2. Conservation Commission Hearing on Wednesday, Mar. 2, 2022, at 5 p.m.

Agenda items of interest are:

- MA Audubon, Map 41, Parcel 182, RDA, fill road with 2" sand at east and end of Lt. Island Road causeway;
- Prager, 376 & 400 King Phillip Road, Map 35, Parcels 184 and 185, NOI, living shoreline and bank stabilization; and
- Mordacai, 374 King Phillip Rd., Map 35, Parcel 182, NOI, Install a living shoreline (Cont'd)

The Audubon hearing is about filling in the puddle in the access road to the South Lieutenant Island shellfishing area, which commercial wild fishermen might be interested in, and the other two are about proposed erosion solutions for two houses on King Phillip Rd., which shellfishermen with grants on Indian Neck and Field Point who have been affected by sand migration might find of interest.

As a reminder, the Shellfish and Conservation departments are working together to determine best ways to accomplish required beach nourishment while respecting the potential impacts to shellfish farms operating in the areas where the sand may migrate. We are hoping to schedule a joint Shellfish Advisory Board and Conservation Commission meeting this spring to discuss this in more detail.

3. Cold Shocked Terrapin Rescue Tips

Due to a recent influx in calls from the public about what to do when you find a cold-stunned diamondback terrapin on the beach, here are some key points to remember:

- 1. Keep the terrapin cool, around 50°F, do not warm them.
- 2. Don't put them back in the water, it's still too cold.
- 3. Let Mass Audubon/Wellfleet Bay Wildlife Sanctuary know when the terrapin was found. Call 508-349-2615 and press 8 or dial ext. 6104 to be connected with the turtle hotline.

Like last year, Mass Audubon is sending all of the live terrapins to the Cape Wildlife Center in Cummaguid so they can continue to collect blood samples and do analysis.
