seaward of the dike; 3) just landward of the dike; 4) upriver below High Toss Road; 5) and the reference site in Chipman's Cove.



Spat will be collected on 15X15-cm tiles, with replicates of three tiles set 10 cm above the sediment on small racks at each location. Tiles will be set out near the

end of June and exchanged for fresh tiles in mid-July, at the end of July and mid-August. The number of spat on each tile will be counted after the tile has been in the water for two weeks. This will allow us to determine the number of spat as well as the seasonality of spat settlement.

At each site, we will also collect continuous measurements of water temperature and water depth (hydroperiod). The salinity regime at each station throughout the tidal cycle will be described by concurrent monitoring by restoration project partners and/or from prior long-term records. These water parameters will be compared with the number of spat per tile at each site.

All work will be conducted by Friends of Herring River Volunteers and Wheaton College Interns in cooperation with the Wellfleet Shellfish Department, and under suitable National Park Service research permits. The Shellfish Department may have an Americorps placement to help with this study. Abigail Archer and Josh Reitsma, at the Cape Cod Cooperative Extension, have offered to help with data analysis.

Due to the tax-exempt status of Friends of Herring River, taxes are not included in these estimates.

In-kind Contribution:

Estimated minimum volunteer time (construct and deploy equipment, count spat) 2 volunteers @ 5 tides X 4 hours per tide= 40 hours/year for 3 years=120 hours. For grant purposes, due to the level of education and professional status, there is a \$65/hr in-kind contribution from Friends of Herring River Board members. So volunteer time for this project is equivalent to \$7,800.

The Public Notice issued on August 24, 2021 indicates that all factors which may be relevant to the proposal will be considered, including, among other things, economics, general environmental concerns, fish and wildlife values, navigation, recreation, water quality, safety, food production and the general needs and welfare of the people. In that spirit, we hope the agency will take a holistic view of the Town's application. If the agency does so, it will be clear that the Town's proposed dredging project will improve navigation, enhance public safety, support the Town's economy, protect the federal navigation channel from needless and preventable siltation and rid the basin of a substance that threatens shellfish farming operations in the vicinity.

One of the primary reasons the Town is seeking to dredge the mooring field in Wellfleet Harbor is because the area is inaccessible for six to eight hours every day during each low tide, which affects life and safety and the economy. With respect to life and safety, Wellfleet's Harbormaster is an integral part of the Cape and Islands Maritime Response System (CCIMRS) with responsibility for search and rescue, to prevent loss of life at sea and to protect the maritime environment for Wellfleet Harbor and Cape Cod Bay. Presently the Harbormaster is unable to offer full protection to the thousands of boaters who use Wellfleet and surrounding waters because of the inaccessabilty of the harbor. This inaccessibility also affects Wellfleet's federal designation as a harbor of refuge for other ships in distress.

Inability to access the harbor also impacts the entire Outer Cape economy – Wellfleet Harbor is the economic engine for the Town of Wellfleet and serves as a regional hub for tourism and commerce. Recent economic studies document a direct loss annually of \$5 million to \$8 million in commerce along with hundreds of jobs if Area 2 is not dredged. We are concerned that unnecessary and burdensome mitigation requirements could prevent the Town from moving forward with this important project. Failure to dredge this area will negatively affect public access of the mooring field and likely cause harm to shellfish operations located in Wellfleet harbor, which would significantly affect the regional economy. That is to say nothing of the threat that failure to dredge this area poses on the agency's own assets – the Corps invested \$5 million to dredge the federal channel only a few years ago.

The shellfishing areas adjacent to Area 2 contain some of the most productive shellfish beds in Wellfleet Harbor, providing important winter wild shellfish harvesting for the Town's commercial and recreational permit holders. In a letter that National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS) sent to the New England District of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) on June 16, 2017, NMFS suggested that bordering aquaculture operations could be negatively impacted by siltation associated with dredging activity and recommended the Town coordinate with local shellfish grant owners prior to dredging to minimize potential impacts to these operations. The Town has conducted this outreach to local shellfish grant owners, and what Town leaders were told should be instructive to USACE. Not only do local shellfish grant owners say that Area 2 is inappropriate for shellfish farming, but they are also of the belief that dredging Area 2 will not disturb their oyster beds. To the contrary, local shellfish farmers are very concerned that the material that has filled in Area 2 could harm shellfish beds adjacent to the mooring field.

On that last point, it should be noted that the material the Town is seeking to remove from Area 2 is a combination of particulates, sediment and decaying vegetation that locals refer to as "black mayonnaise". While this material is organic in nature, it is inhospitable to shellfish. Oysters simply disappear into the morass and quahogs and soft-shell clams are unable to achieve an anchorage to orient themselves and siphon up, which is necessary for both respiration and feeding. It should not be a surprise that the shellfish constable has affirmatively stated there are no shellfish beds within Area 2 – shellfish simply can't survive here, and if the Town is unable to dredge Area 2, the same conditions could migrate to other areas of WellIfleet Harbor. This is not speculation – the state of Massachusetts conducted a study in 2019 concluding that the greatest threat to the Town's shellfish industry is the encroachment of the black mayonnaise from Area 2 onto the shellfish beds in other parts of the harbor.

Consistent with this reality, the Town's engineers have completed all the studies required by USACE and concluded that this area has minimal environmental value and that no harm would result from the dredging of Area 2. We believe that closer inspection of this data by USACE would not only bear this out, but also show that failure to dredge poses a bigger threat and that the failure to remove the material that has filled in Area 2 would be very harmful to the local environment and local shellfish farming operations. This conclusion would be consistent with the views held by the State of Massachusetts, which has issued all state-level permits needed to complete this project and concluded that no mitigation is necessary.

Potential Mitigation

It is important to note that the Town has few good mitigation options. Most of land within Wellfleet is protected land – approximately 70% of the land is located within the Cape Cod

National Seashore and an additional 10% is under the protection of other agencies or trusts. This leaves a relatively small amount of land available for new mitigation projects. Nonetheless, the Town of Wellfleet continues to be exceptionally pro-active with respect to conservation measures and expenditures. While this pro-active approach to environmental protection is part of the Town ethos, the unintended consequence is that there are few new opportunities available to satisfy mandatory mitigation requirements.

With that being said, there are a number of current projects moving forward in furtherance of the Town's stewardship and resource management that we believe could be utilized for mitigation purposes if the agency insists on requiring mitigation for the dredging project.

The Public Notice issued on August 24, 2021 indicates that all factors which may be relevant to the proposal will be considered, including, among other things, economics, general environmental concerns, fish and wildlife values, navigation, recreation, water quality, safety, food production and the general needs and welfare of the people. In that spirit, we hope the agency will take a holistic view of the Town's application. If the agency does so, it will be clear that the Town's proposed dredging project will improve navigation, enhance public safety, support the Town's economy, protect the federal navigation channel from needless and preventable siltation and rid the basin of a substance that threatens shellfish farming operations in the vicinity.

One of the primary reasons the Town is seeking to dredge the mooring field in Wellfleet Harbor is because the area is inaccessible for six to eight hours every day during each low tide, which affects life and safety and the economy. With respect to life and safety, Wellfleet's Harbormaster is an integral part of the Cape and Islands Maritime Response System (CCIMRS) with responsibility for search and rescue, to prevent loss of life at sea and to protect the maritime environment for Wellfleet Harbor and Cape Cod Bay. Presently the Harbormaster is unable to offer full protection to the thousands of boaters who use Wellfleet and surrounding waters because of the inaccessabilty of the harbor. This inaccessibility also affects Wellfleet's federal designation as a harbor of refuge for other ships in distress.

Inability to access the harbor also impacts the entire Outer Cape economy – Wellfleet Harbor is the economic engine for the Town of Wellfleet and serves as a regional hub for tourism and commerce. Recent economic studies document a direct loss annually of \$5 million to \$8 million in commerce along with hundreds of jobs if Area 2 is not dredged. This includes impacts on the shellfishing industry, which generates over \$15 million annually in direct sales and supports over 200 jobs in Wellfleet. Approximately 15 percent of the population – and more importantly, 25 percent of working age people in Wellfleet – rely on shellfishing for their livelihoods.

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CONSERVATION LAND IN WELLFLEET

The Town of Wellfleet has a very environmentally conscious citizenry which supports various organizations that conserve open space for protection of natural resources and habitat. In addition to the Cape Cod National Seashore which protects about 50% of the land, Wellfleet actively supports the Wellfleet Bay Wildlife Sanctuary (WBWS) of Mass Audubon, the Wellfleet Conservation Trust (WCT), and the Town's Open Space program under the direction of the Conservation Commission and the Open Space Committee.

The WBWS protects over 1,000 acres of land and provides nature education programs. Much of the WBWS land is in South Wellfleet and is in, or near, the shoreline. This is a non-governmental organization that is mostly funded by public support and is an IRS approved $501\underline{(c)(-C.3)}$ tax-exempt organization.

The WCT is also a 501(c)(.C.3) qualified land trust and is an all-volunteer land trust. It stewards open space according to the Standards and Practices of the national Land Trust Alliance. Protection is provided through direct ownership and holding conservation restrictions (easements). WCT protects over 400 acres of open space in over 150 parcels of land, much of which is near the harbor. WCT acquires its land through direct acquisitions, bargain purchases and receipt of land donations. All Conservation Restrictions are donated. The land valuation account on WCT's financial books is approximately \$13 million. WCT is the owner of record for much of the flats and related upland south of the Mooring Basin.

WCT works in partnership with the Town and has provided numerous instances of advice and supplemental financial support for the Town's Open Space Programs. The Town has protected over 120 acres of land as designated Open Space and has placed that land under the "care and custody" of the Conservation Commission.

All: I received the below message from Bob DeSista this morning. He has been talking with Congressional staff but has largely ignored my outreach the past few weeks (note he references my outreach to HQ). I'm interested in GEI's

DESISTA EMAIL:

" Good morning Ray,

I have seen the email correspondence you have had with our folks in the RIT, particularly the comments you sent to Sue Wilcox to supplement the letter from the Congressional delegation. I understand your concern that the mitigation requirements have the potential to derail the project. Know that we are intent on working with the Town to resolve the mitigation requirements without burdening the Town with onerous and unnecessary mitigation. It is vital that the Town engages with us as soon as possible about the mitigation requirements so we can meet the environmental requirement for mitigation as outlined in the CWA and the Magnusson-Stevens Act in a fair, equitable and timely manner. You referenced the NMFS stance on the impact to shellfish resources. Indeed, one of the original concerns of NMFS was for the shellfish resources. However, they meant in the sense of the ecological function of the Area 2 mudflats. The Town engineer seems to be understanding this diminished function in terms of the Land Containing Shellfish classification of impacted area. As this definition is partly determined as the viability of the area in question to fisheries usage, their studies only demonstrated the non-viability of the area as a fisheries resource. Unfortunately, NMFS carefully replies that the habitat function is separate from the viability of the fisheries resources alone.

Quoting from the NMFS response to the data the town provided to them in 2018 "We...made a preliminary determination that this project would result in substantial adverse impacts to EFH. Further, because the project involves mudflats, which are has designated as "special aquatic sites" under the Clean Water Act, we also found that this project may result in substantial and unacceptable adverse effects to Aquatic Resources of National Importance as outlined in Part N(3)(a) of our 1992 Memorandum of Agreement between the Department of Commerce and the Department of the Army concerning Section 404(q) of the Clean Water Act (MOA)...The project is located in an important area for a number of marine and estuarine finfish and shellfish species, and is likely to result in direct and indirect adverse impacts to managed fish species and EFH. The area has been identified as EFH for 31 federally-managed species including, but not limited to, winter flounder, summer flounder, Atlantic cod, pollack, ocean pout, silver hake, red hake, white hake, windowpane flounder, little skate, winter skate, thorny skate, and surf clam."

Attached is the complete letter representing the NMFS EFH conservation recommendations from which these quotes were taken. Alo attached is the Towns reply to the original NMFS determination which occasioned the NMFS response. As indicated the NMFS response, there are serious concerns about the environmental impacts from the proposed work that are exclusive of the fisheries-related impacts that you and the Town have addressed.

We also reached out to our folks responsible for our own recent dredging in Wellfleet. It is their opinion that a delay in the remaining dredging to be performed in Area 2 does not pose a siltation threat to the elevation in the FNP reYou have mentioned that the Town has additional information that substantiates the Town's contention of severely diminished ecological function in the Area 2 mudflats. This information would be very useful to help us assist the town resolve the mitigation requirements. We would really appreciate any data the Town may have for us to consider, particularly any data regarding the aquatic resource functions of the area and any studies completed by the Town's engineers that you believe we are not aware of. Our public notice on the project will be closing soon, so whatever you may have would be very helpful.

Thank you for the continuing interest and input to the Corps review of this vital marine infrastructure project.

Wellfleet Harbor Dredging is comprised of three distinct components: 1) the federal navigation channel; 2) Area 1, which is comprised of the North and South Access Channels, the North Anchorage, and the L-Pier Access Channel; and Area 2, which is comprised of the South Anchorage. Dredging of the federal channel was completed in November 2020 with a federal investment of \$5 million. Upon completion of the dredging of the federal project, the Town of Wellfleet initiated work in Area 1 – the Town performed some dredging work in the vicinity of the L-pier, in December 2020 and will be dredging the remainder of Area 1 beginning October 1, 2021 through December 31, 2021. Pending receipt of necessary permits, Area 2 dredging is scheduled to begin October 1, 2022 and run through December 31, 2022.

The three components of the overall Wellfleet Harbor Dredging project work as a system – all three projects need to be completed in order to maximize efficient use of Wellfleet Harbor. Failure to complete dredging of Area 2 in a timely manner undermines use of the Harbor and will negatively impact use of the federal channel and Area 1. For the reasons described below, we are concerned about the suggestion of unnecessary and burdensome mitigation requirements could prevent the Town from moving forward with this important project. Failure to dredge this area will negatively affect public access of the mooring field and likely cause harm to shellfish operations located in Wellfleet harbor, which would significantly affect the regional economy. That is to say nothing of the threat that failure to dredge this area poses on the agency's own assets – the Corps invested \$5 million to dredge the federal channel just last year in 2020.

The shellfishing areas adjacent to Area 2 contain some of the most productive shellfish beds in Wellfleet Harbor, providing important winter wild shellfish harvesting for the Town's commercial and recreational permit holders. In a letter that National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS) sent to the New England District of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) on June 16, 2017, NMFS suggested that bordering aquaculture

operations could be negatively impacted by siltation associated with dredging activity and recommended the Town coordinate with local shellfish grant owners prior to dredging to minimize potential impacts to these operations. The Town has conducted this outreach to local shellfish grant owners, and what Town leaders were told should be instructive to USACE. Not only do local shellfish grant owners say that Area 2 is inappropriate for shellfish farming, but they are also of the belief that dredging Area 2 will not disturb their oyster beds. To the contrary, local shellfish farmers are very concerned that the material that has filled in Area 2 could harm shellfish beds adjacent to the mooring field.

On that last point, it should be noted that the material the Town is seeking to remove from Area 2 is a combination of particulates, sediment and decaying vegetation that locals refer to as "black mayonnaise". While this material is organic in nature, it is inhospitable to shellfish. Oysters simply disappear into the morass and quahogs and soft-shell clams are unable to achieve an anchorage to orient themselves and siphon up, which is necessary for both respiration and feeding. It should not be a surprise that the shellfish constable has affirmatively stated there are no shellfish beds within Area 2 – shellfish simply can't survive here, and if the Town is unable to dredge Area 2, the same conditions could migrate to other areas of Wellfleet Harbor. This is not speculation – the state of Massachusetts conducted a study in 2019 concluding that the greatest threat to the Town's shellfish industry is the encroachment of the black mayonnaise from Area 2 onto the shellfish beds in other parts of the harbor.

In May of 2020, the Center for Coastal Studies with funding from the Town of Wellfleet Natural Resources Advisory Board, conducted a study of the Wellfleet Harbor sediments. The goal of the study was to better characterize the nature, density, and movement of the sediments. The study found that the material in the harbor, called "black custard" for the purposes of this study was 70% silt and 30% organic material. This material is present predominantly in the Harbor and was not found in a sample taken downstream of the Chequessett Neck dike. Sampling and sonar studies indicate that the material is present to a depth of 8-12 ft. The organic material present is derived from marine sources. Deposition of fine-grained sediment in the study area is likely a product of slowing tidal currents that arise from a decrease in depth and a process known as flocculation, where fine-grained sediment comes together and falls out of suspension to be deposited in the harbor. While conducting this study a biological assessment of the samples was also conducted. The Samples 1, 2 and 4 (Area1) showed a paucity of individuals and low species diversity. Sample 3 (Area 1) did show a high number of individuals and some species diversity (6 identified species) although approximately 85% of individuals found were mud worms. In comparison the control sample taken outside the harbor near the Chequessett Neck dike yielded 60 individuals and showed a much higher diversity (10 species). This result is similar to the 2018 biological survey conducted in Area 2 which showed very low species diversity and few individuals per sample.

Consistent with this reality, the Town's Engineering Consultants have completed all the studies required by USACE and concluded that this area has minimal environmental value and that no harm would result from the dredging of Area 2. We believe that closer inspection of this data by USACE would not only bear this out, but also show that failure to dredge poses a bigger threat and that the failure to remove the material that has filled in Area 2 would be very harmful to the local environment and local shellfish farming operations. This conclusion would be consistent with the views held by the State of Massachusetts, which has issued all state-level permits needed to complete this project and concluded that no mitigation is necessary.

Furthermore, failure to dredge Area 2 in a timely manner could cause siltation in the federal channel, which is located adjacent to the mooring field. This would be hugely unfortunate, given that the US Army Corps of Engineers spent \$5 million to dredge this federal asset in FY20. Similarly, the part of the mooring field referred to as Area 1 has received permits and is scheduled to be dredged starting on October 1, 2021. The Town's engineers have warned that after Area 1 is dredged it will rapidly fill in with material from Area 2 if that part of the mooring field is not dredged soon thereafter. Failure to dredge Area 2 would result in a massive waste of local investment, which would be on top of an unnecessary and avoidable risk to the investment made here by the federal government.

Potential Mitigation

It is important to note that the Town has few good mitigation options. Most of the land within Wellfleet is protected land – approximately 70% of the land is located within the Cape Cod National Seashore. In addition to the Cape Cod National Seashore, which protects about 70% of the land, Wellfleet actively supports the Wellfleet Bay Wildlife Sanctuary (WBWS) of Mass Audubon. WBWS protects over 1,000 acres of land and provides nature education programs. Much of the WBWS land is in South Wellfleet and is on, or near, the shoreline. The Town also supports the Wellfleet Conservation Trust (WCT), and the Town's Open Space program under the direction of the Conservation Commission and the Open Space Committee. This leaves a relatively small amount of land available for new mitigation projects. (Please see the attached map of "Wellfleet Conservation Lands and Open Space". This map is available on WCT's website and can be magnified for more detailed examination.

Nonetheless, the Town of Wellfleet continues to be exceptionally pro-active with respect to conservation measures and expenditures. While this pro-active approach to environmental protection is part of the Town ethos, the unintended consequence is that there are few new opportunities available to satisfy mandatory mitigation requirements.

With that being said, there are a number of current projects moving forward in furtherance of the Town's stewardship and resource management that we believe could be utilized for mitigation purposes if the agency insists on requiring mitigation for the dredging project.

Below is a listing of recent and current projects in furtherance of the Town's stewardship and resource management.

Herring River Restoration Project

The Herring River Restoration Project is a long term, complicated project involving many federal agencies, Town departments and committees, citizen advisory groups, and private landowners. The goal of the Herring River Restoration Project is to restore a healthy, functioning tidal marsh within the Herring River flood plain by re-establishing tidal exchange in the river basin and its sub-basins. Tidal exchange will be increased incrementally over time using an adaptive management approach to achieve desired conditions for native estuarine habitats. The Friends of the Herring River primarily support the Cape Cod National Seashore in its efforts to facilitate the restoration project. The Friends are supporting the process of securing the necessary permits to replace the Herring River bridge as well as supporting all of the monitoring projects being performed by the CCNS.

An essential feature of the project is to replace the Chequessett Neck Dike with a bridge and control structure to allow managed increases in tidal flow. Other restrictions to tidal flow will be removed or modified and flood protection measures will be taken to protect private property.

The extensive time required to implement such a complex, multi-stakeholder projects is testimony to Wellfleet's commitment and persistence in developing conservation measures.

HDYLTA Trust

In October of 2019, The Town of Wellfleet, at a cost of \$2 million, acquired 168 acres (calculated at mean low water mark) of Land Under Ocean / Tidal Flats. This area includes 56.06 acres already under use for shellfish grants with an additional 4 acres to be allotted to a grant expansion area. The current shellfish grants provide both economic benefit to the Town, and environmental benefit through the active water filtration of the shellfish. The rest of the purchased area includes Coastal Beach, Salt Marsh and Open Water resources. A significant portion of the site consists of Tidal Flats. (See attached Survey and MA OLIVER Mapping) The Town would seek to preserve the portion of this land not set aside for shellfish grants, and this portion would be kept in a town restriction. This means that approximately 100 acres of land, with a significant portion being intertidal, will-would remain undeveloped.

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Wellfleet Conservation Trust

In August 2020, 18.5 acres overlooking the Herring River Estuary, were gifted to the Wellfleet Conservation Trust.

Upcoming request for two parcels of Town owned land to be transferred to the Conservation Commission for purposes of open space conservation.

Map 30-Parcel 186 is a 2.06 acres of wetlands marsh property in Blackfish Creek abutting conservation lands owned by the Wellfleet Conservation Trust and Mass Audubon Society.

Map 42 – Parcel 137 is 3.26 acres of wetlands marsh that abuts the Town owned Bayberry Hill Conservation Land and Trail property off Lt. Island Road.

Reactive Protective Barrier

At the June 2021 Wellfleet Annual Town meeting, voters approved \$50,000 for an engineering & hydrogeological assessment for a Permeable Reactive Barrier at 117 & 111 East Commercial Street.

Pre-restoration Assessment of Spat Settlement in the Herring River Estuary

The planned restoration of natural tidal flow into Wellfleet's Herring River is projected to restore habitats for many estuarine animals, including economically and recreationally important shellfish. This study monitors spat settlement in four locations within the Herring River Estuary and will compare the results to a reference location within Wellfleet Harbor. The study is in progress and is expected to be complete in

Wellfleet Mitigation Efforts regarding Water Quality, Rare and Endangered Species and Habitat Restoration

Through a combination of efforts among the Wellfleet Clean Water Advisory Committee, which is responsible for the Town's EPA 208 nitrogen mitigation plan, Wellfleet Conservation Commission, Wellfleet Natural Resources Advisory Board, Wellfleet Health and Conservation Department and Wellfleet Department of Public Works, there are several mitigation projects on-going in the inner Wellfleet Harbor which directly address conservation issues and aim to also reduce the long term need for dredging in the inner harbor. Collectively, these projects will cost several million dollars over the next five years and have a profound impact on water quality health as well as rare and endangered species. Projects that have a direct nexus to the area of dredging in Wellfleet Harbor are discussed below. These projects are separate from the Herring River Restoration which is estimated at \$75 million and aims to restore 1,100 acres of degraded marsh back to healthy salt marsh.

Salt Marsh Restoration:

Salt marshes are well documented as natural treatment systems providing significant water quality and ecological benefits. Salt marsh restoration includes restoring degraded or impaired marsh to natural brackish flow which restores the natural salt vegetation and marine species that revive ecological functions that reduce nutrient levels and increase species diversity. The Town of Wellfleet has identified numerous potential restoration projects that will restore large areas of salt marsh. These include Herring River, Mayo Creek and others. Most of these projects are intended to restore tidal flow into areas that have been historically blocked by water control structures such as dams, dikes, clapper valves, culverts, etc.

Three habitat restoration projects that are underway in Wellfleet (Mayo Creek, Herring River, and Hawes Pond) will likely result in significant water quality and habitat improvements and are estimated at over 1,200 acres. However, these projects are very site-specific and the resulting nitrogen reductions are difficult to estimate. The Cape Cod Commission's MVP tool estimates a reduction of 317 kg/year for Mayo Creek restoration, potentially 25% of the target for the Duck Creek area. Their corresponding nitrogen reduction credits be established through monitoring as part of the adaptive management program. Mayo Creek funding was approved at the June 2021 Town Meeting and the other projects are on-going and approved by the Wellfleet Board of Selectman and supported by the respective committees, Town Departments and staff.

Mayo Creek

From According to the Mayo Creek Restoration Committee final report to the Board of Selectmen June 2019: "The Mayo Creek estuary formed thousands of years ago behind the Mayo Beach barrier spit, and is bordered on three sides by hills: Summit Hill, Taylor Farm and the ridge along Holbrook Avenue. The original tidelands covered about 60 acres.

Tides and seawater were blocked from this back-barrier salt marsh in 1909 when, the Town replaced a bridge across the original 100-foot-wide inlet with a solid-fill dike. This dike currently serves as a causeway connecting Commercial Street with the Wellfleet Marina and Kendrick Avenue. The only opening for water passage through the dike is a two-foot-diameter culvert intended to allow freshwater drainage to the harbor; a one-way valve at the seaward end of this culvert prevents nearly all saltwater inflow to the Mayo Creek estuary. About 15 acres of the original tidelands were filled with harbor dredged material in the early to mid-20th century.

Restoration has been approved and funded by Town Meeting and is anticipated to include road improvements and the installation of a self-regulating tide gate to protect upland properties. The new tide gate will allow for an increase in tide range and periods of free flow between the harbor and the upstream wetlands to allow recovery of the salt marsh and increased habitat for rare and endangered species.

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Hawes Pond

From a report prepared by VHB Consulting for Mass DOT: "Hawes Pond is an approximately 0.7 acre pond that is connected to Duck Creek, a tributary that flows through a saltmarsh into Wellfleet Harbor. A shallow 550-foot channel and 145-foot culvert beneath Main Street connects Hawes Pond to Duck Creek." Due to a failed tide gate, "The water has become stagnant and the Pond's salinity has been reduced." Hawes Pond is considered of an emergency priority by the Wellfleet Conservation Commission and they relayed this to Mass DOT through a series of planning meetings among the stakeholders. The salt marsh is dying and due to the blocked tide gate, one of the remaining highly productive eel runs in Wellfleet is at risk of complete collapse. This habitat is also an important Diamond Terrapin Turtle spawning area.

This area is directly connected to the Inner Harbor Basin through Duck Creek which empties at the Marina Basin. The Wellfleet Clean Water Advisory Committee has documented this area as the most difficult and with the highest nitrogen loads to be remediated in Wellfleet Harbor and lists Hawes Pond on its project list for nutrient remediation.

DOT has recommended the installation of a self-regulating tide gate at an estimated cost of \$150,000 as the best solution for this area and it is included in the Town's draft watershed plan for compliance with EPA 208 requirements.

Shellfish/Aquaculture:

The Town of Wellfleet is a recognized leader in the shellfish industry and has focused on shellfish restoration and aquaculture research over the past several decades. Inherent in this approach is a belief that the marine ecosystem must be restored to enable it to increase filtration and consume phytoplankton (its food source). Excess phytoplankton can result from either large nutrient loads or too little consumption and leads to highly organic muck known as "black custard" (the decay products from excess phytoplankton and marine vegetation) and eutrophication (too little oxygen).

A pilot project conducted by the town, at a site adjacent to the Town Pier, in conjunction with University of Massachusetts and the Center for Coastal Studies reported over a 70% reduction in concentrations of nitrogen and over 90% reduction in chlorophyll (which is an indicator for phytoplankton). Recent updates to the Cape Cod Commission's Technology Matrix indicate a range of potential nitrogen mitigation associated with shellfish and aquaculture ranging from 52 – 300 kg/acre-year for these projects depending upon the density of shellfish. Moreover, a recent analysis from the Center for Coastal Studies on the make-up of black custard indicated no human component and 85% phytoplankton and 15% marine vegetation, meaning ecosystem restoration will be critical as a solution for Wellfleet to reduce the accumulation of so called "black custard" which is the major re-siltation material in the dredged areas.

Expansion of this effort adjacent to the boat slips, and in the vicinity of the Town Pier is similar to efforts advanced in places like Virginia, Florida and Texas for reduction in

these materials that fill the harbor and will require future dredging. At the same time these improve water clarity and substantially increase species diversity. The original project site saw a dramatic increase in diamond back terrapin use and in a report to the Clean Water Advisory Committee, showed a very large increase in speciation.

Consistent with this reality, the Town's Engineering Consultants have completed all the studies required by USACE and concluded that this area has minimal environmental value and that no harm would result from the dredging of Area 2. We believe that closer inspection of this data by USACE would not only bear this out, but also show that failure to dredge poses a bigger threat and that the failure to remove the material that has filled in Area 2 would be very harmful to the local environment and local shellfish farming operations. This conclusion would be consistent with the views held by the State of Massachusetts, which has issued all state-level permits needed to complete this project and concluded that no mitigation is necessary.

Furthermore, failure to dredge Area 2 in a timely manner could cause siltation in the federal channel, which is located adjacent to the mooring field. This would be hugely unfortunate, given that the US Army Corps of Engineers spent \$5 million to dredge this federal asset in FY20. Similarly, the part of the mooring field referred to as Area 1 has received permits and is scheduled to be dredged starting on October 1, 2021. The Town's engineers have warned that after Area 1 is dredged it will rapidly fill in with material from Area 2 if that part of the mooring field is not dredged soon thereafter. Failure to dredge Area 2 would result in a massive waste of local investment, which would be on top of an unnecessary and avoidable risk to the investment made here by the federal government.

Potential Mitigation

It is important to note that the Town has few good mitigation options. Most of the land within Wellfleet is protected land – approximately 70% of the land is located within the Cape Cod National Seashore. In addition to the Cape Cod National Seashore, which protects about 70% of the land, Wellfleet actively supports the Wellfleet Bay Wildlife Sanctuary (WBWS) of Mass Audubon. WBWS protects over 1,000 acres of land and provides nature education programs. Much of the WBWS land is in South Wellfleet and is on, or near, the shoreline. The Town also supports the Wellfleet Conservation Trust (WCT), and the Town's Open Space program under the direction of the Conservation Commission and the Open Space Committee. This leaves a relatively small amount of land available for new mitigation projects. (Please see the attached map of "Wellfleet Conservation Lands and Open Space". Nonetheless, the Town of Wellfleet continues to be exceptionally pro-active with respect to conservation measures and expenditures. While this pro-active approach to environmental protection is part of the Town ethos, the unintended consequence is that there are few new opportunities available to satisfy mandatory mitigation requirements.

With that being said, there are a number of current projects moving forward in furtherance of the Town's stewardship and resource management that we believe could be utilized for mitigation purposes if the agency insists on requiring mitigation for the dredging project.

Below is a listing of recent and current projects in furtherance of the Town's stewardship and resource management.

Herring River Restoration Project

The Herring River Restoration Project is a long term, complicated project involving many federal agencies, Town departments and committees, citizen advisory groups, and private landowners. The goal of the Herring River Restoration Project is to restore a healthy, functioning tidal marsh within the Herring River flood plain by re-establishing tidal exchange in the river basin and its sub-basins. Tidal exchange will be increased incrementally over time using an adaptive management approach to achieve desired conditions for native estuarine habitats. The Friends of the Herring River primarily support the Cape Cod National Seashore in its efforts to facilitate the restoration project. The Friends are supporting the process of securing the necessary permits to replace the Herring River bridge as well as supporting all of the monitoring projects being performed by the CCNS.

An essential feature of the project is to replace the Chequessett Neck Dike with a bridge and control structure to allow managed increases in tidal flow. Other restrictions to tidal flow will be removed or modified and flood protection measures will be taken to protect private property.

The extensive time required to implement such a complex, multi-stakeholder projects is testimony to Wellfleet's commitment and persistence in developing conservation measures.

HDYLTA Trust

In October of 2019, The Town of Wellfleet, at a cost of \$2 million, acquired 168 acres (calculated at mean low water mark) of Land Under Ocean / Tidal Flats. This area includes 56.06 acres already under use for shellfish grants with an additional 4 acres to be allotted to a grant expansion area. The current shellfish grants provide both economic benefit to the Town, and environmental benefit through the active water filtration of the shellfish. The rest of the purchased area includes Coastal Beach, Salt Marsh and Open Water resources. A significant portion of the site consists of Tidal Flats. (See attached Survey and MA OLIVER Mapping) The Town would seek to preserve the portion of this land not set aside for shellfish grants, and this portion would be kept in a town restriction. This means that approximately 100 acres of land, with a significant portion being intertidal, will-would remain undeveloped.

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Wellfleet Conservation Trust

In August 2020, 18.5 acres overlooking the Herring River Estuary, were gifted to the Wellfleet Conservation Trust.

Wellfleet Mitigation Efforts regarding Water Quality, Rare and Endangered Species and Habitat Restoration

Through a combination of efforts among the Wellfleet Clean Water Advisory Committee, which is responsible for the Town's EPA 208 nitrogen mitigation plan, Wellfleet Conservation Commission, Wellfleet Natural Resources Advisory Board, Wellfleet Health and Conservation Department and Wellfleet Department of Public Works, there are several mitigation projects on-going in the inner Wellfleet Harbor which directly address conservation issues and aim to also reduce the long term need for dredging in the inner harbor. Collectively, these projects will cost several million dollars over the next five years and have a profound impact on water quality health as well as rare and endangered species. Projects that have a direct nexus to the area of dredging in Wellfleet Harbor are discussed below. These projects are separate from the Herring River Restoration which is estimated at \$75 million and aims to restore 1,100 acres of degraded marsh back to healthy salt marsh.

Salt marshes are well documented as natural treatment systems providing significant water quality and ecological benefits. Salt marsh restoration includes restoring degraded or impaired marsh to natural brackish flow which restores the natural salt vegetation and marine species that revive ecological functions that reduce nutrient levels and increase species diversity. The Town of Wellfleet has identified numerous potential restoration projects that will restore large areas of salt marsh. These include Herring River, Mayo Creek and others. Most of these projects are intended to restore tidal flow into areas that have been historically blocked by water control structures such as dams, dikes, clapper valves, culverts, etc.

Three habitat restoration projects that are underway in Wellfleet (Mayo Creek, Herring River, and Hawes Pond) will likely result in significant water quality and habitat improvements and are estimated at over 1,200 acres. However, these projects are very site-specific and the resulting nitrogen reductions are difficult to estimate. The Cape Cod Commission's MVP tool estimates a reduction of 317 kg/year for Mayo Creek restoration, potentially 25% of the target for the Duck Creek area. Their corresponding nitrogen reduction credits be established through monitoring as part of the adaptive management program. Mayo Creek funding was approved at the June 2021 Town Meeting and the other projects are on-going and approved by the Wellfleet Board of Selectman and supported by the respective committees, Town Departments and staff.

Mayo Creek

From According to the Mayo Creek Restoration Committee final report to the Board of Selectmen June 2019: "The Mayo Creek estuary formed thousands of years ago behind the Mayo Beach barrier spit, and is bordered on three sides by hills: Summit Hill, Taylor Farm and the ridge along Holbrook Avenue. The original tidelands covered about 60 acres.

Tides and seawater were blocked from this back-barrier salt marsh in 1909 when, the Town replaced a bridge across the original 100-foot-wide inlet with a solid-fill dike. This dike currently serves as a causeway connecting Commercial Street with the Wellfleet Marina and Kendrick Avenue. The only opening for water passage through the dike is a two-foot-diameter culvert intended to allow freshwater drainage to the harbor; a one-way valve at the seaward end of this culvert prevents nearly all saltwater inflow to the Mayo Creek estuary. About 15 acres of the original tidelands were filled with harbor dredged material in the early to mid-20th century.

Restoration has been approved and funded by Town Meeting and is anticipated to include road improvements and the installation of a self-regulating tide gate to protect upland properties. The new tide gate will allow for an increase in tide range and periods of free flow between the harbor and the upstream wetlands to allow recovery of the salt marsh and increased habitat for rare and endangered species.

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Hawes Pond

From a report prepared by VHB Consulting for Mass DOT: "Hawes Pond is an approximately 0.7 acre pond that is connected to Duck Creek, a tributary that flows through a saltmarsh into Wellfleet Harbor. A shallow 550--foot channel and 145-foot culvert beneath Main Street connects Hawes Pond to Duck Creek." Due to a failed tide gate, "The water has become stagnant and the Pond's salinity has been reduced." Hawes Pond is considered of an emergency priority by the Wellfleet Conservation Commission and they relayed this to Mass DOT through a series of planning meetings among the stakeholders. The salt marsh is dying and due to the blocked tide gate, one of the remaining highly productive eel runs in Wellfleet is at risk of complete collapse. This habitat is also an important Diamond Terrapin Turtle spawning area.

This area is directly connected to the Inner Harbor Basin through Duck Creek which empties at the Marina Basin. The Wellfleet Clean Water Advisory Committee has documented this area as the most difficult and with the highest nitrogen loads to be remediated in Wellfleet Harbor and lists Hawes Pond on its project list for nutrient remediation.

DOT has recommended the installation of a self-regulating tide gate at an estimated cost of \$150,000 as the best solution for this area and it is included in the Town's draft watershed plan for compliance with EPA 208 requirements.

Shellfish/Aquaculture:

The Town of Wellfleet is a recognized leader in the shellfish industry and has focused on shellfish restoration and aquaculture research over the past several decades. Inherent in this approach is a belief that the marine ecosystem must be restored to enable it to increase filtration and consume phytoplankton (its food source). Excess phytoplankton can result from either large nutrient loads or too little consumption and leads to highly organic muck known as "black custard" (the decay products from excess phytoplankton and marine vegetation) and eutrophication (too little oxygen).

A pilot project conducted by the town, at a site adjacent to the Town Pier, in conjunction with University of Massachusetts and the Center for Coastal Studies reported over a 70% reduction in concentrations of nitrogen and over 90% reduction in chlorophyll (which is an indicator for phytoplankton). Recent updates to the Cape Cod Commission's Technology Matrix indicate a range of potential nitrogen mitigation associated with shellfish and aquaculture ranging from 52 – 300 kg/acre-year for these projects depending upon the density of shellfish. Moreover, a recent analysis from the Center for Coastal Studies on the make-up of black custard indicated no human component and 85% phytoplankton and 15% marine vegetation, meaning ecosystem restoration will be critical as a solution for Wellfleet to reduce the accumulation of so called "black custard" which is the major re-siltation material in the dredged areas.

Expansion of this effort adjacent to the boat slips, and in the vicinity of the Town Pier is similar to efforts advanced in places like Virginia, Florida and Texas for reduction in

these materials that fill the harbor and will require future dredging. At the same time these improve water clarity and substantially increase species diversity. The original project site saw a dramatic increase in diamond back terrapin use and in a report to the Clean Water Advisory Committee, showed a very large increase in speciation.

As you are aware, the Wellfleet Harbor Dredging Project is currently in progresscomprised of three distinct components: 1) the federal navigation channel; 2) Area 1, which is comprised of the North and South Access Channels, the North Anchorage, and the L-Pier Access Channel; and Area 2, which is comprised of the South Anchorage. Dredging of the federal channel was completed in November 2020 with a federal investment of \$5 million. Upon . USACE dredged the channel and the federal anchorage in October and November 2020. At the completion of the USACE workthe dredging of the federal project, the Town of Wellfleet initiated work in Area 1—the Town performed some dredging work in the vicinity of the L-pier, in December 2020 and . The Town will be dredging the remainder of Area 1 beginning . October 1, 2021 through December 31, 2021. Pending receipt of necessary permits. Area 2 dredging is scheduled to begin October 1, 2022 and run through December 31, 2022.

The three components of the overall Wellfleet Harbor Dredging project work as a system – all three projects need to be completed in order to maximize efficient use of Wellfleet Harbor. Failure to complete dredging of Area 2 in a timely manner undermines use of the Harbor and will negatively impact use of the federal channel and Area 1. For the reasons described below,

USACE/NMFS has raised an issue, suggesting that Area 2 dredging would trigger mitigation requirements. wWe are concerned that about the suggestion of unnecessary and burdensome mitigation requirements could prevent the Town from moving forward with this important project. Failure to dredge this area will negatively affect public access of the mooring field and likely cause harm to shellfish operations located in Wellfleet harbor, which would significantly affect the regional economy. That is to say nothing of the threat that failure to dredge this area poses on the agency's own assets – the Corps invested \$5 million to dredge the federal channel just last year in 2020.

The shellfishing areas adjacent to Area 2 contain some of the most productive shellfish beds in Wellfleet Harbor, providing important winter wild shellfish harvesting for the Town's commercial and recreational permit holders. In a letter that National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS) sent to the New England District of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) on June 16, 2017, NMFS suggested that bordering aquaculture operations could be negatively impacted by siltation associated with dredging activity and recommended the Town coordinate with local shellfish grant owners prior to dredging to minimize potential impacts to these operations. The Town has conducted this outreach to local shellfish grant owners, and what Town leaders were told should be instructive to USACE. Not only do local shellfish grant owners say that Area 2 is inappropriate for shellfish farming, but they are also of the belief that dredging Area 2 will not

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disturb their oyster beds. To the contrary, local shellfish farmers are very concerned that the material that has filled in Area 2 could harm shellfish beds adjacent to the mooring field.

On that last point, it should be noted that the material the Town is seeking to remove from Area 2 is a combination of particulates, sediment and decaying vegetation that locals refer to as "black mayonnaise". While this material is organic in nature, it is inhospitable to shellfish. Oysters simply disappear into the morass and quahogs and soft-shell clams are unable to achieve an anchorage to orient themselves and siphon up, which is necessary for both respiration and feeding. It should not be a surprise that the shellfish constable has affirmatively stated there are no shellfish beds within Area 2 – shellfish simply can't survive here, and if the Town is unable to dredge Area 2, the same conditions could migrate to other areas of WellIfleet Harbor. This is not speculation – the state of Massachusetts conducted a study in 2019 concluding that the greatest threat to the Town's shellfish industry is the encroachment of the black mayonnaise from Area 2 onto the shellfish beds in other parts of the harbor.

Please accept this letter in support of the Town of Wellfleet's application for maintenance dredging in the area identified as the South Anchorage, also known as Area 2.

The Public Notice issued on August 24, 2021 indicates that all factors which may be relevant to the proposal will be considered, including, among other things, economics, general environmental concerns, fish and wildlife values, navigation, recreation, water quality, safety, food production and the general needs and welfare of the people. In that spirit, we hope the agency will take a holistic view of the Town's application. If the agency does so, it will be clear that the Town's proposed dredging project will improve navigation, enhance public safety, support the Town's economy, protect the federal navigation channel from needless and preventable siltation and rid the basin of a substance that threatens shellfish farming operations in the vicinity.

One of the primary reasons the Town is seeking to dredge the mooring field in Wellfleet Harbor is because the area is inaccessible for six to eight hours every day during each low tide, which affects life and safety and the economy. With respect to life and safety, Wellfleet's Harbormaster is an integral part of the Cape and Islands Maritime Response System (CCIMRS) with responsibility for search and rescue, to prevent loss of life at sea and to protect the maritime environment for Wellfleet Harbor and Cape Cod Bay. Presently the Harbormaster is unable to offer full protection to the thousands of boaters who use Wellfleet and surrounding waters because of the inaccessibility of the harbor. This inaccessibility also affects Wellfleet's federal designation as a harbor of refuge for other ships in distress.

