## 1. Hats in the Cove

Please ensure that ALL your hats are tagged. If one were to get loose, we need to be able to determine whose it is to ensure that it gets back to the proper owner. Per our regulations, we also need to cross reference that grant holders have their propagation permits endorsed for spat collecting in Chipman's Cove (CCB13) and that they have a 2022 Wellfleet commercial shellfishing permit. Please tag all hats and gear by July 31, or contact the Shellfish Department to make other arrangements.

## 3. Vibrio vulnificus: What you need to know

A couple of shellfishermen, one commercial and one recreational, have let us know that they were recently treated with antibiotics for infected wounds from getting cut by oysters. While Vibrio parahaemolyticus is often associated with raw seafood, there is another strand of Vibrio, *Vibrio vulnificus*, that can cause life-threatening wound infections. People contract this type of Vibrio when an open wound comes in contact with raw or undercooked seafood, its juices or saltwater/brackish water. Please read more about this very serious bacterium here and take care of your wounds.