Inability to access the harbor also impacts the entire Outer Cape economy – Wellfleet Harbor is the economic engine for the Town of Wellfleet and serves as a regional hub for tourism and commerce. Recent economic studies document a direct loss annually of \$5 million to \$8 million in commerce along with hundreds of jobs if Area 2 is not dredged. This includes impacts on the shellfishing industry, which generates over \$15 million annually in direct sales and supports over 200 jobs in Wellfleet. Approximately 15 percent of the population – and more importantly, 25 percent of working age people in Wellfleet – rely on shellfishing for their livelihoods.

The Town of Wellfleet fully supports the Wellfleet Harbor Dredging Project, as further evidenced by the significant Town funds that have been approved to implement this much needed project. Altogether, dredging Area 1 and Area 2 represent a combined non-federal investment of nearly \$20 million, including \$13 million to dredge Area 2. Altogether, the Town has set aside \$7.5 million for dredging (including \$1.7 million already incurred), which is complimented by \$2.5 million in funding from the State of Massachusetts. The balance of funding is coming from other non-federal sources.

As detailed above, Area 2 dredging is vital to public safety, the shellfish industry, the Town's economy and the health of the harbor. The Town of Wellfleet has diligently performed all the tasks required by the regulatory agencies and the various oversight committees necessary to receive the permits to dredge Area 2. Dredging this area is critically important to the Town and region, and the failure to dredge will severely impact the life and safety and economic factors that have provided citizens a means of maintaining a positive livelihood for over one hundred years.

Wellfleet Harbor Dredging is comprised of three distinct components: 1) the federal navigation channel; 2) Area 1, which is comprised of the North and South Access Channels, the North Anchorage, and the L-Pier Access Channel; and Area 2, which is comprised of the South Anchorage. Dredging of the federal channel was completed in November 2020 with a federal investment of \$5 million. Upon completion of the dredging of the federal project, the Town of Wellfleet initiated work in Area 1 – the Town performed some dredging work in the vicinity of the L-pier, in December 2020 and will be dredging the remainder of Area 1 beginning October 1, 2021 through December 31, 2021. Pending receipt of necessary permits, Area 2 dredging is scheduled to begin October 1, 2022 and run through December 31, 2022.

The three components of the overall Wellfleet Harbor Dredging project work as a system — all three projects need to be completed in order to maximize efficient use of Wellfleet Harbor. Failure to complete dredging of Area 2 in a timely manner undermines use of the Harbor and will negatively impact use of the federal channel and Area 1. For the reasons described below, we are concerned the suggestion of unnecessary and burdensome mitigation requirements could prevent the Town from moving forward with this important project. Failure to dredge this area will negatively affect public access of the mooring field and likely cause harm to shellfish operations located in Wellfleet harbor, which would significantly affect the regional economy. That is to say nothing of the threat that failure to dredge this area poses on the agency's own assets — the Corps invested \$5 million to dredge the federal channel just last year in 2020.

The shellfishing areas adjacent to Area 2 contain some of the most productive shellfish beds in Wellfleet Harbor, providing important winter wild shellfish harvesting for the Town's commercial and recreational permit holders. In a letter that National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS) sent to the New England District of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) on June 16, 2017, NMFS suggested that bordering aquaculture

operations could be negatively impacted by siltation associated with dredging activity and recommended the Town coordinate with local shellfish grant owners prior to dredging to minimize potential impacts to these operations. The Town has conducted this outreach to local shellfish grant owners, and what Town leaders were told should be instructive to USACE. Not only do local shellfish grant owners say that Area 2 is inappropriate for shellfish farming, but they are also of the belief that dredging Area 2 will not disturb their oyster beds. To the contrary, local shellfish farmers are very concerned that the material that has filled in Area 2 could harm shellfish beds adjacent to the mooring field.

On that last point, it should be noted that the material the Town is seeking to remove from Area 2 is a combination of particulates, sediment and decaying vegetation that locals refer to as "black mayonnaise". While this material is organic in nature, it is inhospitable to shellfish. Oysters simply disappear into the morass and quahogs and soft-shell clams are unable to achieve an anchorage to orient themselves and siphon up, which is necessary for both respiration and feeding. It should not be a surprise that the shellfish constable has affirmatively stated there are no shellfish beds within Area 2 – shellfish simply can't survive here, and if the Town is unable to dredge Area 2, the same conditions could migrate to other areas of Wellfleet Harbor. This is not speculation – the state of Massachusetts conducted a study in 2019 concluding that the greatest threat to the Town's shellfish industry is the encroachment of the black mayonnaise from Area 2 onto the shellfish beds in other parts of the harbor.

In May of 2020, the Center for Coastal Studies with funding from the Town of Wellfleet Natural Resources Advisory Board, conducted a study of the Wellfleet Harbor sediments. The goal of the study was to better characterize the nature, density, and movement of the sediments. The study found that the material in the harbor, called "black custard" for the purposes of this study was 70% silt and 30% organic material. This material is present predominantly in the Harbor and was not found in a sample taken downstream of the Chequessett Neck dike. Sampling and sonar studies indicate that the material is present to a depth of 8 - 12 ft. The organic material present is derived from marine sources. Deposition of fine- grained sediment in the study area is likely a product of slowing tidal currents that arise from a decrease in depth and a process known as flocculation, where fine-grained sediment comes together and falls out of suspension to be deposited in the harbor. While conducting this study a biological assessment of the samples was also conducted. The Samples 1, 2 and 4 (Area1) showed a paucity of individuals and low species diversity. Sample 3 (Area 1) did show a high number of individuals and some species diversity (6 identified species) although approximately 85% of individuals found were mud worms. In comparison the control sample taken outside the harbor near the Chequessett Neck dike yielded 60 individuals and showed a much higher diversity (10 species). This result is similar to the 2018 biological survey conducted in Area 2 which showed very low species diversity and few individuals per sample.

Consistent with this reality, the Town's Engineering Consultants have completed all the studies required by USACE and concluded that this area has minimal environmental value and that no harm would result from the dredging of Area 2. We believe that closer inspection of this data by USACE would not only bear this out, but also show that failure to dredge poses a bigger threat and that the failure to remove the material that has filled in Area 2 would be very harmful to the local environment and local shellfish farming operations. This conclusion would be consistent with the views held by the State of Massachusetts, which has issued all state-level permits needed to complete this project and concluded that no mitigation is necessary.

Furthermore, failure to dredge Area 2 in a timely manner could cause siltation in the federal channel, which is located adjacent to the mooring field. This would be hugely unfortunate, given that the US Army Corps of Engineers spent \$5 million to dredge this federal asset in FY20. Similarly, the part of the mooring field referred to as Area 1 has received permits and is scheduled to be dredged starting on October 1, 2021. The Town's engineers have warned that after Area 1 is dredged it will rapidly fill in with material from Area 2 if that part of the mooring field is not dredged soon thereafter. Failure to dredge Area 2 would result in a massive waste of local investment, which would be on top of an unnecessary and avoidable risk to the investment made here by the federal government.

Potential Mitigation

It is important to note that the Town has few good mitigation options. Most of the land within Wellfleet is protected land – approximately 70% of the land is located within the Cape Cod National Seashore. In addition to the Cape Cod National Seashore, which protects about 70% of the land, Wellfleet actively supports the Wellfleet Bay Wildlife Sanctuary (WBWS) of Mass Audubon. WBWS protects over 1,000 acres of land and provides nature education programs. Much of the WBWS land is in South Wellfleet and is on, or near, the shoreline. The Town also supports the Wellfleet Conservation Trust (WCT), and the Town's Open Space program under the direction of the Conservation Commission and the Open Space Committee. This leaves a relatively small amount of land available for new mitigation projects. (Please see the attached map of "Wellfleet Conservation Lands and Open Space". This map is available on WCT's website and can be magnified for more detailed examination.

Nonetheless, the Town of Wellfleet continues to be exceptionally pro-active with respect to conservation measures and expenditures. While this pro-active approach to environmental protection is part of the Town ethos, the unintended consequence is that there are few new opportunities available to satisfy mandatory mitigation requirements.

With that being said, there are a number of current projects moving forward in furtherance of the Town's stewardship and resource management that we believe could be utilized for mitigation purposes if the agency insists on requiring mitigation for the dredging project.

Below is a listing of recent and current projects in furtherance of the Town's stewardship and resource management.

Herring River Restoration Project

The Herring River Restoration Project is a long term, complicated project involving many federal agencies, Town departments and committees, citizen advisory groups, and private landowners. The goal of the Herring River Restoration Project is to restore a healthy, functioning tidal marsh within the Herring River flood plain by re-establishing tidal exchange in the river basin and its sub-basins. Tidal exchange will be increased incrementally over time using an adaptive management approach to achieve desired conditions for native estuarine habitats. The Friends of the Herring River primarily support the Cape Cod National Seashore in its efforts to facilitate the restoration project. The Friends are supporting the process of securing the necessary permits to replace the Herring River bridge as well as supporting all of the monitoring projects being performed by the CCNS.

An essential feature of the project is to replace the Chequessett Neck Dike with a bridge and control structure to allow managed increases in tidal flow. Other restrictions to tidal flow will be removed or modified and flood protection measures will be taken to protect private property. The extensive time required to implement such a complex, multistakeholder projects is testimony to Wellfleet's commitment and persistence in developing conservation measures.

HDYLTA Trust

In October of 2019, The Town of Wellfleet, at a cost of \$2 million, acquired 168 acres (calculated at mean low water mark) of Land Under Ocean / Tidal Flats. This area includes 56.06 acres already under use for shellfish grants with an additional 4 acres to be allotted to a grant expansion area. The current shellfish grants provide both economic benefit to the Town, and environmental benefit through the active water filtration of the shellfish. The rest of the purchased area includes Coastal Beach, Salt Marsh and Open Water resources. A significant portion of the site consists of Tidal Flats. (See attached Survey and MA OLIVER Mapping) The Town would seek to preserve the portion of this land not set aside for shellfish grants, and this portion would be kept in a town restriction. This means that approximately 100 acres of land, with a significant portion being intertidal, would remain undeveloped.

Wellfleet Conservation Trust

In August 2020, 18.5 acres overlooking the Herring River Estuary, were gifted to the Wellfleet Conservation Trust.

The Town of Wellfleet is planning, at an upcoming Town Meeting, to request that the following parcels be transferred to the Conservation Commission for the purpose of open space conservation.

Map 30-Parcel 186 is a 2.06 acres of wetlands marsh property in Blackfish Creek abutting conservation lands owned by the Wellfleet Conservation Trust and Mass Audubon Society.

Map 42 – Parcel 137 is 3.26 acres of wetlands marsh that abuts the Town owned Bayberry Hill Conservation Land and Trail property off Lt. Island Road.

Reactive Protective Barrier

At the June 2021 Wellfleet Annual Town meeting, voters approved \$50,000 for an engineering & hydrogeological assessment for a Permeable Reactive Barrier at 117 & 111 East Commercial Street.

Pre-restoration Assessment of Spat Settlement in the Herring River Estuary

The planned restoration of natural tidal flow into Wellfleet's Herring River is projected to restore habitats for many estuarine animals, including economically and recreationally important shellfish. This study monitors spat settlement in four locations within the Herring River Estuary and will compare the results to a reference location within Wellfleet Harbor. The study is in progress and is expected to be complete in 2022.

Wellfleet Mitigation Efforts regarding Water Quality, Rare and Endangered Species and Habitat Restoration

Harbor dredge spoils have been tested and contain a large amount of nitrogen. So called benthic recycling of nitrogen is a known enhancement of eutrophication in sensitive waters. Wellfleet Harbor is both a nitrogen sensitive area and listed as an "Area of Critical Concern". Removal of these anoxic sediments, especially in the inner harbor will significantly reduce nitrogen, providing both nitrogen credits under the "208" program and significant long term improvements in water quality. The improvement of bottom structure by the removal of anoxic sediments will also provide an opportunity for missing bottom species to re-populate providing a much healthier ecosystem in addition to removing the threat of overrunning adjacent oyster and clam beds that could be lost.

Through a combination of efforts among the Wellfleet Clean Water Advisory Committee, which is responsible for the Town's EPA 208 nitrogen mitigation plan, Wellfleet Conservation Commission, Wellfleet Natural Resources Advisory Board, Wellfleet Health and Conservation Department and Wellfleet Department of Public Works, there are several mitigation projects on-going in the inner Wellfleet Harbor

which directly address conservation issues and aim to also reduce the long term need for dredging in the inner harbor. Collectively, these projects will cost several million dollars over the next five years and have a profound impact on water quality health as well as rare and endangered species. Projects that have a direct nexus to the area of dredging in Wellfleet Harbor are discussed below. These projects are separate from the Herring River Restoration which is estimated at \$75 million and aims to restore 1,100 acres of degraded marsh back to healthy salt marsh.

Salt Marsh Restoration:

Salt marshes are well documented as natural treatment systems providing significant water quality and ecological benefits. Salt marsh restoration includes restoring degraded or impaired marsh to natural brackish flow which restores the natural salt vegetation and marine species that revive ecological functions that reduce nutrient levels and increase species diversity. The Town of Wellfleet has identified numerous potential restoration projects that will restore large areas of salt marsh. These include Herring River, Mayo Creek and others. Most of these projects are intended to restore tidal flow into areas that have been historically blocked by water control structures such as dams, dikes, clapper valves, culverts, etc.

Three habitat restoration projects that are underway in Wellfleet (Mayo Creek, Herring River, and Hawes Pond) will likely result in significant water quality and habitat improvements and are estimated at over 1,200 acres. However, these projects are very site-specific and the resulting nitrogen reductions are difficult to estimate. The Cape Cod Commission's MVP tool estimates a reduction of 317 kg/year for Mayo Creek restoration, potentially 25% of the target for the Duck Creek area. Their corresponding nitrogen reduction credits be established through monitoring as part of the adaptive management program. Mayo Creek funding was approved at the June 2021 Town Meeting and the other projects are on-going and approved by the Wellfleet Board of Selectman and supported by the respective committees, Town Departments and staff.

Mayo Creek

According to the Mayo Creek Restoration Committee final report to the Board of Selectmen June 2019: "The Mayo Creek estuary formed thousands of years ago behind the Mayo Beach barrier spit, and is bordered on three sides by hills: Summit Hill, Taylor Farm and the ridge along Holbrook Avenue. The original tidelands covered about 60 acres.

Tides and seawater were blocked from this back-barrier salt marsh in 1909 when, the Town replaced a bridge across the original 100-foot-wide inlet with a solid-fill dike. This dike currently serves as a causeway connecting Commercial Street with the Wellfleet Marina and Kendrick Avenue. The only opening for water passage through the dike is a two-foot-diameter culvert intended to allow freshwater drainage to the harbor; a one-way valve at the seaward end of this culvert prevents nearly all saltwater inflow to the

Mayo Creek estuary. About 15 acres of the original tidelands were filled with harbor dredged material in the early to mid-20th century.

Restoration has been approved and funded by Town Meeting and is anticipated to include road improvements and the installation of a self-regulating tide gate to protect upland properties. The new tide gate will allow for an increase in tide range and periods of free flow between the harbor and the upstream wetlands to allow recovery of the salt marsh and increased habitat for rare and endangered species.

Hawes Pond

From a report prepared by VHB Consulting for Mass DOT: "Hawes Pond is an approximately 0.7 acre pond that is connected to Duck Creek, a tributary that flows through a saltmarsh into Wellfleet Harbor. A shallow 550-foot channel and 145-foot culvert beneath Main Street connects Hawes Pond to Duck Creek." Due to a failed tide gate, "The water has become stagnant and the Pond's salinity has been reduced." Hawes Pond is considered an emergency priority by the Wellfleet Conservation Commission and they relayed this to Mass DOT through a series of planning meetings among the stakeholders. The salt marsh is dying and due to the blocked tide gate, one of the remaining highly productive eel runs in Wellfleet is at risk of complete collapse. This habitat is also an important Diamond Terrapin Turtle spawning area.

This area is directly connected to the Inner Harbor Basin through Duck Creek which empties at the Marina Basin. The Wellfleet Clean Water Advisory Committee has documented this area as the most difficult and with the highest nitrogen loads to be remediated in Wellfleet Harbor and lists Hawes Pond on its project list for nutrient remediation.

DOT has recommended the installation of a self-regulating tide gate at an estimated cost of \$150,000 as the best solution for this area and it is included in the Town's draft watershed plan for compliance with EPA 208 requirements.

Shellfish/Aquaculture:

The Town of Wellfleet is a recognized leader in the shellfish industry and has focused on shellfish restoration and aquaculture research over the past several decades. Inherent in this approach is a belief that the marine ecosystem must be restored to enable it to increase filtration and consume phytoplankton (its food source). Excess phytoplankton can result from either large nutrient loads or too little consumption and leads to highly organic muck known as "black custard" (the decay products from excess phytoplankton and marine vegetation) and eutrophication (too little oxygen).

A pilot project conducted by the town, at a site adjacent to the Town Pier, in conjunction with University of Massachusetts and the Center for Coastal Studies reported over a 70% reduction in concentrations of nitrogen and over 90% reduction in chlorophyll (which is an indicator for phytoplankton). Recent updates to the Cape Cod Commission's Technology Matrix indicate a range of potential nitrogen mitigation

associated with shellfish and aquaculture ranging from 52 – 300 kg/acre-year for these projects depending upon the density of shellfish. Moreover, a recent analysis from the Center for Coastal Studies on the make-up of black custard indicated no human component and 85% phytoplankton and 15% marine vegetation, meaning ecosystem restoration will be critical as a solution for Wellfleet to reduce the accumulation of so called "black custard" which is the major re-siltation material in the dredged areas.

Expansion of this effort adjacent to the boat slips, and in the vicinity of the Town Pier is similar to efforts advanced in places like Virginia, Florida and Texas for reduction in these materials that fill the harbor and will require future dredging. At the same time these improve water clarity and substantially increase species diversity. The original project site saw a dramatic increase in diamond back terrapin use and in a report to the Clean Water Advisory Committee, showed a very large increase in speciation.

We look forward to a timely and favorable resolution of the mitigation issue. If necessary, we are available to meet and discuss the above items in further detail at your convenience.





Please accept this letter in support of the Town of Wellfleet's application for maintenance dredging in the area identified as the South Anchorage, also known as Area 2.

The Public Notice issued on August 24, 2021 indicates that all factors which may be relevant to the proposal will be considered, including, among other things, economics, general environmental concerns, fish and wildlife values, navigation, recreation, water quality, safety, food production and the general needs and welfare of the people. In that spirit, we hope the agency will take a holistic view of the Town's application. If the agency does so, it will be clear that the Town's proposed dredging project will improve navigation, enhance public safety, support the Town's economy, protect the federal navigation channel from needless and preventable siltation and rid the basin of a substance that threatens shellfish farming operations in the vicinity.

One of the primary reasons the Town is seeking to dredge the mooring field in Wellfleet Harbor is because the area is inaccessible for six to eight hours every day during each low tide, which affects life and safety and the economy. With respect to life and safety, Wellfleet's Harbormaster is an integral part of the Cape and Islands Maritime Response System (CCIMRS) with responsibility for search and rescue, to prevent loss of life at sea and to protect the maritime environment for Wellfleet Harbor and Cape Cod Bay. Presently the Harbormaster is unable to offer full protection to the thousands of boaters who use Wellfleet and surrounding waters because of the inaccessibility of the harbor. This inaccessibility also affects Wellfleet's federal designation as a harbor of refuge for other ships in distress.

Inability to access the harbor also impacts the entire Outer Cape economy – Wellfleet Harbor is the economic engine for the Town of Wellfleet and serves as a regional hub for tourism and commerce. Recent economic studies document a direct loss annually of \$5 million to \$8 million in commerce along with hundreds of jobs if Area 2 is not dredged. This includes impacts on the shellfishing industry, which generates over \$15 million annually in direct sales and supports over 200 jobs in Wellfleet. Approximately 15 percent of the population – and more importantly, 25 percent of working age people in Wellfleet – rely on shellfishing for their livelihoods.

Failure to dredge Area 2 would result in a massive waste of local investment, which would be on top of an unnecessary and avoidable risk to the investment made here by the federal government.

The Town of Wellfleet fully supports the Wellfleet Harbor Dredging Project, as further evidenced by the significant Town funds that have been approved to implement this much needed project. Altogether, dredging Area 1 and Area 2 represent a combined non-federal investment of nearly \$20 million, including \$13 million to dredge Area 2. Altogether, the Town has set aside \$7.5 million for dredging (including \$1.7 million already incurred), which is complimented by \$2.5 million in funding from the State of Massachusetts. The balance of funding is coming from other non-federal sources.

As detailed above, Area 2 dredging is vital to public safety, the shellfish industry, the Town's economy and the health of the harbor. The Town of Wellfleet has diligently performed all the tasks required by the regulatory agencies and the various oversight committees necessary to receive the permits to dredge Area 2. Dredging this area is critically important to the Town and region, and the failure to dredge will severely impact the life and safety and economic factors that have provided citizens a means of maintaining a positive livelihood for over one hundred years.

Thank you for your letter dated September 20, 2021 that was submitted on behalf of the Town of Wellfleet which contains mitigation approaches for the proposed South Anchorage (Area 2) dredging project in Wellfleet, Massachusetts. In the September 20, 2021 letter you have presented two preservation proposals that could provide compensatory mitigation to offset unavoidable impacts associated with your project. The preservation project associated with the HDYLTA and the preservation project associated with the Wellfleet Conservation Trust may have the potential to provide compensatory mitigation. Prior to the Corps making an official determination on the merit of the proposed mitigation additional information will be required.

In accordance with 33 CFR 332, Compensatory Mitigation for Losses of Aquatic Resources (Federal Register April 10, 2008, effective June 9, 2008) please provide a complete draft mitigation plan and address how the proposed project meets each requirement for preservation (33 CFR 332.3(h)(1)). For a draft mitigation plan to be considered complete it must include and address all 12 components of a mitigation plan ((33CFR 332(c)(2)-(14)). If the 12 components are not thoroughly addressed the application will be deemed incomplete. Attached you will find a letter describing the 12 components to guide your application. In addition to the letter, please utilize the New England District Compensatory Mitigation Procedures for more information about the 12 components

(<u>https://www.nae.usace.army.mil/Portals/74/docs/regulatory/Mitigation/Compensatory-Mitigation-SOP-2020.pdf</u>).

For the proposed mitigation project, the following requirements must be met (33 CFR 332.3(h)(1)) before the Corps can consider preservation:

- The resources to be reserved provide important physical, chemical, or biological functions for the watershed;
- The resources to be preserved contribute significantly to the ecological sustainability of the watershed;
- The resources are under threat of destruction or adverse modification:

• The preserved site will be permanently protected through an appropriate real estate instrument (e.g., easement, title transfer to state resource agency or land trust).

As part of the complete mitigation plan, long-term management must be thoroughly documented and established prior to any permit decision. I have included an example long-term management plan. The proposed preservation parcels must have long-term protection through a real estate instrument such as a conservation easement. A third party, such as a non-profit conservation organization, land trust, state or federal entity will hold the conservation easement to oversee long-term management of the property. Please check with the State of Massachusetts Division of Ecological Restoration to see if your preservation proposal is eligible and consistent with Article 97 of the state constitution, as they may be able assist with the long-term management.

Depending on the aquatic resource function of the two proposed preservation projects, additional mitigation measures may be needed. An initial estimate of the proposed mitigation projects indicates that 118.5 acres of intertidal land would be preserved. This mitigation may generate an estimated 5.925 mitigation credits. Based on the best available information, the proposed dredging of 23.851 acres of mudflats would require the generation of 7.16 mitigation credits to offset impacts. Therefore, a minimum of 1.235 mitigation credits are currently required in addition to the proposed mitigation. To meet the compensatory mitigation requirements, you may: reduce the overall dredge footprint by approximately 4.12 acres; or purchase the remaining credits from the Massachusetts Department of Fish and Game In-Lie Fee Program; or provide another permittee responsible mitigation not included in the September 20, 2021 mitigation proposals.

 - i. Monitoring Methods: In general, compensatory mitigation monitoring methods should include quantitative sampling methods following established, scientific protocols. Sampling documentation, as part of monitoring reports, should include maps and coordinates (also shapefiles, if available) showing locations of sampling

Stream mitigation Projects with in-channel modifications, high levels of complexity and scale shall provide As-Built surveys that include at minimum the following information: photo documentation at all cross-sections and structures, a plan view survey, a longitudinal profile, and vegetation information (type, number and location of species planted).

As-Built Plan surveys for wetland mitigation projects shall be completed immediately following the completion of construction to document post-construction conditions. Projects provide As-Built Plan surveys that include the following: photo documentation at permanent documented photo points with bearing and azimuth, a plan view diagram, baseline location and in-situ soil profile descriptions at well locations, and vegetation information (type, number of species planted). Also, any special permit condition relating to signage or Deed Restriction should be submitted. These projects shall also provide location data including coordinates and shapefiles, if available, of all monitoring activities (permanent vegetation plots, wells, piezometers, pressure transducer gages, surface water gauges, crest gauges, stream cross-sections, bank pins, water quality and aquatic biota sampling points, etc.).]

- J. Long-Term Management Plan: [Provide a description of how the mitigation project will be managed after Performance Standards have been achieved to ensure the long-term sustainability of the resource, including long-term financing mechanisms and the party responsible for Long-Term Management. II. Introduction

The purpose of this management plan is to ensure that the property is managed and maintained in perpetuity in the Mitigation Plan referenced in Corps Permit Number [Corps permit number].

V. Management Vision & Goals

Routine monitoring and minor maintenance tasks are intended to assure the viability of the site in perpetuity. Those who are chosen to carry out monitoring activities will have the knowledge, training, and experience to accomplish monitoring responsibilities. An objective of this long-term management plan is to conduct regular monitoring to identify any issues that arise, and use adaptive management to determine what actions might be appropriate. Adaptive management means an approach to natural resource management which incorporates changes to management practices, including corrective actions as determined to be appropriate. Adaptive management includes those activities necessary to address the effects of climate change, fire, flood, or other natural events. Before considering any adaptive management changes to the long-term management plan, the Long Term Steward will consider whether such actions will help ensure the continued viability of site's biological resources and conservation values.

Sample goals: The primary management goal is to preserve the ecological integrity of the various wetlands and other natural resources located on the property while simultaneously providing limited human access to this unique ecological area through a network of pedestrian trails.

OR The preserve shall be forever used, operated and maintained in its current undeveloped and open space condition for the long-term protection of wetlands, conservation of wildlife and other natural resources. Low-impact recreation and nature observation will be allowed.

OR The future condition of the property will be high value, forested wetlands with associated, upland buffers. Long-Term Steward will manage the property as habitat for wildlife and as a recreational/educational resource for the public. No forestry or active wildlife management is planned. The existing woods roads/trails on the property will be maintained for low impact recreation and nature observation

A bulleted list of goals may be included.

To reach these goals, the Long-Term Steward will: (examples)

- Maintain the property in its undeveloped state.
- Maintain the quality of the existing natural resources.
- ➤ Maintain and expand Best Management Practices that limit soil erosion and protect local water quality;
- Provide regulated, passive recreational opportunities where appropriate:
- Protect, maintain, and enhance existing cultural (aesthetic) resources; and
- Facilitate educational opportunities relating to natural resources, natural resource management, and conservation.

A. Permitted Uses: (examples)

2. Hunting & fishing – may be allowed on the site but are not specifically funded or a part of this long-term management plan.

VI. Management Actions

This section includes the actions that need to be taken over time to maintain the site. Subsections may include:

A. Natural Resources

1. Management of wetlands, streams and other natural resources

Objectives: Monitor, conserve and maintain the site's natural resources. Limit any impacts to resources from human use, vehicular travel, invasive species or other adverse impacts

- Action: At least one annual walk-through survey will be conducted to qualitatively monitor the general condition of these habitats. General topographic conditions, hydrology, general vegetation cover and composition, invasive species, erosion, will be noted, evaluated and mapped during a site examination. Notes to be made will include observations of species encountered, water quality, general extent of wetlands and streams, and any occurrences of erosion, structure failure, or invasive or non-native species establishment.
- Action: Establish reference sites for photographs and prepare a site map showing the reference sites for the file. Reference photographs will be taken of the overall site at least every f--- year(s) (no less than five) from the beginning of the long-term management plan, with selected reference photos taken on the ground more frequently, _____ times per year (if applicable).

Special attention should be paid to any area adjacent to or draining into the property from off-site lands. Streams and wetlands should be observed near bank boundaries to observe if increased sediment deposition has occurred. The monitoring report should provide a discussion of any recent changes in the watershed (i.e., subdivision being developed upstream bank).

2. <u>Ecological Monitoring for Threatened/Endangered/Rare/Special Concern Species (If applicable)</u>. The methodology used may vary for different plant and animal species as determined in consultation with the appropriate agencies.

Objectives: Monitor population status and trends. Manage to maintain habitat for

- Action: Monitor status every year by conducting population assessment surveys. The annual survey dates will be selected during the appropriate period as identified by the applicable agencies and will generally occur from _____ through _____ each year. Occupied habitat will be mapped and numbered to allow repeatable data collection over subsequent survey years.
- Action: Visually observe for changes to occupied habitat, such as changed hydrology or vegetation composition. Record any observed changes. Size of population (1 acre, etc.).
- > Action: Implement other actions that enhance or monitor habitat characteristics for

3. Invasive Species, Pests and Pathogens

Note: Given the growing problem with invasive species, an invasive species inventory should be carried out at regular intervals on all sites.

Objectives: Monitor and maintain control over invasive species, pests and pathogens that diminish native natural resources on the site. If invasive species are present, an Invasive Species Control Plan (ISCP) shall be developed and attached to this management plan as an Appendix (see ISCP Template in Appendix).

Action: Mapping of presence of invasive species, pests and pathogens presence shall occur during the first two years of site management, to establish a baseline. Mapping shall be accomplished through use of available technologies, such as GIS, GPS, and aerial photography. Note: Invasives are easier to control if they are located and a control plan is undertaken before they become established. It is recommended that all properties be evaluated for the presence of invasive species, even if none are known to occur on the site!

- Action: Each year's annual walk-through survey (or a supplemental survey) will include a qualitative assessment (e.g., visual estimate of cover) of invasive species and actions taken, in accordance with an Invasive Species Control Plan.
- Action: Actions shall be taken to control invasive species in accordance with the Invasive Species Control Plan in Appendix A.

4. Forest/Vegetation Management (if approved)

Objectives: Adaptively manage vegetation based on site conditions and data acquired through monitoring to maintain biological values. Analyze effects of any authorized forestry, agricultural or field maintenance activities on the wetland, streams, and buffers on the site. If determined appropriate, develop and implement specific vegetation management techniques (e.g., selective thinning) in coordination with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. [Site specific targets for vegetation may be specified here and actions revised or added to achieve those targets].

- Action: If determined appropriate, develop a forest, or other vegetation, management plan for review and approval by the Corps.
- Action: Implement forest/vegetation management techniques.

B. Infrastructure and Facilities, Security and Public Access

1. Gates, Parking, Fences, Signage, and Property Boundaries

Objective: Monitor and maintain condition of gates, parking areas, fences, signage, and property boundaries to prevent casual trespass, allow necessary access, and facilitate management.

Action: During each site visit, record condition of parking areas, gates, fencing, signs, crossings, and property boundaries. Record location and type of any maintenance issues, with actions to be taken for resolution, if applicable. Action: Maintain gates, fences, signs, crossings and property boundary markers as necessary. Repair or replace as necessary, and as funding allows.

2. Roads, Trails and Structures

Objectives: Create/maintain trails to allow public access as necessary and as approved by the Corps. Any construction or maintenance of trails shall be conducted in such a manner as to avoid any disturbance to wetland habitat and buffers or habitat for sensitive species. Monitor and maintain condition of roads, trails and structures to facilitate management, public use, and prevent adverse impacts to wetlands, streams and other resources. Retire unnecessary sections of existing road.

- Action: During each site visit, record condition of roads, trails and structures. Record location and type of any maintenance issues, with actions to be taken for resolution.
- Action: Maintain roads, trails and structures as necessary. Replace as necessary, and as funding allows.

3. Trash and Trespass

Objectives: Monitor sources of trash and trespass. Collect and remove trash, repair vandalized structures, and rectify trespass impacts. Specifically address any ATV issues, existing or potential.

- Action: During each site visit, record occurrences of trash and/or trespass. Record location and type of any trespass issues, with actions to be taken to avoid, minimize, or rectify trash and/or trespass impacts.
- Action: At least once yearly collect and remove as much trash as possible and repair and rectify vandalism and trespass impacts.
- ➤ Action Take appropriate action to address issues of vandalism, trespass, or ATV violations including but not limited to:
 - Outreach to violators

Appendix A

Invasive Species Control Plan (ISCP) Template

General Notes on this template: Invasive species are an ever-increasing issue all across New England. Removal of invasive species when there are very few plants is critical and should be given the highest priority. Most light infestations can be controlled by pulling or digging and this should be done when invasives are found, or immediately after. Larger infestations may require the use of a licensed herbicide applicator.

The New England District of the US Army Corps of Engineers has information on Invasive Species and control on their website. The Invasive Species Plant Atlas of New England includes descriptions, as well as links to management information on other sites. It may also be useful to consult with appropriate state or federal agencies for guidance on what species may threaten the site and or management of those species.



This is a follow up to Assistant Secretary Connor's call with Congressman Keating on December 21, 2021. We agreed to provide a status on the Wellfleet Harbor Dredging Permit.

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, New England District, is working with the town on their plan for the compensatory mitigation required for project impacts to critical habitat. The town provided a list of proposed mitigation options. In October, the District reviewed their proposed mitigation options, identified two that could address the matter and outlined the steps they needed to take to develop a full mitigation plan. The town agreed to work on their plan using the guidance. The District has followed up with the town. As of the last check, December 16, 2021, the District reported the town was still working on the plan. The town expects to finish their proposed plan when the Area 1 dredging ends which was slated for on or about December 31, 2021.

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

While I hear the dredging of area 1 was underway, the outstanding permit did not sound ideal. This is what I've been told.

On October 27, 2021 we sent the applicant (Town of Wellfleet) a letter which outlined the steps they needed to take and the materials they needed to develop a full mitigation plan. We reached out to the applicant again on December 16, 2021. They indicated they were working on the mitigation proposal but were busy with the Area 1 dredging project and would spend more time on the required mitigation proposal after December 31, 2021.

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So our regulatory office explained that the ball has been in the Town's court since October 27, 2021—and three months have passed.

I hope that they are able to provide the necessary mitigation plan very soon. With the continued interest we have not withdrawn the application, but typically we get responses within 30 days from the request.

Hello again.

I think there are two main questions that we would like to discuss. The first is primarily in regards to the HDYLTA property which is the largest of the two areas included in the mitigation letter. This property will continue to be used in part for active shellfishing while the rest will be maintained for preservation but will not be part of a traditional mitigation or restoration project. Being that there is no direct changes to the proposed areas we are unsure how to proceed with a monitoring plan. If we assume that the current conditions are acceptable to meet the mitigation requirements than we would propose no additional action on the site and minimal monitoring. I would be interested to hear the opinion of the USACE on how long and in what capacity they expect the monitoring to continue. Similarly the areas that will become conservation land will not have an active restoration project and will also be used as a preservation of habitat.

I think there are two main questions that we would like to discuss. The first is primarily in regards to the HDYLTA property which is the largest of the two areas included in the mitigation letter. This property will continue to be used in part for active shellfishing while the rest will be maintained for preservation but will not be part of a traditional mitigation or restoration project. Being that there is no direct changes to the proposed areas we are unsure how to proceed with a monitoring plan. If we assume that the current conditions are acceptable to meet the mitigation requirements than we would propose no additional action on the site and minimal monitoring. I would be interested to hear the opinion of the USACE on how long and in what capacity they expect the monitoring to continue. Similarly the areas that will become conservation land will not have an active restoration project and will also be used as a preservation of habitat.

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

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



Hi Andrew,

While I hear the dredging of area 1 was underway, the outstanding permit did not sound ideal. This is what I've been told.

On October 27, 2021 we sent the applicant (Town of Wellfleet) a letter which outlined the steps they needed to take and the materials they needed to develop a full mitigation plan. We reached out to the applicant again on December 16, 2021. They indicated they were working on the mitigation proposal but were busy with the Area 1 dredging project and would spend more time on the required mitigation proposal after December 31, 2021.

We reached out to the permitting consultant/contractor for the applicant on February 1, 2022. The consultant indicated they needed additional input from the town before they can complete a draft mitigation plan for the USACE review. The consultant indicated they would have it sometime in February.

We cannot finish our permit review until they provide the mitigation plan and by regulation we are unable to issue an individual permit without a finalized mitigation plan.

So our regulatory office explained that the ball has been in the Town's court since October 27, 2021—and three months have passed.

I hope that they are able to provide the necessary mitigation plan very soon. With the continued interest we have not withdrawn the application, but typically we get responses within 30 days from the request.

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
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

Transfer of properties needed for the mitigation credits are on the June 11th Town Meeting agenda. A proposed reduction in the credit calculation is in the final stages of preparation and the Town is working on setting up protective covenants for the subject credit sites that will be monitored by third party organizations. We can have another update for you in June after the Town meeting.

The General Contractor shall purchase and maintain such insurance as will protect him from claims under worker's compensation acts and from claims for damages because of bodily injury, including death, and property damage which might arise from and during operations under this contract, whether such operations be by himself or by a Subcontractor or anyone directly or indirectly employed by either of them.

ARTICLE II - DEFINITIONS

Wherever the words defined in this Article or pronouns used in their stead occur in this Contract, they shall have the meanings here given.

- A. The words "Contract Documents" and "the Contract" shall mean this Contract and shall include Notice to Bidders, Information for Bidders, Proposal, Bid Bond, Agreement, Performance and Payment Bond, General Conditions, Special Conditions, Construction Specifications, Drawings, Addenda, Notice of Award, Notice to Proceed, the Change Orders. The Contract Documents represent the entire and integrated agreement between the Owner and the Contractor. The Contract shall not be construed to create any contractual relationship of any kind between the Engineer and the Contractor, but the Engineer shall be entitled to performance of obligations intended for his benefit and to enforcement thereof. Nothing in the Contract Documents shall create any contractual relationship between the Owner or the Engineer and any Subcontractor.
- B. The word "Owner" or "Project Sponsor" or "Awarding Authority," shall mean the Town of Wellfleet, MA.
- C. The word "State" shall mean the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.
- D. The word "Commonwealth" shall mean the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.
- E. The words "Approval of the Owner" or "Approved by the Owner," "Approval of the Engineer" or "Approved by the Engineer," shall mean approval in writing.
- F. The word "Contractor" shall mean the party termed as such by the Agreement, his/her heirs, executors, administrators, successors, or assigns as regards the obligations of the Contract.
- G. "Subcontractor." A person, firm, or corporation supplying labor and materials, or only labor, for work at the site of the project under separate Contract or agreement with the Contractor.

- H. The word "Contract Drawings" or words of like effect shall mean the Drawings listed by that number and title herein.
- I. The words "as permitted," "as required," or words of like effect shall mean that the permission or requirement of the Engineer is intended; the words "approved," "acceptable," "satisfactory," or words of like import shall mean approved by, or acceptable to, or satisfactory to the Engineer and the words "necessary," "suitable," "equal," or words of like import shall mean necessary, suitable, or equal in the opinion of the Engineer.
- J. The Owner is treated as if it were of singular number and neuter gender and the Contractor and the Engineer are treated as if each were of the singular number and masculine gender.
- K. The words "Notice to Proceed" shall mean a written notice to the Contractor of the date on which he is to begin the prosecution of the work for which he has contracted.
- L. Any communication to the Owner shall be addressed to the Town of Wellfleet, MA.
- M. The word "work" shall mean all performance, including the furnishing of materials, labor, tools, equipment and incidentals required of the Contractor under the terms of this Contract, including the transportation of the materials and supplies to or from the location of the project by employees of the Contractor and any subcontractor.

ARTICLE III - INTERPRETATION OF CONTRACT

The Contractor shall at his own proper cost and expense provide and do everything necessary to prepare for and perform everything required under the conditions and requirements of the Contract, and he hereby agrees that the Engineer shall in the first instance be the interpreter of the Contract Documents, and all the work contemplated and described therein shall be so done as to satisfy him that its intent is fulfilled. The Engineer shall promptly render impartial decision on all claims of either party against the other and on all other matters governed by this intent, including questions as to the execution and progress of the work, the quality and types of materials and workmanship, the suitability of methods, and costs and values. The determination and decision of the Engineer shall be final and binding on both parties and shall be a condition precedent to the right of the Contractor to receive any money hereunder, except as to those areas of disputed work covered under ARTICLE XII - DISPUTED WORK, DETERMINATION OR ORDER.

ARTICLE IV - DRAWINGS AND SPECIFICATIONS

The Owner will furnish to the Contractor, at no charge electronic copies of the Contract Drawings, and Contract Specifications. Hard copies of the Contract Drawings and Contract Specifications shall be provided at the Contractor's expense.

The Plans, Drawings, Specifications and other data and documents prepared for use in connection with this Contract are intended to be complementary to each other, but should any discrepancy appear or any misunderstanding arise as to the import of anything contained in them or any of them, except to those areas of disputed work covered by ARTICLE XII - DISPUTED WORK, DETERMINATION OR ORDER the explanation or decisions of the Engineer shall be final and binding on the parties hereto.

Any errors or omissions in Plans, Drawings or Specifications or in other data or documents may be corrected by the Engineer when such correction is necessary for the proper fulfillment of their intention as construed by him, such correction to govern only from the time that the Engineer gives notice in writing thereof to the Contractor.

The Contractor shall not take any advantage or make any claim for damages on account of any omission, discrepancy or error in any soundings, borings, estimates, schedules, specifications, drawings, plans, or other data or documents furnished him, but shall report same to the Engineer as soon as it comes to his knowledge.

ARTICLE V - NOT TO SUBLET OR ASSIGN

The Contractor shall keep the Contract under his control; and shall not assign, by power of attorney or otherwise, any portion of said work, or any moneys payable under the Contract or his claim thereto, unless by the previous approval of the Owner and the Surety. No part of this work shall be sublet except to parties skilled in and equipped properly for the same and satisfactory to the Engineer and approved by the Owner.

ARTICLE VI - INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS

- A. The General Contractor shall purchase and maintain such insurance as will protect him from claims under worker's compensation acts and from claims for damages because of bodily injury, including death, and property damage which might arise from and during operations under this contract, whether such operations be by himself or by a Subcontractor or anyone directly or indirectly employed by either of them.
- B. Contractor shall not commence work under this Contract until he has obtained all insurance required herein nor until such insurance has been approved by the Owner. Contractor shall not allow any Subcontractor to commence work until the insurance required of the Subcontractor has been obtained and approved.
- C. Subcontracts: Contractor shall either (1) require each Subcontractor to procure and to maintain during the life of his Subcontract, Subcontractor General Liability and Property Damage Insurance of same type and in such manner as specified herein, or (2) Insure activities of his Subcontractors on his own policy.

- D. All insurance required by this Document shall be provided by a Best "A+ VIII" rated company, or companies, authorized to do business in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts and satisfactory to the owner and shall be written for not less than any limits of liability specified herein, or required by law, whichever is greater.
- E. Certificates: Certificates of Insurance acceptable to the Owner shall be submitted in triplicate to the Owner simultaneously with the execution of the Contract. Certificates shall indicate that broad form Contractual Liability coverage is in force, as well as deletions of the XCU exclusions. Certificates shall contain a provision that the insurance company will notify the Owner by registered mail at least (60) calendar days in advance of any cancellation, non-renewal, change or expiration of the policies. Certificates shall include description of coverage, effective dates and expiration dates of policies and shall clearly indicate all exclusions (other than standard policy form exclusions contained in the basic policy) which will be added to the policies provided.
- F. Deductibles: In the event of paid claims, Contractor shall bear costs of any amounts deductible.
- G. The Owner shall be named as additional insured under all policies.
- H. Before any blasting is done, Contractor shall present evidence that blasting damage is included in his insurance coverage.

COVERAGE AND LIMITS

A. Workers' Compensation Insurance:

The Contractor shall maintain and cause all subcontractors and lower tier contractors to maintain Workers Compensation and Employers Liability Insurance in accordance with the law and regulations of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. The limits of liability provided shall be as follows:

B. Contractor's Liability Insurance

The Contractor shall purchase and maintain Commercial General Liability Insurance and cause all subcontractors and lower tier contractors to maintain the same throughout the term of the Work. Commercial General Liability Insurance must comply with all applicable broad form endorsements. Such insurance shall be on the 1986 standard insurance Service Office occurrence coverage form (or any later amendments or revisions thereto).

Limits of liability to be provided shall be as follows:

Coverage shall specifically include blanket contractual liability covering Contractor's indemnity obligations as contained in this Document. The Town of Wellfleet, MA must be added as an additional Insured as their interest may appear.

C. Business Automobile Liability:

The Contractor shall maintain and cause all subcontractors and lower tier contractors to maintain business automobile liability insurance covering all owned, non-owned, leased, rented and hired automobiles (symbol 1). The limits of liability shall be as follows:

Bodily Injury and Property Damage: \$1,000,000 per occurrence

Automobile physical damage coverage shall be at the option of the Contractor, all subcontractors and lower tier contractors. The Owner shall not be liable for physical loss or damage to any owned, non-owned, leased, rented or hired automobile.

The Town of Wellfleet, MA must be added as an additional insured as their interest may appear.

D. Umbrella or Excess Liability

Umbrella or Excess Liability shall be provided in excess of the primary limits of liability required above. Coverage shall be at least as broad as provided in the primary coverage required. The limits of liability to be provided shall be as follows:

\$2,000,000 per occurrence Bodily Injury and Property Damage \$2,000,000 per occurrence Personal Injury and Advertising Injury \$2,000,000 General Aggregate \$2,000,000 Products and Completed Operations Aggregate

Coverage shall specifically include blanket contractual liability covering Contractor's indemnity obligations as contained in this Document. The Town of Wellfleet, MA must be added as an additional Insured as their interest may appear.

INDEMNIFICATION

- A. To the fullest extent permitted by Laws and Regulations, and in addition to any other obligations of Contractor under the Contract or otherwise, Contractor shall indemnify and hold harmless Owner and Engineer, and the officers, directors, members, partners, employees, agents, consultants and subcontractors of each and any of them from and against all claims, costs, losses, and damages (including but not limited to all fees and charges of engineers, architects, attorneys, and other professionals and all court or arbitration or other dispute resolution costs) arising out of or relating to the performance of the Work, provided that any such claim, cost, loss, or damage is attributable to bodily injury, sickness, disease, or death, or to injury to or destruction of tangible property (other than the Work itself), including the loss of use resulting therefrom but only to the extent caused by any negligent act or omission of Contractor, any Subcontractor, any Supplier, or any individual or entity directly or indirectly employed by any of them to perform any of the Work or anyone for whose acts any of them may be liable.
- B. In any and all claims against Owner or Engineer or any of their officers, directors, members, partners, employees, agents, consultants, or subcontractors by any employee (or the survivor or personal representative of such employee) of Contractor, any Subcontractor, any Supplier, or any individual or entity directly or indirectly employed by any of them to perform any of the Work, or anyone for whose acts any of them may be liable, the indemnification obligation under Paragraph A shall not be limited in any way by any limitation on the amount or type of damages, compensation, or benefits payable by or for Contractor or any such Subcontractor, Supplier, or other individual or entity under workers' compensation acts, disability benefit acts, or other employee benefit acts.
- C. The indemnification obligations of Contractor under Paragraph A shall not extend to the liability of Engineer and Engineer's officers, directors, members, partners, employees, agents, consultants and subcontractors arising out of:
 - 1. the preparation or approval of, or the failure to prepare or approve maps, Drawings, opinions, reports, surveys, Change Orders, designs, or Specifications; or
 - 2. giving directions or instructions, or failing to give them, if that is the primary cause of the injury or damage.

PERFORMANCE AND PAYMENT BONDS

The Contractor shall provide the Owner with a performance bond and a labor and materials or payment bond executed by a surety company licensed by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

ARTICLE VII - ALTERATIONS OF WORK

- A. The Owner may make alterations in the form or character of any of the work done, or to be done, and in the requirements of the Contract Documents, and the Engineer may order in writing such alterations to be made. Such order shall be by means of a written Change Order, supplemented with drawings when in the opinion of the Engineer it is necessary, which shall include a description of the change with revised specifications, estimated quantities, and prices of the work involved in the alterations made. Each Change Order shall make provisions for revising the time of completion of all work to be done under this Contract or shall state that no revision of time is necessary. All such Change Orders shall be approved in writing by the Owner's Chief Procurement Officer (Town Administrator) and accepted in writing by the Contractor before they become effective. If the Owner and Contractor do not agree on the revised prices of the work involved in the alterations, the work shall be paid for on the cost-plus basis as provided for Extra Work in ARTICLE VIII EXTRA WORK.
- B. All work involved in the alterations shall be made under the terms and as a part of this Contract, and the security for the performance of the Contract shall in no ways be invalidated but shall be held to secure in like manner the performance of the work involved in the alterations made under the Contract.

ARTICLE VIII - EXTRA WORK

- A. For the purpose of this Contract all Change Orders which include extra work shall be referred to as Extra Work Orders.
- B. The Contractor shall do any work in addition to the obligations required under the Contract in the original form of its Contract Documents and not herein otherwise provided for as ordered in writing by the Engineer. Such work shall be termed Extra Work. All orders for Extra Work shall contain particular reference to this Article. Before any work is commenced under any Extra Work Order, the order shall be approved by the Owner's Chief Procurement Officer (Town Administrator) in writing and accepted in writing by the Contractor. It is understood that the Owner may, at its option, have other parties do work in connection with the work to be done under this Contract, which is not within the limits or is not an integral part of the work herein specified, in lieu of having such work done as Extra Work under this Contract.
- C. All requirements of this Contract and its documents shall be applicable to Extra Work. The Contractor shall not receive any compensation for Extra Work, regardless of its nature, unless the work was ordered done in the manner prescribed above. The Contractor waives all rights to claim any compensation for any work done except (a) that provided for payment as stated in the Proposal, (b) alterations of the work as provided for in

ARTICLE VII ALTERATIONS OF WORK, and (c) that provided for as Extra Work ordered done as described in this Article.

- D. All written orders for Extra Work issued by the Engineer shall be accompanied by drawings, if in the opinion of the Engineer drawings are necessary: all orders shall describe the work to be done, shall make provisions for revising the time of completion of all work to be done under this Contract or shall state no revision of time is necessary, and shall prescribe unit prices or the total cost of the Extra Work agreed to by the Owner and Contractor for the work to be done. If the Owner and the Contractor do not agree on unit prices or the total cost of the Extra Work to be done, the orders for Extra Work shall provide for the work to be done on a cost-plus basis, so that the Contractor will receive for full compensation for providing and doing everything required to prepare for and perform everything included in the Extra Work Order the actual cost to him of the following items applicable to the Extra Work Order:
 - 1. All labor directly on the Contractor's payroll at specified rates;
 - 2. Salaries of Contractor's employees stationed at the field office, engaged at shops or on the road in expediting the production or transportation of material;
 - 3. Fees for licenses and permits required particularly for the extra work involved and not required for the work as planned in the original Contract;
 - 4. Minor expenses, such as telephone service, express, and similar petty cash items;
 - 5. Cost of hand tools not owned by the workmen consumed in the prosecution of the work, and depreciation of such tools used but not consumed and which shall remain the property of the Contractor;
 - 6. Cost of moving equipment from and to the Contractor's yard; and
 - 7. Cost of Bonds
- E. To the cost of items 1 to 7, inclusive, there shall be added a fixed fee to be agreed upon but not to exceed 15 percent of the total of items 1 to 7, inclusive. The fee shall be compensation to cover the cost of general supervision, overhead, profit, and other general expenses.
- F. If the work is done by a subcontractor, and the cost is determined on the actual cost basis, there shall be added an additional fixed fee to be agreed upon but not to exceed 5 percent of the total of item 1 to 7, inclusive. This additional fee shall be compensation to cover the General Contractor. In no case shall the combined overhead and profit allowed to the Subcontractor and General Contractor exceed 20 percent.
- G. The Contractor shall furnish to the Engineer an itemized statement of all costs incurred in Extra Work during any calendar month on or about the first of the next following month. All quantities (labor, equipment, etc.) shall be agreed upon on daily basis, in writing, by the Contractor and Engineer.

H. Unless otherwise specifically provided for in the Extra Work Orders, the compensation agreed to, whether unit prices, total cost or the cost-plus basis as described above, includes payment for any damages or expense caused the Contractor by any delays to other work to be done under the Contract resulting from or on account of Extra Work, and the Contractor waives all rights to any compensation for such damage or expense except as may be provided for in the Extra Work Orders.

ARTICLE IX - PAYMENTS

- A. The Owner shall pay and the Contractor shall receive as full compensation for providing and doing everything required to prepare for and perform everything called for by this Contract, and as full compensation also for all loss or damage arising out of the nature of the work under the Contract, or from the action of the elements, or from fire, or from any unforeseen obstructions or difficulties which may be encountered in the prosecution of the said work; also for all expenses incurred by, or in consequence of, the suspension or discontinuance of said work in accordance with the Contract, including all work incidental thereto, the prices stated in the bid Schedule of Prices, or the prices revised, if such are revised as provided for in ARTICLE VII ALTERATIONS OF WORK, and also the cost of Extra Work authorized under ARTICLE VIII EXTRA WORK.
- B. It is understood and agreed that the Contractor shall receive payment in accordance with the Schedule indicated under the lump sum item.
- C. A retainage of 5 percent of the total amount of work invoiced shall be retained by the Town until the construction work has been completed to the approval of the Engineer. The full Contract price shall be paid to the Contractor only after completion of all work to be done and final acceptance has been given by the Owner and Engineer in writing.

ARTICLE X - GUARANTEE

- A. The Contractor guarantees that the work and services to be performed under the Contract, and all workmanship, materials and equipment performed, furnished, used or installed in the construction of the same, shall be free from defects and flaws, and shall be performed and furnished in strict accordance with the Drawings, Specifications and other Contract Documents, that the strength of all parts of all manufactured equipment shall be adequate and as specified and that the performance test requirements of the Contract shall be fulfilled. This guarantee shall be for a period of one year from and after the date of completion which date of completion shall be determined under the provisions of ARTICLE IX PAYMENTS herein. If part of the work is accepted in accordance with the Special Conditions, the guarantee for that part of the work shall be for a period of one year from the date fixed for such acceptance. Said guarantees are in addition to any other guarantees provided by law or otherwise.
- B. If at any time within the said period of guarantee any part of the work requires repairing, correction or replacement, the Owner may notify the Contractor in writing to make the required repairs, corrections, or replacements. If the Contractor neglects to commence making such repairs, corrections, or replacements to the satisfaction of the Owner within seven (7) days from the date of receipt of such notice or having commenced failed to

prosecute such work with diligence, the Owner may employ other persons to make the same, and all direct and indirect costs of making said repairs, corrections or replacements, including compensation for additional professional services, shall be paid by the Contractor.

ARTICLE XI - RIGHT OF THE OWNER TO TERMINATE CONTRACT

- Α. If the Contractor shall be adjudged bankrupt or if he shall make a general assignment for the benefit of his creditors, or if a receiver shall be appointed of his property, or if the work to be done under this Contract shall be abandoned, or if this Contract or any part thereof shall be sublet without the previous written consent of the Owner, or if the Contract or any claim thereunder shall be assigned by the Contractor otherwise than as herein specified, or if at any time the Engineer shall certify in writing to the Owner that the rate of progress of the work or any part thereof is unsatisfactory or that the work or any part thereof is unnecessarily or unreasonably delayed, or that the Contractor has violated any of the provisions of this Contract, the Owner may notify the Contractor to discontinue all work or any part thereof; and thereupon, the Contractor shall discontinue such work or such part thereof as the Owner may designate and charge the entire expense of so completing the work or part thereof to the Contractor; and for such completion, the Owner for itself or its contractors may take possession of and use or cause to be used in the completion of the work or part thereof any of such materials, machinery, implements and tools of every description as may be found upon the site of the Contractor's operations. The Owner may at its option require the surety or sureties to complete the Contract.
- B. All expenses charged under this Article shall be deducted and paid by the Owner out of any money then due or to become due the Contractor under this Contract or any part thereof; and in such accounting, the Owner shall not be held to obtain the lowest figures for the work of completing the Contract or any part thereof, or for insuring its proper completion, but all sums actually paid therefore shall be charged to the Contractor. In case the expenses so charged are less than the sum which would have been payable under this Contract if the same had been completed by the Contractor, the Contractor shall be entitled to receive the difference, but only for work actually completed by the Contractor. If such expenses shall exceed the said sum, the Contractor shall pay the amount of the excess to the Owner upon completion of the work without further demand being made therefor.

ARTICLE XII - DISPUTED WORK, DETERMINATION OR ORDER

- A. If the Contractor is of the opinion that any work ordered to be done as Contract work by the Engineer is in fact Extra Work and not Contract work, or that any determination or order of the Engineer violates the provisions of this Contract, he must promptly, and before proceeding with such work or complying with the determination or order, notify the Owner and Engineer in writing of his contentions with respect thereto and request a final determination thereon.
- B. If the Owner determines that the work is Contract work and not Extra Work, or that the determination or order complained of is proper, it will direct the Engineer to order the Contractor to proceed and the Contractor must promptly comply. However, in order to

reserve the right to claim compensation for such work or damages resulting from such compliance, the Contractor must, within five days after receiving notice of the Owner's determination, notify the Owner and Engineer in writing that the work is being performed or that the determination is being complied with under protest.

C. If the Contractor fails to so appeal to the Owner and Engineer, or having appealed, should the Contractor fail to notify the Owner and Engineer in writing of his doing the work under protest, the Contractor shall be deemed to have waived any claim for extra compensation or damages. No oral appeals or oral protests shall be deemed as compliance with the provisions of this Article.

ARTICLE XIII - MINORITY PROCUREMENT GOALS

- A. Under Massachusetts Executive Order 237, it is the policy of the Commonwealth to promote the fullest participation of all citizens in resources provided by municipal government. Therefore, the Town of Wellfleet, MA invites the participation of minority and women owned businesses in any and all parts of the contract.
- B. The Town of Wellfleet, MA invites all qualified women and minority owned business firms to respond to bid invitations.

ARTICLE XIV - OSHA 10 TRAINING

All employers must certify at the time of the bid that all employees to be employed at the jobsite have successfully taken an OSHA 10-hour course. Documentation of successful course completion for each employee must be submitted with the first certified payroll report (CPR) on which the employee's name appears. Employers shall attach copies of the OSHA 10-hour cards to the first certified payroll report.

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SECTION 00 80 00 SPECIAL CONDITIONS

1. COMMENCEMENT AND COMPLETION

- a. The Contractor shall commence work within ten (10) calendar days after the dates specified in the Notice to Proceed and shall fully complete the work as herein prescribed no later than **December 31, 2022.**
- b. It is specifically understood that "Completion" as used herein shall mean full and complete dredging and disposal of 100,000 cubic yards including, without limitation, all incidentals. Substantial performance is not completion within the meaning of the contract.

2. LIQUIDATED DAMAGES

- a. Contractor agrees to pay as liquidated damages, the sum of \$0.00 for each consecutive calendar day that the Contractor is in default of completing the work.
- b. It is hereby understood and mutually agreed by and between the Contractor and the Owner that the date of beginning and the time for completion are ESSENTIAL CONDITIONS of this Contract; and it is further mutually understood and agreed that the work embraced in this Contract shall be commenced as stated in the Contract Documents.

3. SHOP DRAWINGS AND CERTIFICATES

- a. The Contractor shall submit so as to avoid delay in its work, or that of any Subcontractor, five copies or electronic files of all shop, detail or working drawings and samples, and certificates required for the work and the Engineer shall review them noting comments. If required, the Contractor shall make corrections and resubmit electronic files or five corrected copies or samples for final review and furnish such other copies as may be needed.
- b. The Engineer's review of such Drawings and/or certificates shall not relieve the Contractor from responsibility/for deviations from the Contract Drawings or Specifications, unless it had in writing called the Engineer's attention to such deviations at the time of submission, and unless the Engineer shall have issued a written waiver of the pertinent Specification, nor shall it relieve him from responsibility for errors of any sort in Shop Drawings.

4. PROTECTION OF WORK AND MATERIALS

The Contractor shall protect all work, equipment and materials from deterioration and damage. All work of whatever kind, which during its progress or before the final acceptance of the work as established by the Engineer's Certificate of Completion may have become damaged from any cause, shall be removed and replaced by good and

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satisfactory work, and at no additional cost to the Owner, both for labor and materials.

5. CHANGED CONDITIONS

- a. If, during the progress of the work, the Contractor or the Owner discovers that the actual sub-surface or latent physical conditions encountered at the site differ substantially or materially from those shown on the plans or indicated in the Contract Documents either the Contractor or the Owner may request an equitable adjustment in the Contract Price of the Contract applying to work affected by the differing site conditions. A request for such an adjustment shall be in writing and shall be delivered by the party making such claim to each other party as soon as possible after such conditions are discovered. Upon receipt of such a claim from a Contractor, or upon its own initiative, the Owner will make an investigation of such physical conditions, and, if they differ substantially or materially from those shown on the plan or indicated in the Contract Documents and are of such a nature as to cause an increase or decrease in the cost of performance of the work or a change in the construction methods required for the performance of the work which results in an increase or decrease in the cost of the work, the Owner will make an equitable adjustment in the Contract Price and the Contract will be modified in writing accordingly.
- b. Any adjustment in compensation and/or any adjustment in Contract time because of any changes resulting from one or more of the conditions described in the foregoing paragraph will be made in accordance with the provisions of ARTICLE VII ALTERATIONS OF WORK contained within the General Conditions.

6. <u>SUPERINTENDENCE</u>, SKILLED LABOR, AND EMPLOYEES

a. The Contractor shall employ qualified personnel for scheduling all materials and equipment to be used in the Project and for preparation of suitable working drawings. The Contractor shall employ a suitable superintendent and foremen to represent him at all the several parts of the work and they shall be present at all times while the work entrusted to them is in progress and shall be informed thoroughly regarding it. The foremen, workers, and others employed by the Contractor shall be skilled and experienced in the particular work which is given them to do.

7. PROTECTION OF UTILITIES

Location and depth of existing utilities are estimated and should not be relied upon by the Contractor. The Contractor shall check and verify the location of all existing utilities, both underground (by test pits or other approved means) and overhead before proceeding to begin the work or to order materials. Excavation, if any, shall be in accordance with Chapter 502 of the Acts of 1980 entitled, "An Act Further Regulating Excavation in Public Ways," which became effective in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts on October 12, 1980, including any amendments thereto, and all other statutes, by-laws,

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rules and regulations of any city, state or federal agency that may be applicable. Any damage to the existing utilities and any other costs arising out of said excavation or by reason thereof shall be the Contractor's sole responsibility.

8. FIRE PROTECTION

The Contractor shall take all necessary precautions to prevent fires adjacent to the work and its buildings and it shall prevent the spread of fires to areas outside the limits of the work. It shall provide adequate facilities for extinguishing fires.

9. USE OF PORTIONS BEFORE ENTIRE COMPLETION OF WORK

The Owner and its duly authorized representative may enter upon and use any portions of the work for the Owner's benefit before final completion of the whole work to be done under this Contract, without any claim by the Contractor for payment for said use, or for any damage for delay caused by such use.

10. MASSACHUSETTS SALES TAX EXEMPTION

Materials for use in the work under this Contract are exempt from the Massachusetts Sales Tax. The Tax Exemption number shall be provided.

11. ANTI-DISCRIMINATION CLAUSE

In connection with the performance of work under this Contract, the Contractor agrees not to discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, color, religious creed, national origin, age or ancestry. The aforesaid provision shall include but not be limited to the following: employment upgrading, demotion or transfer; recruitment or recruitment advertising; layoff or termination; rates of pay or other forms of compensation; conditions or privileges of employment; and selection for training, including apprenticeship. The Contractor agrees to post hereafter in conspicuous places available for employees and applicants for employment, notices to be provided by the Massachusetts Commission Against Discrimination setting forth the provisions of the fair employment practice law of the Commonwealth. The aforesaid provision shall be binding upon all subcontractors, except subcontractors for standard commercial supplies or raw materials.

12. MISPLACED MATERIALS

Should the Contractor during the progress of the work, lose, dump, sink, or misplace any material, plant, machinery, or appliance, which in the opinion of the Engineer or Owner is unsatisfactory, the Contractor shall recover and remove the same with the utmost dispatch. If such material must be removed by the Owner, the cost of such removal may be deducted from any money due the Contractor or may be recovered under its bond.

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13. WAGE RATES

All construction work will be governed by the prevailing Minimum Wage Rages established for this project as determined by the commissioner of the Massachusetts Department of Labor and Industries pursuant to M.G.L.C. 149, Sections 26 and 27, as attached to this Section.

14. CONTRACT AND REFERENCE DRAWINGS

The work shall conform to contract drawings.

SECTION 01 11 00 SUMMARY OF WORK

PART 1 GENERAL

1.1. SCOPE OF WORK

- A. Perform all activities and furnish all labor, materials, equipment, Subcontractor services, and incidentals to implement the Work in accordance with the Contract between the Town of Wellfleet, MA (Town) and the Contractor. The Wellfleet Harbor Dredging Project consists of the dredging, removal, and off-site disposal of sediment from the areas known as Area II or South Mooring Field, adjacent to Federal Channel.
- B. The Town will remove and reinstall all moorings within the dredge footprint.
- C. The Town has retained GEI Consultants, Inc. (GEI) to serve as the engineer of record for the Project (Engineer). GEI will provide input on the review of submittals and Requests for Information (RFIs), and other ancillary services as may be requested by the Town.
- D. All tasks, requirements, deliverables, etc. contained in the Contract Documents are the sole responsibility of the Contractor unless specifically assigned to Others. Project Work to be performed by the Contractor includes, but is not limited to, the following:
 - 1. Prepare and implement a Contractor Health and Safety Plan.
 - 2. Install, operate, and maintain temporary facilities and controls, including:
 - a. Worker health and safety measures.
 - b. Vessel based sanitary facilities.
 - c. Sedimentation controls.
 - 3. Establishing additional survey control points, as necessary.
 - 4. Obtaining all construction-related permits and clearances as required for completion of the Work.
 - 5. Read, understand, and abide by the provisions of all permits and provide coordination and adequate notice as may be required by the regulatory agencies.
 - 6. Perform the Work:
 - a. Identify, temporarily relocate, or protect existing utilities and Site features to remain after the Project is complete.
 - b. Perform monitoring, surveys, and testing as required by the Contract Documents
 - c. Install, maintain, and remove turbidity controls around the work area.
 - d. Site mobilization and demobilization.
 - e. Dredge by mechanical method using an environmental bucket and remove sediment to the limits shown on the contract drawings.

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- f. Removal, segregation, and disposal of debris found within the dredge limits shown. Rock is not considered debris.
- g. Place sediments into scow and transport to the Cape Cod Bay Disposal Site. Certifications, monitoring, and reporting through Dredge Quality Management (DQM) system.
- h. Reinstall all Site features and appurtenances that are damaged or relocated by the Contractor during the performance of the Work.
- 7. Demobilize and promptly remove all contractor supplies, equipment, and tools from the Site after completion of the Work. Restore, repair, or replace utilities, and other features that were removed, damaged, destroyed, or disrupted during construction.
- 8. Provide and perform any other equipment, Work, or submittals required to facilitate items 1 through 7 above and the Work shown on the Contract Drawings.

1.2. PROJECT CONDITIONS

A. Information regarding Site conditions is intended to assist the Contractor in preparing their Bid. The Town and GEI guarantee neither the accuracy of this information nor that this information is necessarily indicative of all conditions that may be encountered, therefore the Contractor agrees that it shall neither have nor assert against the Town or GEI any claim for damages by reasons of inaccuracy, inadequacy, incompleteness, or other deficiency of the information provided. The Contractor shall satisfy/verify for himself all existing conditions, including understanding the site data presented in the Bid Documents, affecting his Work by personal investigation. Failure by the Contractor to understand and verify all existing site conditions shall not result in additional charges to the Town. Also, neither the information provided by GEI, the Town, or their agents or employees, shall act to relieve Contractor of any responsibility hereunder from fulfilling all the terms and requirements of the Contract Documents.

1.3. CONTRACT DOCUMENTS

- A. The Contract Documents include all Specifications, Contract Drawings, figures, and conditions included or referenced in the Request for Proposal package, and any subsequently approved Change Orders.
- B. The organization and division of Work contained within the Contract does not make GEI or the Town representative an arbitrator to establish contract limits between the Contractor and any Subcontractor.

1.4. ORDER OF PRECEDENCE

- A. In the event of a conflict between any of the Contract Documents, the following order of precedence will be applied to determine which document will govern (first document listed being of highest precedence):
 - 1. Agreement.
 - 2. Contract Supplemental Conditions issued by the Town.

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- 3. Contract Drawings.
- 4. Specifications.
- 5. MassDOT Standard Specifications.
- B. Any conflicts discovered within the Contract Documents should be immediately brought to the attention of the Town.

1.5. CONTRACTOR REQUIREMENTS

- A. Perform the scope of Work contained in the Contract Documents.
- B. Comply with the requirements of the Contractor Health and Safety Plan. Take precautions as necessary to protect the public and work force personnel from potential hazards.
- C. For any Work performed in close proximity to residential or commercial properties, utilities, or any other third-party property, take appropriate precautions to protect the property, utility lines, fences, and other structures and/or related appurtenances from damage.
- D. Repair any damage caused directly or indirectly by the Contractor outside the Project limits, as directed by the Town, at no additional cost to the Town.
- E. Comply with all applicable OSHA safety regulations during the performance of the Work.

1.6. CONTRACT DRAWINGS AND SPECIFICATIONS

- A. Maintain at the Site, two (2) copies of all Contract Drawings, Specifications, Addenda, approved Shop Drawings, Change Orders, schedules, and instructions, in good order. Mark one set to record all changes made during construction and keep one set clean of all markings. Make both sets readily available for review by the Harbormaster or other designated agent.
- B. The Contract Drawings include notes. Refer to the Contract Drawings in conjunction with the Specifications.

1.7. WORK BY OTHERS

A. The Town will perform a pre-dredge bathymetric survey prior to work commencing and will perform a post-dredge bathymetric survey at the conclusion of the Work. These surveys will be used for verification of the pre and post dredge surfaces and to determine the final volume, for the purposes of measurement and payment.

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SECTION 01 14 00 WORK RESTRICTIONS

PART 1 GENERAL

1.1. SUMMARY

A. This section contains general restrictions to be followed during the performance of the Work. Other sections of the specification may contain additional requirements/restrictions for the performance of their specific subject matter.

1.2. WORK HOURS

A. Work activities can be conducted 24 hours per day 7 days per a week.

1.3. SCHEDULE

- A. All dredging work must be completed within the time of year restrictions established by the project permits.
- B. Copies of the Project permits have been included as an appendix to the Bid Documents. Example Army Corps of Engineers permit is provided for bidding purposes. Actual permit approval is pending and will be provided as an amendment.
- C. The Work must be completed before the end of the time of year restrictions established in the Project permits.

1.4. MARINE MAMMEL/TURTLE OBSERVER

A. A marine mammal/turtle observer must be provided when performing parts of the Work. Refer to the regulatory approval conditions that have been included in Attachment C for additional details.

1.5. SITE ACCESS

- A. All sediments/debris must be removed from the site via barge.
- B. Debris must be segregated and disposed of at an approved upland facility.
- C. All Work must be performed from the water.
- D. The Contractor may dock a launch at a Town owned facility. Town provided docking space is provided for the convenience of the Contractor only, the Town is not responsible for any delays or injuries incurred via the use of Town owned facilities.
- E. Public parking is available on-site, coordinate location with Harbormaster.

1.6. COMMUNICATION WITH THIRD PARTIES

- A. Representatives of regulatory agencies from the Town, USACE, and other local civic organizations may be on-Site to observe and inspect the Work.
 - 1. Maintain a supply of additional Level D Personal Protective Equipment (except for safety boots) on-Site to provide to regulatory agency personnel, if needed.
- B. Direct any communications received from regulatory agency personnel to the Town.

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C. Do not communicate with the media/press, Project stakeholders, public, etc. regarding the Work. Refer all external questions and comments to the designated Town representative.

1.7. LAY DOWN AND STORAGE AREA

A. The Town will permit the contractor to have a laydown area and temporary facilities by the Contractor on the Town pier for use during construction. The location and size of this area shall be approved by the town. The contractor shall assume a laydown area of approximately 10,000 SF will be available.

1.8. SANITARY FACILITIES

A. Provide sanitary facilities on-board the dredging barge for use by the Contractor personnel, Subcontractors, and visiting agency representatives during the performance of the Work.

1.9. NOISE CONTROL

- A. Comply with all noise ordinances for the Town of Wellfleet during the performance of the Work.
- B. Equip motorized equipment with appropriate noise control devices to maintain noise levels that conform to current OSHA standards and State and local regulations. Take immediate steps to correct any deficiencies noticed, or as directed by the Town.
- C. Properly maintain all mufflers and noise control devices and replace when necessary. Operate all construction equipment in the manner that it was intended. Excessive amount of noise and vibration due to the improper use of equipment, is prohibited.
- D. All equipment that is required to operate beyond standard work hours will, to the maximum extent possible be, electrically driven.

1.10. EQUIPMENT LEFT ON-SITE

- A. Secure all equipment left on-Site outside of standard work hours and remove ignition keys from all equipment.
- B. Ensure that all equipment, where feasible, is de-energized when left on-Site and not in use to prevent electrical/fire/explosive hazards. The Contractor is responsible for the security, operation, and maintenance of any systems that require such services outside standard work hours. If systems are operational outside the standard work hours, provide oversight at all times when equipment is in operation, or provide an electronic monitoring system with a remote communication feature to alert the appropriate personnel of a system failure. Repair system failures in a timely manner such that the Project schedule is not affected.
- C. Any generators running on-Site overnight must be enclosed and/or baffled such that their noise producing levels do not exceed applicable State and local regulations.

3.1. ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION

- A. For the purposes of this specification, environmental protection is defined as the retention of the environment in its natural state to the greatest extent possible during construction. Comply with all applicable or relevant and appropriate, Federal, State, local laws, and permit conditions to provide for the abatement and control of any potential environmental impacts arising from the performance of the Work.
- B. Comply with all project permits and provide notices and other submittals as required by the project permits.
- C. The Town will notify the Contractor of any instances of non-compliance with Federal, State, local laws, or permit conditions and identify corrective actions to be taken. State or local agencies may also provide notification of non-compliance with state or local requirements. After receipt of any notice of non-compliance, the Contractor shall immediately inform the Town of the proposed corrective action and take such actions once they are approved by the Town. Failure or refusal to promptly comply may result in the Town issuing an order suspending or halting all or parts of the Work until satisfactory corrective action has been taken. Claims for extensions of time or for excess costs or damages due to the stop Work order described above, will be denied.
- D. Do not pollute any stream, river, waterway, roadway, or soil with fuel, oil, grease, lubricant, hydraulic fluid, bitumen, calcium chloride, acid, base, or other harmful materials. Comply with the appropriate Federal, State, and local regulations and guidelines for the handling and disposal of any encountered contaminated materials.
- E. Properly dispose of any debris resulting from the performance of the Work. Disposing of any contaminated soil, water, effluent, byproduct, waste, trash, chemical, fuel, oil, grease, lubricant, bitumen, calcium chloride, acid, base, or other harmful material etc., in or adjacent to the Project area is not acceptable. Remove any unauthorized dumped materials and restore the area as directed by the Town. If necessary, areas contaminated because of unauthorized activity, failure of environmental controls, or dumping by the Contractor will be remediated at no additional cost to the Town.
- F. If encountered, dispose of all contaminated materials (debris, soil, water, effluent, by-product, waste, trash, chemical, fuel, oil, grease, lubricant, bitumen, calcium chloride, acid, base, used erosion controls, or other harmful material, etc.) resulting from the Work in accordance with all applicable, or relevant and appropriate, Federal and State laws at a Town approved disposal facility prior to completion of the Work.

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SECTION 01 18 00 UTILITY PROTECTION

PART 1 GENERAL

1.1. SUMMARY

A. This specification contains the requirements for the location and protection of utilities that could potentially be affected by the performance of the Work.

1.2. UTILITY COORDINATION

A. The Contractor is solely responsible for any and all required notifications to utility companies prior to commencing the Work, and for response to any emergencies that may arise during the Work. Certain active and inactive utilities may currently be present at the Site. The exact location and type of utility is to be determined by the Contractor without reliance on information provided by the Town or GEI.

1.3. PROTECTION OF EXISTING UTILITIES

- A. Comply with the requirements of all applicable utility protection laws or regulations.
- B. Contact and cooperate with utility companies to locate all utilities (including pipelines, cables, and other structures) on the Site prior to beginning the Work.
- C. Protect all utilities from damage during construction, unless otherwise indicated to be removed or abandoned. If damaged, repair the utilities as required by the utility's owner at the Contractor's expense.
- D. If a utility is encountered that is not shown on the Contract Drawings, or otherwise not made known to the Contractor prior to beginning the Work, promptly take the necessary steps to assure that the utility is not damaged and notify the Town of the presence of the utility. The Town will review the conditions and determine the extent, if any, to which a change is required in the Contract Documents to reflect and document the consequences of the existence of the utility.
- E. Immediately notify the Town of any incident involving a utility.

1.4. SUBMITTALS

A. If a utility, either known or unknown, is damaged during the performance of the Work submit a written description of the incident to the Town within 48 hours of the incident.

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SECTION 01 20 00 PRICE AND PAYMENT PROCEDURES

PART 1 GENERAL

1.1. SUMMARY

A. This specification contains the requirements for measurement for payment of the Work and descriptions of the pay items.

1.2. PAYMENT TERMS

- A. Payment will not be made unless the proper supporting documentation has been submitted and approved by the Town.
- B. Payment includes full compensation for all required labor, products, tools, equipment, transportation, services, permits, surveys, supervision, testing, incidentals, erection, application, supply, or installation for completion of an item of the Work, including overhead and profit.
- C. Payment will not be made for any of the following:
 - 1. Products wasted or disposed of in a manner that is not acceptable.
 - 2. Products determined unacceptable before or after work.
 - 3. Products not completely unloaded from the transporting vehicle.
 - 4. Products placed or removed beyond the lines and levels of the required Work.
 - 5. Any rejected work.
 - 6. Loading, hauling, and disposing of rejected materials.
 - 7. Products remaining on hand after completion of Work.
 - 8. Additional Work undertaken to expedite Contractor's operations.
 - 9. Repair or replacement of property located within or adjacent to the Work area.
- D. Payment will be made for all Work actually performed during a particular payment period. Payments for lump sum items will be made based on the percent completion of the pay item, upon approval by the Town.

1.3. SUBMITTALS

- A. Submit a Town supplied Project Price Schedule with the Bid that has been signed by a company officer who is authorized to contractually bind the company.
- B. Submit monthly invoices in a format that is acceptable to the Town.

1.4. QUANTITY ESTIMATES

A. For all unit price Work, the Contract price will include an amount equal to the sum of the unit price for each pay item times the estimated quantity of each item as indicated in the Project Price Schedule. The estimated quantities shown on the Project Bid Proposal are

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not guaranteed and are solely for the purpose of comparison of bids and determining an initial Contract price. Quantities and measurements supplied or placed in the Work in accordance with the Specifications and Contract Drawings, and verified by the Town, will determine payment.

- B. The Town will verify the quantities and classifications of unit price Work invoiced by the Contractor. The Town will review their preliminary determination with the Contractor before rendering a decision on an application for payment.
- C. If the actual Work requires more or fewer units than the estimated units indicated on the Bid Proposal, provide the required units at the contracted unit price. Under no circumstances may the Contractor exceed estimated quantities without prior written approval from the Town in the form of a Change Order.
- D. The Town reserves the right to increase (via a Change Order) or decrease any pay item quantity, or to eliminate any pay item, as a result of the actual conditions encountered during the performance of the Work.

1.5. MEASUREMENT OF QUANTITIES

A. Measurement by Weight:

- 1. Weigh Scales: Certified in accordance with applicable laws and regulations for the state in which the scales are located. Certification must be within a period of not more than one year prior to the date of use.
- 2. The term "ton" will mean the short ton consisting of 2,000 pounds.
- 3. For shipments to off-Site disposal facilities, trucks will be weighed at the receiving facility for the purpose of measuring the quantity of Work for payment.

B. Measurement by Volume:

- 1. All volume will be measured as in-place and determined by survey.
- 2. Material dredged and disposed by mechanical method and disposed of at the Cape Cod Bay Disposal Site shall be measured by computing the volume between the bottom surface shown by sounding of the last Owner survey made before dredging and the bottom surface shown by sounding of the final Owner survey made within one week, or as otherwise practicable, after the Work has been completed. No measurement will be made for material dredged from outside the payment limits indicated on the Contract Drawings.
- 3. For applications for progress payments (if made), retain the services of an independent surveyor that is licensed in the State of Massachusetts. To compute in-place volumes, use the surface comparison function in the surveying software program, or other methods acceptable to the Town.
- 4. Unless stipulated otherwise, all pay items that refer to being measured for payment by volume will be interpreted to mean in-place volume.

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C. Measurement by Time:

- 1. Measure by the actual time, rounded to the nearest time unit, and verified by the Harbormaster.
- D. The Town reserves the right to reject measurements for progress payments provided by the Contractors licensed surveyor and have the units re-measured for payment at their own expense by a licensed surveyor under separate Contract to the Town.

1.6. ASSESSMENT OF NON-CONFORMING WORK

- A. Replace Work, or portions of the Work, that do not conform to the requirements of the Specifications and Contract Drawings, as assessed by the Town.
- B. If, in the opinion of the Town, it is not practical to remove and replace the non-conforming Work, the Town will direct one of the following remedies:
 - 1. The non-conforming Work may remain, but the price will be adjusted to a new price at the discretion of the Town.
 - 2. Partially repair non-conforming Work to the instructions of the Town, and the price will be adjusted to a new price at the discretion of the Town.
- C. The individual Specification sections specific to the Work in question may modify these options or may identify a specific formula or percentage price reduction.
- D. The authority of the Town representative to assess non-conforming Work, and identify payment adjustment, is final.

1.7. ELIMINATED ITEMS

- A. If any items contained in the Contract Drawings or Specifications are found unnecessary for the proper completion of the Work, the Town may, upon written order to the Contractor, eliminate such items from the Work, and such action will in no way invalidate the Contract.
- B. The Contractor will be paid for all Work performed and all documented costs incurred, including the mobilization of materials, prior to the elimination of such items.

1.8. MEASUREMENT AND PAYMENT OF BID ITEMS

- A. The Project Bid Proposal lists the pay items for the Work.
- B. At the direction of the Town, the Contractor may be asked to perform additional Work. The unit rate schedule included in the Contractor's proposal will be the basis for measurement and payment of equipment and labor for any additional Work. Include overhead and profit on the Contractor unit rate schedule for all additional Work.
- C. For all pay items, payment to the Contractor for completed Work will constitute full compensation for all labor, supervision, submittal preparation, materials, equipment, incidentals and all other costs necessary to complete the pertinent pay item.
- D. The following paragraphs specify measurement and payment of the pay items listed on the Project Bid Proposal:

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Item 1 Mobilization

- A. Mobilization shall be measured by the Contract Price LUMP SUM and shall be measured once only for the entire Contract. Lump sum shall not exceed the lesser of 15% of total Base Bid price or \$750,000.
- B. Payment to complete Mobilization shall include, but is not limited to:
 - 1. Movement of personnel, equipment, and materials to the Site, if such movement is not included in any other bid item.
 - 2. Participating in preconstruction coordination meetings.
 - 3. Preparation, submittal, and revision (if required) of all pre-mobilization submittals described in Specification Section 01 33 00 Submittal Procedures.
 - 4. Relocation of equipment and remobilization to suit vessel operations.
 - 5. Provide Project management oversite.
 - 6. All office and field engineering and survey support, surveys, supervision, notifications, coordination, reports, and compliance.
 - 7. Participation in preconstruction and periodic project coordination meetings.
 - 8. Preparation, submittals, and revisions (if required) of all submittals.
 - 9. Implement the health and safety requirements specified in the Contract health and safety plan.
 - 10. Install and maintain temporary facilities and controls unless specifically identified as being provided by Others.
 - 11. Site preparation, turbidity controls/curtains, and project clean up.
 - 12. Take any required correction action, as may be directed by the Town, to remediate conditions associated with a failure of the turbidity controls.
 - 13. Installation, operations, maintenance, and removal of the marine signaling equipment.
 - 14. Compliance with all applicable U.S. Coast Guard regulations for the use of temporary signaling equipment, including any required coordination, during the performance of the Work.
 - 15. Demobilization of all personnel, equipment, and materials used to complete the work that is not already included in any other bid item.
 - 16. Restoration of any features or structures that were removed or damaged during the performance of the Work.
 - 17. Removal and lawful disposal of all environmental controls used during the performance of the Work.

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- 18. All other costs for work or activities not included in another pay item, or specifically identified as being the responsibility of Others, not specifically identified but required to complete the work specified.
- 19. Mobilization will be paid Sixty Percent (60%) of the lump sum price upon completion of mobilization to the work site. An additional twenty-five percent (25%) will be paid to the Contractor upon the acceptance of his verification survey. The final fifteen percent (15%) will be paid only after the Contractor has received the written notice from the Town to proceed with final demobilization and has successfully demobilized to the satisfaction of the Town.

Item 2 Dredging & Disposal - Cape Cod Bay Disposal Site

- A. Materials dredged by mechanical methods shall be measured by the CUBIC YARD of the material dredged by computing the volume between the bottom surface shown by sounding of dredge survey. Progress payment, if desired, will require intermediate dredge surveys.
- B. No measurement or payment will be made for materials dredged beyond the payment limit indicated in the Contract Drawings.
- C. No separate measurement or payment will be made for costs in connection with transportation of dredge spoils to the designated offshore disposal site.
- D. Work required to complete Dredging & Disposal Cape Cod Bay Disposal Site includes, but is not limited to:
 - 1. The removal of sediments and debris to the lines and grades shown on the Contract Drawings.
 - 2. The loading of sediments and debris onto barges.
 - 3. Segregating debris from sediments as needed to meet the requirements for use of the approved offshore disposal site.
 - 4. Changeout of dredge buckets, as needed, to remove any debris encountered during the performance of the Work.
 - 5. Transportation of sediment to the approved offshore disposal site.
 - 6. The lawful offloading and disposal of sediment at the Cape Cod Bay Disposal Site
 - 7. All required permits and submittals.
- E. Dredging and Disposal Work will be measured for payment on an in place cubic yard basis, as verified by surveys.

Item 3 – Transportation and Disposal – Debris

- A. Work required to complete the Transportation and Disposal Debris pay item includes, but is not limited to:
 - 1. All labor, equipment, dumpsters, and work associated with the segregation, shipping/hauling of the debris from the project site to the disposal facility

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- 2. Transportation and disposal of debris dredged from the Project Site to a Town-approved disposal facility.
- B. Transportation and Disposal Debris will be measured for payment on a per ton basis, as documented by disposal facility scale weight tickets.

Item 4 - Turbidity Curtains

- A. Turbidity Curtains will be measured for payment on a LINEAR FOOT (LF) basis, based on quantity of material supplied and deployed to maintain turbidity controls. Reuse/relocation is excluded from payment.
- B. Work required for Turbidity Curtains pay item includes, but is not limited to:
 - 1. All labor, equipment, anchoring devices, disposal, and work associated with supplying, deploying, securing, maintaining, and disposing of turbidity curtains.

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SECTION 01 30 00 ADMINISTRATIVE REQUIREMENTS

PART 1 GENERAL

1.1. SUMMARY

A. This Section describes Project administrative requirements; the minimum level of coordination and meetings required to execute the Work and required pre-mobilization submittals.

1.2. ON-SITE CONSTRUCTION PERSONNEL

- A. The Contractor is to maintain a full-time on-Site Superintendent, who will be responsible for quality assurance, Contractor health and safety, and competent person(s) for the duration of the Work. The Superintendent will be responsible for the supervision and/or coordination of all Contractor employees, Subcontractors, manufacturers, fabricators, suppliers, distributors, installers, and testing agencies whose services, materials or equipment are required to ensure the completion of the Work. The Superintendent will have sufficient qualifications, experience, and authority to act as a single point of contact for the on-Site staff, and to make adjustments to the means and methods as needed and as requested by the Town.
- B. The Engineer will make periodic visits to the Site to observe the Work. The Engineer will not direct the Contractor with regard to their means and methods of construction but may identify areas of non-conformance with the Specifications that require redress by the Contractor.

1.3. MEETINGS

- A. Attend all Project meetings as deemed necessary by the Town during the term of the Contract.
- B. A pre-construction meeting will be held at the Site prior to the start of the Work. At a minimum, the Contractor's project manager and Superintendent for the Project will attend the meeting. It is recommended that the Contractor assemble input from primary Subcontractors prior to this meeting.
 - 1. This meeting is intended to make certain that the Work is properly scheduled, responsibilities are coordinated among Subcontractors and suppliers, and that those responsibilities are reflected on the Contractor submittals. Questions concerning any other aspect of the Project may also be addressed.
- C. Beginning with the mobilization to the Site, at a location designated by the Town, the Contractor will facilitate weekly on-site construction meetings among contractor, GEI, Harbormaster and Town Representative for the duration of the Work. Present a progress update at weekly construction meetings that includes tasks completed from the prior week, currently active tasks, and tasks/activities planned for the next two weeks along with an updated Project schedule. The format of the two-week look ahead must be submitted and approved prior to use.

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- D. The standard day and time for the weekly construction meeting will be established based on mutual agreement between all regular participants.
- E. Individuals authorized to discuss and make decisions on behalf of the Contractor, relative to the meeting agenda, must participate in all weekly construction meetings.
- F. All expenses associated with attending the meetings, except those that are incurred by the Town, their representatives, or consultants, are to be borne by the Contractor.

1.4. REQUESTS FOR INFORMATION, CLARIFICATIONS, AND CHANGES

- A. All requests for Project information, clarifications, or changes in the requirements of the Contract Documents must be made in writing to the Town.
- B. Written requests must be provided regardless of any preceding conversations and preliminary decisions regarding the subject matter(s).
- C. At the discretion of the Town, e-mail communications may qualify as "requests made in writing" for the purposes of this provision.
- D. The Town will provide written responses to each request.
- E. The Town may also issue clarifications and/or amendments based on their own assessment of Project needs.
- F. Any potential increases or decreases in Contractor compensation due to amendments will be in accordance with the provisions of the Supplemental Conditions.
- G. If latent or unforeseen conditions require modifications to the Contract, the Contractor must propose changes in the Work by submitting a detailed request to include labor rates, equipment rates, material costs, etc. for a change to the Town.

1.5. RECORDS

A. Maintain copies on-site of all Project correspondence and Project documents generated during the Work.

1.6. PRE-MOBILIZATION SUBMITTALS

- A. All submittals are subject to review and approval by the Town and/or the Engineer. Provide all submittals to the Town who will then forward them onto the appropriate party for review. Submittals will not be approved until the reviewing party has determined that they meet the minimum requirements of these specifications. Claims for lost time or requests for extensions based on rejected pre-mobilization submittals will be denied.
- B. Contractor Health and Safety Plan:
 - 1. Prepare and submit a site-specific Contractor Health and Safety Plan.
 - 2. Refer to Specification Section 01 35 00 for details on what must be included in the Contractor Health and Safety Plan.

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C. Project Schedule:

- 1. Prepare a Critical Path Method (CPM) or bar chart project schedule and provide it to the Town at the first post-award meeting. Update and disseminate the schedule on a weekly basis.
- 2. Contractor must achieve a minimum of 30,000 Cubic Yards per calendar month. If the contractor fails to achieve the specified production rate in any month, the contractor shall implement remedial action immediately and shall submit a written recovery plan within 2 days. The Recovery Plan shall add sufficient resources, equipment, etc. such that the contractor achieves he prescribed cumulative production by end of that month.

D. Pre-Construction Condition Documentation:

- 1. Perform a pre-construction condition documentation of the site to 50 feet beyond the Project limits under the supervision of the Town.
 - a. Submit the findings of the pre-construction condition documentation to the Town prior to mobilization.
 - b. Include video/photographic documentation of the existing conditions of the Site and surrounding structures, including rip rap slopes, floating docks, piers, and building or other structures in-place at the harbor.
 - c. Claims determined to be resulting from pre-existing structural and/or cosmetic damage, not identified during the pre-construction survey, will be the sole responsibility of the Contractor to remedy to the satisfaction of the applicable owner(s).

E. Dredging Plan:

1. Refer to Specification Section 35 20 23 – Dredging by Mechanical Methods for details on the information required to be included in the Contractor supplied Dredging Plan.

F. Turbidity Control Plan:

1. Contractor shall prepare a Turbidity Control Plan indicating means and methods for minimizing turbidity and how permit requirements for turbidity control will be met. Turbidity curtains are required.

G. Schedule of Permits:

- 1. Submit copies of all supplemental and/or recurring data required by the permits to the Town, as needed. Include documentation that the supplemental data was provided to the entity that issued the permit, according to the schedule required by the permit.
- 2. Submit copies of any Contractor obtained permits to the Town.

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1.7. DAILY REPORT

- A. Prepare a daily report summarizing the staff and equipment used and Work performed. The Contractor's internal documentation used for this purpose may fulfill this requirement, subject to approval by the Town. At a minimum, the daily report will include the following additional items:
 - 1. Summary of any safety related issues including a summary of the daily safety meeting and running total of safe hours worked.
 - 2. Approximate dredging rate for the reporting period and a brief description of where the Work was being performed.
 - 3. Approximate disposal rate for the reported period and a brief description of where the Work was being performed.
 - 4. Status of all marine signaling equipment. Note the date and time that any irregularity in the system (e.g., inoperable lights, markers off station, markers removed) is discovered, and the data and time that irregularities are corrected.
 - 5. Status of the turbidity controls. Note any maintenance performed on the systems, unsatisfactory performance observed, and corrective actions taken:
- B. Submit the daily report to the Town by 10 AM of the next calendar day.

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SECTION 01 33 00 SUBMITTAL PROCEDURES

PART 1 GENERAL

1.1. SUMMARY

A. This section summarizes the protocol and procedures for the preparation and delivery of submittals to the Town.

1.2. GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

- A. The Contractor shall review and approve all submittals prior to submittal to the Town.
- B. Provide all submittals in electronic format directly to the Town. The Town may require review and recommendation by Engineer prior to approval. The Town reserves the right to request that any submittal be provided via paper copy.
- A. For all submittals requested via paper copy, provide five (5) copies unless otherwise directed.
- B. Include calculations, shop drawings, plans, reports, records, photographs, diagrams, and details with submittals, as needed, to facilitate the review and/or approval process.
- C. Contractor shall submit all submittals to the Town and Engineer in sufficient time for checking and processing. Shop Drawings shall be of sufficient clarity so that copies thereof will be legible.
- D. All submittals by subcontractors for approval shall be sent directly to the Contractor for approval. The Contractor shall be responsible for their submission to the Town and Engineer at the proper time so as to prevent delays in delivery of materials.
- E. All Submittals shall be referenced properly to clearly indicate the location, service, and function of each particular item and the specification paragraph under which it is being furnished.
- F. Submittals that are related to or affect each other shall be forwarded simultaneously as a package to facilitate coordinated review. Uncoordinated submittals will be rejected.
- G. The Engineer reserves the right to require submittals in addition to those called for in individual sections.
- H. The term "Shop Drawings" include drawings, diagrams, schematics, descriptive literature, illustrations, schedules, performance and testing data, and similar materials furnished by the Contractor to explain in detail specific portions of the work required by the contract.
- I. Provide submittals electronically in the format requested (i.e. document file, drawing file, image file, etc.). For electronic drawings, submit AutoCAD 2016 (or later) file using the e-transmit feature (i.e. include external references, image files, color table file, font file, line file, etc.). Convert all AutoCAD add on data to AutoCAD format. Use descriptive layer titles (i.e. not numbers or internal use acronyms). Use extensive layer control and use line color by layer and line type by layer management. AutoCAD files of the Contract

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- Drawings will be made available to the Contractor selected to perform the Work, upon request.
- J. Certifications must be signed by an officer or other individual authorized to sign on behalf of the entity. Submittals requiring preparation by an engineer or surveyor must be signed and sealed by a Professional Engineer/Surveyor licensed to practice engineering in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.
- K. Schedule submittals to expedite Work. Provide the Town a minimum of five (5) Business Days, excluding transmittal time, for review.

1.3. SUBMITTAL PROCEDURES

- A. Each Submittal shall be numbered with the project name (abbreviated), Specification section and submittal number in consecutive order (Ex NAME-013300-#). Where resubmission is required a letter shall be assigned to designate each resubmission (Ex. NAME-013300-#A, NAME-013300-#B, etc.)
- B. Use a cover form for each submittal. Include the Project name, Project number used by the Town, date, submittal number, submittal description/title, submittal exclusions, and deviations from the Contract Documents (if any) on each cover form. The submittal cover form must be signed by an individual authorized to sign documents on behalf of the Contractor.
- C. Use the same units of weights and measures on submittals that are used in the Contract Documents.
- D. Identify variations from the Contract Documents and product or system limitations that may be detrimental to successful performance of the completed Work.
- E. Resubmit submittals if requested by the Town. When performing a submittal revision, identify all changes made since previous submission. For each re-submittal allow the same number of workdays required for review as the original submittal.
- F. Submittals not requested will not be recognized or processed.
- G. The Contractor shall distribute approved submittals to job site and record documents files and to suppliers and subcontractors as required.

1.4. SUBMITTAL REGISTER

A. Maintain a technical submittal register at the Site. Including the submittal number, description, date submitted, status, and date of approval/rejection.

1.5. SUBMITTAL REVIEW

- A. Submittals will be reviewed solely for the purpose of determining whether the information contained in the submittal conforms to the design concept of the Contract Documents. Submittals will be returned with the following classifications:
 - 1. No Exceptions Taken: Work may proceed, no exceptions taken.

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- 2. Furnish as Corrected: Work may proceed subject to comments, resubmittal not required.
- Revise and Resubmit: Work may not proceed, resubmittal required for indicated 3. items. Proceed with Work on other items subject to comments.
- 4. Rejected: Work may not proceed, resubmittal required, submittal unresponsive and/or not in conformance with Contract Documents.
- B. Any review performed by the Town or Engineer is for the limited purpose of checking for conformance with the information given and the design concept expressed in the Contract Documents. Review is not conducted for the purpose of determining the accuracy and completeness of other details such as dimensions or quantities. Approval of a specific item does not constitute approval of an assembly of which the item is a component. The review and approval of the Contractor's submittals does not relieve the Contractor from complying with the requirements of the Contract Documents. The Contractor is responsible for: dimensions to be confirmed and correlated at the jobsite; fabrication processes and construction means, methods, techniques, sequences or procedures; coordination of the Work of all trades; and performing all Work in a safe and satisfactory manner.

1.6. CERTIFICATES OF COMPLIANCE

- A. Certificates must be signed by an official authorized to sign on behalf of the manufacturing or testing company.
- B. For each certification, include the name and address of the Subcontractor, name of the requestor, the Project name and location, relevant test data (if required), and the dates of shipment and delivery.
- Certifications do not relieve the Contractor from the requirement for furnishing materials that comply with the requirements of the Contract Documents.

1.7. **INVOICES**

- Submit monthly invoices in accordance with the provisions of the Supplemental Conditions.
 - 1. Submit invoices on a form approved by the Town with an updated schedule showing contract values, approved Change Orders, Work completed to date, current invoice and quantity amounts, and balance to complete for each bid item.
 - 2. No payment will be made unless all the proper supporting documentation has been submitted and accepted by the Town.

Submittal Procedure

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SECTION 01 35 00 HEALTH AND SAFETY REQUIREMENTS

PART 1 GENERAL

1.1. SUMMARY

A. The Work required under this section includes furnishing all labor, materials and equipment, and performing all operations required to conform to all Federal, State, and local health and safety requirements during the performance of the Work.

1.2. SUBMITTALS

A. Prior to mobilization, submit the Contractor's Health and Safety Plan, and documentation of OSHA training as described in Section 3.1 – Work Qualifications of this Specification.

1.3. CONTRACTOR'S RESPONSIBILITY FOR HEALTH AND SAFETY

- A. Comply with any and all applicable state, federal, and local ordinances, laws and regulations.
- B. The Contractor is responsible for the Health and Safety their employees, its Subcontractors, suppliers, agents, inspectors, visitors, the general public, and any Others associated with, or interacting with Contractor who provides labor, goods, or other services on the Site.
- C. The Contractor is responsible for emergency response planning and notification and for actual response to all emergencies that may occur during the course of the Work, including emergencies that may occur when the Contractor is not present at the Site.
- D. Designate a Site Safety and Health Officer (SSHO).
- E. The SSHO shall enforce the health and safety requirements for all Contractor personnel on-Site at all times. The SSHO shall ensure that all Contractor personnel, Subcontractor personnel, and Contractor visitors follow the Contractor's site Health and Safety Plan (HASP), including wearing the designated level of Personal Protective Equipment (PPE). If the SSHO elects to require a higher level of protection, the extra costs associated with such higher level shall be borne by Contractor, unless such extra costs are approved in advance in writing by the Town.
- F. Prior to mobilization and continually through the duration of the Work, the SSHO shall inspect the Site and document area-specific and worker-specific protection requirements.
- G. After mobilization, the SSHO shall monitor Work activities and document the need for additional worker protection, as required, based on the Work being performed and action levels specified in the Contractor HASP.
- H. The SSHO shall verify that all activities are performed in accordance with the HASP and all federal, state, local, and Health and Safety standards, Laws and Regulations, and guidelines.
- I. In the event of a health or safety risk, as determined by the SSHO, other Contractor personnel, or by the Town, stop Work until a method for handling the risk has been

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- determined and implemented. Report any health or safety risk resulting in a Work stoppage to the Town.
- J. The Contractor is responsible for implementing a behavior-based safety process and providing site training, observation, and feedback for Contractor personnel employed at the Site.

1.4. CONTRACTOR'S HEALTH AND SAFETY PLAN

- A. Prepare and submit a Site-specific Health and Safety Plan (HASP) to the Town prior to the start of the Work. Follow all applicable local, state, and federal Health and Safety standards, Laws and Regulations, and guidelines implemented through, but not limited to, the OSHA, NIOSH, ACGIH, and USEPA. Where these references are in conflict, follow the more stringent requirement. At a minimum, address the following topics in the Contractor HASP:
 - 1. Names of key personnel and alternates responsible for Health and Safety, including a Contractor Health and Safety Representative and SSHO.
 - 2. Documentation of employee and Subcontractor training and medical certifications required by 29 CFR 1910.120, as described in Part 3 of this Section.
 - 3. PPE to be used for each of the tasks and operations being conducted, as required by the PPE program in 29 CFR 1910.120, 29 CFR 1910 Subpart I, 29 CFR 1926.28, and 29 CFR 1926 Subpart EA list of Health and Safety and emergency equipment available on the Site.
 - 4. A description of engineering controls used to reduce the hazards of equipment operation.
 - 5. Heat stress program.
 - 6. Cold stress program.
 - 7. Lockout/Tagout procedures where the sudden start up or release of stored energy could cause injury to personnel.

1.5. NOTIFICATIONS

- A. Notify the Town as soon as practical, but no more than twenty-four hours, after any mishaps, including recordable accidents, incidents, and near misses, as well as, any report of injury, illness, or any property damage.
- B. Notify the Town of load handling equipment or rigging mishaps, as soon as practical but not more than 4 hours after mishap.
- C. The Contractor is responsible for obtaining appropriate medical and emergency assistance and for notifying fire, law enforcement, and regulatory agencies.
- D. Immediate reporting is required for electrical mishaps, to include Arc Flash; shock; uncontrolled release of hazardous energy (includes electrical and non-electrical); load handling equipment or rigging; fall from height (any level other than same surface); and

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- underwater diving. These mishaps must be investigated in depth to identify all causes and to recommend hazard control measures.
- E. Immediately notify the Town of any hazard the Contractor discovers or observes on the Site, and the corrective measures planned or taken to eliminate or minimize the hazard Within notification include Contractor name; contract title; type of contract; name of location where accident occurred; date and time of accident; names of personnel injured; extent of property damage, if any; extent of injury, if known, and brief description of accident (for example, type of construction equipment used and PPE used). Preserve the conditions and evidence on the accident site until all possible Town investigations are conducted. Assist and cooperate fully with the Town investigation(s) of any mishap.

PART 2 PRODUCTS

2.1. EQUIPMENT AND FACILITIES

A. Provide all equipment, temporary facilities, and controls required to perform the Work safely in accordance with all applicable laws and regulations and the Contractor's HASP.

2.2. PERSONAL PROTECTIVE EQUIPMENT

- A. The appropriate level of PPE is to be determined by the Contractor for the specific tasks as described in the Contractor's HASP. If hazards are identified that require a level of protection greater than Level D (defined in paragraph C below), Work shall be suspended, and the Town notified.
- B. Furnish and maintain materials and equipment for the health and safety of Contractor employees, Subcontractors, Suppliers, and visitor personnel. Provide all required first aid equipment, tools, monitoring equipment, PPE, and ancillary equipment required to comply with the Contractor's HASP.
- C. Level D protection will be required at all times for all personnel and visitors on the Site. Level D PPE consists of:
 - 1. Hard hat,
 - 2. Steel-toed boots.
 - 3. Safety glasses with permanent side shields.
 - 4. Work clothes (long pants, shirts with sleeves).
 - Work gloves.
 - 6. Hearing protection (as needed to prevent exposure exceeding 85 dB level).
 - 7. High visibility reflective safety vests, or;
 - 8. U.S. Coast Guard approved Personal Flotation Devices for personnel working on or near the water.

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PART 3 EXECUTION

3.1. WORKER QUALIFICATIONS

- A. Provide the following training to workers.
 - 1. Current cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) and first aid certification for at least two workers assigned to Work on the Site.
 - 2. OSHA 10 Hour training course.
 - 3. For any worker who is assigned the role of a "competent person," provide documentation of sufficient and relevant training and experience to perform the assigned duties and responsibilities of that role. As defined in 29 CFR 1926.31, the competent person shall be "one who is capable of identifying existing and predictable hazards, and who has authority to take prompt corrective measures to eliminate them." Relevant training and experience shall be in the same type of Project activities included in the Work under this Contract.

3.2. WORK PLANNING AND MEETINGS

- A. Conduct a daily health and safety meeting, prior to beginning Work for that day, to address health and safety issues, changing conditions, activities, and personnel. All Contractor and Subcontractor employees working on the Site on that day must attend the meeting. Document all meetings and have attendees sign a form acknowledging their presence at the meeting. Include as part of the daily meeting, an evaluation of the Work to be conducted and the hazards associated with the work.
- B. Contractor personnel who are not in attendance for the daily Health and Safety must be briefed on the meeting notes prior to commencing any Work-related activities.
- C. Hold and document additional safety meetings at the start of each major task, and whenever site conditions change such that it could potentially affect worker safety.

3.3. MONITORING

A. Perform heat exposure and cold exposure monitoring activities as required by weather conditions.

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SECTION 01 41 00 REGULATORY REQUIREMENTS - PERMITS

PART 1 GENERAL

1.1. SUMMARY

A. This Section establishes responsibility for obtaining Project permits between the Engineer, the Town, and the Contractor.

1.2. TOWN APPROVALS

- A. The Town has obtained the following Project permits. The Contractor will be required to comply with all approved permit requirements.
 - 1. 401 Water Quality Certification.
 - 2. MA DEP Waterways Chapter 91 permit.
 - Wetlands Protection Act Order of Conditions.
- B. The Town is awaiting approval of the following permits. Example conditions are provided for bidding. The Contractor will be required to comply with all approved permit requirements.
 - 1. Section 401/404 USACE permits

1.3. CONTRACTOR PERMITS

- A. Obtain the following Project permits/acceptances:
 - 1. Coast Guard Notice to Mariners.
 - 2. Local construction permits/notifications, as needed.
 - 3. Permits required for transportation and disposal of dredge material.
 - 4. Permits required for any off-Site parking that is negotiated between the Contractor and the Town, and/or private parking facilities, as needed.
- B. This Section does not describe all permits required for performance of the Work. Any permits not identified in this Section, or elsewhere in the Contract Documents, are the responsibility of Contractor.
- C. Regardless of who is responsible for obtaining a permit, the Contractor is responsible for performing in accordance with the Supplemental Conditions of all permits.

PART 1 GENERAL

1.1. SUMMARY

A. Closeout procedures covers the administrative and technical requirements for final cleaning, inspection, Project as-built documents, warranties, bonds, final payment, and other procedures for Project closeout in accordance with the Contract Documents.

1.2. CLOSEOUT PROCEDURES AND REQUIRED SUBMITTALS

- A. For this Project, Substantial Completion will be defined as all dredging work complete, and all sediment and debris transferred to the offshore disposal site. The Town has sole and final discretion for determining whether the Work has progressed to the point of Substantial Completion or not.
 - 1. Substantial Completion defined as:
 - a. Completion of 3 month minimum production rate of dredge material within Area II South Mooring Basin. (90,000 CY)
 - b. Hydrographic survey of final dredge area
 - 2. Submit written certification that project, or designated portion of the project, is substantially complete, and request, in writing, a final inspection. The Town's representative will perform the final inspection.
 - 3. Should the Town's representative determine that the work is substantially complete, he will prepare a punch list of deficiencies that need to be corrected before final acceptance and issue a notice of substantial completion with the deficiencies noted.
 - 4. Should the Town's representative determine that the work is not substantially complete, he will immediately notify the Contractor, in writing, stating reasons. After the Contractor completes the work, he shall re-submit certification and request for final inspection.
 - 5. Failure to complete parameters for Substantial Completion:
 - a. Contractor shall be paid for the Cubic Yards dredged and disposed of within the dredge limits.

B. Record Drawings:

- 1. If progress payment applications are submitted by the Contractor, the data collected to substantiate the progress payment is to be submitted to the Town at the conclusion of the Work to be incorporated into the Record Drawings for the Project.
- 2. Submit record surveys in electronic format (.dwg AutoCAD file) and provide two (2) hard copies to the Town that have been signed and sealed by a surveyor licensed to practice in the State of Massachusetts. At a minimum, Record Drawings are to include:

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- a. Approved pre-dredge survey.
- b. Encountered structures left in place.
- c. Bottom of dredging grade.
- d. Benchmark coordinates and elevation.
- 3. Quantities that are designated to be determined by survey are to be included on the Record Drawings when/if making an application for a progress payment. The Record Drawing must clearly indicate the pay item and total quantity of measured units. Final payment will be based off difference between the Town pre and post dredge surveys.
- 4. Provide the Town with an electronic version of the Record Drawing as an AutoCAD file with .xyz file and in a color-PDF format that bears the seal of the Project surveyor who oversaw the preparation of the Record Drawings.
- C. Provide copies of all Project records including, but not limited to, the following:
 - 1. Health and Safety reports.
 - 2. Copies of closed permits.
 - 3. Marine Mammal Observer Reports (combined document of all reports)
 - 4. ACOE Disposal Reports (combined document of all reports)

D. Permit Closeout:

1. Submit written confirmation that all permits have been closed with their governing authority and that any and all remaining fees (if applicable) have been paid in full.

E. Other Close-out Submittals

- 1. Refer to EXECUTION portion of each specification section for closeout requirement, including operating and maintenance manuals; instruction of Town's personnel in maintenance and operation of systems; submission of certifications, test reports, etc.; provisions of spare parts and maintenance materials, all of which shall be neatly wrapped or packaged in standard sizes and clearly labeled.
- 2. Submissions specified elsewhere in the Contract Documents, include consent of surety to final payment; affidavit that all bills and indebtedness from subcontractors and suppliers, or bond satisfactory to the Owner indemnifying the owner against liens or other claims.

1.3. ACCEPTANCE OF WORK

- A. After all deficiencies have been corrected, a Letter of Final Acceptance will be issued. If only designated portions of the project have been inspected, a Letter of Partial Acceptance will be issued for that portion of Work.
- B. Acceptance may be given prior to correction of deficiencies that do not preclude operations and use of the facility; however, final payment will be withheld until all deficiencies are corrected.

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C. Until receipt of Letter of Final Acceptance, the Contractor shall be responsible for the work of this Contract.

2.2. LIGHTS

- A. Furnish navigation warning lights that conform to the United States Coast Guard requirements for location, visibility, and color.
- B. Provide navigational lighting on all vessels, including scows and dredge equipment, which complies with applicable U.S. Coast Guard regulations.
- C. Provide lighting for turbidity curtains and all other potential hazards to navigation put in place during the Work, in compliance with all applicable U.S. Coast Guard regulations and permit requirements.

2.3. BUOYS

A. Provide buoys that are in compliance with all applicable U.S. Coast Guard regulations.

PART 3 EXECUTION

3.1. INSTALLATION AND OPERATION

- A. Coordinate with the U.S. Coast Guard and obtain all required permits and file all required notifications prior to mobilizing to the Site.
- B. Furnish and maintain all marine signaling equipment required by permit and/or U.S. Coast Guard regulations while the Work is being performed.

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3.2. MAINTENANCE

A. Inspect marine signaling equipment daily. Take immediate corrective action to repair/replace a malfunctioning marine signaling device.

SECTION 35 20 23 DREDGING BY MECHANICAL METHOD

PART 1 GENERAL

1.1. SUMMARY

A. The Work required under this section includes furnishing all labor, materials, equipment, and performing all operations required for completing the mechanical dredging portion of the Work.

1.2. GENERAL

- A. The work under this section shall include, but not be limited to, the following:
 - 1. Site mobilization & demobilization.
 - 2. Project scheduling and phasing.
 - 3. Dredging by mechanical method of sediment within the harbor to the depths and limits shown on the Contract Drawings. The dredging must be completed within the Time of Year (TOY) set by the Project permits and completed entirely from the water. The Contractor must comply with all permit conditions and shall schedule his work to meet this condition.
 - 4. Performing all dredging work in accordance with turbidity controls measures including turbidity curtains and turbidity monitoring.
 - 5. Placement of dredged material into scows or other approved transport container, in conformance with the Contract Documents and all regulatory approvals.
 - 6. Transportation and placement of dredged material in the Cape Cod Bay Disposal Site in conformance with these specifications, USACE requirements, and all regulatory approvals.
 - 7. Compliance with USACE National Dredge Quality Management Program (DQM) and Section 35 20 23.13
 - 8. Removal and proper disposal of debris and other obstructions as defined within these Specifications.
 - 9. Preparing, receiving, and acceptance by the Town of all submittals outlined in Section 1.5. of this Specification.
- B. Comply with all applicable regulations, rules, laws, and ordinances of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, and all other authorities having jurisdiction including, but not limited to , the USACE, U.S. Coast Guard, and the Town of Wellfleet
- C. Compliance with all conditions with the Regulatory Approvals including, but not limited to, the following:
 - 1. US Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) permits (Pending)
 - 2. MA DEP Waterways Chapter 91 License

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- 3. Coastal Zone Management (CZM) Consistency
- 4. MA DEP Water Pollution Control: 401 Water Quality Certificate
- D. Contractor shall assume permit requirements include:
 - 1. Providing qualified marine mammal/turtle observer
 - 2. Providing qualified fisheries observer
 - 3. Monitoring during dredging and disposal events
 - 4. Preparation of a turbidity control plan(s)
 - 5. Preparation and submission of all required reports
- E. Comply with all conditions and perform monitoring and reporting as required by the Regulatory Approvals.
- F. In the event that any conflict between conditions in the Regulatory Approvals and the Contract Document occurs, the Contractor shall comply with the more stringent requirement at no additional cost to the Town.
- G. Comply with all applicable regulations, rules, laws, and ordinances of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, and all other authorities having jurisdiction including, but not limited to, the USACE, US Coast Guard, and the Town of Wellfleet.
- H. Examine all Contract Drawings and sections of the Specifications for requirements and provisions of the Work that this Section affects.

1.3. QUALIFICATIONS

- A. The Contractor shall have completed at least 3 dredging projects of similar size and scope using mechanical methods.
- B. The dredging supervisor shall have a minimum of 5 years of experience with dredging projects in the role of dredging supervisor or superintendent.
- C. The Contractor's equipment operators, supervisory engineering staff, and technical staff shall have a minimum of 2 years of experience with dredging via mechanical methods.

1.4. QUALITY ASSURANCE

- A. Comply with all applicable local, state, and federal requirements, as well as industry standards and practices regarding materials, methods of work, proper disposal, safety of workers, and safety of the public.
- B. Copies of the Regulatory Approvals and Conditions for performing the work or examples thereof are included within Appendix A of the Contract Documents. The Contractor shall be responsible for understanding and implementation of the stipulated conditions as a condition of the contract. The Contractor shall note that not all regulatory approvals for the Project have been received and examples have been provided for bidding purposes. Contractor shall comply with final regulatory approvals once received.

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- C. All the Contractor's dredging equipment and dredge scows shall be in good working condition and suitable for the intended task.
- D. Dredging and disposal will only be allowed during specified times established by the project permits. The Contractor shall be responsible for adhering to all local, state, and federal requirements for endangered and threatened water mammals and other marine life.
- E. Should it become necessary for work under this section to extend into the no dredging/disposal windows, the Contractor will be responsible, at his expense, to obtain approvals for any time extensions, re-permitting, or changes that may be necessary.
- F. Contractor's equipment shall comply with all requirements of the USACE Dredge Quality Management (DQM) System.

1.5. SUBMITTALS

A. Dredging Plan:

- 1. Within fifteen (15) calendar days from the date of the Notice to Proceed, or at the pre-construction meeting, whichever occurs first, submit the Dredging Plan to the Town for review and acceptance.
- 2. Include the name, address, and 24-hour emergency contact information of the person who will be in responsible charge of the dredging and disposal operation.
- 3. Include the name, address, and 24-hour emergency contact information of all Subcontractors who will be involved in the Project.
- 4. Identification and list of dredge equipment to be used. Certify that all the Contractor's dredging equipment and dredge scows are in good working condition and suitable for the Work. All equipment is subject to inspection and approval prior to use on the Project.
- 5. USACE Certifications for Contractors DQM System to be used.
- 6. Plan for dredge area and dredge disposal location monitoring.
- 7. The Contractor is responsible for adhering to the USACE Dredge Quality Management (DQM) System Requirement. It is the responsibility of the Contractor to notify the USACE prior to commencing dredging and to request the exact coordinates for the disposal of the dredged materials from USACE at least ten (10) days prior to the start of the project. Confirmation of notification and the disposal coordinates from USACE shall be submitted to the Town prior to proceeding with the dredging.
- 8. As part of the Dredging Plan, submit a Spill Management Plan which will be utilized to prevent and/or mitigate fuel and material spillage.

B. Progress Plans:

1. The Contractor is required to plot the locations of all obstructions encountered during the progress of the Work on the progress plan and on the Daily Reports.

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- 2. Maintain a dredging progress plan onsite and update it daily. This plan shall be colorized and show the locations dredged and the date of the work. The dredging progress plan will be submitted to the Town at the completion of the Work.
- 3. Maintain a disposal progress plan onsite that is updated daily to show all disposal work in the Cape Cod Bay Disposal Site. This plan shall show locations of all disposal locations and dates/time of each disposal. The disposal progress plan will be submitted to the Town at the completion of the Work.
- 4. The contractor's hydrographic surveys, when performed, shall be provided at the same size and scale as the Contract Drawings and shall show the final elevations of the dredged area with all pertinent data, landmarks, baseline, and shall be based on the datum established for the project on the contract documents. Data grid used shall be sufficient to provide adequate details of the side slope and the limit of dredging. The Town may request additional data sets as required to review the Contractor's data. Submittal shall include hard copies as well as supporting electronic files. All surveys shall be performed using the same horizontal coordinate system and vertical datum based on Mean Low Water datum, unless noted otherwise.
- C. Submit a Turbidity Control Plan for review and acceptance by the Town and Regulatory Agencies prior to mobilizing any materials to the Site.
- D. Certificate of Compliance
 - 1. The Contractor shall provide name and contact information for the Registered Land Surveyor and/or Registered Professional Engineer, experienced in hydrographic surveys, to perform its verification survey and prepare the required plan.
 - 2. The Contractor's verification survey shall be the same size and scale as the Contract Drawings and shall show the final elevations of the dredged area with all pertinent data, landmarks, baseline and shall be based on the Datum established for the project.
 - 3. The Contractor's verification survey must be sufficient in detail and accuracy to satisfy the Town that the Town's final survey can be ordered.
- E. Surveys submitted for consideration shall have an original stamp by a licensed professional land surveyor or licensed professional engineer. Surveys shall be provided in AutoCAD with .xyz file and stamped plans on paper copies for the following purposes:
 - 1. Pre-dredge conditions prior to commencing dredging activities.
 - 2. Disagreement with pre-dredge condition must be submitted at least 3 days prior to performing any dredge activities.
 - 3. Requests for partial payment of dredge activities.
 - 4. Verification survey to confirm work is complete.
 - 5. Disagreement with post-dredge condition and payment volumes

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F. The Contractor will be required to maintain daily records of dredging operations. A plan will be marked and colored coded showing daily progress, and a sketch of this progress plan indicating the work accomplished for that period will be drawn on the back of the record forms. The record forms shall be submitted to the Authority on a weekly basis. The progress plans will be turned over to the Authority at the completion of work.

1.6. NOTIFICATIONS

- A. Provide notifications required by Project permits in compliance with the notice period prior to the beginning of dredging including, but not limited to:
 - 1. Notify the USACE of intent to start Work at least 10 days prior to the beginning of dredging.
 - 2. The Department of Environmental Protection
 - 3. At least ten (10) working days in advance of the start date, the Contractor shall notify the First Coast Guard District, Aids to Navigation Office, of the location and estimated duration of the dredge and disposal operations.
 - 4. Notify and coordinate all work with the Town of Wellfleet.
- B. It is the Contractor's responsibility to notify the US Coast Guard prior to the start of this Project.
- C. Before beginning any dredge or disposal operations, the Contractor shall coordinate with the US Coast Guard to issue a "Notice to Mariners".
- D. If the Town is not present onsite, it is the Contractor's responsibility to immediately notify the Town of any changes in the Site so that the Town may inspect the conditions.
- E. Upon completion of dredging, submit a letter notifying the Town of completion and when the Contractors final bathymetric survey will be completed. Town will complete its own independent bathymetric survey within one week for verification of project completeness and volume confirmation prior to approving final payment request.

1.7. SITE CONDITIONS

A. PROJECT STAGING

1. Upland area may be available for the dredge contractor staging and for material handling and disposal associated with material not suitable for disposal at the CCBDS site. Any use of the upland area for these activities shall be subject to the review and approval of the Town of Wellfleet. If not available Contractor shall provide their own site for these activities at no additional cost to the project.

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B. SITE ACCESS

- 1. Contractor shall note that the dredge site has limited access and size restrictions and will require selection of materials and equipment that are capable of safely navigating within the site restrictions shown on the contract plans.
- 2. Contractor shall note that the work includes dredging of shallow and intertidal areas. Limitations on the duration of dredging within each tide cycle should be anticipated.

1.8. CONTRACTOR SURVEYS

A. QUALIFICATIONS

- 1. If needed to support applications for progress payments, subcontract with a Professional Surveyor licensed in the State of Massachusetts to serve as the independent surveyor for the Project.
- 2. The selected surveyor shall have served in a similar role on at least two previous Projects with a dredging component of a similar or greater size.
- 3. The selected surveyor may not be replaced unless the Contractor submits a written request to the Town for approval that details the reason(s) for the requested change and includes any noted deficiencies.

B. REFERENCE POINTS

- 1. Establish horizontal control points and benchmarks, as needed. Protect the reference points from disturbance during performance of the Work.
- 2. When laying out and controlling the performance of the Work, use horizontal and vertical datums that are consistent with those used in the Contract Drawings.

C. BATHYMETRIC SURVEYS

- 1. Bathymetric surveys shall be conducted to meet USACE accuracy standards defined in EM 1110-2-1003, Hydrographic Surveying. Surveys will be performed by single vertical beam transducer, or multiple vertical beam transducer sweep, or multibeam sweep methods. When vertical single beam or multiple sweep beam transducers are employed, an acoustic frequency of 200 kHz (± 20%) shall be used. When utilizing multibeam technology, the operating acoustic frequency will range from 180 kHz to 250 kHz. All depth measurement devices, positioning, and motion compensation systems will be calibrated following the quality control procedures outlined in EM 1110-2-1003.
- 2. At the start of each day's soundings, the system shall be calibrated in strict accordance with Corps of Engineer's Manual EM 1110-2-1003 (2004). The Contractor will be required to submit to the Town sufficient field data, including all digital fathometer data in a usable format, corrected for tide, and corresponding boat plots and track sheets, so that the Contractor's submitted survey plot may be reproduced by the Town by referring only to this field data.

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- 3. After completion of the Contractor's survey, the results will be plotted and reviewed by the Contractor to ensure that all Work was completed in accordance with contract requirements, and then submitted to the Town on CD-ROM, DVD-ROM, or by electronic file transfer in digital ASCII format. If deficiencies are noted, a re-survey of the area after correction of deficiencies will be required to assure the Town that appropriate corrections have been made.
- 4. Submission of all Contractor quality control survey data, including plots, is required prior to the performance of the final examination and acceptance survey to be performed by the Town. The results of the quality control surveys should be used by the Contractor to ensure that Work was performed in accordance with the Contract Documents.
- 5. If requesting a progress payment, surveys shall be performed by the Contractor for all completed areas of dredging being submitted for payment. All data shall be submitted on CD-ROM, DVD-ROM, or by electronic transfer with X, Y, and Z ASCII files containing Easting, Northing, and true Elevations. Data shall be provided to the Town denoted by shallowest soundings in a 3-foot grid pattern. The files shall be referenced to state plane coordinates, NAD83 Massachusetts Mainland Zone 2001, and vertical datum referenced to MLW.

1.9. ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION

- A. The Contractor shall provide the services of a Marine Mammal/Turtle Observer. The Marine Mammal/Turtle Observer will be responsible for prohibiting harassment of marine mammals and sea turtles during transit and disposal work.
- B. The Contractor shall provide the services of a Fisheries Observer. The Fisheries Observer will be responsible for prohibiting harassment and adverse effects to fisheries during dredging, transit, and disposal work.

PART 3 EXECUTION

3.1. SCOPE OF WORK

A. General

- 1. The Contractor shall dredge to the depths shown on the Contract Drawings. The proposed depths include an over-dredge payment limit depth as shown on the Contract Drawings. No work outside the payment limit will be considered for compensation.
- 2. The Contractor shall perform a Pre-Dredge survey of the project area before any work is started. The Pre-Dredge survey must be submitted prior to work commencing.

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3. The Contractor shall place and maintain range markers to show the limits of the dredge area. Markers shall not be located to cause an obstruction or other hazard for vessels.

B. Site Mobilization & Demobilization

- 1. The Contractor shall mobilize dredging plant, work boats, scows, barges, tugs, cranes, and all other equipment to the work site to commence dredging and disposal operations
- 2. The Contractor shall relocate and move cranes, dredge plant, and related equipment from one work location to another work location(s) within the project limits as work progresses and to accommodate vessel operations, as required.
- 3. The Contractor shall perform all survey for layout, placement, and maintenance of markers, as well as the verification survey. Survey control baseline(s), markers and tide boards shall be established and maintained at all times during the project for the dredging area.
- 4. The Contractor shall perform all notifications, as required under this specification and within the Project Regulatory Approvals.
- 5. The Contractor shall perform all surveys and reports, as required under this specification.
- 6. Demobilization of the Contractor's dredging plant, work boats, scows, barges, tugs, cranes, and all other equipment from the work site upon completion of the dredging operations shall only take place after receiving approval from the Town.
- 7. Under no circumstances shall the Contractor leave the site until the Contractor has completed and submitted a Post Dredge survey and the Town has notified the Contractor in writing that it may demobilize from the site, or unless otherwise authorized in writing by the Town. If any work has not been completed, including complete demobilization, or, if any shoals exist within the work area, the Contractor will be ordered to return to the site to complete said work without delay. If the Contractor does not return to the site, all monies owed the Contractor shall be retained by the Town to complete the work. Any funds not utilized to complete the work will be paid to Contractor.

3.2. GENERAL OPERATIONS

- A. Conduct operations in such a manner as to cause the least amount of interference with shipping and boating interests in and around the Site. Coordinate all Work with:
 - 1. Town of Wellfleet.
 - 2. USACE.
 - 3. U.S. Coast Guard.
- B. Notify Town 24 hours prior to any dredging activities.

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- C. Ensure proper closure and water-tightness of the scow pocket doors to eliminate any seepage or leakage of material. The use of plastic material or other non-approved materials to cover cracks in scow pockets will not be allowed.
- D. Provide and maintain a walkie-talkie communication system, or other system approved by the Town, between the Town and the dredge plant, and between the towboat and the scow.
- E. Barges, dredge plants, tow boats or any vessel used during this Project shall not sit on the bottom within or adjacent to the Work area.

3.3. DREDGING BY MECHANICAL METHOD

- A. Examine the Site and available data and determine the character of the materials to be removed. The Contractor is required to remove all materials within the design footprint and shall provide all necessary labor and equipment to handle the materials.
- B. Furnish equipment of sufficient size and capacity to dredge sediments to the depths shown on the Contract Drawings. The Contractor shall dredge, by use of environmental bucket dredging equipment or clam shell bucket as required for harder materials, the areas shown on the plan. Project Permits require the use of BMP's and an environmental bucket shall be used to the maximum extent practical and the Contractor shall assume use of an environmental bucket prior to use of a heavy clamshell, as required to complete the work, including removal of all debris encountered. Contractor shall furnish additional dredging buckets as may be needed to complete the work including removal of large pieces of debris.
- C. Dredged material shall be placed in watertight scows with fast rate hopper door release and transported to the Cape Cod Bay Disposal Site.
 - 1. Scow overflow will not be permitted.
- D. The quantities shown on the plans are estimated based on the survey and soundings. The actual amount removed will be dependent on the amount of material the Contractor removes to the payment limits as shown on the Contract Drawings. Intermittent progress bathymetric surveys may be conducted by the Contractor for progress payments, if desired. Quantity removed will be obtained by computing the volume between the bottom surface of the last Town survey made before dredging, and the bottom surface of the final Town survey made within one week or otherwise as soon as practicable after the work specified has been completed. The Contractor must complete a post-dredge survey within 5 days of completing dredge activities and notify the Town of when post-dredge survey is scheduled to be completed. The Town will complete its own post dredge survey for verification and agreement of post dredge conditions and final payment.
- E. Unless approved in advance by the Town, payment will only be made on the computed volume of the dredge prism shown in the Contract Drawings plus 1 foot of allowable overdredge, including side slopes.
- F. Minimize over-dredge.
- G. Do not exceed the maximum dredge cut line at the base of side slopes. Remove any upslope sediments that fall into the dredge prism.

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- H. Dredging performed beyond the limits of the allowable over-dredge will not be measured for payment. Additionally, any other pay items impacted by the performance of dredging beyond the allowable dredge limits will not be measured for payment.
- I. Make the bottom of the excavation as smooth and level as possible at or within 1 foot below the plane of the required depths. All bumps, shoals, pinnacles or any other obstruction above the design dredge depth are to be removed. No payment will be made for any material dredged beyond the design over-dredge depths as shown on the Contract Drawings as determined from information obtained during the Town post-dredge survey.
- J. The method used to obtain a smooth and level bottom shall be selected by the Contractor, with the approval of the Town, before such method is implemented.
- K. If the Town post-dredge survey shows areas that have not been dredged to the proper depth, the Contractor shall complete the Work required as directed by the Town and shall pay for the additional survey(s) required to show that the Work has been completed per the Contract Documents.
- L. The Town will notify the Contractor in writing, upon the receipt and approval of the final survey, that the Contractor may demobilize from the Site. The Contractor shall not demobilize from the Site without the prior written approval from the Town.

3.4. DEBRIS AND OBSTRUCTIONS

- A. The Contractor shall assume debris is present and shall remove it in the course of his work. In the event, significant obstructions are encountered which may impact the progress of the work, the Contractor shall notify the Town prior to removal.
- B. Debris shall be separated and placed in a separate unsuitable material dumpster. Debris placed in the dumpster shall be free of excessive dredge material and water. All such material shall be disposed in accordance with the Contract Documents.
- C. Furnish any special or additional equipment that may be required for removing debris and submerged obstructions as needed to complete the Work. Care must be taken when removing any debris encountered adjacent to existing structures to minimize any possible impact.
- D. Separate any floating debris contained within the turbidity controls and stockpile for offsite disposal.
- E. Lawfully dispose of debris in accordance with all applicable laws and regulations.
- F. The changing of dredging bucket type or of dredging platform to remove debris is to be included in the Contractors Bid and will not be considered adequate grounds for a Change Order.
- G. Any material that is disposed of other than in places designated by the Town will not be paid for and the Contractor may be required to remove such misplaced material and deposit it where directed at no additional cost to the Town.

3.5. SEDIMENT TRANSPORT AND DISPOSAL

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- A. All tow boats used for towing to disposal areas shall be equipped with differential global positioning system (DGPS) and track recording navigational equipment or approved equivalent electronic navigation equipment, radar, corrected compass, marine radio, and depth sounding equipment which shall be maintained in operating condition during each tow. The tow boats utilized by the Contractor for this purpose shall be of a size adequate for towing in the open ocean and shall have necessary reserve power for maneuvering with scows and under emergency conditions as well as for control of scows at the disposal point.
- B. Use of a fully automated horizontal positioning system capable of locations within 1.0 meter of the true position is required to ensure proper positioning of the scows over the disposal site.
- C. Place material at the disposal site such that the mounding of material is minimized.
- D. All scows used for in-water disposal shall be bottom-dump that have been inspected and approved by the USACE.
- E. Any dump scows used to transport material shall be in good operating condition and shall contain the sediment and water placed in it so that no discharge of sediment or water occurs until the barge has been transported to the designated disposal location.
- F. Transport, monitoring, and disposal of dredge material shall be in accordance with all regulatory requirements and the Contractor shall be solely responsible for proper disposal of material.
- G. The Contractor shall bear full responsibility for resolution of issues arising from the transport, monitoring, and disposal of dredge material in violation of regulatory requirements, including but not limited to meetings, surveys, environmental studies, and mitigation. No additional compensation from the Town shall be made to address permit violations.

3.6. PROTECTION OF EXISTING STRUCTURES

- A. Proposed dredging limits as shown on the Contract Drawings are in close proximity to existing structures. Take the necessary precautions to protect these structures from damage. The Contractor shall bear full responsibility for any damage of any nature to these structures caused by his workers and/or equipment, and any such damage shall be satisfactorily remedied at the sole expense of the Contractor to the satisfaction of the Town.
- B. Conduct the dredging operations such that they do not undermine, weaken, or otherwise impair existing structures located in or near the areas to be dredged. The Contractor shall investigate the existing structures at the Site and plan the dredging operations accordingly.

3.7. INSPECTIONS

A. Furnish, upon request of the Town, the use of such boats, boatmen, laborers, and material forming a part of the ordinary and usual equipment and crew of the equipment or marine plant as may be reasonably necessary in inspecting and monitoring the Work. The Contactor shall furnish, on request of the, suitable transportation from all points on shore to and from the various pieces of the marine plant and the Site.

PART 1 GENERAL

1.1 DESCRIPTION

The work under this contract requires use of the National Dredging Quality Management Program (DQM) to monitor the scow's status at all times during the contract and to manage data history. For the purpose of these specifications, a scow is defined as any non-self-propelled vessel used to transport dredged material. This includes, but is not limited to, split-hull scows, pocket scows, hopper barges, and deck barges.

This performance-based specification section identifies the minimum required output and the precision and instrumentation requirements. The requirements may be satisfied using equipment and technical procedures selected by the Contractor.

1.2 SUBMITTALS

The following shall be submitted in accordance with Section 01 33 00, "SUBMITTAL PROCEDURES":

- SD-07, Certificates
 - Letter of National Dredging Quality Management Program Certification

1.3 PAYMENT

No separate payment shall be made for installation, operation, and maintenance of the DQM-certified system as specified herein for the duration of the dredging operations; all costs in connection therewith will be considered a subsidiary obligation of the Contractor and covered under the contract unit price for dredging in the bidding schedule.

1.4 NATIONAL DREDGING QUALITY MANAGEMENT PROGRAM CERTIFICATION

The Contractor is required to have a current certification from DQM for the scow instrumentation system to be used under this contract. Criteria for certification shall be based on the most recent specification posted on the DQM website (https://dqm.usace.army.mil/Specifications/Index.aspx). Compliance with these criteria

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shall be verified by onsite quality assurance (QA) checks conducted by the DQM Support Center Data Acquisition and Analysis Team and by periodic review of the transmitted data. If a system is installed specifically for this contract, in order to ensure that it is capable of transmitting quality data to the DQM database, the QA checks should take place either prior to the start of the contract or, with prior approval of the local USACE District, as soon as practical after dredging commences. DQM certification is valid for one year from the date of certification and is contingent upon the system's ability to meet the performance requirements as outlined in Paragraph 3.3, "Performance Requirements." If issues with data quality are not corrected within 48 hours, the system certification shall be revoked and additional QA checks by the Data Acquisition and Analysis Team may be necessary.

Annual DOM certification shall be based on the following:

- A series of QA checks as outlined on the DQM website (https://dqm.usace.army.mil/Certifications/Index.aspx)
- Verification of data acquisition and transfer as described in Paragraph 3.3, "Performance Requirements"
- Review of the Dredge Plant Instrumentation Plan (DPIP) as described in Paragraph 1.5, "Dredge Plant Instrumentation Plan (DPIP)"

The Contractor shall have personnel who are familiar with the system instrumentation and who have the ability to recalibrate the sensors on site during the QA process. The Contractor shall coordinate pickup times and locations and provide transportation to and from any platform with a DQM system to team personnel in a timely manner. The Contractor shall also have on site for the QA checks a tug capable of towing the scow. As a general rule, DOM Data Acquisition and Analysis Team personnel will come with personal protective equipment (PPE) consisting of hardhats, steel toe boots, and life jackets. If additional safety equipment is needed—such as eye protection, safety harnesses, work gloves, or personal location beacons—these items shall be provided to the team while on site. The Contractor shall submit a test data package to the DQM database from the system on each scow and have it accepted by the DQM Support Center prior to scow compliance checks. The Contractor shall also submit data collected during the QA checks from the scow monitoring system to the DQM database and the Data Acquisition and Analysis Team personnel while on site. It is the Contractor's obligation to inform the QA team if the location designated for the QA checks has any site-specific safety concerns prior to their arrival on site.

The owner or operator of the scow shall contact DQM at DQM-AnnualQA@rpsgroup.com on an annual basis, or at least three weeks prior to the proposed beginning of dredging, to schedule QA checks. This notification is meant to make the Data Acquisition and Analysis Team aware of a target date and the contract on National Dredging Quality Management Program Scow Monitoring Profile 35 20 23.13-2

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which the plant will be used. At least one week prior to the target date, the Contractor shall contact the Data Acquisition and Analysis Team and verbally coordinate a specific date and location. The Contractor shall then follow up this conversation with a written email confirmation. The owner/operator shall coordinate the QA checks with all local authorities including, but not limited to, the Town and USACE.

Recertification is required for any yard work which produces modification to displacement (for example, a change in scow lines, or repositioning or repainting hull marks), modification to bin volume (change in bin dimensions, or addition or subtraction of structure), or changes in sensor type or location; these changes shall be reported in the sensor log section of the DPIP. A system does not have to be transmitting data between jobs; however, in order to retain certification during this period, the system sensors or hardware should not be disconnected or removed from the scow. If the system is powered down, calibration coefficients shall be retained.

1.5 DREDGE PLANT INSTRUMENTATION PLAN (DPIP)

The Contractor shall have a digital copy of the DPIP on file with the DQM Support Center. While working on site, the Contractor shall also maintain on the dredge a copy of the DPIP which is easily accessible to Government personnel at all times. This document shall describe the sensors used, configuration of the system, how sensor data will be collected, how quality control on the data will be performed, and how sensors/data reporting equipment will be calibrated and repaired if they fail. A description of computed scow-specific data and how the sensor data will be transmitted to the DQM database shall also be included. A complete list of the required DPIP contents is provided on the DQM website (https://dqm.usace.army.mil/Certifications/Index.aspx).

The Contractor shall submit to the DQM Support Center any addendum or modifications made to the plan, subsequent to its original submission, prior to the start of work. Any changes to the computation methods shall be approved by the DQM Support Center prior to their implementation.

3.1 REQUIREMENTS FOR REPORTED DATA

The Contractor shall provide, operate, and maintain all hardware and software to meet these specifications. The Contractor shall be responsible for the replacement, repair, and calibration of sensors and other necessary data acquisition equipment needed to supply the required data.

Repairs shall be completed within 48 hours of any sensor failure. Upon completion of a repair, replacement, installation, modification, or calibration, the Contractor shall notify the USACE. The USACE may request recalibration of sensors or other hardware components at any time during the contract as deemed necessary.

The Contractor shall keep a log of sensor repair, replacement, installation, modification, and calibration in the onsite copy of the DPIP. The log shall contain a three-year history of sensor maintenance, including the time of sensor failures (and subsequent repairs), the time and results of sensor calibrations, the time of sensor replacements, and the time that backup sensor systems were initiated to provide the required data. It shall also contain the name of the person responsible for the sensor work.

Sensors installed shall be capable of collecting parameters within specified accuracies and resolutions indicated in the following subparagraphs.

With the exception of position and any value calculated, reported sensor values should represent a weighted average with the highest and lowest values not included in the calculated average for the given interval. The averaging routine used should be consistent across all event triggers. This information should be documented in the DPIP sections that say "Calculations done external to the instrumentation."

These data-reporting requirements cover the collection of electronic data on a scow through the entire dredging cycle. Disposal events can consist of both open-water disposal and offloading. Open-water disposal is the placement of material via bottom doors or split hull. Offloading is the placement of material via either hydraulic or mechanical means.

3.1.1 Scow Name

Each scow shall be assigned a unique name that will remain constant from one dredging operation to the next.

3.1.2 Contract Number

The USACE-assigned contract number for the project will be reported.

3.1.3 Load Number

A DQM load number shall document the end of a disposal event for a given scow.

3.1.4 Horizontal Positioning

Horizontal positioning shall be recorded as the geographic coordinates of the vessel as indicated by the location of the Global Positioning System (GPS) antenna. All locations

shall be obtained using a positioning system operating with a minimum accuracy level of 1 to 3 meters horizontal Circular Error Probable (CEP). Positions shall be reported as Latitude/Longitude WGS 84 in decimal degrees. West Longitude and South Latitude values are reported as negative.

3.1.5 Date and Time

The date and time shall be reported to the nearest second and referenced to Universal Time Coordinated (UTC) based on a 24-hour format: yyyy-mm-dd hh:mm:ss.

3.1.6 Hull Status

Hull status is meant to reflect a condition when material could be removed or released from the scow.

For this contract, hull status shall register closed prior to leaving the disposal area.

3.1.6.1 Open-Water Disposal

An open split hull or open bottom door of a scow shall be indicated by reporting an "OPEN" value. A closed split hull or closed bottom door of a scow shall be indicated by reporting a "CLOSED" value. An open status shall be indicated as the bin starts to open, and a closed status shall be indicated only once the bin is fully closed. For pocket scows, the open/closed status shall correspond to the compartment which is first to open and last to close.

3.1.6.2 Offloading

For non-dumping scows, an "OPEN" value shall indicate that the bin is in the process of being unloaded, either by pumping or mechanical means.

3.1.7 Course

Scow course-over-ground (COG) shall be provided using industry-standard equipment. The Contractor shall provide scow course-over-ground (to the nearest whole degree) with values from 000 (true north) to 359 degrees referenced to a clockwise positive direction convention.

3.1.8 Speed

Scow speed-over-ground shall be provided in knots using industry-standard equipment with a minimum accuracy of 1.0 knot and resolution to the nearest 0.1 knot.

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3.1.9 Heading

Scow heading shall be provided using industry-standard equipment. The scow heading shall be accurate to within 5 degrees and reported to the nearest whole degree with values from 000 (true north) to 359 degrees referenced to a clockwise positive direction convention.

3.1.10 Draft

All reported draft measurements shall be in feet, tenths, and hundredths with an accuracy of \pm 0.1 foot relative to observed physical draft readings. The measurements shall be reported at a resolution of two decimal places (hundredths of a foot). The reported forward draft value shall be equal to the sum of the visual forward port and starboard draft mark readings divided by two. The reported aft draft value shall be equal to the sum of the visual aft port and starboard draft mark readings divided by two. Forward draft, aft draft, and average draft will be reported. Sensors shall be placed at an optimum location on the scow to be reflective of observed physical draft mark readings at any trim or list. Minimum accuracies are conditional to relatively calm water. The sensor value reported shall be an average of at least ten samples per event, with at least one maximum value and one minimum value removed, and the minimum eight remaining values averaged. When the average draft is calculated for the purpose of determining displacement, significant digits for average draft shall be maintained such that if forward draft were 0.15 and aft draft were 0.1, then the average draft would be 0.125.

3.1.11 Displacement

Scow displacement shall be reported in long tons, based on the most accurate method available for the scow. The minimum standard of accuracy for displacement is interpolation from the displacement table, based on the average draft. For this contract the density of water used to calculate displacement shall be 64 pounds/cubic foot.

3.2 NATIONAL DREDGING QUALITY MANAGEMENT PROGRAM SYSTEM REQUIREMENTS

The Contractor's DQM system shall be capable of collecting, displaying, and transmitting information to the DQM database. The parameters which shall be reported to the DQM database include trip number, date and time, hull status, scow course, scow speed, scow heading, draft, and displacement. An easily accessible, permanent visual display on the scow shall show in real time the parameters collected by the system in the same units as are used for data submitted to the DQM database. In the event a reported parameter is calculated based on multiple sensors, the sensor values as used in the equation shall be able to be viewed in addition to the required parameter. If a hardware problem occurs, or if a part of the system is physically damaged, then the Contractor shall be responsible for repairing it within 48 hours of determination of the condition.

3.2.1 Telemetry

The Contractor may select any commercial satellite, cellular phone, or other data communications systems available as long as it is capable of transmitting real-time data as well as enough additional bandwidth to clear historically queued data when a connection is reobtained. If connectivity is lost, unsent data shall be queued and transmitted upon restoration of connectivity. Delays in pushing real-time data to the DQM database should not exceed four hours. Exceptions to these requirements may be granted by the DQM Support Center on a case-by-case basis with consideration for contract-specific requirements, site-specific conditions, and extreme weather events.

The data transition process from the scow to the DQM database must be automated. The data may be sent from the scow directly to the DQM database or to a shore-based system. Data transmitted to the DQM database should be raw data; any processing of the data conducted shoreside shall be done using repeatable automated software or programming routine. A description of this process shall be included in the DPIP.

3.2.2 Data Reporting Frequency

Disposal activities shall be logged with high temporal and spatial resolution. Data shall be logged as a series of events. Each set of measurements (time, position, etc.) will be considered an event. Any required information in Paragraph 3.1, "Requirements for Reported Data," that is not an averaged variable (that is, draft and ullage) shall be collected within 1 second of the reported time. Data shall be measured with sufficient frequency by the scow system to resolve the events to the accuracy specified in the following table. Any averaged variable must be collected and computed within this sampling interval. Event types "Sailing," "Loading/Stationary," "Offloading," and "Open Water Disposal" are triggered by a time criterion; the criterion should be consistent across the "Sailing" and "Open Water Disposal" event types and should not change for the data collected on a given scow. This criterion should be documented by the Contractor in the DPIP.

Example: The scow is stationary for 1 hour and 15 minutes, and then it sails to the disposal area. You should have a "Loading/Stationary" event at time 0, time 1 hour, and time 1 hour and 15 minutes. Then, for "Sailing," within 1 second of an elapsed time of 1 minute from the 1 hour and 15 minutes event, another event occurs.

3.2.3 Data Transmission to the Web Service

A Simple Object Access Protocol (SOAP) web service shall be used to report sensor data to the DQM database. Data shall be transmitted as it is collected in real time and pushed to the DQM web service. If the web service is not available or returns an error message, the data shall be stored in a queue and transmitted upon re-establishment of the connection, starting with the oldest data in the queue and continuing until real-time transmission is restored.

Contact <u>dqm-support@usace.army.mil</u> to obtain the web service URL and the appropriate key credentials and communication protocol.

The data transmission method call takes two arguments: a string containing the plant identifier assigned by the DQM Support Center and a second string containing the XML-formatted sensor data. The method returns the string "OK" if the data is received. If the data is not received, either the web service or the client application throws an error.

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3.2.4 XML-Formatted Sensor Data String

Each scow event shall be passed as a string on one continuous line of data. The example below is broken up by variable for ease of reading:

DATE_TIME values shall be formatted as YYYY-MM-DD HH:MM:SS, as shown above. If, for any reason, a field has no value, the enclosing XML tags should be sent with nothing between them (for example, <DRAFT_AFT></DRAFT_AFT>). The web service cannot handle a "null" value or any other indicators of no value collected.

3.2.5 Contractor Data Backup

The Contractor shall maintain an archive of all data sent to the DQM database during the dredging contract. The Town may require, at no increase in the contract price, that the Contractor provide a copy of these data covering specified time periods. The data shall be provided in the HTML format which would have been transmitted to the DQM database. Data submission shall be via storage medium acceptable to the Town.

At the end of the dredging contract, the Contractor shall contact the DQM Support Center prior to discarding the data. The DQM Support Center will verify that all data has been received and appropriately archived before giving the Contractor discard permission. The

3.3 PERFORMANCE REQUIREMENTS

The Contractor's DQM system shall be fully operational at the start of dredging operations and fully certified prior to moving dredge material on the contract (see Paragraph 1.4, "National Dredging Quality Management Program Certification"). To meet contract requirements for operability, in addition to certification, the Contractor's system shall provide, at a minimum, a data string with values for all parameters while operating, as described within the specifications. Additionally, all hardware shall be compliant with DPIP requirements (Paragraph 1.5, "Dredge Plant Instrumentation Plan [DPIP]"). Quality data strings are considered to be those providing values for all parameters reported when operating according to the specification. Repairs necessary to restore data return compliance shall be made within 48 hours. Failure by the Contractor to report the required data within the specified time window for scow measurements (see Paragraph 3.2.2, "Data Reporting Frequency," and Paragraph 3.2.3, "Data Transmission to the Web Service") and failure to receive DQM certification prior to dredging will result in withholding of up to 10% of the contract progress payment per clause 52.232-5.





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

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FINANCIAL & PROPOSITION 2½ TERMS

Chapter 59, section 21C of the Massachusetts General Laws is commonly referred to as Proposition 2½ (Prop. 2½) or the Tax Limiting Law for Cities and Towns in Massachusetts.

LEVY: The property tax levy is the revenue a Town can raise through real and personal property taxes. The property tax levy is the largest source of revenue for the Town.

LEVY CEILING: This is the maximum the levy can be. The ceiling equals 2.5% of the Town's full and fair cash value. The levy limit is equivalent to a tax rate of \$25.00.

LEVY LIMIT: The maximum the levy can be in a given year. The limit is based on the previous year's levy limit plus certain allowable increases, such as debt exclusions.

LEVY LIMIT INCREASE: The levy limit automatically increases each year by 2.5% of the previous year's levy limit.

<u>NEW GROWTH:</u> New construction and new parcel subdivision may also increase the Town's levy limit.

OVERRIDE: A community can permanently increase its levy limit by successfully voting at a referendum to exceed the limits. A community may take this action as long as it is below the levy ceiling.

<u>DEBT EXCLUSION:</u> This type of override ballot question can be placed on a referendum by a two- thirds vote of the Selectboard. If a majority of the voters approve the ballot question, the Town's levy limit is increased only for the amount voted at the referendum for the life of that debt only. The levy limit increase may exceed the Town's levy ceiling.

<u>DEBT SERVICE:</u> The repayment cost, usually stated in annual terms and based on an amortization schedule, of the principal and interest owed on any particular bond issue.

ENCUMBRANCE: A reservation of funds to cover obligations chargeable to but not yet paid from a specific appropriation account.

<u>CAPITAL OUTLAY EXPENDITURES EXCLUSION:</u> This type of override ballot question can be placed on a referendum by a two-thirds vote of the Selectboard. If a majority of the voters approve the ballot question, the additional amount for the payment of the capital project cost is added to the levy limit or levy ceiling only for the year in which the project is being undertaken.

CONTINGENT VOTES: Chapter 59, section 21C (m) permits a Town Meeting to appropriate funds contingent upon passage of a referendum question (OVERRIDE/DEBT EXCLUSION). A contingent vote does not automatically result in an override referendum. An override referendum can only be called by the Selectboard. If a referendum is called by the Selectmen, it must take place within forty-five days of the Town Meeting vote.

TOWN MEETING PROCEDURES

A quorum of 6% of the Town's registered voters must be present in order to conduct business (Charter: Sect. 2-1-3).

Voters are identified by voter cards issued when they check in with the registrars at the beginning of the meeting.

Only voters may participate in voice votes. In case of a counted vote, voters will be identified by their voter cards.

Non-voters who have been admitted to the meeting must sit in the section designated for them. Non-voters who may wish to speak must identify themselves and may address the meeting only by permission of the Moderator (Charter: Sect. 2-1-2).

No voter will be allowed to speak until recognized by the Moderator.

Voters and others recognized to address Town Meeting may only speak twice to any motion or amendment unless authorized by the Moderator (Charter: Sect. 2-7-8).

All motions or amendments must be in writing and be legible. Exceptions for very simple motions or amendments are at the discretion of the Moderator (General Bylaws: Sect. II–2).

The order of consideration of the Articles as printed in the Warrant may be changed only by a 2/3 majority vote (Charter: Sect. 2-7-4).

A motion for indefinite postponement, if passed, ends any proposal under the motion currently being debated. It may only be made after a voter has been recognized and may not come at the end of a speaker's remarks. It is fully debatable to the same extent as the main motion under consideration.

A motion to end debate (known as a "motion for the previous question") must be made by a voter who has been properly recognized. Anonymous cries from voters to "call the question" are out of order and will be ignored by the Moderator. As a motion to end debate requires an additional 2/3 majority vote, it may be more efficient to hear from one or two more speakers and then proceed to a vote on the main motion itself.

A motion to reconsider must be made at the same session as the vote it seeks to reconsider. It can only be made after some intervening business and must be made within one hour of the vote to be reconsidered (Charter: Sect. 2-7-9). It is debatable to the same extent as the motion it seeks to reconsider and requires a majority vote. A motion to reconsider will only be allowed if there is new information that was not available at the time of the original debate. A motion to reconsider will be ruled out of order if, in the judgment of the Moderator, it is simply an attempt at "another bite at the apple."

Some other common motions which require more than a simple majority to pass:

Zoning bylaws (except those subject to majority vote per Housing Choice Act)

2/3 majority

To authorize borrowing or incur debt 2/3 majority
To transfer or sell Town land 2/3 majority
To approve proposed Charter amendments 2/3 majority

To pay unpaid bills of a prior fiscal year 4/5 majority at an annual town meeting

9/10 majority at a special town meeting

The Human Resource Directors' duties would include administering employee insurance programs; planning and implementing the human resource requirements for the town; acting as central personnel file repository; providing the administration with appropriate recruitment, training, and other human resource development programs and activities conforming to federal, state, and local requirements such as ADA, EEO, HIPAA, workers' compensation statutes, MCAD, and town personnel policies. SUMMARY: This article seeks funding for an overview survey life in Wellfleet harbor as recommended in the Harbor Management Plan (March 2021). It replicates a Division of Marine Fisheries study, which is now nearly 50 years old. We plan a broad survey of harbor life – finfish and wild shellfish at the top, phytoplankton, and harbor grasses at the base. Selected sites of specific interest will be included. Local knowledge will be consulted throughout. NRAB views this work as a critical step in identifying and preserving the health of the harbor in view of climate change and other environmental impacts.

<u>ARTICLE NO. 7 – ADULT COMMUNITY CENTER ADDITION</u> <u>FEASIBILITY STUDY PROJECT</u>:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate and/or transfer from available funds the sum of \$15,000.00, or any other sum, for the purpose of paying costs associated with conducting an Adult Community Center Building Addition Feasibility study, to do or act on anything thereon.

SUMMARY: In the past, several alterations and additions have been proposed for the Adult Community Center.

- Based on plans from 2013, creation of a paved walkway through the woods on the Cahoon Hollow side of the building of one-half mile that connects to the walkway and patio that were installed in 2014. That project was funded with a bequest and there were insufficient funds to complete the entire plan. This walkway will provide access for walkers both able bodied and those with some mobility challenges in a sheltered place by a building with good parking and amenities.
- When Sea Babies (Cape Cod Children's Place) was using space in the building, they applied for and received a grant from the Community Preservation Committee to install an Infant/Toddler playground. They moved from the building in June of 2020 and the playground is still there but not maintained. I have had requests to purchase and install adult outdoor exercise equipment for the use of adults adjacent to the existing Infant/Toddler playground.
- The Council on Aging Board conducted a survey of Town residents in 2021 to determine what people would like to see added to the programs at the Adult Community Center. One of the top requests was space for exercise equipment and for free weights. Given the use of the Great Pond Room for COA programs as well as Boards and Committees and as the Wellfleet Polling place, there is no space for this healthy and entertaining activity in the current building. In addition to floor space, a locker room and outside access to the gym will be necessary.
- Because we live in a Pandemic, post-Pandemic world, there is a need for building capacity for hybrid meetings. Because the Adult Community Center is the designated location for that upgrade/expansion, that program will need

space to do the job correctly. Additionally, there has been a request for an additional small meeting room like the current Conference Room.

In order to do this in an organized way, I want to do the planning of this multi-level project in one study so that if the decision is made to implement it in stages, everything will fit onto the available land and the end product will be produced with the best fiscal and construction practices in order to create an attractive and functional building and grounds.

After months of meetings and conversations the Board has signed a purchase and sale agreement with the owners of Maurice's Campground to purchase their 21.25 acres of land for the Town of Wellfleet.

The driving force behind wanting to make this purchase is to help with the lack of affordable and workforce housing affecting towns across the Cape and especially Wellfleet. The Town has signed a purchase and sale agreement for the property for \$6.5M, with a closing date on Oct. 31, 2022 pending Town Meeting approval. The Town will continue to run the campground and receive the revenue generated for at least 6 years while the planning and permitting processes take place.

Wellfleet's lack of affordable year-round housing has been well documented in the Town's 2017 Housing Needs Assessment and Action Plan. By State standards, Wellfleet's Affordable Housing constitutes 2.5% of total housing, the lowest percentage on the Cape. The State goal is 10%. Year-round housing has been lost to seasonal ownership and short-term rentals while prices have skyrocketed. Local year round rentals are virtually nonexistent. Wellfleet is losing young families at an alarming rate.

The initial estimate is that the annual cost of a \$6.5 million dollar bond will cost the owner of a median priced home an average of less than \$80 per year. (Based on a 30-year level payment bond at a 4% interest rate.)

<u>ARTICLE NO. 14 - ADOPTION OF ENABLING LEGISLATION FOR THE DISPOSITION OF UNCLAIMED PROPERTY:</u>

DISPOSITION OF UNCLAIMED PROPERTY

- (a) In any city, town or district that accepts this section in the manner provided in Section 4 of chapter 4, there shall be an alternative procedure for disposing of abandoned funds held in the custody of the city, town or district as provided in this section.
- (b) Any funds held in the custody of a city, town or district may be presumed by the city, town or district treasurer to be abandoned unless claimed by the corporation, organization, beneficiary or person entitled thereto within one 1 year after the date prescribed for payment or delivery; provided, however, that the last instrument intended as payment shall bear upon its face the statement "void if not cashed within 1 year from date of issue." After the expiration of one 1 year after the date of issue, the treasurer of a city, town or district may cause the financial institution upon which the instrument was drawn to stop payment on the instrument or otherwise cause the financial institution to decline payment on the instrument and any claims made beyond that date shall only be paid by the city, town or district through the issuance of a new instrument. The city, town or district and the financial institution shall not be liable for damages, consequential or otherwise, resulting from a refusal to honor an instrument of a city, town or district submitted for payment more than a year after its issuance.
- (c) The treasurer of a city, town or district holding funds owed to a corporation, organization, beneficiary or person entitled thereto that are presumed to be abandoned under this section shall post a notice entitled "Notice of names of persons appearing to be owners of funds held by Town of Wellfleet, and deemed abandoned". The notice shall specify the names of those persons who appear from available information to be entitled to such funds, shall provide a description of the appropriate method for claiming the funds and shall state a deadline for those funds to be claimed; provided, however, that the deadline shall not be less than 60 days after the date the notice was either postmarked or first posted on a website as provided in this section. The treasurer of the city, town or district may post such notice using either of the following methods: (1) by mailing the notice by first class mail, postage prepaid, to the last known address of the beneficiary or person entitled thereto; or (2) if the city, town or district maintains an official website, by

posting the notice conspicuously on the website for not less than 60 days. If the apparent owner fails to respond within 60 days after the mailing or posting of the notice, the treasurer shall cause a notice of the check to be published in a newspaper of general circulation, printed in English, in the county in which the city or town is located.

- (d) In the event that funds appearing to be owed to a corporation, organization, beneficiary or person is \$100 or more and the deadline as provided in the notice has passed and no claim for the funds has been made, the treasurer shall cause an additional notice, in substantially the same form as the aforementioned notice, to be published in a newspaper of general circulation in the county in which the city, town or district is located; provided, however, that the notice shall provide an extended deadline beyond which funds shall not be claimed and such deadline shall be at least 1 year from the date of publication of the notice.
- (e) Once the final deadline has passed under subsection (d), the funds owed to the corporation, organization, beneficiary or person entitled thereto shall escheat to the city, town or district and the treasurer thereof shall record the funds as revenue in the General Fund of the city, town or district and the city, town or district shall not be liable to the corporation, organization, beneficiary or person for payment of those funds or for the underlying liability for which the funds were originally intended. Upon escheat, the funds shall be available to the city, town, or district's appropriating authority for appropriation for any other public purpose. In addition to the notices required in this section, the treasurer of the city, town or district may initiate any other notices or communications that are directed in good faith toward making final disbursement of the funds to the corporation, organization, beneficiary, or person entitled thereto. Prior to escheat of the funds, the treasurer of the city, town or district shall hear all claims on funds that may arise and if it is clear, based on a preponderance of the evidence available to the treasurer at the time the claim is made, that the claimant is entitled to disbursement of the funds, the treasurer shall disburse funds to the claimant upon receipt by the treasurer of a written indemnification agreement from the claimant wherein the claimant agrees to hold the city, town or district and the treasurer of the city, town or district harmless in the event it is later determined that the claimant was not entitled to receipt of the funds. If it is not clear, based on a preponderance of the evidence before the treasurer at the time of the claim that the claimant is entitled to disbursement of the funds, the treasurer shall

segregate the funds into a separate, interest-bearing account and shall notify the claimant of such action within 10 days. A claimant affected by this action may appeal within 20 days after receiving notice thereof to the district, municipal or superior court in the county in which the city, town or district is located. The claimant shall have a trial de novo. A party adversely affected by a decree or order of the district, municipal or superior court may appeal to the appeals court or the supreme judicial court within 20 days from the date of the decree.

If the validity of the claim shall be determined in favor of the claimant or another party, the treasurer shall disburse funds in accordance with the order of the court, including interest accrued. If the validity of the claim is determined to be not in favor of the claimant or another party or if the treasurer does not receive notice that an appeal has been filed within one 1 year from the date the claimant was notified that funds were being withheld, then the funds, plus accrued interest, shall escheat to the city, town or district in the manner provided in this section. If the claimant is domiciled in another state or country and the city, town or district determines that there is no reasonable assurance that the claimant will actually receive the payment provided for in this section in substantially full value, the superior court, in its discretion or upon a petition by the city, town or district, may order that the city, town or district retain the funds.

Amendment

Effective on May 1, 2023, the Commercial Single Use Plastic Water Bottle Ban will be amended as printed below.

Section 49. Commercial Single-Use Plastic Non-Alcoholic Beverage Bottle Ban

Section 1. Sale of Single-use Plastic Water Bottles

Effective on September 1, 2021, it shall be unlawful to sell non-carbonated, unflavored drinking water in single-use plastic bottles of less than one gallon in the Town of Wellfleet. Enforcement of this regulation will begin September 1, 2021.

Section 2. Sale of Other Plastic Non-Alcoholic Carbonated Beverage Bottles Effective on May 1, 2023, it shall be unlawful to sell non-alcoholic carbonated beverages in plastic bottles of less than 21 oz. Enforcement of this regulation will begin May 1, 2023.

Section 3. Definitions

A single-use plastic bottle is a beverage container made from any type of plastic resin.

Section 4. Exemptions

Sales or distribution of non-carbonated, unflavored drinking water in plastic bottles occurring subsequent to a declaration of emergency (by the Emergency Management Director or other duly authorized Town, County, Commonwealth or Federal official) affecting the ability and/or quality of drinking water to residents of the Town shall be exempt from this bylaw until seven days after the declaration has ended.

Section 5. Enforcement

Enforcement of this article shall be the responsibility of the Town Administrator of his/her designee and/or any police officer of the Town. The Town Administrator shall determine the inspection process to be followed, incorporating the process into other Town duties as appropriate. Any establishment conducting sales in violation of this article shall be subject to a non- criminal disposition fine as specified in G.L. Chapter 40 21D. The following penalties apply:

First violation: Written Warning
Second violation: \$150.00 fine.

• Third and subsequent violations: \$300.00 fine

Each day a violation continues constitutes a separate violation, incurring additional fines. Any such fines collected shall be payable to the Town of Wellfleet. All businesses will be routinely inspected until the Town Administrator deems the inspection to no longer be required.

Section 6. Severability

If any provision of this Bylaw should be declared invalid, void, or unenforceable by a court of competent jurisdiction, all other provisions shall remain in force and effect.

SUMMARY:

- The Commercial Plastic Water Bottle Ban has been very successful on Cape Cod. This ban has now been passed in ten Cape Cod towns (Brewster, Chatham, Dennis, Eastham, Falmouth, Harwich, Mashpee, Orleans, Provincetown, and Wellfleet). Alternatives to plastic water bottles are now widely available. Examples include water refill stations, and retail sales of still or sparkling water in aluminum bottles and cans, chilled coffee in aluminum cans, refillable beer growlers, and refillable glass milk bottles.
- The proposed amendment expands the water bottle ban to all non-alcoholic beverage bottles of less than 21 ounces. This targets plastic beverage bottles in single serve sizes and is based on the New York City municipal ban passed in 2020. Plastic litter has adverse health consequences for us, marine species, and our natural environment. The Section 49 Bylaw will be renamed Commercial Plastic Non-Alcoholic Beverage Bottle Ban, and the term "single-use" will be removed from the bylaw to avoid confusion with the new term "single-serve".

Further, after an initial contact or conflict with a wild animal, no person shall continue to provide, or otherwise fail to secure or remove, any likely food sources or attractants.

C. The prohibitions of this section shall not apply to naturally growing shrubs, live crops, plants, flowers, vegetation, gardens, or trees.

Section 3. Enforcement

A. The Animal Control Officer and/or Park Rangers shall enforce the provisions of this article.

B. Violations of this article shall be enforceable under the noncriminal disposition procedures established by M.G.L. c. 40, § 21d. The noncriminal disposition penalties for any person violating this article shall be a written warning for the first violation; \$25 for the second violation; \$100 for the third violation; and \$300 for each subsequent violation. Each day of violation shall constitute a separate offense.

SUMMARY: The size of dwellings within cottage colonies are ideal for housing that might be affordable to local residents and not be income restricted. That Wellfleet has functionally restricted approximately 10% of its housing stock to seasonal use only while we struggle to retain and develop year-round housing is counterproductive. This class of housing also tends to be of modest proportions. It thus commands a lower seasonal rent on the market, making it utterly unreasonable to be restricted to seasonal occupancy only. Wellfleet's year-round housing crisis is well documented. Wellfleet badly needs a more balanced blend of housing options. From young people and families to seniors and well-paid professionals, finding and keeping a year-round rental is less and less possible. Businesses of all types and even the Town's departments struggle to find employees because of the high cost and lack of year-round housing. The housing crisis is impacting both residents and visitors as it is already affecting the Town's quality of life and economic sustainability.

6.26 Affordable Dwelling Developments (Added 4/26/2011)

6.26.1 Purpose

The purpose of this by-law is to further the goal of encouraging various lot sizes and housing types for persons of various income levels in accordance with Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 40A, Section 9 which allows municipalities to adopt "incentive" ordinances for the creation of affordable year round dwellings, and for the purpose of helping people who, because of rising land prices, have been unable to obtain suitable housing at an affordable price and maintaining a stable economy by preventing out-migration of residents who provide essential services.

6.26.2 Authority

The Planning Board is hereby designated the special permit granting authority for all Affordable Dwelling Development applications under this by-law, and shall have the power to hear and decide applications for special permits and to adopt regulations for carrying out its duties under this by-law.

For the purpose of promoting the development of affordable dwellings in Wellfleet, the Planning Board may by special permit allow the creation of Affordable Dwellings in residential and commercial zoning districts consistent with Section 5.3.1 of the Zoning By-laws. All Affordable Dwellings created shall

be for the primary and sole domicile of the eligible tenant or owner for year-round occupancy.

- 6.26.3 Special Permit Requirements for Affordable Dwellings
- A. The Planning Board shall have the discretion to reduce the off-street parking requirements otherwise applicable under Section 3.1.3.2 where:
- (1) the number of units to be restricted under Section 6.26 equals or exceeds twenty-five percent (25%) of the total units, and;
- (2) the applicant demonstrates that the proposed parking is sufficient to address the parking needs of the Affordable Dwelling and/or Affordable Dwelling Development.
- B. The second unit created, and at a minimum, every fourth unit created there-after shall be deed restricted as permanently affordable units, per the applicable standards in Section 6.26.7 below.
- C. An Affordable Dwelling Unit must have the following minimum areas:
- studio two hundred fifty (250) square feet
- one bedroom units seven hundred (700) square feet
- two bedroom units nine hundred (900) square feet
- three bedroom units one thousand two hundred (1,200) square feet
- four bedroom units one thousand four hundred (1,400) square feet
- D. The Affordable Dwelling Development must conform to all other requirements of the Zoning By-law. In the event that a provision of Section 6.28 conflicts with another provision of the By-law, the provisions of Section 6.28 shall control.

6.26.4 Standards and Criteria

In reviewing applications under this by-law, the Planning Board shall apply the following standards and criteria:

- A. At least twenty-five percent (25%) of all dwelling units created under this bylaw shall be restricted as provided for under 6.26.7;
- B. At least twenty-five percent (25%) of the total number of bedrooms within any Affordable Dwelling Development shall be within said restricted dwelling units;

- C. The applicant has conformed to the standards and criteria of this by-law and will deliver the needed Affordable Dwelling Units;
- D. The proposed development is suitable for the proposed location, with proportions, orientation, materials, landscaping and other features that provide a stable and desirable character complementary and integral with the site's natural features;
- E. The development, density increase or relaxation of zoning standards has no material, detrimental effect on the character of the neighborhood or Town and is consistent with the performance standards in Section 8.4.2 of the Wellfleet Zoning By-laws.
- 6.26.5 Area, Setback and Frontage Requirements for Affordable Dwelling Units and Developments
- A. The Planning Board shall have discretion to reduce or suspend the minimum area and frontage requirements otherwise applicable under Section 5.4.1 of the Wellfleet Zoning By-laws for an Affordable Dwelling Development, provided however that there must be at least 10,000 square feet of lot area for each bedroom created in an Affordable Dwelling Development.
- B. Where an applicant proposes to divide the tract of land that is the locus of a proposed Affordable Dwelling Development, the minimum lot size shall be twenty thousand (20,000) square feet for each affordable unit. All other units included in the development shall comply with lot area requirements in Section 5.4.1 of this Zoning By-law.
- C. The Planning Board may, in its sole discretion, reduce the front, side or rear yard setback requirements of Section 5.4.2, provided however, that said setbacks shall be no less than ten (10) feet.
- D. In the case of a subdivided lot, the Planning Board shall have discretion to reduce or suspend the minimum road width for access and frontage may be created through the establishment of a common driveway deemed to provide safe and adequate access.
- E. The Planning Board shall have the discretion to permit a density of less than 10,000 square feet for each bedroom if the applicant can demonstrate to the satisfaction of the Planning Board and the Board of Health that the sewage disposal

system servicing the development will result in nitrogen loading of less than ten (10) parts per million.

6.26.6 .7 Affordable Dwelling Restrictions in Affordable Developments [This whole section needs to rewritten]

As a condition to any special permit issued under Section 6.28, the applicant shall be required to execute an affordable dwelling restriction ("Restriction") in a form acceptable

to the Planning Board. All restrictions shall be for perpetuity or the longest period allowed by law. The special permit shall not be exercised until the applicant records the Restriction in the Registry of Deeds.

A. The Restriction shall provide that units made available for ownership shall be made available to households earning at or below eighty percent (80%) of the Barnstable County median income (BCMI), adjusted for household size.

The initial sales price of such units shall be calculated on the basis of what a household at seventy percent (70%) of the BCMI could afford to pay (assume a household size of one more than the number of bedrooms in the unit). In determining this amount:

- 1) no more than thirty percent (30%) of the household's gross income may be allocated to housing costs (mortgage principal and interest, real estate taxes, house and private mortgage insurance, and any homeowners' association or condominium fees);
- 2) current interest rates offered for thirty (30) year, no point fixed rate loans with down payments of 5% of total cost shall be applied; and
- 3) current real estate taxes for the Town of Wellfleet shall be used.
- B. Any lot containing an Affordable Dwelling shall be subject to a recorded restriction that shall restrict the lot owner's ability to convey interest in the Affordable Dwelling except leasehold estates for the term of the restriction or sale to an income qualified individual or family in accordance with Section 6.28.7 below.
- C. It shall be a condition upon every special permit issued under this by-law that the applicant shall comply with any Massachusetts Department of Housing and Community Development ("DHCD") regulations under Chapter 40B of the

Massachusetts General Laws and guidelines for qualification of the dwelling units created under this By-law towards the Town's subsidized housing inventory, including but not limited to the form of the affordable dwelling restriction and regulations concerning tenant selection and marketing, unit design standards, and income eligibility standards and maximum rent or sale price.

D. In the event that a dwelling unit subject to a restriction created under this Bylaw becomes vacant, the owner shall give written notice to the Wellfleet Housing Authority. It is the intent of this by-law that a local preference shall be used in filling vacancies to the extent permitted by DHCD regulations and guidelines and state or federal laws.

E. An Affordable Dwelling available for rental shall be rented to households earning at or below eighty percent (80%) of the Barnstable County median income (BCMI), adjusted for household size. Maximum rents for studio, one-bedroom, two-bedroom, etc., units respectively, shall be in accordance with current Housing and Urban Development (HUD) published Fair Market Rental Guidelines for Barnstable County.

All occupants of the affordable dwelling shall upon initial application and annually thereafter submit to the Town or its agent necessary documentation to confirm their eligibility for the dwelling unit.

Property owners are required to submit to the Town or its agent information on the rents to be charged along with a lease for a one year period. Each year thereafter they shall submit information to the Town or its agent on annual rents charged along with a one year lease.

- F. This section shall not prevent a lot owner from building an affordable dwelling that meets the requirements of this by-law and from transferring such dwelling and lot to an income eligible immediate family member (sibling, parent or child) by gift or inheritance, provided that the restriction required by Section 6.28.7 is properly recorded prior to issuance of a building permit.
- G. Penalty Failure to comply with any provision of this section may result in fines established in Section 8.3 of the Wellfleet Zoning By-laws. Any profits or proceeds from leasing, rental or sale which has not received prior consent from the Wellfleet Housing Authority, shall be paid to the Wellfleet Affordable Housing Trust Fund.

SUMMARY:

These amendments resolve an inconsistency in our zoning bylaws where the Planning Board has previously reserved their rights as a Special Permit Granting Authority. The definitions previously contained in PROVISIONS TO ENCOURAGE THE DEVELOPMENT OF AFFORDABLE DWELLINGS IN WELLFLEET are moved to section 2.1 Definitions. The Use Table (Section 5.2) is updated to reflect the pre-existing bylaw. The minimum lot size is not required in the definition as it separately controlled by 6.26.7 B. The amendments renumber the current section 6.28 to 6.26 and updates to numbering within the bylaw reflect that the definitions have been moved to section 2.1. Wellfleet does not currently have a section 6.26 or 6.27 in our Zoning Bylaws.

2.1 DEFINITIONS

An affordable undersized lot shall be subject to any conditions attached to a Special Permit issued by The Special Permit Granting Authority.

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6.27 Affordable Lots and Affordable Undersized Lots

6.271 Purpose: The purpose of this bylaw is to increase the supply of housing that is

available and permanently affordable to low- or moderate-income households by allowing affordable dwellings to be built on otherwise non-complying lots, provided the lots meet the criteria listed herein.

6.272 Applicability - This bylaw applies shall apply to lots of record as of January 1, 2022 which do not meet the zoning requirements for a lot as determined by The Town. Any increase in tax assessment for an applicable lot shall only occur upon an issuance of a building permit for an affordable One Family Dwelling on that applicable lot.

Any Dwellings created under this bylaw shall as low or moderate income units for purposes of M.G.L. Ch. 40B sec. 20-23 and shall be in compliance with 760 CMR 56.00 the Local Initiative Program (LIP) and shall meet the guidelines and standards promulgated thereunder by the Department of Housing and Community Development (DHCD) for inclusion in the DHCD Ch 40B Subsidized Housing Inventory as Local Action Units.

- 6.273 The Building Inspector may allow construction of a One Family Dwelling, restricted by a Regulatory Agreement and/or Deed Rider, in an acceptable form, executed and recorded by the applicant, as an affordable homeownership or rental dwelling unit in perpetuity or the maximum time period allowed by law, on an eligible parcel of land that meets the following criteria:
 - 1. Parcel is not within the National Seashore Park District.
 - 2. Parcel has no existing dwelling unit
 - 3. Parcel contains at least 10,000 square feet of contiguous upland area.
 - 4. Parcel satisfies applicable Board of Health requirements.
 - 5. Parcel satisfies applicable Town of Wellfleet's Conservation Commission Environmental Protection Regulations.
 - 6. Parcel has a minimum of twenty (20) feet of frontage on a way previously approved by the Planning Board or a public way, having, in the opinion of the Planning Board, sufficient width, suitable grades and adequate construction to provide the needs of vehicular traffic. Lots without suitable frontage may be Permitted under this section if there is an adequate recorded access easement of at least twenty (20) feet in

- width from the lot to a previously way approved by the Planning Board or a public way, having, in the opinion of the Planning Board, sufficient width, suitable grades and adequate construction to provide the needs of vehicular traffic and emergency response apparatus.
- 7. The setbacks shall not be less than fifteen (15) feet. If a dwelling is built within twenty-five (25) feet of any other dwelling or principal structure a stockage type fence at least 6' in height shall be required by the Permit Granting Authority.
- 8. A applicant under this Section shall submit a site plan that depicts the dimensions and setbacks of the subject Parcel, and the existing setbacks of principal structures on the lots immediately adjacent to the subject lot must be shown on the plans.
- 9. A Parcel shall not be built upon if the Parcel; was purposely created, subject to a deed restriction or designated as an unbuildable lot as part of a subdivision open space or park, or by any other condition or agreement with the Town.

- 11. No part of any access driveway may be within fifteen (15) feet of a principal structure on an adjoining lot.
- 12. The Applicant submits a Regulatory Agreement and Affordable Housing Deed Rider, to be approved as to form by Town Counsel, that restricts the use of the dwelling unit to Low- or Moderate-Income housing in perpetuity, or the maximum time period allowed by law. Said Regulatory Agreement shall include an Affirmative Fair Marketing Plan that complies with DHCD's requirements for the selection of income-eligible tenants/occupants and shall identify a Monitoring Agent who shall be responsible for ensuring that any re-sales of units created under this bylaw shall be made to income-eligible purchasers and comply with the Affirmative Fair Marketing Plan and Affordable Housing Deed Rider. The Applicant shall work with the Town to provide any information necessary to ensure that units created under this bylaw are eligible for inclusion on the Subsidized Housing Inventory maintained by the DHCD as Local Action Units. No building permit (or no certificate of occupancy?) shall be issued until the Regulatory Agreement and Affordable Housing Deed Rider has been approved by Town Counsel, executed by all parties, and recorded at the registry of deeds and proof of such recording has been furnished to the Building Inspector.

- 6.274 The Zoning Board of Appeals As the Special Permit Granting Authority under this section The Zoning Board of Appeals, may grant a special permit to allow construction of a One Family Dwelling, to be restricted as an affordable homeownership or rental dwelling unit in perpetuity or the maximum time period allowed by law, on a lot less than 10,000 square feet of upland if:
 - 1. The Board finds that such a reduction in minimum lot requirement would further the purposes of the bylaw without causing any undue nuisance, hazard or congestion in the Town or neighborhood.

SUMMARY:

This bylaw provides limited relief of zoning requirements to promote the development of otherwise unbuildable lots solely for the purpose of deed-restricted affordable single-family homes in perpetuity or the maximum allowable period by law. The relief granted is a reduction in the minimum lot size, frontage, and setbacks. There are a total of 18 parcels that have a high probability and 26 additional parcels where it may be applicable. These parcels are largely within neighborhoods of similarly sized lots. There is no increase in tax burden borne by the owner of one of these parcels until a building permit has been issued. This bylaw will only apply to pre-existing lots and will not be appliable new lots. 10,000 sq ft is the minimum allowed lot size for Title V septic systems. It is important to note that other issues could cause a lot to be functionally unbuildable such as the location of abutter's wells and septic systems. This is an opportunity for private parties to build a limited number of affordable units that would remain affordable in perpetuity.

Replacement of Squad 80/2015 Ford Pickup Truck

The Fire Department's Squad 80, a 2015 Ford F-250 pickup truck is utilized on a daily basis (several times a day). It is on the Town's Capital Improvement Plan to be replaced in FY-2024.

However, we are now experiencing issues with the exhaust and regeneration of diesel fuel/engine oil which if not able to be corrected soon will result in the engine being destroyed. We are looking for the replacement filter which would prevent this situation, but, due to supply chain issues the required filter is not available, and, very possibly not available in at least a year, if ever.

We have reached out to a couple of dealers to seek information to replace this vehicle and this could be anywhere from 18-24 months, again, because of supply chain issues. It is imperative that we have the ability to replace this vehicle as soon as possible (and be able to order its replacement in the very short future). We are researching various pickup trucks of the same capability, but, would go with a gasoline engine and a vehicle of lighter weight payload, better efficiencies, etc.

In the meantime, we are reducing the use of the current Squad 80 as much as possible in attempt to extend its life span. Currently, we have no choice but to seek approval at the September special town meeting to replace this vehicle. The estimated cost to replace this vehicle is \$65,000.00. I am respectfully requesting that we place the replacement of this vehicle on the September Town Warrant to be paid for by free cash or the Ambulance Receipts Fund.

I am attaching additional documentation regarding this request, and, as always, please don't hesitate to contact me with any questions or should you need more information.

Chief,

Recently Squad 80 has been going through some issues with the exhaust and regeneration. Per mechanic Josh Ford we have regenerated the vehicle 3 times since January 1, 2022, which is overly excessive. The newer diesel engines require an additive called DEF- Diesel Exhaust Fluid, as well as more stringent emissions regulations. The vehicles are designed to regenerate over the road, which cleans the exhaust filter, unfortunately our vehicle has reached the point where we can no longer regenerate. With this happening diesel fuel gets injected into the engine oil which in turn will ruin the engine.

Josh has reached out to numerous mechanics as well as Ford dealers and found that we can not have the vehicle regenerated on a specialized machine, we must replace the filter. All the dealers stated that they have 4-5 vehicles in there lots with the same problem, and the parts are not available and there are no time frames for parts.

Customer notified from previous invoice that unit was overdue for service based on hours and mileage. Customer stated that during use unit had been making an engine whine that was becoming louder. Unit had oil and filter changed with new noting oil smelled of fuel and appeared thin in lubricity removing approximately 1 ½ to 2 gallons surplus of oil obtaining and sending out an

oil sample to confirm fuel suspicion and cause for excess oil, adding 14 quarts new oil to reach correct level and fuel filters changed with new noting that the reported whistle / whine no longer present following the oil change. Policy on Vehicle Rollover

Original Date: October 28, 2008

2008-1

During the early years of the life of a vehicle (the length determined by the warrantee), the expense of ownership consists of monthly note payments, insurance premiums, tags and the cost of manufacturer's recommended servicing; i.e. oil, lube, fluids, tune ups and the price of labor to perform this preventive maintenance.

As a vehicle becomes more seasoned, the cost of operating and maintaining it (brakes, tires, clutch and other mechanical as well as electrical systems) increases. While this is happening, the trade-in value decreases.

At some point two decisions have to be made.

- 1. Do we continue pumping time and funds into keeping this vehicle running as intended or is it more cost-effective to replace it?
- 2. During the expected life of a replacement, is it more cost-effective to purchase or rent the replacement or subcontract the work?

To facilitate these decisions, effective October 28, 2008 requests for the replacement of Town vehicles must be supported with:

- ♦ Description of vehicle being replaced including Department ID# and VIN
- Purchase date of vehicle being replaces
- Base purchase price of vehicle being replaced
- Extras asses and cost (radio, lights, plow, etc.)
- Manufacturer's projected life-span of vehicle being replaced
- Primary use of the vehicle
- Secondary use; i.e. snow removal
- Base price quote of replacement
- Price quote for needed extras such as radios, plow, etc.
- ◆ Target date for replacement
- ♦ Manufacturer's expected normal lifespan of replacement
- Expected lifespan under Wellfleet conditions
- Projected trade in value of vehicle being replaced as of September 20, 2022.
- Projected auction value of vehicle being replaced as of September 20, 2022, if not traded in.
- Maintenance records including:
 - 1. Service performed, date of service performed, service provider if not DPW employee.
 - 2. Mileage and fuel consumption rate at date of service, engine hours at date of service
 - 3. Projected service requirements in next 12 months, and projected costs
- Cost of leasing replacement vehicle and terms
- Cost of renting replacement vehicle and terms
- Cost and terms of subcontracting the work

Re: Long Pond – transfer from the Beach Fund

On January 4, 2022, I went before the Selectboard to request permission to remove the stairs at Gull Pond and at Long Pond. Gull Pond was approved but the SB wanted the stairs at Long Pond to be repaired. I also discussed the need for improved fencing and for the removal of the dead trees.

On March 2, the Conscom approved the plan to remove the stairs at Gull and revegetate and to repair the stairs at Long Pond and to erect permanent fencing.

I spoke to Charlie Sumner about getting a transfer from the Beach Fund and he recommended that I request the funding in the STM that would happen in the Fall.

I don't yet have a written estimate from the fence company but Peter Williams did a site visit with the fence company rep and estimates \$10,000 to \$12,000 for the fence, another \$10,000 to \$11,000 for the stairs and another \$2,000 for incidentals like the chips and signage.

I spoke to Jay Norton on July 26, 2022 and asked him about scheduling the project and the funding. He is of the opinion that it would be more effective to get the funding at the STM rather than wait until the ATM in April of 2023.

I would like to be on the agenda for the August 2 SB meeting in order to place the request for the transfer on the STM warrant.

Re: Replacement of Long Pond stairs and installation of new fencing

I brought the proposal to remove the existing stairs at both Gull Pond and Long Pond and to revegetate those areas to stabilize the banks to the Selectboard for approval. They voted to permit the removal at Gull but wanted the stairs at Long Pond rebuilt and improved. Peter Williams and I did a site visit and determined that the existing social trail from the end of the walkway that parallels Long Pond Road is sloped and potentially dangerous from exposed roots and pine needles which are slippery underfoot. The existing fencing is degraded and in many locations destroyed by those who have climbed over and through it rather than follow the path. I recommend that the existing fencing be replaced with a more durable fence similar to that surrounding the Wellfleet Community Garden. I also recommend extending the fencing parallel to Long Pond Road down to the handicapped parking area to keep people from using the hill as a shortcut. There are a number of exposed roots here that are not only a trip and fall hazard but can lead to degradation of the trees. Peter recommended putting crushed stone along this path to protect the roots and provide non-slip footing. To the east side of the existing stairs, there is a considerable amount of erosion with exposed roots. I would like to enclose this section and stabilize the roots with jute and landscaping staples, using Americorp labor if possible.





- 2. I would also-at least as crucial-like to see progress made regarding resolving ongoing issues of possibly hidden agendas and personal differences/squabbles interfering materially with the functionality and efficiency of certain town departments and high-profile projects-specifically issues surrounding the harbor dredging project and the operation of our marina. Left unresolved, these issues have the potential to be very costly to the town, both financially and in terms of the good will of our state government representation and our Congressional delegation.

- 3. I am greatly concerned as to the ongoing, brazen flouting of our zoning bylaws regarding activities at 1065 State Highway. While there may be aspects of this situation of which I may be unaware, it strikes me that the Town of Wellfleet, through Town Council or other means, must do what is required to give teeth to our zoning bylaws; many tax-paying residents, both year-round and seasonal, are being very negatively impacted by this ongoing situation. If our zoning bylaws are to have any meaning or relevancy, it is crucial that the Town stand its ground.
- 4. Lastly, another elephant in the dining room: we have been kicking the "can" of the out-of-control parking issue down the road long enough, it is time to act decisively. We now are seeing the "funk" bus using the Marina lot as a staging area for people heading to the beaches, in addition to the fact that the Marina has been providing free parking for any number of businesses for far too long. There is a high cost to "free" parking, and it is long past time to address it.

Dear Senator Markey and Congressman Keating:

We, as the undersigned elected officials of the Town(s) of [Duxbury] and [Plymouth write to express our gratitude for your leadership and insightful questioning during the May 6, 2022 Field Hearing of the United States Senate Environment and Public Works Subcommittee on Clean Air, Climate and Nuclear Safety. We also write to acknowledge the actions of the United States Environmental Protection Agency (Region 1), which on June 17, 2022, explicitly stated: "Holtec Pilgrim is not authorized under the current NPDES Permit to discharge pollutants in spent fuel pool water."

While we were pleased to hear of the EPA's directive,² Holtec's assurance that it will not discharge water without the consent of all stakeholders,³ and Holtec's promise to release data to the Woods Hole Oceanographic Institution and other expert and scientific organizations for testing,⁴ we write to express our continued and grave concerns with the decommissioning process at Pilgrim Nuclear Power Station.

Specifically, we write to express our continued concerns with the failure of the Nuclear Regulatory Commission and the nuclear industry's failure to meaningfully listen and respond to the concerns of our communities. To that end, and in light of the Subcommittee's May 6, 2022

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Field Hearing, we respectfully request your support to secure a safe decommissioning process for our Town(s), the Commonwealth of Massachusetts and the United States of America.

Transparency and Exchange of Information Between Federal Agencies

As you know, the Stellwagen Bank National Marine Sanctuary sits east of Boston, between Cape Ann and Cape Cod. The dumping of one million gallons of radioactive water into Cape Cod Bay may affect the Sanctuary. We were troubled by Director Lubinski's testimony that the Nuclear Regulatory Commission ("NRC") did not consult with the NOAA Office of National Marine Sanctuaries to determine whether the proposed discharge into Cape Cod Bay would destroy, cause the loss of, or injure the Sanctuary.⁵

We request that you confirm that the NRC will respond to the Office of National Marine Sanctuaries' March 14, 2022 inquiry, and any subsequent inquiries and concerns it may have. We also request your assistance in identifying any other federal agencies with subject matter expertise that the NRC should be consulting to ensure any decommissioning decision protects the health, safety, and welfare of our communities.

Inadequate Safety Inspections (Aging Management Plans)

According to Holtec, it will use sixty-one (61) casks to store Pilgrim's spent nuclear fuel. However, according to Director Lubinski, Holtec has proposed only to inspect one cask every five years to determine if there is damage. As Senator Markey acknowledged, such an inspection routine is wholly inadequate. Therefore, we request that you communicate to the NRC that the proposed Aging Management Plan should be made publically accessible so that key stakeholders can review and provide comments prior to NRC's final decision in August, 2022. In particular, the Town of Plymouth, whose public safety personnel will be asked to respond first to any incident at the facility deserve greater transparency as to the company's plans for securing the facility and its preparations for both accidents and malicious events.

Cost Analysis For Off-Site Removal

When questioned by Congressman Keating, Holtec CEO, Dr. Kris Singh, was unable to provide the estimated cost of transporting radioactive materials from Plymouth by truck. Dr. Singh promised to supply that cost estimate. We request that Holtec make the cost estimate publically available as soon as possible.

Payment-in-Lieu Agreements

In response to a question by Senator Markey, Dr. Singh was unable to confirm whether Holtec would negotiate PILOT Agreements with local communities, including Plymouth, the

plant's host community for the past five decades.¹⁰ As you know, our communities face significant financial concerns, not only pertaining to lost revenues, but also lot emergency planning training funds.¹¹ Therefore, we request your assistance in facilitating these conversations between Holtec and our communities.

Conclusion

As recently stated by Senator Markey: "Over the years, communities with decommissioning nuclear power plant have repeatedly called on the [NRC] to be a good partner and for nuclear companies to be good neighbors." Our communities continue to be concerned with the proposed decommissioning of the Pilgrim Station, and respectfully request your continued assistance in ensuring that the NRC, and Holtec, are good partners and neighbors.

PREFACE

The policies are intended to outline objectives, provide direction, and define authority to help ensure sound fiscal stewardship and management practices. Each should be periodically reviewed and updated as necessary. With these policies, the Town of Wellfleet, through its Selectboard, Town Administrator, Finance Committee, and employees, commits to the following objectives:

- Sustaining a consistent level of service and value for residents and businesses
- Safeguarding financial integrity and minimizing risk through a system of internal controls
- Ensuring the quality and maintenance of capital assets
- Conforming to general law, uniform professional standards, and municipal best practices
- Preserving the town's AAA credit rating
- Promoting transparency and public disclosure
- Assuring accurate and timely reporting
- Ensuring that Wellfleet has the expertise on staff to effectively manage its finances and departmental operations.

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A-1 Balanced Budget	
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INTRODUCTION

To ensure the growing and continued financial health of the Town of Wellfleet, provide the public with confidence that Town officials seriously respect their responsibility for fiscal stewardship, and demonstrate to bond rating agencies that the Town has thoughtfully prepared for its future, the financial policies outlined below shall guide the Town. These policies are a living tool and shall be reviewed by the Town Administrator and designated staff on an annual basis and updated as necessary, changes may be required to adapt to the needs of the Town.

This document is intended to establish a set of financial management policies and not the procedures that identify the specific methods and actions necessary to carry out these policies. Policies are the terms and conditions which guide and direct the town in making financial management decisions. They are not hard and fast rules so that they may recognize extraordinary situations. Financial management policies are made to support strategies. In many instances, administrative procedures are or will be developed as tools to implement these policies.

Objectives:

The objectives of the Financial Management Policies are as follows:

- A. To guide the Selectboard, Finance Committee, and management staff in evaluating and implementing decisions that have significant impact on the Town.
- B. To set forth planning and operating principles which require that the cost of government be clearly identified, and that financial risk be minimized.
- C. To employ balanced and fair fee and user revenue policies that provide funding for required and needed programs.
- D. To regularly evaluate the Town's financial capacity to meet present and future needs.
- E. To promote credible and sound financial management by providing accurate and timely information on the Town's financial condition to elected officials, staff, the public and external interests.
- F. To ensure that current and future capital needs are addressed in a comprehensive and financially sound manner.
- G. To promote improvement in the Town's credit rating and provide financial resources sufficient to meet the Town's obligations on all municipal debt and other long-term obligations.
- H. To establish an effective system of internal controls that ensures the legal use of financial resources.
- To promote cooperation and coordination with other governments and the private sector in the financing and delivery of services.



A. GENERAL BUDGET POLICIES

A-1 Balanced Budget

Background:

All Massachusetts municipalities are required by state law to prepare balanced annual budgets.

The Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA) notes a true structurally balanced budget is one that supports financial sustainability for multiple years into the future.

Policy:

The Town shall adopt balanced budgets in which current revenues (non-one-time) equal or exceed current expenditures. Expenditures shall be realistically budgeted and estimated revenues shall be conservatively budgeted to allow for unanticipated events. The Town shall present said estimates and assumptions behind revenue estimates along with the balanced budget.

The Town will not balance the budget by using one time or other nonrecurring revenues to fund ongoing expenditures. The Town shall not use budgetary procedures that balance the budget at the expense of future years, such as postponing or deferring payment of expenses already incurred, accruing future year revenues, or rolling over short-term debt to avoid making principal payments.

The Town budget shall also support a financially sound operating position by maintaining reserves for emergencies and providing sufficient liquidity to pay bills on time and avoid revenue anticipation borrowing.

A-2 Local Receipts

Background:

Local Receipts are comprised of, short term occupancy tax, meals tax, parking fees, motor vehicle excise taxes, licenses, permits, and other non-property tax or state aid revenues. Local receipts are more economically sensitive and volatile than the property tax levy. Some of these revenues may be dedicated to specific uses or special purpose funds such as the Beach Fund by previous town meeting votes.

Policy:

Estimated revenues shall be conservatively budgeted to allow for unanticipated events. The Town shall budget for no more than 85% of the previous fiscal year's local receipts. Any receipts in excess of the 85% will be in the following year's free cash or as otherwise allocated by previous town meeting votes.

A-3 Submission of Budget and Budget Message

Background:

Two important principles of public budgeting are clarity and publicity. The GFOA considers the preparation of the annual budget document of great importance in providing detailed financial information and also explaining the key issues that face the community. It is also important to broadly distribute this information to the staff, elected and appointed officials and the general public in order to give them a greater understanding of the operations, financing and key issues confronting the community.

Policy:

The Selectboard's budget proposal to Town Meeting shall provide a complete financial plan of all general and enterprise funds and activities for the ensuing fiscal year, an accompanying budget message, and supporting documents. The budget message from the Selectboard shall explain the proposed budget for all Town agencies in fiscal terms and in terms of work programs. It shall outline the proposed financial policies for the Town for the ensuing fiscal year, describe the important features of the budget, indicate any major differences from the current fiscal year in financial policies, expenditures, and revenues, together with the reason(s) for such changes, summarize the Town's debt position, and include such other material as the Selectboard deems desirable, or the Finance Committee or Town Meeting may reasonably require. The Finance Committee is encouraged to also supply a message to the Selectboard and Town Meeting.

The Town Administrator shall also provide a budget message.

The Town shall work toward the implementation of a budget document that meets the high standards of the Government Finance Officers Association "Distinguished Budget Presentation Award Program."

A-4 Revenue and Expenditure Forecast

Background:

A critical step in maintaining a sound financial plan is the preparation of a multi-year revenue/expenditure forecast(s). Long term financial planning, including revenue and expenditure assumptions, is one of the local government financial practices that credit rating agencies evaluate when assessing municipalities for credit quality.

The Massachusetts Division of Local Services (DLS) states that a financial forecast, or multi-year revenue and expenditure forecast, allows a municipality to evaluate the impact of various government decisions over time.

A forecast will provide decision-makers with an indication of the long-term fiscal impact of current policies and budget decisions, and will allow the Town Administrator and staff, the Finance Committee, and the Selectboard to test various "what-if" scenarios and examine the fiscal impact on future budgets.

Policy:

Each year the Town Administrator, in consultation with the Finance Committee and Selectboard, shall prepare and maintain a five-year Financial Forecast for General Fund and Enterprise Fund operations based on current service levels and current funding sources and including the five-year Capital Improvement Program.

The forecast shall be used as a budget tool to enable Town officials to review operating needs, identify fiscal challenges and opportunities, and develop long-term budgeting policies as part of an overall strategic plan. The forecast shall be designed to provide an outlook on the implications of changes in revenues and expenditures and allow for analyzing multiple scenarios. The forecast will: 1) provide insight into whether the current mix and level of resources in the General Fund are likely to continue to be sufficient to cover current service levels and capital projects; and 2) identify the resources needed to maintain required enterprise fund operations and 3) estimate the impact on rate payers.

The Town Administrator, in cooperation with the Finance Committee, the Selectboard and Town departments, will review fiscal assumptions every year when the forecast is updated and will use information that is timely and accurate in preparation of the forecast. The forecast and the associated assumptions shall be made available to the Selectboard and the Finance Committee no later than upon submission of the Capital Improvement Plan.


A-5 Position Control & Vacancies

Background:

A large segment of a town's budget is its personnel costs. Failure to accurately monitor the personnel budget can lead to errors in budgeting, over or under staffing, incorrect grading, and other personnel costs.

Policy:

The Town shall maintain a personnel system that accurately tracks authorized, filled, and unfilled positions as well as their funding source. Annual budgets shall be prepared that account for all the costs necessary to cover positions that the Town intends to have during that budget period. The existing staffing structure shall be regularly reviewed and justified by the Town Administrator, Department Heads, and the Personnel Board.



A-6 Personnel Policies and Labor Contracts

Background:

The Town has approximately XX full and part time town and school employees and a total of X unions and associations. For the purposes of these policies, the following definitions shall apply:

- Personnel Policies are the documents that represent the conditions of employment, wages, benefits, hiring, promotions, classifications, and many other categories of employer/employee relations. Collective bargaining agreements, as well as state laws and regulations, take precedence over the terms included in the Personnel Policy.
- Pay and Classification Plans are the schedules that identify employees by job category, job title, and union/non-union status on a typical Grade structure. Pay Plans are the wage schedules that specify pay rates, typically on an annual step or merit system, for each union and non-union position.
- Memorandums of Agreement (MOAs) are the documents that represent agreement between a
 municipality and the various labor unions. They are created when a municipality and the
 respective union have reached agreement for a contract period about wages and working
 conditions.
- Collective Bargaining Agreements (CBAs) are the documents that incorporate the negotiated changes and represent the total agreement that exists between a municipality and a union.
- Side Letters are documents that represent a short term agreement between a municipality and a union.

Policy:

Pay plans and pay rates shall be constantly monitored to ensure compliance with labor contracts, personnel policies, and accuracy. Contract proposals and agreements will be fully costed out to understand the short and long term impact on Town finances. In order to foster transparency in the provision of employment agreements and benefits, the Town will prepare and maintain documents that are publicly available including personnel policies, pay plans, classification plans, memorandums of agreement, collective bargaining agreements, and side letters.

A-7 New Revenue Sources [STUB]

Background: THIS IS A STUB

Policy: New Revenue sources less the expense of collecting and or administering them shall not be applied to the general budget until a policy governing their use is adopted and shall be based on actual receipts. Said policy shall utilize a community engagement process to determine the use of the funds. Until such a policy has been adopted these funds shall follow H-1 Use of One Time Revenue. (Enacting legislation)

B. ENTERPRISE FUND POLICIES

B-1 Self Sufficiency and Rates

Background:

Enterprise Funds provide a separate accounting and financial reporting mechanism for municipal services for which a fee is charged in exchange for goods and services. Under enterprise accounting, the revenues and expenditures of the service are segregated into a separate fund with its own financial statements, rather than commingled with revenues and expenditures of all other government activities. Enterprise accounting allows a community to demonstrate to the public the total cost of providing a service.

Policy:

Enterprise Funds (e.g., Water Funds) shall be fully supported by the revenue from their rates, fees, and other revenue generating operations. The methodology for calculating indirect costs shall be explicitly documented and agreed upon by Town Accountant, Treasurer and Enterprise Department heads.

Rates and fees for enterprise services shall be set at a level to provide for self-supporting enterprise operations, including direct and indirect costs. Capital projects shall be financed from enterprise revenues and grants.

Enterprise Funds shall be reviewed annually by the responsible board, commission, or department head to project revenues and expenditures for the next fiscal year and generate estimates of the current fiscal year and the projections for future years in order to prevent the need for subsidy by the General Fund operating budget. Estimates of capital project costs, debt service, and other liabilities shall be included in this analysis in order to project future enterprise fund budgets and revenues necessary to maintain self-sufficiency.

Specific to the Water Enterprise, changes in the rates and/or rate structure shall be carefully analyzed prior to recommendation and implementation in order to ascertain the short- and long-term impact on rate payers.

C. RESERVE FUNDS/FUND BALANCE POLICIES

Background:

Formal written policies that establish guidelines for funding and maintaining reserves can help a community sustain operations during difficult economic periods. Reserves can be used to finance unforeseen or emergency needs, to hold money for specific future purposes, or in limited instances, to serve as a revenue source for the annual budget. Reserve balances and policies can also positively impact a community's credit rating and as a consequence, the long-term cost to fund major projects. The discussion of reserves, and the attention of credit rating agencies, is generally focused on free cash, stabilization funds, and, sometimes, overlay surplus.

C.1 Free Cash

Background:

The Division of Local Service's Municipal Finance Glossary (May 2008) defines Free Cash as follows:

Free Cash (Also Budgetary Fund Balance) — Remaining, unrestricted funds from operations of the previous fiscal year including unexpended free cash from the prior year, actual receipts in excess of revenue estimates shown on the tax recapitulation sheet, and unspent amounts in budget lineitems. Unpaid property taxes and certain deficits reduce the amount that can be certified as free cash. The calculation of free cash is based on the balance sheet as of June 30, which is submitted by the community's auditor, accountant, or comptroller. Important: free cash is not available for appropriation until certified by the Director of Accounts.

Free Cash provides a financial cushion against events such as a sudden loss of a revenue source, an economic downturn, an emergency, or other unanticipated expenditure, non-recurring capital expenditures and uneven cash flow. Free cash can serve as a source for funding capital funds or replenish other reserves.

GFOA notes it is essential that governments maintain adequate levels of fund balance to mitigate current and future risks (e.g., revenue shortfalls and unanticipated expenditures).

DLS recommends that a municipality strive to generate free cash in an amount equal to 3-to-5% of its annual budget.

Policy:

The Town of Wellfleet will eliminate its dependence on free cash to fund the operating budget.

In accordance with the Selectboard policy, the Town will endeavor to maintain a target minimum free cash balance equivalent to 4.5% of the operating budget after town meeting appropriations. Amounts in excess of this 4.5% target will be available for capital or other one-time expenses, while the target amount will be left unspent from year to year.

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Free cash will not be depleted in any year, so that the following year's calculation will begin with a positive balance. Conservative revenue projections and departmental appropriations shall be managed to produce excess income and departmental budget turn backs.

Free Cash may be used for certain one-time expenditures, such as major capital projects, emergencies, other unanticipated expenditures, or to replenish reserve funds.

C-2 Stabilization Funds

Background:

A stabilization fund allows a Town to maintain a reserve to enhance the Town's fiscal stability. By state law, it allows a town to set aside monies to be available for future spending purposes, including emergencies or capital expenditures, although it may be appropriated for any lawful purpose.

Under State law, a municipality may establish one or more stabilization funds for different purposes and may appropriate into and from them in any year. Generally, a majority vote of town meeting is required to establish, amend the purpose of, or appropriate money into a stabilization fund, and a two-thirds majority is required to appropriate money from a stabilization fund. Any interest generated by a fund must be added to and become a part of the fund. The total of all stabilization fund balances shall not exceed 10% of a municipality's equalized values.

C-2 A General Stabilization Policy:

The Town shall maintain a General Stabilization Fund of not less than 5% of the prior year's tax levy for the purpose of extraordinary or unforeseen expenditures. Until this target has been reached, a minimum of \$50,000 will be appropriated each year to this fund. The Town will endeavor to leave the stabilization fund balance unspent, except in the event of an emergency or extraordinary or unforeseen events. If it is necessary to draw down from the General Stabilization Fund, the Town will ensure that it is restored through the appropriation of revenues such as free cash and/or one-time revenues.

C-2 B Capital Stabilization Policy:

The Town shall maintain a special purpose Capital Stabilization Fund that shall serve as a funding source for the Town's capital improvement plan, including any associated debt service. The Town shall have a goal to maintain a Capital Stabilization Fund equal to 2% of the prior year's tax levy. Until this target has been reached, a minimum of \$25,000 will be appropriated each year to this fund. Each year, as pay as you go capital is expended from the Fund, the Town shall replenish the fund to the targeted policy goal.

C-2 C Finance Committee Reserve Fund:

Background:


The Town has established an annual budget reserve in accordance with the provisions of Massachusetts General Law, Ch.40 §6. The Wellfleet Finance Committee maintains a reserve fund to that may be used in the event of unforeseen funding needs that may occur in during a fiscal year that cannot be deferred until the next scheduled town meeting. This fund must be re-authorized each fiscal year by town meeting vote.

Policy:

The Finance Committee shall be funded at 0.5% of the Operating Budget. Any unexpended balance at the end of the fiscal year will be closed to expenditure. A request for a Finance Committee Reserve Fund transfer will not be considered if it is contrary to the vote of town meeting, or as a means to increase the operating budget.

C-3- Grant Matching Fund Reserve Funds

The Town shall establish a Climate Action Reserve fund to be funded initially at \$50K to be used as the town's matching portion for any Climate Action Grant to the extent required by the grant after in-kind contributions are accounted for. Expenditure of these funds shall be controlled by the Selectboard. A request for a Grant Matching Fund Reserve Funds transfer will not be considered if it is contrary to the vote of town meeting, or as a means to increase the operating budget. This fund must be re-authorized each fiscal year by town meeting vote.



C-2 D Overlay Surplus:

The purpose of the overlay reserve is to offset unrealized revenue resulting from uncollected property taxes, abatements, exemptions, and forgiveness. It can be used for other purposes only after it is determined to have a surplus. Therefore, unlike the other two types of general fund reserves, this policy does not set a consistent, specific funding target for the overlay. Rather, each year as part of the budget process, the Board of Assessors will vote to raise an overlay amount on the annual tax recapitulation sheet based on the following:

- Current balance in the overlay account
- Three-year average of granted abatements and exemptions
- Potential abatement liability in cases pending before, or on appeal from, the Appellate Tax Board (ATB)
- Timing of the next DLS certification review (scheduled every five years)

At the conclusion of each fiscal year, the Board of Assessors will submit to the Town Administrator and Chief Financial Officer an update of the overlay reserve with data that includes, but is not limited to, the gross balance, potential abatement liabilities, and any transfers to surplus. If the balance exceeds the amount of potential liabilities, the Select Board may request that the Board of Assessors vote to declare those balances surplus and available for use in the Town's capital improvement plan or for any other one-time expense.

C-3 Ambulance Fund:

Background:

Wellfleet's Ambulance fund is special purpose fund funded with reimbursements from usage fees. The fund was established by town meeting as a way of moderating the impact of ambulance replacements on the town's budget and to ensure they are replaced in timely fashion. Wellfleet's median age is 57.2(ACS 2019). The initial data releases of 2020 Decennial Census show that Wellfleet's permanent population has grown by 29.7% in the last decade. Wellfleet has a growing high-risk population. The Cape as a whole sees an immense increase in population in the summer months. Wellfleet provides and receives mutual aid to the surrounding towns; the closest emergency room facilities are in Hyannis each leg of the trip takes approximately forty minutes. All these factors underscore the critical need to maintain the availability of Wellfleet's ambulances. It is imperative that Wellfleet is able replace the ambulance fleet in a timely basis to minimize the down time or be able to quickly replace one or both ambulances in an emergency. Utilizing non-reoccurring sources of revenue to fund operating budgets creates budgetary shocks when those non-reoccurring sources of revenue are not available.

Policy:

The Town shall maintain the Ambulance Fund's balance of not less than the full cost replacement value of two fully outfitted ambulances. The Fire Chief is expected to update this reserve balance each fiscal year to reflect the change in the replacement costs. Until this reserve balance has been reached no funds shall be transferred out of the fund unless they are specifically related to the purpose of the fund. Funds from the ambulance fund shall never be utilized at any level to fund the general operating budget or reoccurring costs. Funds in excess of the reserve balance may be transferred from the ambulance fund at the end of the fiscal year. These funds shall be treated one-time revenues and the use of those funds shall follow H-1 Use of One Time Revenue with a preference to fund items related to public safety or OPEB.

D. CAPITAL PLANNING

Background:

Planning, budgeting and financing for the replacement, repair and acquisition of capital assets is a critical component of any municipality's budget and operation. Prudent planning and funding of capital assets ensures that a municipality can provide quality public services in a financially sound manner. It is recognized that a balance must be maintained between operating and capital budgets so as to meet the needs of both to the maximum extent possible. Adherence to this policy will help the Town meet its capital needs despite limited resources.

Long term capital planning is one of the local government financial practices that credit rating agencies evaluate when assessing municipalities for credit quality. Climate change has recently started to factor in bonding and needs to be taken into consideration for Town Capital Projects.

Policy:

The Town will maintain its physical assets by providing funding in the operating budget to protect its capital investments and minimize future maintenance and replacement costs. The Town will emphasize preventive maintenance as a cost-effective approach to capital reinvestment and replace exhausted goods as necessary. All town buildings will be inspected annually by the Town Administrator, the DPW, the Building, Plumbing, and Electrical inspectors. Individual building components will be assessed and maintained. If it is determined that there needs to a significant project in excess of \$10,000 it shall be incorporated into the Capital Improvement Plan

To support a systematic acquisition and replacement schedule, the Town Administrator, with the assistance of the DPW Director will annually update and maintain a detailed inventory of all capital assets, which shall include dates built, acquired or last improved, original costs, current conditions, expected and remaining useful lifespans, depreciated values, extent of use, and any scheduled replacement or expansion dates.

D-1 Capital Improvement Plan

Background:

The development of a Capital Improvement Program (CIP) is the mechanism that a municipality uses to identify projects, prioritize funding, and create a long-term financial plan that can be achieved within the limitations of the budget environment. A delay in necessary infrastructure upgrades will frequently require a catch-up period to properly address problems caused by deferred maintenance and replacements.

Climate Change and Resiliency:

Impacts and adaptation to climate change in will impact Wellfleet's CIP. Capital projects have a long lifespan as such it is imperative that they be assessed for long term resilience in response to climate change. Wellfleet has identified several municipal capital assets that are vulnerable to climate change. Coastal erosion, shoreline change, and coastal flooding will present unprecedented challenges in the years to come. Low lying roads are in danger of becoming impassable, municipal structures are vulnerable to flooding, coastal parking lots regularly loose parking spaces and Ocean View Drive will be severed at some point in the future in the face of the advancing Atlantic Ocean. As the sea level rises the freshwater lens of the aquifer will rise in response posing the danger of nuisance flooding to low lying areas that are not directly impacted by the seawater itself. The groundwater response also poses a danger to low lying septic systems.

Massachusetts has set a goal of achieving net-zero in greenhouse gas emissions by 2050. Article VII Section 39 of Wellfleet's general bylaws commits the town to these goals and calls for achieving them at the earliest feasible time and that all officers, departments, committees, and representatives of the Town take such measures within the scope of their respective responsibilities and authority as may be necessary and prudent to facilitate such policy and objective.

Policy:

Each year, the Town Administrator shall submit a ten-year capital improvement plan to the Selectmen and Finance Committee by the end of October.

To qualify as a capital expenditure, a proposed capital item or project must have a useful life of five years or more and must exceed \$10,000 in cost. All Officers, Boards, Commissions, and Committees shall, by the end of September of each year, submit to the Town Administrator information concerning all anticipated Capital Projects and Purchases requiring Town Meeting action.

At a minimum the following principals will guide the development of the CIP.

- The Finance Committee shall set their standards for the CIP no later than June 30th of each year.
- The Town Administrator will prepare forms and instructions distribute them no latter than July 30th of each year and shall coordinate development of the capital improvement budget.

- Future operating costs associated with new capital improvement will be projected and included in operating budget forecasts, as appropriate.
- Federal, state, or private grants or loans shall be used to finance those capital improvements that
 are consistent with the Town's capital improvement plan and priorities, and for which operating
 and maintenance costs have been included in operating budget forecasts to the maximum, extent
 possible and prudent. Any conditional requirements of a grant/s shall be evaluated before
 assumption.
- All assets shall be maintained at a level adequate to protect the Town's capital investment and to minimize future maintenance and replacement costs.
- Equipment replacement and building repair needs shall be projected for the next ten years and will be updated each year. From this projection, a maintenance and replacement schedule will be developed and followed.
- Capital items shall be evaluated for vulnerability to climate change.
- Non-vehicle capital items shall be evaluated for increased energy efficiency with a preference for net zero greenhouse gas emissions wherever possible.
- Capital projects shall be prioritized based upon criteria establish by the Town and shall incorporate climate change adaptation and resiliency.
- Building Projects shall conform to Wellfleet's Policy on Town Building Projects.
- The estimated costs and potential funding sources for each proposed capital project shall be determined before it is submitted to Selectboard and Town Meeting for appropriation.

D-2 Vehicle Replacement

Background:

As a vehicle deprecates it is subject to more frequent and expensive maintenance. Significant down time for servicing may negatively impact the availability and quality of service. At some point the cost curve for ongoing maintenance and the replacement of a vehicle intersect and replacing said vehicle becomes more cost effective than continuing to maintain it. Municipal vehicles have a variety of uses and different priorities in availability.

Policy:

All vehicles in the town of Wellfleet's fleet shall be regularly assessed for their capability to meet the needs placed on them and their cost effectiveness in doing so. The DPW shall make annual elevations of each vehicle unless a department has their own internal capabilities of doing so. Vehicles that are used on an infrequent basis shall be evaluated for continued need and if there are more cost-effective arrangements that can be made before a replacement purchased. Borrowing should not be used to fund purchases of vehicles that are routinely replaced. Replacement of vehicles will be reviewed in accordance with Wellfleet's Fuel-efficient Vehicle Policy.

To facilitate these decisions requests for the replacement of Town vehicles must be supported with: For the Pre-existing Vehicle:

- Description of vehicle being replaced the VIN number, Purchase date of the vehicle.
- Base purchase price of vehicle being replaced.
- Extra assets and cost (radio, lights, plow, etc.).
- Manufacturer's projected lifespan of vehicle being replaced.
- Primary use of the vehicle & Secondary use for example snow removal.
- Projected trade in or auction value of vehicle being replaced as of projected replacement date.
- Maintenance records including:
- Service performed, date of service performed, service provider if not DPW
- employee.
- Mileage, engine hours at date of service.
- Combined Fuel Economy and type of Fuel
- Projected service requirements over the expected useful life of the vehicle.

For the replacement vehicles

- Base price quote of replacement.
- Price quote for needed extras such as radios, plow, etc.
- Target date for replacement.
- Combined Fuel Economy and type of Fuel
- Manufacturer's expected normal lifespan of replacement.
- Expected lifespan under Wellfleet conditions.

Comparative costs for:

• Cost of leasing replacement vehicle and terms

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- Cost of renting replacement vehicle and terms
- Cost and terms of subcontracting the work

E. CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT FINANCING AND DEBT MANAGEMENT

Background:

Debt management is essential to the overall financial planning of any municipality. Borrowing funds and repaying over a number of years allows the Town to finance essential projects that the town could not afford to pay from current operating dollars and also spread the cost to citizens who will be benefitting from the capital investment.



E-1 Capital Improvement Financing

It is critical to develop policies and guidelines for the issuance, timing and tax impact of current and future debt. For those projects supported by user fees, it is important to identify the impact on user rates as a result of debt service costs.

For the purpose of these policies, the following definitions shall apply:

- General Fund Debt Service All town debt service (non-exempt and Proposition 2 ½ exempt) excluding enterprise debt service.
- General Fund Budget The total amount raised by the town as reported on the tax recapitulation form less the amount reported as enterprise revenue.
- General Fund Debt Service as a % of General Fund Budget The percentage of the town's general fund budget that is allocated to debt service for capital investment.
- Water Fund Debt Service All town debt service for the water system capital projects.
- Water Fund Budget- The total amount of revenues reported on the tax recapitulation form for the water enterprise which is the amount required to provide for a self-supporting water system.
- Water Fund Debt Service as a % of Water Fund Budget- The percentage of the town's water budget that is allocated to water debt service for capital investment.
- Marina Fund Debt Service All town debt service for the Marina capital projects.
- Marina Fund Budget- The total amount of revenues reported on the tax recapitulation form for the marina enterprise which is the amount required to provide for a self-supporting marina.
- Pay As You Go Capital Projects Capital projects that are funded with current revenues (typically tax revenue, grants or user fees) and/or reserves (typically free cash or stabilization funds)

Policy:

Annually, the Town will strive to maintain 3-7% of the operating budget, net of debt, on capital investment allocations. Funding shall be derived from a combination of property taxes and the general and capital improvement stabilization funds. Long-term debt is an appropriate funding source for certain types of projects, while short-term debt and current revenues should be used for assets with short useful lifespans. The Wellfleet capital improvement program (CIP) shall be prepared and financed in accordance with the following policies:

- Outside Funding State, federal, or private grant funding shall be pursued and used to finance the capital budget wherever possible.
- Debt Exclusion Large projects, typically in excess of \$1 million, shall be funded by a Proposition 2 ½ debt exclusion vote in order to collect annual revenues sufficient to pay the new debt costs and not impact funds necessary to maintain the annual town and school operating budgets.
- General Fund Debt Smaller projects may be funded by non-exempt debt with a careful review of the timing and impact on the operating budget while also maintain the town's investment in its capital infrastructure and equipment.

- Water Fund Debt The Water system operates as an enterprise and all costs (direct, indirect and debt service) shall be covered by water revenues. Projects funded by debt shall have a careful review of the timing and impact on water rates
- General Fund Debt Service as % of General Fund Budget—The annual Debt Service requirement should not exceed 15% of the town's general fund annual revenues (excluding enterprise funds), with a long term target of 10%.
- Water Fund Debt Service as % of Water Fund Budget The annual Water Fund Debt Service requirement should not exceed 20% of the town's water fund annual revenues

<u>Pay As You Go Local Funding</u> – The first source of capital investment shall be free cash unless the project exceeds \$1 million. Even when a significant balance exists in this account, the Town will be cautious about the amount of funds to be used. After establishing a base of approximately \$300,000, the Town shall increase its capital investment by the same rate a regular budget growth. The Town will use modest amounts from the capital stabilization or other reserves above target levels to fund pay-as-you go capital needs in order to meet urgent needs above the 5 percent Net Capital Investment target. In the event that annual deposits into the capital stabilization fund change significantly, the Town will revisit this capital funding policy.

Debt-Financing/Borrowing

- The term of borrowing for a capital project shall not exceed its estimated useful life.
- The Town will attempt to maintain a long-term debt schedule such that at least 50% of its outstanding principal will be paid within 10 years to 15 years.
- The Town will strive to issue level principal debt such that debt service will decline over the term
 of the issue as another means to mitigate risk regarding this funding source.
- For any capital item funded by debt, cost of borrowing, including estimated principal and interest by fiscal year shall be projected in report.
- The strategy of utilizing "level debt service" versus "level principal and declining interest cost" shall be analyzed before borrowing is authorized.
- Refunding opportunities will be evaluated annually to consider the possibility of future interest
 cost savings. The Town will consider a refunding of existing bonds should present value savings
 equal or exceed 2-6% of the amount of the bonds being refunded.

Capital Project Closeouts

The Town will endeavor to close out all capital projects within six months of completion or discontinuation. When closing out any project with a residual balance, the Chief Financial Officer will work with the Treasurer/Collector to do one of the following:

- If the project was funded by available revenue (tax levy or reserves), reallocate the balance to another capital project(s) or close it to the appropriate fund surplus.
- If the project was bond-funded and has a balance under \$50,000, propose that the Select Board apply the balance to debt service.
- If the project was bond-funded and has a balance over \$50,000, propose that the Select Board apply the balance to another capital project(s) for which the Town may borrow for an equal or greater term than the originally issued loan.

E-2 Debt Management

PURPOSE

To provide for the appropriate issuance and responsible use of debt, this policy defines the parameters and provisions governing debt management. Policy adherence will help the Town to responsibly address capital needs, provide flexibility in current and future operating budgets, control borrowing, sustain capital investment capacity, and maintain or enhance the Town's bond rating so as to achieve long-term interest savings.

APPLICABILITY

This policy applies to the budget decision-making duties of the Select Board, Town Administrator, Finance Committee, and Water Commission. Further, it applies to the Treasurer/Collector's debt management responsibilities and Chief Financial Officer's budget analysis and reporting duties.

POLICY

Under the requirements of federal and state laws, the Town may periodically issue debt obligations to finance the construction, reconstruction, or acquisition of infrastructure and other assets or to refinance existing debt. The Town will issue and manage debt obligations in such a manner as to obtain the best long-term financial advantage and will limit the amount of debt to minimize the impact on taxpayers. Debt obligations, which include general obligation bonds, revenue bonds, bond anticipation notes, lease/purchase agreements, and any other debt obligations permitted to be issued under Massachusetts law, will only be issued to construct, reconstruct, or purchase capital assets that cannot be acquired with current revenues.

A. Debt Financing

In financing with debt, the Town will:

- 1. Issue long-term debt only for purposes that are authorized by state law and qualify for tax exempt bonds and only when the financing sources have been clearly identified.
- 2. Use available funds to the greatest extent possible to reduce the amount of borrowing on all debt-financed projects.
- 3. Confine long-term borrowing to capital improvements and projects that cost at least [\$100,000] and that have at least [10] years of useful life or whose useful lifespans will be prolonged by at least 10 years.
- 4. Refrain from using debt to fund any recurring purpose, such as cyclical vehicle replacements, current operating and maintenance expenditures.
- 5. Consider using revenue bonds, special assessment bonds, or other types of self-supporting bonds instead of general obligation bonds whenever possible.
- Set user fees to cover capital costs for the water and golf operations to the extent practicable.

B. <u>Debt Limits</u>

The Town will adhere to these debt parameters:

- 1. Total debt service, including debt exclusions and any self-supporting debt, shall be limited to [10] percent of general fund revenues, with a target balance of [five to seven] percent.
- 2. As dictated by state statute, the Town's debt limit shall be five percent of its most recent equalized valuation.

C. Structure and Terms of Debt

The following shall be the Town's guidelines on the structure and terms of all debt:

- 1. The Town will attempt to maintain a long-term debt schedule such that at least [50] percent of outstanding principal will be paid within 10 years.
- 2. The term of any debt shall not exceed the expected useful life of the capital asset being financed and in no case shall it exceed the maximum allowed by law.
- 3. The Town will limit bond maturities to no more than [10] years, except for major buildings, land acquisitions, and other purposes in accordance with the useful life borrowing limit guidelines published by the Division of Local Services (DLS).

D. Debt Issued through the Bond Market

In addition to all the provisions detailed in the policy thus far, the Town will also adhere to the following provisions if it obtains debt funding through the issuance of bonds.

- 1. Any vote to authorize a borrowing by bond issuance will include an authorization to reduce the amount of the borrowing by the amount of the net premium and accrued interest.
- 2. The Town will work closely with its financial advisor to follow federal regulations and set time frames for spending borrowed funds to avoid committing arbitrage, paying rebates, fines and penalties to the federal government, and jeopardizing any debt issuance's tax exempt status.
- 3. To achieve potential debt service savings on long-term, tax-exempt debt through bond refunding the Town will:
 - a) Issue debt with optional call dates no later than 10 years from issue.
 - b) Analyze potential refunding opportunities on outstanding debt as interest rates change.
 - c) Use any net premium and accrued interest to reduce the amount of the refunding.
 - d) Work with the Town's financial advisor to determine the optimal time and structure for bond refunding.
- 4. To obtain and maintain a favorable bond rating, the Town will:
 - a) Maintain good communications with bond rating agencies, bond counsel, banks, financial advisors, and others involved in debt issuance and management.
 - b) Follow a policy of full disclosure on every financial report and bond prospectus, including data on total outstanding debt per capita, as a percentage of per capita personal income, and as a percentage of total assessed property value.
 - c) Strive to implement and maintain strong management practices and debt ratios favored by rating agencies.

E. Reporting

- 1. The Treasurer/Collector will report to the Select Board and Town Administrator on the Town's debt status by [September 30] each year.
- 2. The Chief Financial Officer will include an indebtedness summary as part of a report on receipts and expenditures in Wellfleet's Annual Town Report.
- 3. The Chief Financial Officer, with the Town's financial advisor, will file the annual audit and official disclosure statement within 270 days of the end of the fiscal year (March 31).

F. GRANTS MANAGEMENT POLICIES

Background:

DLS recommends analyzing current and future impact of grants on operating budget, capital improvement program, and debt management.

The Government Finance Officers Association recommends that governments establish processes to promote awareness throughout the government that grants normally come with significant requirements.



F-1 Grant Administration

Policy:

The Town shall ensure that grants are efficiently and appropriately managed by the respective Boards/Commissions/Committee/Departments who receive the grant. Prior to acceptance of a grant award, the Town shall consider any specialized requirement(s) that apply to the general operations of the grant, specific compliance rules, monitoring of other parties (e.g., sub-grantees) that may receive resources from the grant, specialized reporting requirements, and any long term commitments required by the grant, such as the requirement - either as a condition of the grant itself or politically - to financially maintain a program or asset after the expiration of the grant, among other considerations. Effective grant management helps promote the pursuit of grants that are in the Town's best interest and assure the timely reimbursements to optimize cash flow, and to guard against year-end account deficits. As a legal contract, every grant agreement must be fulfilled in accordance with its prescribed terms and conditions, as well as applicable federal, state, and local regulations. Failure in this regard exposes the Town to legal and financial liabilities and compromises future grant funding.

No department shall expend grant funds, until after a fully executed agreement has been accepted and approved for expenditure by the Selectboard (or the School Committee, when applicable). Further, no grant funds shall be used to supplant an existing expense for the purpose of diverting current funds to another use.

The Town Accountant is responsible for consulting with departments on grant budgetary matters, accounting for grants in the general ledger, monitoring grant expenditures in excess of revenues and distributing monthly reports of grant expenditures to departments. The Town Accountant will also maintain a database of all grants and grant activity from inception to closure. The Boards/Commissions/Committee/Departments is responsible to ensure consistency with award requirements and tracking the timeliness of reimbursement requests.

F-2 Grant Impacts on Operating Budget

Policy:

When positions are funded by grants, the current and future impact on the operating budget shall be analyzed. When allowable, the cost for providing benefits, such as health insurance, should be included in the grant budget to cover the Town's cost for providing that benefit.



F-3 Grant Impacts on Capital Improvement Program

Policy:

When grants are accepted for capital purposes, the Town shall include in its capital improvement program any share of costs associated with the grant and project the Town's share of debt service in its debt management plan. Any future increase or decrease in operating costs associated with the grant should be identified in the Town's revenue / expenditure forecast.

G. POLICIES REGARDING ESTABLISHMENT OF FEES

G-1 Fees and Charges

Background:

The Government Finance Officers Association recommends that when certain services provided especially benefit a particular group, governments should consider charges and fees on the service recipients. Well-designed charges and fees not only reduce the need for additional revenue sources, but promote service efficiency. Regular and consistent review of all fees is necessary to ensure the costs associated with the delivery of specific services have been appropriately identified and that a municipality is collecting reasonable charges.

The Division of Local Services recommends communities adopt written policies for setting charges and fees. A policy should identify what factors are to be taken into account when pricing services. It should also state whether the community intends to recover the full cost of providing the service or benefit and under what circumstances a charge or fee is set at less than full recovery (e.g., debt exclusion or other subsidy). Such a policy and the fee structure should be reviewed periodically to ensure they remain current, and both should be communicated with the public clearly and openly.

Policy:

Town fees and charges shall be reviewed periodically in relation to the cost of providing the service. The Town will compare rates with nearby communities to determine if the fees established are competitive. The Town may decide against full cost recovery where greater public benefit is demonstrated. Exceptions to full recovery costs include cases where: the fee maximums are established by the General Laws of Massachusetts (MGL) or where a policy decision has been made otherwise.

H. USE OF ONE TIME REVENUE OR NEW REVENUES

H-1 Use of One Time Revenue & First Year Receipts of Unencumbered Revenue Source

Background:

The Government Finance Officers Association recommends that communities develop guidance on the use of one-time revenues to minimize services disruptions due to the non-recurrence of these sources.

The first year of a new source of revenue cannot be accounted for in that years' fiscal budget. New sources of revenue are rare. Depending on the enacting legislation there may be encumbrances.

The Division of Local Services states that funding operations with one-time revenues, without identifying future available offsets, effectively postpones difficult decisions necessary to achieve a structurally sound, sustainable spending plan. One-time revenue is usually defined as nonrecurring revenue.

Policy:

The Town shall reduce its use of free cash for the operating budget by at least \$50,000 each year until it ceases using one-time revenue sources for recurring costs in the annual Town operating budget. One-time revenues or the first year of an unencumbered revenue source shall be appropriated to reserve funds, used to fund one-time budget or capital costs, housing support, OPEB, and/or address unfunded liabilities. Encumbered revenues shall be accounted for and used solely on allowable uses.

I. UNFUNDED LIABILITIES

Background:

Defined as "the actuarial calculation of the value of future benefits payable less the net assets of the fund at a given balance date", unfunded liabilities represent a significant financial obligation for all levels of government across the country. In Wellfleet and other Massachusetts municipalities, the two primary unfunded liabilities are for Pensions and Other Post-Employment Benefits (OPEB).

I-1 Pensions/Retirement

Background:

The Contributory Retirement System is a defined benefit program that is governed by Massachusetts General Laws, Ch.32 and is regulated by the Public Employee Retirement Administration Commission (PERAC), a state entity responsible for the oversight, guidance, monitoring, and regulation of Massachusetts' 105 public pension systems. Funding for this system covers the costs of employees who are part of the Town's retirement system, this does not include teachers, as their pensions are funded by the State. The Town of Wellfleet is a member of the Barnstable County Retirement System and pays an annual pension assessment to the County.

Policy:

In accordance with state law, PERAC regulations and government accounting standards, the Town shall continue to fund this liability in the most fiscally prudent manner, recognizing the fact that the adoption of a funding schedule is, by law, the responsibility of the County retirement board.

I-2 Other Post- Employment Benefits (OPEB)

Background:

OPEB consists primarily of the costs associated with providing health insurance for retirees and their spouses. The Government Accounting Standards Board (GASB) issued Statements No. 43 and No. 45 in 2004 to address the OPEB issue. GASB 43 required the accrual of liabilities of OPEB generally over the working career of plan members rather than the recognition of pay-as-you-go contributions, while GASB 45 required the accrual of the OPEB expense over the same period of time. The reporting requirements of GASB 43 and 45 include disclosures and schedules providing actuarially determined values related to the funded status of OPEB. This requires that the accrued liabilities be determined by a qualified actuary using acceptable actuarial methods.

Policy:

While there is currently no legal requirement to fund OPEB, the Town recognizes the importance and financial advantage of initiating early and regular funding for these long-term obligations. The Town will endeavor to appropriate \$150,000 or more per year into the irrevocable trust established under MGL c. 32B, §20 until such a time that OPEB obligations are fully funded.

This policy encompasses OPEB-related budget decisions, accounting, financial reporting, and investment. It applies to the Selectboard and the Finance Committee in their budget decision making duties, and it also applies to the OPEB-related job duties of the Treasurer and Town Accountant. Careful consideration shall be given to identifying the investment vehicle that offers the best rate of return in the safest possible environment.

OPEB Funding Strategies

To address the OPEB liability, decision makers will annually analyze a variety of funding strategies and subsequently implement themas appropriate with the intention of fully funding the obligation. The Town will derive funding for the OPEB trust fund from taxation, free cash, and any other legal form. Achieving full funding of the liability requires the Town to commit to funding its annual required contribution (ARC) each year, which is calculated based on actuarial projections. Among strategies to consider for funding the ARC:

- Transfer unexpended funds from insurance line items to the OPEB trust fund.
- Appropriate amounts equal to the Town's Medicare Part D reimbursements.
- Determine and commit to appropriating an annual portion of free cash.
- Appropriate an annually increasing percentage of yearly revenues.
- One time sources of revenue may be used to contribute to OPEB
- Once the pension system is fully funded, on a subsequent annual basis, appropriate to the OPEB trust fund the amount equivalent to the former pension-funding payment or the ARC, whichever is less.

J. RISK MANAGEMENT POLICIES

J-1 Risk Management Program

Background:

In recognition that during daily operations, a municipality is constantly exposed to potential impact of property loss, personal injury, and liability, the Government Financial Officers Association recommends that governments develop a comprehensive risk management program that identifies, reduces or minimizes risk to its property, interests, and employees. Costs and consequences of harmful or damaging incidents arising from those risks should be contained. As a coastal town Wellfleet will be bearing significant risks relative to climate change. Critical infostructure is at risk, coastal erosion is accelerating along with sea level rise, the Gulf of Maine is one of the fastest warming water bodies globally and ocean acidification presents a real long-term risk to Wellfleet's shellfish industry.

Policy:

The Town's insurance programs shall be aimed at covering the potential impact of the types of property loss, personal injury, and liability the Town is exposed to on a regular basis.

The Town shall develop and maintain a risk management program to protect the Town against the financial consequences of accidental loss of property, liability, fraud and personal injury to the extent possible through effective prevention and loss control policies and practices.

The risks posed by climate change shall be incorporated into Wellfleet's risk management programs.

K. ACCOUNTING/AUDITING/FINANCIAL REPORTING POLICIES

K-1 Annual Audit

Background:

The objective of an audit is to obtain independent assurance that a community's year-end financial statements are reliable, accurate, and complete. An audit also helps to ensure that financial checks and balances are in place to protect public assets. Consequently, it can be a powerful tool by which a community can build taxpayer confidence in government operations.

The Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA) recommends that communities engage the same auditor by entering into multiyear agreements, or a series of one-year contracts, for a term of at least five years. A multiyear agreement allows for greater continuity and enables a new auditor to spread initial start-up costs over multiple years, potentially reducing costs in the initial years.

However, after this term, the GFOA recommends a full, competitive selection process and a rotation of auditors after each multiyear agreement, provided there is adequate competition among qualified auditors. Contracting with a new audit firm not only brings a fresh perspective, but it also reflects good practice.

Where competition is limited, participation of the current auditors is acceptable, assuming their past performance has been satisfactory and conformed to industry standards. In the event the Town chooses to remain with an audit firm, it is advisable to rotate the audit manager on a regular basis.

Policy:

The Town will utilize accounting practices that best conform to generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP) as set forth by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB).

The Town shall have an independent outside audit performed by a certified public accountant each year. The Selectboard shall provide for such an audit by an accountant or a firm of accountants, who have no personal interests, direct or indirect, in the fiscal affairs of the Town government or of any of its officers or employees. The Town will require d the public at large.

K-3 Monthly Reporting

Background:

Monthly reporting helps a community to determine whether sufficient funds are available to cover current obligations, any surplus can be invested, or shortfall exists requiring temporary borrowing. It enables the Town to take prompt management action if fiscal problems are indicated or adjust spending behavior to meet financial challenges.

Policy:

The Accounting Department shall produce and distribute to Department heads monthly budget-to-actual reports. If financial problems are indicated, the Accountant will review with the Town Administrator a monthly report of revenues and expenditures at the line item level. The monthly budget to actual reports shall also be provided to the Selectboard and the Finance Committee.

K-4 Cash Collections

Background:

One of a government's functions is to collect taxes and other revenues. The process involves many actors including the Treasurer/Collector's office, accounting office, legal counsel, tax assessor, other departments or agencies, other governments at the state and/or local level, commercial banks, and private collection agencies.

Policy:

The Town shall collect all revenue using fair and consistent methods, exercising all powers provided to it under law.

On or before September 1st, the Town shall commence tax title proceedings against all properties that owe property taxes to the Town.

The Treasurer/Collector shall establish and maintain reliable record keeping systems and enforce a timely collections process. All amounts committed must be supported with a warrant and a detailed listing of all amounts due. All monies received should be turned over to the Treasurer/Collector's office at least weekly so they may be deposited in the bank in a timely manner.

The Treasurer/Collector shall aggressively pursue the collection of delinquent accounts and with assistance from the Deputy Collector and other Town officials to pursue collection of outstanding real estate taxes, personal property taxes, excise taxes and fines. The execution of a systematic and deliberate program to collect taxes owed is intended not only to capture revenue, but also to establish a clear policy that tax delinquents will be aggressively pursued. The Treasurer/Collector shall execute in a timely manner collection remedies such as issuance of demands immediately after bills become past due and initiate tax taking shortly afterwards to increase the rate of collection of municipal monies, thereby assisting in the financial stability of the Town.

K-5 Reconciling Cash and Receivables

Background:

Two of the largest assets for a community are cash and receivables. Information pertaining to these is kept by the Treasurer/Collector, and the Accountant. A Treasurer is the custodian of the community's revenues, tax titles, and tax possessions, while a Collector keeps listings of outstanding receivables due to the community, and an Accountant is responsible for maintaining the accounting records. Prompt and frequent reconciliations between these offices are essential in order to maintain control and ensure checks and balances are in place.

Policy:

Within thirty days after the end of each month, the Treasurer/Collector shall internally reconcile the cashbook to all bank statements, and the Treasurer/Collector shall internally reconcile all receivable balances with the receivable control. The results of these activities shall be forwarded to the Accountant's office and compared to the general ledger records. If differences are determined, the Treasurer/Collector and Accountant shall reconcile the variances (e.g., missing information, errors, and timing differences).

The Town shall reconcile revenues and expenditures for each fiscal year within one to two months of the end of the fiscal year.

K-6 Cash Flow Forecasting and Budgeting

Background:

The purpose of cash flow forecasting is to determine whether sufficient funds are available to cover current obligations, any surplus can be invested, or if any cash shortfall exists which may requiring temporary borrowing.

The Division of Local Services recommends maintaining a cash flow budget to forecast investment opportunities or borrowing needs. Major revenue sources like property taxes and state aid are generally received in large, lump sums at specific points in the fiscal year and do not necessary coincide with expense patterns, which often results in cash surpluses or shortfall during certain periods of the year.

The Government Finance Officers Association also recommends cash flow forecasting as a best practice. When used as a cash management guide, it can lead to the optimized use of funds as well as insure sufficient liquidity.

Policy:

The Treasurer/Collector will develop a cash flow forecast for the upcoming fiscal year after approval of the annual budget and before July 1 each year. This shall be provided by the Town Administrator to the Selectboard and Finance Committee.

K-2 Comprehensive Annual Financial Report

Background:

A Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR) is a set of Government financial statements comprising the financial report of the municipal entity that complies with the accounting requirements promulgated by the General Accounting Standards Board (GASB). GASB provides standards for the content of a CAFR in its annual updated publication *Codification of Government Accounting and Financial Reporting Standards*. A CAFR is compiled by the municipal accounting staff and audited by an external Certified Public Accounting firm utilizing GASB requirements. It is comprised of three sections: Introductory, Financial, and Statistical. It combines the financial information of fund accounting and Enterprise Authorities accounting.

Policy:

The Town shall work towards the preparation of a Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR) that meets the criteria established by the GFOA's Certificate of Achievement in Financial Reporting Program. This program encourages the preparation of a comprehensive report that goes beyond the annual audit report and presents information that enhances government transparency and disclosure.

K-7 Reconciliations

Background:

Reconciliations are an essential tool to identify errors or issues in a timely fashion. In order them to be effective they must be done on a regular and timely basis. To ensure transactions are in balance, mitigate fraud, safeguard general ledger accuracy, and maximize certifications of free cash, financial officers must conduct regular reconciliations of their accounting records, and these must be reconciled to the general ledger. Although each financial officer is responsible for maintaining independent records of his or her office's transactions, they are also collectively accountable for the overall accuracy of Wellfleet's financial records.

Policy:

Town Treasurer in concert with the Collector, and other finical staff preform monthly reconciliations of all funds under their purview. Corrections shall be documented and made in a timely fashion. Significant discrepancies that are unresolved shall be brought to the attention of the Town Administrator, the Finance Committee and the Selectboard immediately along with a plan to resolve them. Causes shall be identified, documented, and remedial actions shall be undertaken to prevent such discrepancies in the future.

K-7A Cashbook Reconciliation

Policy:

To ensure an accurate accounting of all revenue activity, the Treasurer/Collector will maintain a cashbook that reflects up-to-date and accurate information for all cash and assets. To do so, the Treasurer/Collector will make certain that all cash receipts, disbursements, transfers, and interest are recorded in the cashbook within [two business days] of each transaction and will reconcile cashbook accounts to their corresponding bank accounts within [five days] of receiving bank statements. These will include zero-balance vendor and payroll bank accounts, whose balances must equal the outstanding checks at the end of any month.

The Treasurer/Collector will identify all reconciling items, including deposits in transit, bounced and voided checks, and discrepancies between the cashbook and financial institutions, and will correct them when appropriate. The Treasurer/Collector will then forward the reconciled cashbook balances in an Excel report to the Chief financial Officer and, when needed, an additional Schedule of Receipts for any adjustments made.

K-7B Payroll Withholdings Reconciliation

Policy:

Payroll withholdings include federal and state taxes, child support and other wage assignments for legal obligations, deferred compensation, optional insurances, association dues, and other employer-sponsored options, which are all itemized in separate general ledger accounts. At the conclusion of each pay cycle, the Treasurer/Collector forwards a summary report of employee and employer withholdings to the Chief financial Officer to be recorded in the general ledger.



K-7C Accounts Receivable Reconciliation

Policy:

Accounts receivable are outstanding monies owed to the Town, whether from committed bills (i.e., taxes, excises, water charges) or from uncommitted department invoices (e.g., police details). To ensure these assets are accounted for and balanced, the Treasurer/Collector and any department head with accounts receivable duties (each referred to here as "record-keeper") will make certain that all cash receipts are recorded timely, maintain a control record for each receivable type and levy year, and verify the detail balance agrees with the receivable control. The receivable control is a record of original entry in which the record-keeper reduces a commitment according to collections, abatements, and exemptions and increases it by refunds issued. To maintain accuracy, the record-keeper must review the detailed list of receivables, identify credit balances as prepaid amounts or investigate them for possible correction, and reconcile the control balance to the detail. Whenever these records do not agree, the record-keeper must determine the discrepancy by:

- Verifying the various transactions (commitments, abatements, refunds, chargebacks) against their supporting documents.
- Comparing the total amount of posted payments to the turnovers accepted by the Treasurer/Collector
- Determining whether any revenues were incorrectly recorded as payments to the commitment, such as interest and fees.

The record-keeper will forward a copy of the internally reconciled accounts receivable balances to the Chief financial Officer. For the Treasurer/Collector, this is the Schedule of Outstanding Receivables.

K-7D Special Revenue Reconciliation

Policy:

Governed by various state statutes, special revenue funds are specific revenues segregated from the general fund and earmarked for specific purposes. They include gifts and grants from governmental entities, individuals, and organizations; revolving funds; and receipts reserved for appropriation. To ensure these funds are balanced, department heads with responsibility for special revenue funds will verify that all revenues turned over to the Treasurer/Collector, expenditures authorized for payment by the Chief financial Officer, and properly authorized transfers are recorded for the period. These department heads will subsequently provide the Chief financial Officer with quarterly reconciliation reports on the funds.



K-7E General Ledger Reconciliation

Policy:

To achieve the core objective of maintaining the general ledger's integrity, the Chieffinancial Officer must regularly reconcile it with the separately maintained accounting records outlined in Sections A-D above. In addition, it is the Chieffinancial Officer's responsibility to review all accounts analytically from time to time for reasonableness and to identify unusual activity.

The general ledger's cash accounts should reflect only those transactions reported to the Chief financial Officer by the Treasurer/Collector, so that in theory, the general ledger should be in balance with the cashbook. However, errors may occur due to omitting transfers or transactions or applying them in the wrong amounts or to the wrong accounts. Whenever the Chief financial Officer identifies a discrepancy between the general ledger and the cashbook, the following steps must be taken in conjunction with the Treasurer/Collector to determine the cause:

- If the total amount of revenue reported in the cashbook does not agree with the amount recorded in the ledger for that month, the Treasurer/Collector must verify that the monthly
- Treasurer/Collector's Schedule of Receipts agrees by detailed amount and classification with the cashbook and correct any errors.
- Compare the total amount of warrants paid during the month as recorded in the cashbook with
 the total recorded in the ledger for the same period. The last warrant paid must be the last one
 recorded; otherwise, a timing problem will create a discrepancy.
- If the records still do not agree, the Treasurer/Collector and Chief financial Officer must trace each entry to the ledger until the variance is determined.

All receivable records must also be reconciled to the Chief financial Officer's general ledger. If a given receivable control has been internally reconciled, any discrepancy must be in the general ledger, so the Chief financial Officer must:

- Review the commitments, charges, payments, abatements, refunds, reclassifications, and adjustments in the general ledger, as appropriate for the particular control.
- Verify whether receipts are recorded to the correct type and levy year.
- Verify the dates that activities were recorded.

The Chief financial Officer's receivable accounts in the general ledger should reflect the transactions provided by each particular record-keeper. Therefore, the above steps must resolve any discrepancies between the receivable control and the ledger. If they do not, the record-keeper and Chief financial Officer must trace each ledger entry until they determine the reason for variance.

The Chief financial Officer will verify that all special revenue fund reconciliations match the general ledger. The responsible department head and Chief financial Officer must research any discrepancy and correct the record(s) as appropriate.

K-7F Time frames and Documentation

Policy:

Employees subject to this policy will complete reconciliations of their internal accounting records early each month so that subsequent reconciliations to the general ledger take place no later than [the 15th] of the month following the one being reconciled. At each quarter-ending month, the Chief financial Officer will extend the cash reconciliation process to individually reconcile every general ledger account that directly corresponds to a specific bank account (e.g., stabilization funds, trust funds, guarantee bond deposits).

Each general ledger reconciliation will be documented by a worksheet cosigned by the two parties. If, at that time, any variance has not yet been fully resolved, this must be noted, along with a work plan and timetable for resolution. The Chief financial Officer will submit the collective set of reconciliation worksheets to the Town Administrator at each month's end.

K-7G Audit

Policy:

All reconciliation activities are subject to audit by Wellfleet's independent auditor.

L. PROCUREMENT AND PURCHASING POLICIES

L-1 Procurement and Purchasing Policy

Background:

The Commonwealth of Massachusetts establishes municipal purchasing regulations under M.G.L. Chapter 30B, and other related regulations. The State Inspector General's office has oversight of public purchasing laws and has published a comprehensive guide to Chapter 30B requirements.

Policy:

The Town shall follow the guidance contained in the Inspector General's "The Chapter 30B Manual: Procuring Supplies, Services and Real Property" in order to comply with the requirements of M.G.L. Ch. 30B. To supplement this guidance, the Town's Chief Procurement Officer will maintain a concise manual on purchasing procedures for department heads or others involved in Town purchasing or procurement.

M. TREASURER INVESTMENT POLICIES

<u>M-1 Investment Policies</u> – <u>General Fund, Stabilization Fund, OPEB Trust Fund, Other Town</u> <u>Funds</u>

Background:

A local government's investment policy establishes guidelines and responsibilities in accordance with state law for managing and investing municipal funds.

The Governmental Accounting Standards Board recommends the disclosure of key policies affecting cash deposits and other long-term investments to ensure they are managed prudently or are not subject to extraordinary risks.

When assessing municipalities for credit quality, rating agencies look for investment management policies that address selection of financial institutions for services and transactions, risk assessment, investment objectives, investment maturities and volatility, portfolio diversification, safekeeping and custody, and investment performance reporting, benchmarking, and disclosure.

Policy:

The Treasurer-Collector is responsible for developing and maintain the policies for investing Town funds and will make all decisions regarding their management. The Treasurer/Collector shall invest Town funds in a manner that meets daily operating cash flow requirements and conforms to state statutes governing public funds, while adhering to generally accepted diversification, collateralization, and the prudent investment principles of safety, liquidity and yield. The Treasurer/Collector will also regularly monitor statutory changes governing investments and offer any policy amendments. The Treasurer Collector will submit a report of investments on a regular basis to the Town Administrator.

AUTHORIZED AND SUITABLE INVESTMENTS

SELECTION CRITERIA FOR BANKS AND BROKERS/DEALERS

A bank on the list of qualified banks for investment and banking services must meet minimum criteria, which are defined below. Banks failing to meet the minimum criteria or which, in the judgment of the Treasurer fail to offer adequate safety to the Town, will be removed from the qualified list. Although a bank is on the qualified list, it will still be required to pledge collateral on all deposits and investments, pursuant to Town and State Law.

- (1) Capital adequacy;
- (2) Asset quality;
- (3) Management; (4) Earnings, and;
- (5) Liquidity.

OTHER POST EMPLOYMENT BENEFITS TRUST FUNDS

Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 32B, Section 20 allows a city, town, district, county or municipal light plant to setup a special trust fund known as the Other Post Employments Benefits (OPEB) Liability Trust fund. Wellfleet accepted this section by vote of the Town under Article 15 of the 2009 Annual Town Meeting and has established and funded an OPEB Liability Trust fund. The Town Treasurer is the custodian of the fund. Investment of fund monies by the custodian shall be consistent with the prudent person standard set forth in Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 203C for private trust funds. Income earned by the fund shall be added to the fund principal.

M-1A Authorized and Suitable Investments

Policy:

The following are authorized and suitable investments, amendments to these investment types may be made at the request of the Chief Finical Officer or the Treasurer:

- 1. The Town is empowered by statute to invest in the following types of securities:
- 2. United State Treasury Bills. Short-term obligations of the United State government issued and sold at a discount, with maturities of 13, 26, and 52 weeks.
- 3. United State Treasury Notes and Bonds. Obligations of the United State government issued with a fixed coupon rate and original maturities of one year.
- 4. Repurchase Agreements. Contractual agreements between the Town and brokerage firms, banks or government bond dealers. The repurchase agreement (Repot) issuer receives cash and, in tum, provides securities to the Town as collateral for the cash. There exists a contractual agreement for the repot issuer to repurchase the securities at pre-determined dates and prices. The right of substitution of collateral may be granted to the issuer upon approval by the Treasurer.
- 5. Collateralized Public Deposits. Instruments issued by financial institutions (banks) that state specified sums have been deposited for specified periods of time and at specified rates of interest. The certificates of deposit are to be backed by acceptable collateral securities as dictated by State and local law. The right of substitution of collateral may be granted to the financial institution upon approval by the Treasurer. Interest will be calculated on a 365day year/actual-day month basis, or another method approved by the Treasurer in writing.
- 6. Federal Farm Credit Bank Discount Notes. Consolidated obligations of the Farm Credit Banks, issued on a discount basis, with maturities of one year or less.
- 7. Federal Farm Credit Bank Debentures. Unsecured consolidated obligations of the Farm Credit Banks, issued with a fixed coupon rate, with maturities ranging from six months to one year.
- 8. Federal Home Loan Bank Discount Notes. Consolidated obligations of the twelve district banks, issued on a discount basis, with maturities of one year or less.
- 9. Federal Home Loan Bank Debentures. Unsecured consolidated obligations of the twelve district banks, issued with a fixed coupon rate, with maturities running one year or less.
- 10. Federal National Mortgage Association Discount Notes. Obligations of the Association, issued on a discount basis, with maturities under one year.
- 11. Federal National Mortgage Association Debentures. Unsecured obligations of the Association, issued with a fixed coupon rate, with various maturities.
- 12. Federal Home Loan Mortgage Corporation Discount Notes. Obligations of the Corporation, issued on a discount basis, with maturities under one year.
- 13. Federal Home Loan Mortgage Corporation Debentures. Unsecured obligations of the Corporation, used with a fixed coupon rate, with various maturities.
- 14. Bank Money Market Account. Interest bearing bank deposits.
- 15. Federal Home Loan Mortgage Corporation Participation Certificates. Issues of the Corporation, representing undivided interests in conventional mortgages underwritten and previously purchased by the Corporation. The Corporation guarantees the timely payment of interest at the certificate rate and full return of principal. Original maturity payment dates are thirty days.
- 16. Participation Units in a combined Investment Fund. The fund must only invest in Treasury of Agency of the Federal Government instruments. Municipal bonds or corporate bonds rate "A" or higher. (e.g. MMDT-Chapter 44, Section 55)

M-1B Selection Criteria for Bank, Brokers and Dealers

Background:

M-2 Post-Issuance Tax Compliance Procedure for Tax-Exempt Debt Obligations and Other Tax-Benefited Obligations

Background:

Post-issuance compliance procedures are designed to provide for the effective management of a municipality's post bond or note issuance compliance program for tax-exempt and other tax-benefited bonds in a manner consistent with state and federal laws applicable to such obligations.

Policy:

The Treasurer/Collector shall review post-issuance compliance procedures at least annually and implement revisions or updates as deemed appropriate, in consultation with bond counsel or Financial Advisor.



N-Antifraud

Background:

To protect the Town's assets and reputation from misappropriation and abuse, this policy provides guidelines to safeguard against fraudulent activities and any appearance thereof. Policy objectives include:

- To create an environment in which employees and citizens can report any suspicion of fraud
- To communicate the Town's intent to prevent, report, investigate, and disclose to proper authorities suspected fraud, abuse, and similar irregularities
- To provide management with guidelines and responsibilities regarding appropriate actions in conducting investigations of alleged fraud and similar improprieties

Policy:

This policy pertains to any suspected fraud, abuse, or similar irregularity against the Town. It applies to all elected and appointed Town officials and employees and to any other persons acting on behalf of the Town, such as vendors, contractors, volunteers, casual employees, and grant subrecipients.

The Town is committed to protecting its revenue, property, information, and other assets from any attempt, either by members of the public, contractors, consultants, vendors, agents, or its own employees, to gain by deceit, financial or other benefits at the expense of taxpayers. Town officials, employees and other persons acting on behalf of the Town must, at all times, comply with all applicable policies, laws, and regulations. The Town will not condone any violation of law or ethical business practices and will not permit any activity that fails to withstand the closest possible public scrutiny. The Town intends to fully, objectively, and impartially investigate any suspected acts of fraud or other similar irregularities regardless of the position, title, length of service, or relationship with the government of any party who may be the subject of such investigation.

A. Definitions

Any person acting on behalf of the Town will mean any person responsible for or to Wellfleet's government placed in that position by some official relationship with the Town.

Abuse can occur in financial of nonfinancial settings and refers to, but is not limited to:

- Improper use or misuse of authority
- Improper use or misuse of Town property, equipment, materials, records, or other resources
- Waste of public funds

Fraud or other irregularity refers but is not limited to:

Any dishonest or fraudulent act

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- Forgery or alteration of any document or account
- Forgery or alteration of a check, bank draft, or any other financial document
- Misappropriation of funds, securities, supplies, or other assets
- Impropriety in the handling or reporting of money or financial transactions
- Profiteering as a result of insider knowledge of Town activities
- Disclosing confidential or proprietary information to outside parties
- Accepting or seeking anything of material value from consultants, contractors, vendors, or persons providing services or materials to the Town
- Destruction, removal or inappropriate use of records, furniture, fixtures, and equipment
- Any claim for reimbursement of expenses not made for the exclusive benefit of the Town
- Any computer-related activity involving the alteration, destruction, forgery, or manipulation of data for fraudulent purposes
- Any omissions and misrepresentations made in bond offering documents, presentations to rating agencies, and annual financial reports

B. Antifraud Responsibilities

Every employee has the responsibility to assist the Town in complying with policies and laws and in reporting violations. The Town encourages the support and cooperation of all employees in meeting the Town's commitment and responsibility to such compliance.

Town officials and department heads are responsible for instituting and maintaining a system of internal controls to reasonably ensure the prevention and detection of fraud, misappropriations, and similar irregularities. Management should be familiar with the types of improprieties that could occur within their areas of responsibility and be alert for any indications of such conduct.

The Town Administrator has primary responsibility for investigating all activity defined in this policy and will, to the extent practical, notify the Select Board of reported allegations of fraudulent or irregular conduct upon commencing the investigation. In all circumstances where there are reasonable grounds to indicate fraud may have occurred, the Town Administrator, subject to the advice of Town Counsel, will contact the Wellfleet Police Department and/or the District Attorney's office. Upon concluding the investigation, the Town Administrator will report results to the Select Board and others as determined necessary.

C. Disclosure

If the Town's investigation concludes that there was a violation of any federal criminal law involving fraud, bribery or gratuity potentially affecting a federal award, the Town Administrator will disclose such in writing to the federal awarding agency in compliance with the Office of Management and Budget's Omni Circular. Similarly, if there are findings of bond offering information falsification, the Town Administrator will disclose this in writing to the bondholders.

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PROCEDURES

The Town Administrator will create a set of procedures to be appended to this policy or incorporated by reference. The procedures should cover all of the following at minimum:

- 1. Procedure and methods for reporting suspicions of fraud, abuse and other irregularities
- 2. Assignment of responsibilities in response to reported suspicions
- 3. Employee protections from retaliation
- 4. Security of investigation documents
- 5. Treatment of anonymous allegations and false allegations (intentional and unintentional)
- 6. Personnel disciplinary actions
- 7. Responsibilities around media contact
- 8. Training, education and awareness
- 9. Disclosure requirements and protocols

N-1 DISBURSEMENTS

Background:

To mitigate the risk of fraud and ensure the Town disburses cash only for legally valid liabilities, this policy establishes guidelines for the expenditure of Town funds.

Policy:

This policy applies to the Chief Financial Officer, Treasurer/Collector's, and their designees' job duties and to the Selectboard's warrant approval responsibilities. It further applies to all department heads and elected or appointed officials who submit requests for expense and payroll disbursements (all referred to here as "department heads").

No disbursement for any payroll or accounts payable (AP) expense shall occur without the prior review and approval of the Chief Financial Officer and Selectboard. Accordingly, the Chief Financial Officer is responsible for finalizing every AP and payroll warrant and the Selectboard Clerk's signature

All payroll expenditures must be based on approved time and attendance records and consistent with collective bargaining agreements, personal service contracts, or Wellfleet's personnel bylaw. All vendor payments must be based on original invoices and issued only to entities with valid form W-9s on file. All invoices must be charged to the proper fiscal year. Payment for any bills payable for a prior fiscal year must be approved by vote of town meeting in accordance with MGL.c. 44, § 64.

Printed on the face of every disburse dicheck will be: "Void if not cashed within one year of issuance." The Treasurer/Collector will secure all checks in a safe until distributed. As a tax-exempt organization, the Town will not pay sales tax on any expense, including those associated with any employee personal reimbursements.

A. Ongoing Maintenance of Payroll and Leave Time Data

The Treasurer/Collector is responsible for maintaining a database all town employees including their salaries, pay rates, stipends, weekly work hours, earned leave time, benefit options, and withholdings. Any change to an employee's employment status, work hours, or pay rate can only be made by the Treasurer/Collector based on a personnel action form signed by the appropriate department head, and Town Administrator or their designee.

The Chief Financial Officer or their designee is responsible for maintaining and updating weekly a database of employee leave time accumulations and usage. Any change the Chief Financial Officer or their designee makes to any employee's rate of accumulation must be supported by one of the following documents: collective bargaining agreement, classification and compensation schedule, or personal services contract. Deductions to leave time will be based on data reported on weekly time sheets.

B. Weekly Responsibilities Related to Disbursement Processing

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Each **department head** is responsible for:

- Assuring that all purchases of goods and services conform to the state's procurement laws
- Verifying that adequate funds exist in the department's budget for every AP and payroll submission, attesting to the accuracy of each submission via signature, and timely submitting the disbursement requests to the Chief Financial Officer
- Distributing paychecks to employees upon receipt from the Treasurer/Collector

The **Chief Financial Officer** (and/or any delegated staff) is responsible for:

- Including each requested expense on the AP/payroll warrant only after validating:
 - o Procurement laws were adhered to
 - o The submission is legal o No fraud is evident o

Adequate funds exist

- Preparing the AP and payroll warrants and submitting them to the Select Board for approval
- Ensuring the payroll warrant balances with the Treasurer/Collector's payroll preliminary report before providing it to the Select Board and subsequently notifying the Treasurer/Collector to finalize the payroll
- Updating the general ledger with all AP and payroll warrant expenditures
- Receiving blank checks from the Treasurer/Collector, imprinting them with the disbursement data using the office printer, and returning them to the Treasurer/Collector

The Treasurer/Collector (and/or any delegated staff) is responsible for:

- Entering payroll data in the Abra database based on time sheets received from the Chief Financial Officer and transmitting the finalized electronic file when notified to do so by the Chief Financial Officer
- Reviewing the AP warrant and withholding from disbursement any amounts owed to the town by listed payees
- Upon receipt of payroll and AP warrants signed by the Select Board, funding the associated bank accounts in the gross amount of each warrant
- Providing the Chief Financial Officer with the appropriate number of sequential blank checks for printing
- Mailing out all AP checks to the vendors. The Treasurer/Collector will <u>not</u> give any vendor checks to department heads or other employees to mail.
- Notifying department heads to pick up paychecks on pay day.
- Updating the cashbook to document the disbursement activity

The **Selectboard** members are responsible for:

- Reviewing each warrant for appropriateness by examining the invoices, back-up documents, and payroll detail, and directing any inquiries to the Chief Financial Officer
- Approving the warrants by signing them

C. Emergency Disbursements

If there is an emergency or extenuating circumstance where payment must be made to a vendor outside of the normal warrant process, the Treasurer/Collector may issue a manual check with written authorizations by the Town Administrator. In any such case, the departmenthead will submit the expense to be processed as a no-check on the next accounts payable warrant.

D. Petty Cash

To mitigate the risks of illegal expenditures, procurement law violations, or instances of expenses exceeding appropriations, no petty cash accounts are authorized.

E. Audit

All disbursement activity is subject to audit by Wellfleet's independent auditor.

N-2 Employee Reimbursement

Background:

To mitigate opportunities for fraud, waste and abuse, the Town must properly monitor and control reimbursements to employees and officials. This policy establishes rules governing reimbursements for legitimate business-related expenses, including necessary travel expenses incurred in performing official duties. It also provides guidelines for determining reasonable travel-related and other expenses and details the procedures, forms and documentation necessary to receive reimbursement.

Policy:

The Town will reimburse employees for reasonable expenses incurred on the Town's behalf as authorized by their department heads, boards, or committees.

Travel shall be restricted to necessary activities that provide a public benefit, such as training, professional conferences, and other municipal-related activities. All travel on Town business shall be planned for using the most economical mode and class of transportation reasonably available and the most direct and time-efficient route. Employees will travel using government and group rates when available. The Town will not reimburse or pay sales tax but will, however, pay meals and room excise taxes.

Business-related expenses, such as office supplies, should be procured through the Town's vendors and billed directly to the Town as much as feasible. Whenever this is not possible, the purchase must be made with the department head's approval.

When this policy is not followed, there is no guarantee that all expenditures will be reimbursed. Employees should determine estimates for their travel costs, discuss any extraordinary circumstances and expenses with their department heads, and obtain their authorizations in advance.

A. Unauthorized Expenses

The following expenditures will not be reimbursed:

- Alcoholic beverages and tobacco
- Massachusetts sales tax
- Costs associated with any political or charitable event
- Flowers or other gifts for employees or others
- Expenses incurred by or on behalf of any person who is not a Town employee who accompanies the employee on official business
- Expenses incurred for the sole benefit of the traveler, such as valet service, entertainment, laundry services, etc.
- Theft, loss, or damage to personal property while on Town business
- Non-mileage-related personal automobile expenses, including repairs, insurance, gasoline, and traffic citations

The Chief Financial Officer may refuse to approve for payment any claim deemed to be ineligible, fraudulent, unlawful, or excessive. In that instance, the Chief Financial Officer will file a written statement of the reason for refusal with the Treasurer/Collector and forward copies to the Town Administrator and the originating department head. Resolution of all disputes shall reside with the Town Administrator.

B. Reimbursable Expense Categories

Transportation

- Employees authorized to travel using their personal vehicle will be reimbursed at the mileage reimbursement rate established yearly by the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) or, for union employees, the rate established in their contractual agreement.
- Mileage will be calculated starting from the employee's office location or residence to the destination point, whichever distance is shorter.
- Employees must present receipts to be reimbursed for parking, tolls, airfares, taxi fares, and, when using a Town-owned vehicle, fuel charges.

Lodging

- If travel requires an employee to be away from home for more than 24 hours, he or she will be reimbursed for reasonable charges for lodging expenses.
- Lodging expenses must not exceed the group rate published by the conference or activity sponsor. If the sponsor's group rate is not available when booking, the Town will reimburse for lodging costs comparable in location and quality and reserved at the lodging's government or group rate, whenever that is available.
- The Town will reimburse for only one night preceding any conference.

Meals

- If travel requires an employee to be away from home for more than 24 hours, he or she will be reimbursed for reasonable charges for meal expenses.
- Meal costs, including tips and taxes, incurred during approved travel will be reimbursed only upon
 presentation of itemized receipts. If the receipt is for multiple employees, they should be listed
 on the back of the receipt.
- Meals included in registration costs cannot be claimed for reimbursement or advance.
- Under no circumstance will the total meals reimbursement exceed the Town's per diem rate of \$65.

Registrations

- Whenever possible, registration fees for any conference, training, or workshop should be paid in advance through the Town's accounts payable warrant process. To pay advance registrations timely, the registration bill must be received in the Chief Financial Officer no later than two weeks prior to the registration deadline.
- If registration is not paid in advance, the employee must pay out-of-pocket and then submit for reimbursement.

Business and Office Supplies

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- Employees must obtain department head approval prior to incurring expenses for any business or office supplies, and all purchases made on behalf of the Town must be necessary, reasonable, and appropriate.
- Business-related special postal services or delivery services that are not available through the Town will be reimbursed.

C. Reimbursement Submission

Every claim for reimbursement must be documented using an [Expense Reimbursement Form] signed by the employee and the authorizing department head. Required information on the form includes: the travel or purchase date(s), purpose, amount(s), and total business-related mileage (as applicable). Except for mileage, the employee must attach to the form a receipt or other valid proof of payment for each reimbursement claim.

Employees should submit for reimbursement as soon as the travel has concluded or the expense has been paid, but at maximum, no later than 30 days after the expenses being incurred. If an employee does not submit the [Expense Reimbursement Form] and accompanying receipts or other necessary documentation within that time, he or she may be personally responsible for the expenses.

D. Violations

Employees who violate this policy will be held directly responsible for their actions. Consequences may include revocation of travel privileges, reparatory payments, suspension, or termination. Improper documentation of otherwise valid travel expenditures creates the appearance of fraud, waste, or abuse and may result in similar consequences. Moreover, misrepresenting expenses and intentionally submitting false claims are fraudulent and could result in criminal penalties.

E. Audit

All expenses are subject to verification that they comply with this policy and to audit by the Town's independent auditor.

O: FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT TEAM

Background:

Team meetings help the Town's finance officers to maintain open lines of communication and reinforce awareness of their interdependence. In this forum, team members can identify critical junctures, consider strategies to deal with anticipated areas of concern, and establish agreement about goals, deadlines, and each individual's role in meeting common objectives. A formal financial management team approach also fosters institutional continuity during times of turnover in financial offices.

To maximize the effectiveness of financial practices by optimizing the coordination of interdepartmental activities and long-range plans, this policy establishes a financial management team that will meet regularly to discuss common goals and objectives.

POLICY

The Town establishes a financial management team consisting of the Town Administrator, Chief Financial Officer, Treasurer/Collector, Assessor, & Town Accountant. Meetings of the team will be scheduled at a consistent time each month and more frequently when necessary.

Agenda topics will include:

- Updating the status of assigned responsibilities and due dates related to cyclical procedures, such
 as tax takings, tax recaps, year-end closings, and others
- Monitoring monthly revenue and expenditure reports and analyzing cash flow
- Reviewing the effectiveness of internal controls, including the status of reconciliations
- Coordinating submissions to the Division of Local Services
- Assessing special projects assigned by the Selectboard or Town Administrator
- Pursuing professional development and training opportunities
- Assessing progress on any initiatives being implemented.

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APPENDIX 1: SELECTED GLOSSARY OF TERMS

Available Funds —Balances in the various fund types that represent non-recurring revenue sources. As a matter of sound practice, they are frequently appropriated to meet unforeseen expenses, for capital expenditures or other onetime costs. Examples of available funds include free cash, stabilization funds, overlay surplus, water surplus, and enterprise net assets unrestricted (formerly retained earnings).

Betterments (Special Assessments) – Whenever part of a community benefits from a public improvement, or betterment (e.g., water, sewer, sidewalks, etc.), special property taxes may be assessed to the property owners of that area to reimburse the governmental entity for all, or part, of the costs it incurred in completing the project. Each property parcel receiving the benefit is assessed a proportionate share of the cost which may be paid in full, or apportioned over a period of up to 20 years. In this case, one year's apportionment along with one year's committed interest computed from October 1 to October 1 is added to the tax bill until the betterment has been paid.

Block Grant – A Block Grant is a Federal grant of money awarded by formula under very general guidelines that allow grantees broad latitude in spending activities. Recipients are normally state or local governments.

Bond – A means to raise money through the issuance of debt. A bond issuer/borrower promises in writing to repay a specified sum of money, alternately referred to as face value, par value or bond principal, to the buyer of the bond on a specified future date (maturity date), together with periodic interest at a specified rate. The term of a bond is always greater than one year.

Bond and Interest Schedule Record (Bond Register) – The permanent and complete record maintained by a treasurer for each bond issue. It shows the amount of interest and principal

coming due each date and all other pertinent information concerning the bond issue.

Bond Anticipation Note (BAN) – Short-term debt instrument used to generate cash for initial project costs and with the expectation that the debt will be replaced later by permanent bonding. Typically issued for a term of less than one year, BANs may be reissued for up to five years, provided principal repayment begins after two years (MGL Ch. 44§17).

Principal payments on school related BANs may be

deferred up to seven years (increased in 2002 from five years) if the community has an approved project on the Massachusetts School Building Authority (MSBA) priority list. BANs are full faith and credit obligations.

Bond Authorization – The action of town meeting or a city council authorizing the executive branch to raise money through the sale of bonds in a specific amount and for a specific purpose.

Once authorized, issuance is by the treasurer upon the signature of the mayor, or selectmen. (See Bond issue)

Bond Buyer – A daily trade paper containing current and historical information of interest to the municipal bond business.

Bond Counsel – An attorney or law firm engaged to review and submit an opinion on the legal aspects of a municipal bond or note issue.

Bond Issue – The actual sale of the entire, or a portion of, the bond amount authorized by a town meeting or city council.

Bond Rating (Municipal) – A credit rating assigned to a municipality to help investors assess the future ability, legal obligation, and willingness of the municipality (bond issuer) to make timely debt service payments. Stated otherwise, a rating helps prospective investors determine the level of risk associated with a given fixed-income investment. Rating agencies, such as Moody's and Standard and Poor's, use rating systems, which designate a

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letter or a combination of letters and numerals where AAA is the highest rating and C1 is a very low rating.

Bonds Authorized and Unissued – Balance of a bond authorization not yet sold. Upon completion or abandonment of a project, any remaining balance of authorized and unissued bonds may not be used for other purposes, but must be rescinded by town meeting or the city council to be removed from community's books.

Capital Assets — All tangible property used in the operation of government, which is not easily converted into cash, and has an initial useful live extending beyond a single financial reporting period. Capital assets include land and land improvements; infrastructure such as roads, bridges, water and sewer lines; easements; buildings and building improvements; vehicles, machinery and equipment. Communities typically define capital assets in terms of a minimum useful life and a minimum initial cost. (See Fixed Asset)

Capital Budget — An appropriation or spending plan that uses borrowing or direct outlay for capital or fixed asset improvements. Among other information, a capital budget should identify the method of financing each recommended expenditure, i.e., tax levy or rates, and identify those items that were not recommended. (See Capital Asset, Fixed Asset)

Capital Improvements Program — A blueprint for planning a community's capital expenditures that comprises an annual capital budget and a five-year capital program. It coordinates community planning, fiscal capacity and physical development. While all of the community's needs should be identified in the program, there is a set of criteria that prioritizes the expenditures.

Capital Outlay – The exchange of one asset (cash) for another (capital asset), with no ultimate effect on net assets. Also known as "pay as you go," it is the appropriation and use of available cash to fund

a capital improvement, as opposed to incurring debt to cover the cost.

Capital Outlay Expenditure Exclusion – A temporary increase in the tax levy to fund a capital project or make a capital acquisition. Exclusions require two-thirds vote of the selectmen or city council (sometimes with the mayor's approval) and a majority vote in a community-wide referendum. The exclusion is added to the tax levy only during the year in which the project is being funded and may increase the tax levy above the levy ceiling

Chapter 90 Highway Funds — State funds derived from periodic transportation bond authorizations and apportioned to communities for highway projects based on a formula under the provisions of MGL Ch. 90 §34. The Chapter 90 formula comprises three variables: local road mileage (58.33 percent) as certified by the Massachusetts Highway Department (MHD), local employment level (20.83 percent) derived the Department of Employment and Training (DET), and population estimates (20.83 percent) from the US Census Bureau. Local highway projects are approved in advance. Later, on the submission of certified expenditure reports to MHD, communities receive cost reimbursements to the limit of the grant.

contingent Appropriation – An appropriation that authorizes spending for a particular purpose only if subsequently approved in a voter referendum. Under MGL Ch. 59 §21C (m), towns may make appropriations from the tax levy, available funds or borrowing, contingent upon the subsequent passage of a Proposition 21/2 override or exclusion question for the same purpose. If initially approved at an annual town meeting, voter approval of the contingent appropriation must occur by September 15. Otherwise, the referendum vote must occur within 90 days after the town meeting dissolves. The question may be placed before the voters at more than one election, but if not approved by the applicable deadline, the appropriation is null and void. If contingent appropriations are funded through property taxes, DOR cannot approve the tax rate until the related override or exclusion

question is resolved or the deadline passes, whichever occurs first.

Debt Authorization – Formal approval by a two-thirds vote of town meeting or city council to incur debt, in accordance with procedures stated in MGL Ch. 44 §§1,2,3,4a,6-15.

Debt Burden – The amount of debt carried by an issuer usually expressed as a measure of value (i.e., debt as a percentage of assessed value, debt per capita, etc.). Sometimes debt burden refers to debt service costs as a percentage of the total annual budget.

Debt Exclusion – An action taken by a community through a referendum vote to raise the funds necessary to pay debt service costs for a particular project from the property tax levy, but outside the limits under Proposition 2½. By approving a debt exclusion, a community calculates its annual levy limit under Proposition 2½, then adds the excluded debt service cost. The amount is added to the levy limit for the life of the debt only and may increase the levy above the levy ceiling.

Debt Limit – The maximum amount of debt that a municipality may authorize for qualified purposes under state law. Under MGL Ch. 44 §10, debt limits are set at 5 percent of EQV. By petition to the Municipal Finance Oversight Board, cities and towns can receive approval to increase their debt limit to 10 percent of EQV.

Debt Policy — Part of an overall capital financing policy that provides evidence of a commitment to meet infrastructure needs through a planned program of future financing. Debt policies should be submitted to elected officials for consideration and approval.

Debt Service – The repayment cost, usually stated in

annual terms and based on an amortization schedule, of the principal and interest on any particular bond issue.

Enterprise Fund - An enterprise fund, authorized by MGL Ch. 44 §53F½, is a separate accounting and financial reporting mechanism for municipal services for which a fee is charged in exchange for goods or services. It allows a community to demonstrate to the public the portion of total costs of a service that is recovered through user charges and the portion that is subsidized by the tax levy, if any. With an enterprise fund, all costs of service delivery--direct, indirect, and capital costs--are identified. This allows the community to recover total service costs through user fees if it chooses. Enterprise accounting also enables communities to reserve the "surplus" or net assets unrestricted generated by the operation of the enterprise rather than closing it out to the general fund at year-end. Services that may be treated as enterprises include, but are not limited to, water, sewer, hospital, and airport services. See DOR IGR 08-101

Free Cash (Also Budgetary Fund Balance) — Remaining, unrestricted funds from operations of the previous fiscal year including unexpended free cash from the previous year, actual receipts in excess of revenue estimates shown on the tax recapitulation sheet, and unspent amounts in budget line-items. Unpaid property taxes and certain deficits reduce the amount that can be certified as free cash. The calculation of free cash is based on the balance sheet as of June 30, which is submitted by the community's auditor, accountant, or comptroller. Important: free cash is not available for appropriation until certified by the Director of Accounts.

General Obligation Bonds – Bonds issued by a municipality for purposes allowed by statute that are backed by the full faith and credit of its taxing authority.

Levy Limit — A levy limit is one of two types of levy (tax) restrictions imposed by MGL Ch. 59 §21C (Proposition 2½). It states that the real and personal property taxes imposed by a city or town may only grow each year by 2½ percent of the prior year's levy limit, plus new growth and any overrides or exclusions. The levy limit can exceed

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the levy ceiling only if the community passes a capital expenditure exclusion, debt exclusion, or special exclusion. (See Levy Ceiling)

Massachusetts School Building Authority

(MSBA) – Administers the state program that reimburses cities, towns, and regional school districts varying percentages of their school construction costs depending on the wealth of the community or district and the category of reimbursement. Projects that received their first reimbursement payment prior to July 26, 2004 will continue to get annual state payments to offset the related annual debt service. Thereafter, cities, towns, and regional school districts will receive a lump sum amount representing the state's share of the eligible project costs... (See DOR IGR 06-101)

New Growth – The additional tax revenue generated by new construction, renovations and other increases in the property tax base during a calendar year. It does not include value increases caused by normal market forces or by revaluations. New growth is calculated by multiplying the assessed value associated with new construction, renovations and other increases by the prior year tax rate. The additional tax revenue is then incorporated into the calculation of the next year's levy

limit. For example, new growth for FY07 is based on new construction, etc. that occurred between January and December 2005 (or July 2005 and June 2006 for accelerated new growth communities). In the fall of 2006, when new growth is being determined to set the FY07 levy limit, the FY06 tax rate is used in the calculation.

Non-Recurring Revenue Source — A one-time source of money available to a city or town. By its nature, a nonrecurring revenue source cannot be relied upon in future years. Therefore, such funds should not be used for operating or other expenses that continue from year-to-year. (See Recurring Revenue Source)

Principal – The face amount of a bond, exclusive of accrued interest.

Receipts Reserved for Appropriation — Proceeds that are earmarked by law and placed in separate accounts for appropriation for particular purposes. For example, parking meter proceeds may be appropriated to offset certain expenses for parking meters and the regulation of parking and other traffic activities

Principal The face amount of a bond, exclusive of accrued interest.

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Sale of Cemetery Lots Fund — A fund established to account for proceeds of the sale of cemetery lots. The proceeds may only be appropriated to pay for the cost of the land, its care and improvement or the enlargement of the cemetery under provisions of MGL Ch. 114 §15.

Sale of Real Estate Fund — A fund established to account for the proceeds of the sale of municipal real estate other than proceeds acquired through tax title foreclosure. MGL Ch. 44 §63 states that such proceeds shall be applied first to the retirement of debt on the property sold. In the absence of such debt, funds may generally be used for purposes for which the city or town is authorized to borrow for a period of five years or more

Short-Term Debt — Outstanding balance, at any given time, on amounts borrowed with a maturity date of 12 months or less.

Special Exclusion – For a few limited capital purposes, a community may exceed its levy limit or levy ceiling without voter approval. Presently, there are two special expenditure exclusions: 1) water and sewer project debt service costs which reduce the water and sewer rates by the same amount; and 2) a program to assist homeowners to repair or

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replace faulty septic systems, remove underground fuel storage tanks, or remove dangerous levels of lead paint to meet public health and safety code requirements. In the second special exclusion, homeowners repay the municipality for the cost plus interest apportioned over a period of time, not to exceed 20 years

Special Revenue Fund – Funds, established by statute only, containing revenues that are earmarked for and restricted to expenditures for specific purposes. Special revenue funds include receipts reserved for appropriation, revolving funds, grants from governmental entities, and gifts from private individuals or organizations.

Stabilization Fund — A fund designed to accumulate amounts for capital and other future spending purposes, although it may be appropriated for any lawful purpose (MGL Ch. 40 §5B). Communities may establish one or more stabilization funds for different purposes and may appropriate into them in any year an amount not to exceed ten percent of the prior year's tax levy. The total of all stabilization fund balances shall not exceed ten percent of the community's equalized value, and any interest shall be added to and become a part of the funds. A two-thirds vote of town meeting or city council is required to establish, amend the purpose of, or appropriate money into or from the stabilization fund

Administration

Council on Aging

- I am pleased to announce that Sally Largey, who has been with the Town for 18 years, is our new Outreach Coordinator. She was selected from the four candidates interviewed by a team that consisted of Rebecca Roughley Assistant Town Administrator, Wilson Sullivan the Chair of the COA Advisory Board, Terri Frazier, the Assistant COA Director.
- We will be advertising for Sally's replacement at the Front Desk where Sally supervised the Transportation program and the care and custody of our COA vehicles.

Harbormaster

- Grant award. We received a 2.5 million dollar grant award from the Commonwealth of Massachusetts Housing and Economic Development for the purpose of dredging Area II.
 This is the second year in a row our application has received Max award.
- Fuel Tank Replacement. Thursday July 28th we will be opening bids for the replacement of the Marina fuel system. We are hoping to see some healthy competition based on the amount of interest that was shown in the bid package.
- Dredging bid. We have been analyzing the dredging bids for Area II with GEI Engineering as well as KP Law. We hope to have results back to the Town and Bidders by the end of the week.

Health/Conservation

- We are continuing to distribute covid antigen test kits to residents and employees of local businesses. This week we have 5 positives tests identified on our online reporting tool and 4 identified in the state reporting database (PCR Only)
- The Targeted Watershed Management Plan has been formally submitted to MA DEP and the CCC for concurrent review. Scott Horsley with MA DEP's support has begun to draft the Targeted Watershed Management Permit for their review. A discussion on SRF funding is scheduled for next week with MA DEP.
- Duck, Great, and Gull Pond have shown elevated cyanobacteria growth rates and we are continuing to monitor them weekly. We have no recreational beach advisories for these sites at this time.
- We created and printed bathing beach stickers for the beach signs to allow visitors and residents easy access to beach water quality results. The QR coded stickers should be arriving shortly.
- Updated Wellfleet Board of Health Emergency Operations Plan and will be reaching out to staff to follow up on NIMS/ICS trainings.
- Repaired stairs at Drummer Cove to improve accessibility to the marsh side of the trail system and to mitigate erosion issues. This project was a collaboration with Americorps, Health and Conservation, and DPW.
- Mosquitoes collected on Joint Base Cape Cod on 7/15/22 tested positive for West Nile
 Virus. Crews have been out treating catch basins across the Cape this week. This is the
 first mosquito sample collected in Barnstable County to test positive for arbovirus this
 year. The risk level for transmission of arbovirus remains low throughout Massachusetts.

Fire

- We have started the recruitment process for the two (2) new Firefighter-Paramedic/EMT positions and will begin application review in the next two weeks.
- We are completing the design and specifications for the new Engine 95 as approved at the Annual Town Meeting.
- Captain Joe Cappello is working with the Building Inspector in coordinating fire/life safety inspections on the numerous restaurants/eating establishments in the community.

Town of Wellfleet 3 Town Administrator

Library

- The Board of Trustees have adopted an Anti-Hate Statement which is an initiative that is strongly encouraged by the American Library Association. I commend them for being leaders in this type of initiative, as no other libraries in the CLAMS network have yet to draft such a statement. Here is the text: The members of the Board of Trustees of the Wellfleet Public Library support the Director and Staff in all efforts to adhere to the principles of freedom of speech, intellectual freedom, and free library access while at the same time opposing hateful conduct, in accordance with Federal and state anti-hate laws and with policies of the American Library Association. These policies address a hate crime as a "criminal offense against a person or property motivated in whole or in part by an offender's bias against a race, religion, disability, sexual orientation, ethnicity, gender, or gender identity...and can also encompass a person's color or national origin, (and) overt acts that can include violence against a persons or property, violation of civil rights, conspiracy, certain 'true threats, and acts of intimidation." - I have a forthcoming meeting with the Directors of the Truro and Provincetown libraries to brainstorm review cooperative grant opportunities. I hope this brings about the seeds of some exciting ideas for future collaborative ideas for funding and partnerships.
- On Thursday, August 4th, we are having a teen improv workshop with Jennifer Subrin of the Comedy School of Cape Cod. We held this program in July and it was wildly successful. Teens met each other prior to high school and will be entering drama club together! We hope even more teens will attend this time around!
- The Friends of the Library will be having their annual Distinguished Speaker fundraiser on August 8th by welcoming Congressman Jamie Raskin to the Congregational Church. Aside from the work he has done in Congress this year, he also published a book about his experience and the tragic death of his son. We will be selling the book for signing.
- On August 10th, local author Emily Bingham will be presenting her new book, My Old Kentucky Home. Emily is a Kentucky native and this is a history of the song and a look at its racist origins and how it is used as a state anthem today. Emily is an amazing writer and speaker and we are looking forward to having her back at the library.

Police

- The full-time members of the police department (police & dispatch) will be participating in an Active Shooter Training next month at Nauset Regional High School. There are six scheduled dates so the Nauset School District Police Departments can train all swom and civilian staff. This fall members of our department will participate in lock drills at Wellfleet Elementary School to become familiar with the footprint of the building and assist school staff.
- The Chief was invited and attended the annual summer BBQ held at Harbor Side Village. It
 was a great event interacting with the village residents with tons of food and music!!

• The Chief received several thank you letters from community members on the department's two Community Service Officers Sam Bradshaw and Jack Richards. The first thank you was for Sam who helped someone not feeling well working inside townhall. "He offered to get her water, to stay with her until she felt OK, to call someone to come get her, and gave her his cell phone number to call if she needed help. This is EXACTLY what a CSO should be. He was so professional and caring. Congratulations on a great hire!". The second thank you was from a resident in Harbor Side Village who wanted the Chief to know that Sam and Jack were patrolling on their bikes when they stopped to help her husband carry in a heavy air conditioner. The resident stated that Sam and Jack were kind, helpful and a real asset to the Police Department.

Public Works

- Working with Town Administration to secure a tent for a possible outdoor Town Meeting event.
- DPW is busy working with the Herring River and Maurice Campground planning teams.
- DPW staff continues to assist other departments with their summer operations as well as maintaining roadside brushing and ground maintenance of our facilities.

Recreation

- The 48th Annual Wellfleet Road Race was a huge success. 175 runners in total
 participated in the 5-mile race and 1.2-mile children's fun run which was an increase from
 last year as participants return to road racing after the covid restrictions. Many thanks to
 the DPW, WPD and WFD for their support with this Wellfleet tradition.
- The Summer Rec program at Baker's Field and Gull Pond Swim Lessons are both very popular and currently at capacity. Summer Rec has 178 participants in morning rec and 68 that attend the extended rec program until 3:00 PM. There are 200 children enrolled in the Gull Pond Swim lessons. Sixty-nine of the rec campers also attend pre-rec swim lessons from 8:00-9:00 AM. The summer counselors and swim instructors are doing an exemplary job in to meeting the huge demand for these popular programs.
- The Bands performing at the Music at Mayo concert series have been very appreciative of the event quality stage recently funded by CPC grant and fully utilized by the eclectic mix of performers for the first time during the summer of 2022.

Shellfish Department

- Deputy Shellfish Constable Chris Manulla assisted the state and the FDA on an inspection, and two grant holders participated and made a great impression.
- Assistant Shellfish Constable Johnny Clam Mankevetch has been making use of his new bull rake and harvesting bushels and bushels of littlenecks that he is putting in the Indian Neck Recreational area to the delight of our recreational shellfishermen. There have been over 100 shellfishermen out there every tide of late! We have had quite a few confiscations of product from people harvesting in the closed area.
- The DPW came down to our offices and removed all of the wet and molding ceiling tiles and insulation! Step one in fixing our building. We owe them a big THANKS!

- We took the state out for water quality testing of the Herring River and collected sets of wild oyster samples for a vibrio study they are conducting.
- We submitted a letter to the Conservation Commission in favor of Michael DeVasto's grant extension, as they had already approved those for Pat Winslow and Shea Murphy.
- Deputy Shellfish Constable Jordan Halloran worked with the Mass. Oyster Project, Wellfleet SPAT and the Nauset Regional Middle School STEAM camp to host 60 campers at Jake Puffer's shellfish farm. They had fun activities for the kids to do while they earned about shellfish, aquaculture and the marine environment. Kudos to SPAT for its amazing curriculum – they really got the kids into it! It would not have been as good without them.
- Johnny Clam hosted 40 campers from the Chequessett Yacht and Country Club on our propagation bed and taught them to dig clams for us to bring to the recreational area on Indian Neck.
- Johnny Clam was featured on WCVB'-TV's "Chronicle" and did a great job of promoting our wild oysters and our partnership with the Mass. Oyster Project on its restaurant shell recycling program. It is a four and a half minute piece that you can watch here.
- And on another fun note, Nancy cooked a dinner for the Shellfish Dept. and Audrey Healey, the AmeriCorps member who served with us since last October, as a goodbye in her honor. She took on anything we threw her way and did it with precision and passion. She now takes all she learned with us to a job with Mook Sea Farms in Maine – a hatchery and oyster farm. We wish her the best!



II. Joint meeting with Board of Health, Clean Water Advisory Committee, & Selectboard

• DEP MassDEP's Regulatory Strategy for Cape Cod Estuaries Impaired by Nitrogen

The team from the DEP presented to the boards a slide show showing how the town could obtain a water shed permit, they discussed funding and the ability to accomplish it.

They finished the slide show, and the board had some questions for the DEP representatives. They discussed funding and loan options. Chair Curley had some comments on the proposed regulations. He questioned the ability of the board of health and if they would be able to regulate the number of systems. He feels that the timeline of five years is too aggressive for the town stating that he feels the DEP is setting the town of Wellfleet up for failure. He continued stating his concerns with the plan for Wellfleet. The board discussed the water shed permit at great length, discussing issues, concerns, and possibilities for the town.

• Presentation of Targeted Wastewater Plan

Horsley presented to the board the watershed plan. He began the power point presentation. He discussed with the group IA enhanced septic systems.

• Sewer Sheds GHD

The next power point presentation was the sewer shed slide. He explained how the sewer portion would work for Wellfleet. He discussed the transfer station and the opportunity for treatment at the transfer station. He spoke

about the traditional compliance approach. How the watersheds play into this plan. There were questions regarding this presentation. A long discussion took place about the water sheds, sewerage, and septic systems. Bacon spoke to the DEP representatives about septic and the 95 Lawrence Road project stating that Wellfleet would benefit hugely with a wastewater system. Civetta had questions regarding the shellfish department and how the shellfish propagation plays a role in this. Felix spoke to this watershed plan stating that we need to begin the process to move forward to move towards clean water. He gave kudos to the town for passing many wastewater articles at town meetings. He asked the Selectboard to pass this plan onto the DEP so the town can begin the work towards a watershed permit. DeVasto spoke to the board about the fact that there isn't much use of town property here.

Chair Curley Moved; Board Member Wolf Seconded, and it was voted to approve the application for the use of town property to Harbor of the Bay Road Race; David Whitman; for September 17, 2022, form 12pm to 5pm for a fee of \$500.

Roll Call Vote: 5-0

DeVasto stated to the board for the record he didn't agree with the fee.

B. Amend Original Use of town Property ~ Wellfleet SPAT

Board Member DeVasto recused himself from this discussion.

Ward gave an update and explanation on the amendment of the original application.

Moreau, spoke on behalf of SPAT and gave some information behind the jump from 5,000 people to 7,000 people. She explained to the board how they came to this number. She explained there will be safety measures taken and the field will be able to safely hold the 7,000 people proposed.

Bacon spoke to the group and stated some concerns that she had explaining that she did some research. She read a statement regarding her explanation of being against the 7,000 people. Her concerns mainly focused on treatment of the environment.

Frazier spoke to the board and stated he would answer any questions regarding the structural standpoint. Moreau spoke to Bacon's concerns. She explained the precautionary measures they plan to put into place. Frazier stated that there will be a gated access and it is a hardened gravel surface. Bacon questioned how the ambulance will be able to enter into the field in case of an emergency. Moreau explained the details of where the emergency vehicles will be posted.

- C. (Natural Resources Conservation Service) NRCS Grant ~ Jay Norton Norton gave an update on this grant. He explained that the town of Wellfleet will be receiving more grant funding. He explained the details of this grant and who worked on it. It is to help protect shellfishing areas from being damaged by storm run off water. He explained that what the board has in front of them tonight is 3 easement requests from NRCS. Norton explained what each amount of the grant would be and where the money was going to.

He stated that it was an issue and there were some concerns about using the room for political events. He explained that Wellfleet doesn't have banquet space or a space for people to meet. Wolf gave the board details of his policy and his reasoning behind the policy. The board discussed this policy at great length. Bacon brought up not having political signs, buttons and other items within 50 feet of a town public meeting.

The board discussed this rule as well, and when polling or meeting under political terms is allowed. Board Member DeVasto gave his comments and concerns regarding this policy. They discussed this.

Thomas gave her opinions on this policy stating that it's her building and she's not comfortable with someone other than her making a policy. Chair Curley stated he would like to have town counsel look at the policies.

Chair Curley moved; Board Member DeVasto Seconded; and it was voted to refer both policies be sent to KP Law for their review and approval. Roll Call Vote: 5-0

E. Code of Conduct ~ Ryan Curley, Chair

Chair Curley presented his code of conduct to the board and public. He stated it had gone out to town staff and committees for their comments and suggestions. He continued stating that the WEA (Wellfleet Employees Association) He stated that he feels this policy should also be sent to town counsel for their review. Carboni spoke to sending it to counsel stating there are models of conduct. Bacon asked what the recall for this would be? Would a board member be removed from the board he or she is on? He stated he had asked town counsel to look at the remote participation policy in case anything needed to be changed or modified. He stated there is a critical aspect the board needs to consider. Will the town allow remote participation from the general public? Chair Curley stated that there was a ruling from Open Government which had town counsel change their opinions. It is determined by the selectboard if the public should be able to participate remotely. Chair Curley read a statement from the Open Government. A. Grow Smart Cape Cod ~ HAC/APCC

Gottlieb began a screen show presentation. The presentation discussed housing on the cape and the project they are working on, which will help identify areas that are important to the community, the environment. He went through the slides and discussed how they will be working on housing and objective criteria for housing. He explained how they applied these objectives. He continued his presentation talking about the recommendations he has made to the towns, how the funding will take place the approval processes. Etc. He spoke about the town investing in wastewater and explained the benefits of doing so.

Magnotta spoke to the board and gave more detail about the resources and the website they are working on with an interactive map. B. Seals & Sharks ~ Salem State University, Center for Coastal Studies, Atlantic White Shark Conservancy

explained that a while back there was a bounty on seals which caused there to be a large population drop of the gray seals. This stopped in the late 1970's. She continued talking about the goals of these groups. Discussion public safety and working with towns giving them the knowledge of the ever-changing wildlife and their ecosystem. They explained there are looking to gather knowledge from different groups, voters, fishermen, and tourists. She gave details on their methodology. Chair Curley Moved; Board Member DeVasto Seconded, and it was voted to accept in concept the US Department of Agriculture farm production and conservation general terms and conditions for grants with cooperative agreements and the draft watershed flood prevention statement of work for the Herring River Saltmarsh Restoration Project for a grant to the town of up to \$24 million dollars and financial assistance and up to \$3.2 million dollars in technical assistance for implementation of the Herring River Restoration Project and to authorize the Town Administrator to negotiate the final versions of these documents for approval by the Selectboard and further to authorize the Town Administrator to sign and submit the application and disclosure forms required by the US Department of Agriculture and Natural Resource Conservation Services.
